U.I.L. Places Post in Same District, for Now

The University Interscholastic League (U.I.L.) announced Thursday afternoon its new two-year alignments, leaving Post in District 3AAA, replacing Idalou with Lamesa.

The U.I.L. had announced Wednesday afternoon that Post and Lamesa would be in District 5AAA with Midland, Greenwood, Coahoma, Merkel and Colorado City.

The decision to switch the alignment was made Thursday afternoon.

Idalou dropped to 2A and will join District 4AA.

Other 3AAA teams are Roosevelt, Denver City, Brownfield, Cooper, Slaton and Seminole.

The new alignment takes effect with the 1988-89 school year. The alignment is not final until February 28, when all appeals will be decided.

New head coach Dewayne Osborne has arranged verbal agreements for five non-district football games, beginning with Abernathy, followed by Idalou and Littlefield.

Exact places and dates of games will be announced in the near future, following the waiting period for petitions to the U.I.L.

The new 5AAA football district brings Coahoma, Merkel and Colorado City from the old 5AAA, adding Lamesa and Post.

Southland will be in District 3A with Bledsoe, New Home, Smyer, Wellman, Whitharral and Wilson. Bledsoe will not compete in football.

in have been subsidiaries or suburbs of larger cities.

Turner comes to Post from Fort Worth, but is a native of Mena, Arkansas and lived for 17 years in Fort Smith, Arkansas.

He is a graduate of the University of Central Arkansas and did graduate work at the University of Arkansas. He also received a master's degree from a university in Mexico.

After completing his education, and prior to 1970, he was in private industry and worked in Europe for seven years and New York for four years.

In 1970 he worked with several small cities in six Arkansas counties writing grants and programs as part of the Economic Development Agency in Fort Smith.

In 1973, Turner began work, basically as an independent contractor, with a real estate and development business and worked with one of the largest homes builders in the state, with a lot of emphasis on planning and zoning.

While he was working in the development industry, Barling, a subsidiary of Fort Smith, elected to switch to a city manager position and asked Turner to at least fill in for them until they found their permanent city manager. He "filled in" for four years.

Turner had wanted to move to Texas; Texas was a "city manager" state; and he came to Lake Worth where he served as city manager for two years.

Lake Worth, however, wasn't the self contained community he was looking for and he left as city manager to return to private industry. Turner realized later, and is quick to admit, that it was a "bad time to go into private industry."

When he heard about the city manager's position here, he applied and was impressed with Post.

Post was the kind of community he had in mind when he decided he wanted to come to Texas as a city manager.

Turner is also impressed with the responsibility of the elected city officials here.

"The officials and the city operate, and operate well, on a tight budget - considering that Post has one of the lowest tax rates in the state," he said.

Public Library Has Good Year

For the Post Public Library, one of the best small libraries in West Texas, 1987 was a very good year.

At the close of their fiscal year 1987, the library had 14,153 volumes on the shelves - including paper backs, which have rapidly become a popular addition to the library.

The people of Post availed themselves of the library's services with 8,489 estimated visits to the library to check out 13,717 books.

The children's summer reading program and the films shown during the program, were a big success again this year with more children participating than ever before.

Christmas films were also shown during the month of December for the children's program.

Turner is busy now settling into his new office and getting acquainted with the people of Post - attending meetings of the PMA, the Main Street Project, visiting the library and theatre and other points of interest.

He's amazed at the number of people who turn out for these meetings and take such an interest in what's going on in our town.

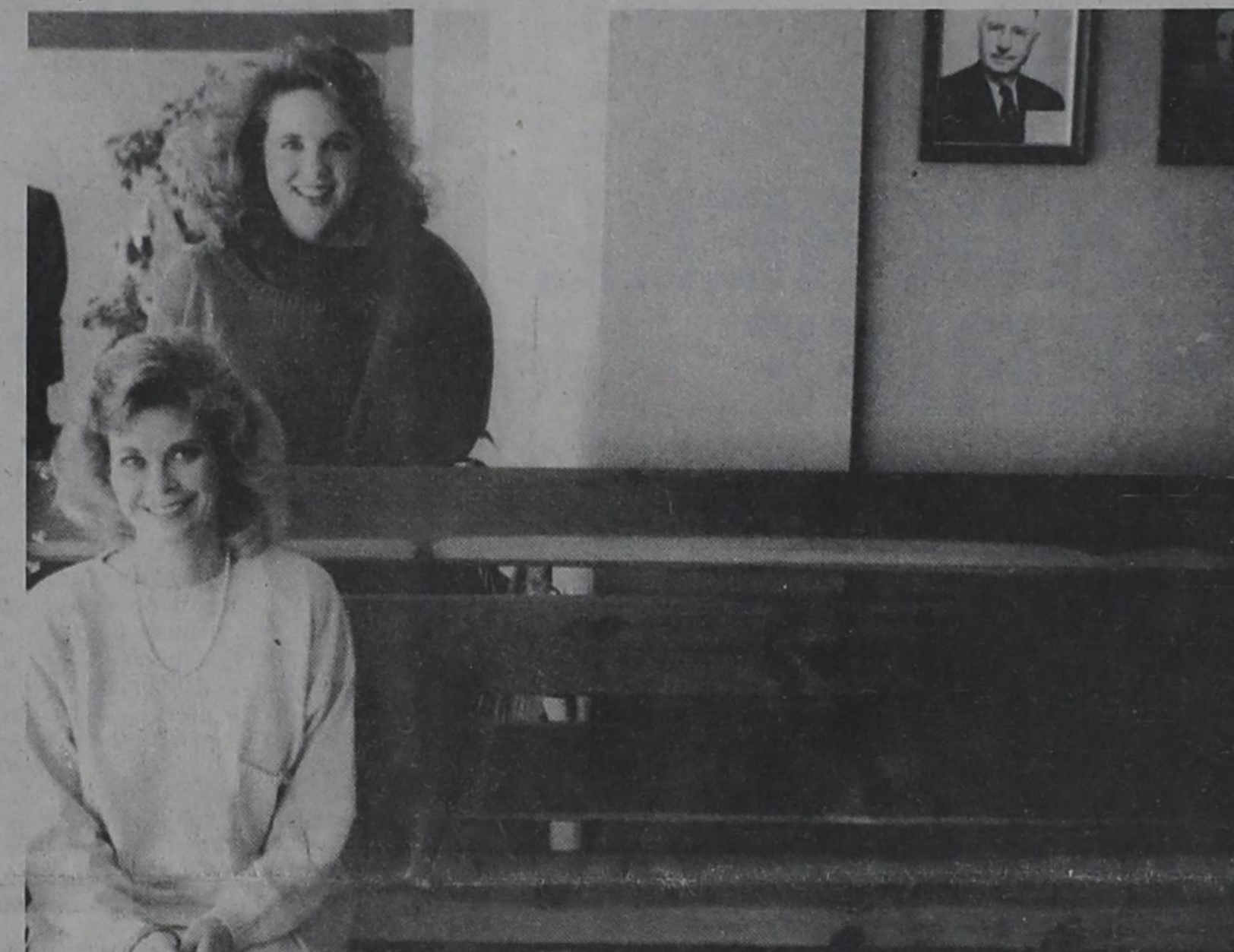
Turner sees the possibilities for growth here and is very much interested in small industries, even those that employ 10-15 people -- sound, solid businesses.

He is doing his homework and acquainting himself with what's going on; what is hoped for; and what is being planned.

Turner is of the opinion that the lakes project will help, but doesn't think Post "will ever be a boomtown and the people probably wouldn't want it to be."

Regulations For Voting In Primaries

A number of people have called the Dispatch for voting information on the upcoming March 8 primaries.

One of the most asked questions concerns voting by persons who have signed a petition for a candidate - Democratic or Republican - to waive the filing fee.

In short, if you signed a petition for a Democratic candidate, you are eligible to vote only in the March 8 Democratic Primary. If the petition was for a Republican candidate, you are eligible to vote only in the March 8 Republican primary.

If you signed petitions for both Democrats and Republicans, you are ineligible to vote in either (Continued on Page 2)

The Project Administrators will not be responsible for installation, maintenance or upkeep of any smoke detector.

Fire Department Battles Fire At White River

The Post Volunteer Fire Department members had their hands full on Wednesday when they were called to a grass fire on Arnold Sanderson's pastures at White River, about six or seven miles from the lake.

With the help of fire fighters from Spur, Crosbyton, Kent County and the Duck Creek Water Conservation District, with 10 or 12 fire trucks; and after several trips to the treatment plant for water, the blaze was brought under control and would have been much worse if the highway hadn't acted as a fire-break, according to a Post Volunteer Fireman.

The Post Fire Department has been called to 17 fires this month and 90 percent of the calls have been to grass fires.

(Continued from Page 1) with organized groups such as the Lions, Rotary, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Senior Citizens Trailblazers, Home Demonstration Clubs, Farmer's Coops and other groups, using already established gatherings as the focal point for training.

The training will be part lecture on the loss and dangers experienced with fires, causes of home and workplace fires, common fire hazards, and examples of dangerous storage of common household and farm materials.

Pictures, slides and training materials already in the hands of these volunteer fire professionals will be used to the maximum and wherever appropriate.

Local video shots will be made of common fire hazards in the community that are commonly overlooked by lay persons, to reinforce the lectures and to increase local interest in the training.

Questionnaires will be developed for use before and after the training workshops to measure the awareness of fire hazards before and after the training sessions.

The training materials will also cover procedures for escaping fire hazards and means for extinguishing domestic fires.

Some video shots may be made of local volunteer firemen in action for use in support of subsequent lectures. The primary purpose of the video will be to show the local reality of fire hazards rather than a general theory about fire dangers that may not be perceived to have local application.

Although an average of two presentations a month are planned, some time during the first two months will be devoted to selecting and arranging for training materials and course preparation.

Post stayed close in the first quarter only trailing by one, 6-7, but had trouble finding the basket for the rest of the game only scoring four more points.

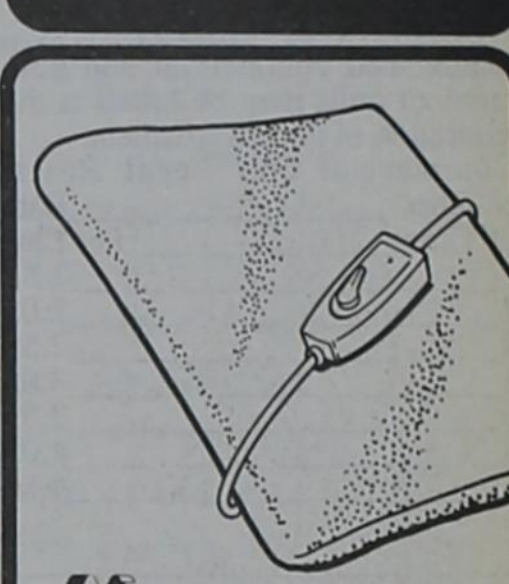

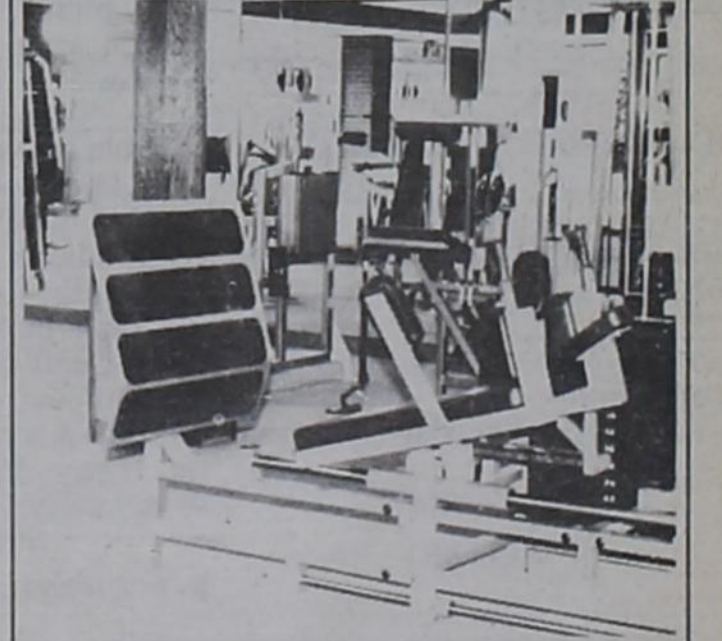

Electronics Firm Appoints Gradine Representative

Parkinson recently introduced a Specialized Mobile Radio (SMR) network which does much more than any cellular system available.

The network covers over 15,000 square miles in seven counties and allows radio users to talk all the way across the South Plains and into eastern New Mexico.

The network is being marketed under the catchy trademark, "Cell-X" and provides extended coverage, rapid access, on-hook dialing, privacy between users, seven-digit dialing and more.

The "Cell-X" network can be seen at Fashion Cleaners in Post and Ronnie Gradine will supply information on the system that has been described as a network that can be expanded to provide exactly what the customers want and need.

"It was something whose time had come," said the founder in explaining the network, which utilizes six communications towers in providing the extended network.

"Our next addition (for a tower) will be to the East of Lubbock," explained Melvin Parkinson.

"We're working on something all the time. There are lots of opportunities in the manufacturing area and we're working to take advantage of them," said Gene.

While he's proud of their work on the manufacturing side of the business, it's the tower business which make a lot of dreams come true.

"I wanted to put in a tower for a number of years but never could get it done."

Parkinson now operates four towers of its own and has arrangements on three other towers. "We have a site for yet another tower, but that's in the future."

Quizzed about cellular, he explained such systems will work well in major cities where overlapping is possible.

In our area where two-way radio users roam over vast areas, their effectiveness will be limited by their service area.

"But we can take care of that by providing SMR service through

Cell-X," he said. So what does the future hold for this not-so-small business?

"We're growing and making plans to expand," said Gene.

Melvin predicts lots of changes are on the horizon for communications systems, with computerization to play an increasingly important role in such systems.

"It's not inconceivable that SMR service will be available all the way from from Mexico to Canada and from the Pacific to Atlantic," said Melvin.

Stop by the museum and visit with Willie Dye and Willie Key.

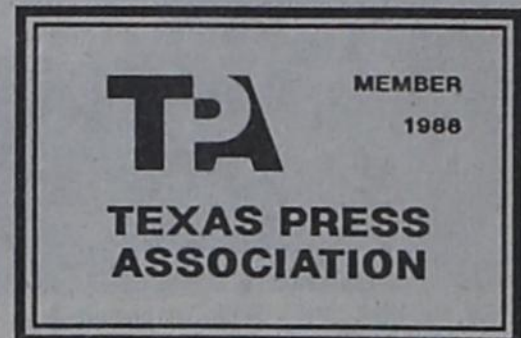

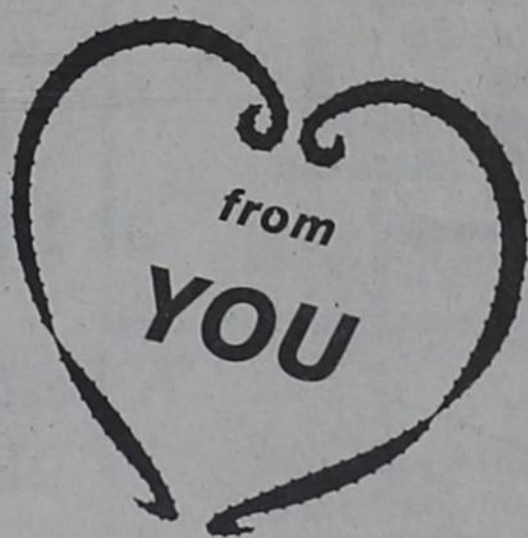
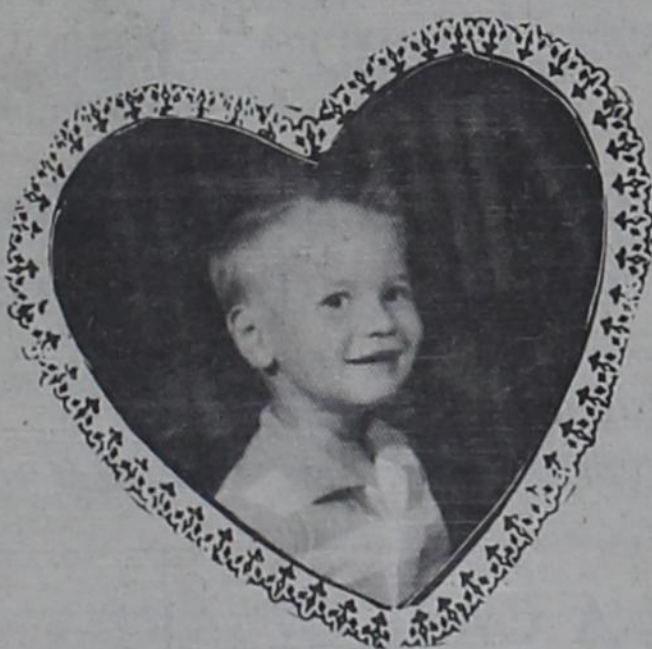
