She is following up on a career opportunity she first discovered at PHS two years ago in the U.I.L. one act play.

"I first noticed Cheryl in the one act play 'Jane Eyre'," Garza Theatre director Will McCrary explains, "and I wasn't surprised at all when she said yes to the request to appear as Elma Duckworth, a major supporting role, in 'Bus Stop,'" McCrary adds.

Since then Cheryl has starred as the lead in last summer's "The Taming Of The Shrew" as Kate, the sophisticated secretary in Act I of "Plaza Suite," and the pert and sexy Jill in Act II of "You Know I Can't Hear You When The Water's Running."

She has been nominated in four spots for this Saturday's "Willy Awards."

Co-starring with Cheryl in "Room Service" is another Post High School drama student, Mike Bartlett, who McCrary saw in "Music Man."

He will be playing in the part made famous by the younger Marx brother Zeppo in the Marx Brothers' version of the movie.

"I had been unable to cast the part of Leo, but when I saw the All-School play 'Music Man', I knew Mike would be great in 'Room Service,'" McCrary emphasizes.

"Mike has a natural gift for comedy, it's been great fun working with him in rehearsals, along with the other two mad-cap Post 'Marx Brothers' Roger McCurrin and Ronnie Gradine," the director continues.

"Mike could well do many different types of roles, he is one of those people to whom acting comes naturally," McCrary adds.

"Room Service" opens Thursday, February 4 and continues through Sunday, February 7.

Evening performances begin at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, Friday and Saturday and Sunday's matinee begins at 2 p.m.

His first coaching job was as an Odessa junior high coach in 1977-79 and became an assistant in Post in 1979.

He moved to the head coaching job at San Saba in 1986.

The 4-H Clubs are represented in the show by 53 Garza County members and the FFA by 31 members from Post and 17 members from Southland.

Announcer for this year's event will be Johnny Kemp with Bobby Fletcher, of Wolfforth, as auctioneer.

Leading off the show's activities will be the swine show to be held Thursday, January 28 beginning at 6:30 p.m. Judging for the swine show will be by Milton Morrow of Levelland.

The sheep show, which begins at 6:30 p.m. on Friday, January 29 will be judged by Allea Turner, County Agriculture Extension Agent for Runnels County.

The steer and heifer shows will get underway Saturday, January 29 at 9 a.m. with judging by Kevin Newsom, County Agriculture Extension Agent for Lamb County.

Awards in each division will be presented this year by current FFA and 4-H sweethearts on Saturday afternoon immediately preceding the 1:30 p.m. sale.

Showmanship buckles will also be presented to the outstanding showman in each of the events and an all-around sportsmanship buckle will be awarded to an individual

for work and contribution to the entire show.

Garza County Extension Homemakers will operate a concession stand throughout the show and sale and will serve a special luncheon from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. on Saturday, January 30.

A jackpot is now being collected for the purpose of purchasing animals shown in the show and donations may be made to association officers Jack Morris, president; Ronnie Dunn, vice president; Leon Gibbs, secretary; and Diane Graves, corresponding secretary.

The Garza County Commissioners court met in a regular session Monday, January 25 with only three items on the agenda, in addition to the regular Executive Session.

The commissioners heard from Jerry Riedel who asked about the policy on paid county employees campaigning for public office.

Riedel stated that he was making no accusations, but felt that the county should have some policy on what employees could and could not do when running for office.

He further stated that if no such policy existed, he would like to see a policy established and made public.

County Judge Giles Dalby told Riedel that there was no policy on the matter because it had never come up before and no policy had been needed.

Judge Dalby did say that a policy would be worked up and presented for approval at the next commissioners meeting.

Action was postponed on an update on the progress at White River Lake because water-tests

were still being run at the lake site and were needed to complete the progress report.

## C.W. Post's Landscaping Dream Revitalized Here

Landscape architect Debra Miller of Austin was in Post recently for the third and final Town Meeting for changes in plans for the Post Main Street Landscaping Project.

Guided by suggestions made at previous Town Meetings, Miller presented revised drawings showing trees which will be 40 feet apart when they reach full maturity in 40 years. Each Main Street block included in the project would be planted with six to seven trees per block.

On the advice of the Texas State Highway Department, red oaks will be used for plantings, with honeylocusts as alternatives.

As the highway department program is set up for landscaping only, trees and any greenery used would be the responsibility of the highway department.

Benches, lights, and trash receptacles would not be included in the program, but donations of these items could be counted as in-kind contributions and would go toward meeting the city's matching funds

## Moore Returns From Deployment

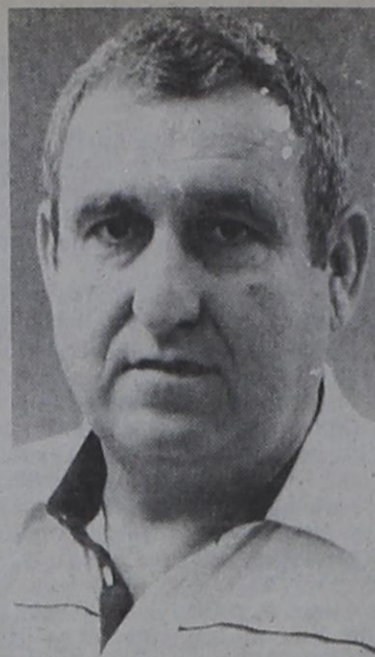

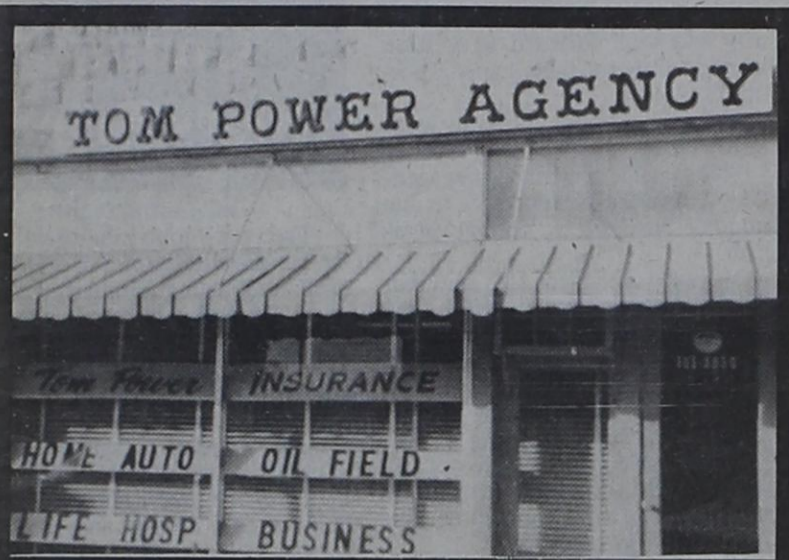

(Continued from Page 1) for the project.

Each block in the landscaped area would include two benches and two trash receptacles, with a street lamp at each end of the block. To retain the authenticity of C.W. Post's early landscaping plans, Miller would like to include hitching posts in each block.

Getting the landscaping project off to a good start is the Women's Division of the Post Chamber of Commerce with their donation of furnishings for one block.

One of the problems faced by the planners was the two blocks of Main Street from the Court House to Broadway which would not be covered by highway department funds because it is not on a state right-of-way.

The re-routing of Highway 380 to include these two blocks was considered, but the highway department suggested as an alternative the re-routing of 669 to put these two blocks on a state right-of-way and make it available for state funding.

To get approval for this alternate route would take about two months to complete.

After the Post Town Meeting, Miller and Main Street Project Manager Melissa Cunningham met with Woody Morrissey, Maintenance Construction Superintendent with the Texas State Highway Department to present him with the final plans.

The plans are now waiting Austin's approval of the application and, with the highway department so solidly behind the project, application approval should be made by March.

Actual work on the landscaping project could begin in August with a completion date of late October or early November.

Marcial Salinas, son of the late Willie and Anna Mae Salinas, was born and raised in Garza County and has lived here all his life, except for a period from 1958 to 1975 when he was employed in the law enforcement field in Georgia.

He attended school in Post and is employed as an electrician by Energy Electric of Snyder.

Salinas and his wife, Linda Mae, have two children. He is also the father of two stepsons and has five grandchildren. The couple attends Holy Cross Catholic Church.

Salinas' experience in the law enforcement field includes security work as a guard in Atlanta and as a commissioner's reserve deputy in Decatur, Georgia.

He also served as a reserve deputy for the Atlanta-Fulton County Sheriff's Department.

Salinas began work as a deputy in Post in 1978 under Sheriff J.F. Pippin, who "gave me my first chance in local law enforcement," Salinas said.

"First -- I am a town-boy and this is my home. I don't like the way the system is being run and I don't think Post is getting a fair chance.

"I think the people should have some say in the way the town is run and should all be treated equally," he said.

"People need to be respected and, if I'm elected, they will be - by me and by my staff; and I will be keeping on top of the performance and conduct of deputies.

"The people of Post are ready for a change, and the only way to get a change is to vote. No matter who you vote for -- vote. Vote and at least have a say in matters.

"People tried to help when I was a deputy here - especially the young people - and I appreciate that help and the help they are still giving me.

"Without that help and that support I wouldn't be running for this office now," Salinas concluded.

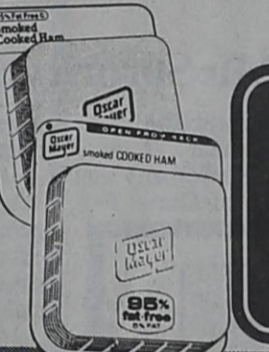

**Artist James Rice Works with Area School Students**

## Tom Power Agency Has Long History Here

Some of the Power family have been in business in Garza County since 1909 at which time Tom Power's father and grandfather purchased the C.W. Post Commissary

### Mid-Plains Could Expand Garza Field Operations

Lubbock's Electric Utility Board members have been negotiating with Mid-Plains, a gas gathering company operating in Garza County oilfields, for a contract to provide natural gas to Lubbock Power and Light for the next 20 years.

Carroll McDonald, city director of electric utilities for Lubbock said the limit on the contract is for four million thousand cubic feet (mcf) a day, but Mid-Plains currently supplies only about two and a half million a day.

The contract probably would give Mid-Plains an incentive to connect with additional Garza County wells to meet the commitment, McDonald said.

Currently, Mid-Plains sells its gas to another company which sells gas to Lubbock Power & Light at \$2.60 per mcf.

A tentative agreement with Mid-Plains calls for the firm to supply gas to LP&L for 20 years at \$2.15 per mcf for the first year.

The prices would increase one percent a year for the next four year until the price reaches \$2.23 per mcf at the end of five years.

The Lady Lopes extended their lead by out scoring Denver City 18-11 in the second period to lead 29-19 at halftime.

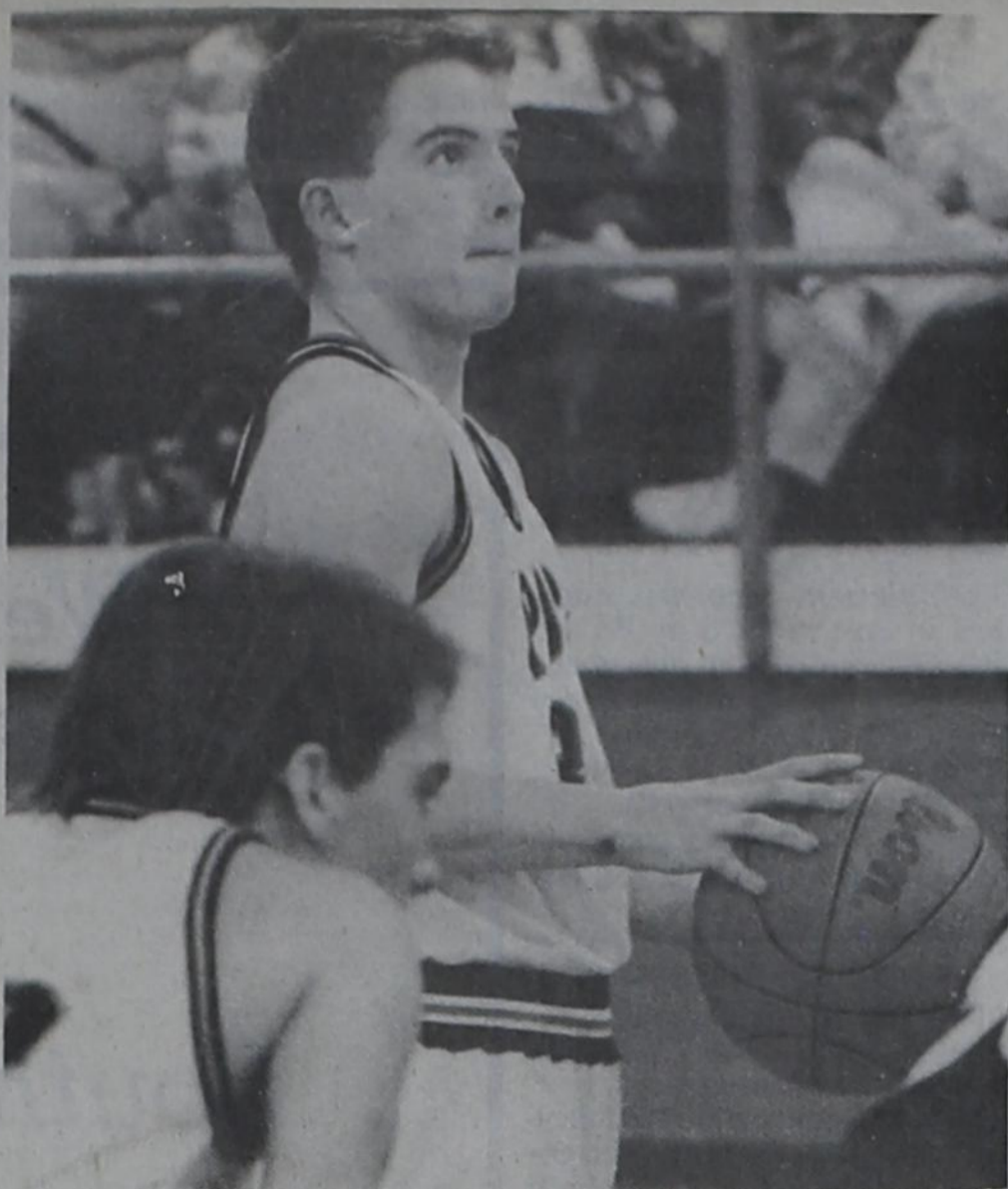
Again the Lopes came out a little weak in the third quarter only scoring five points
