## Texas Bank Failures <br> Didn't Cost Taxpayers

Texas State Treasurer Ann W.
Richards reported recently that taxpayers "didn't lose one red cent" from the 50 bank failures in Texas
last year, even though those banks last year, even though those banks
held almost $\$ 15$ million in state funds.
"I am pleased to report to the people of T fully accounted for and is safe, even
though our collateral system was tested as never before in recent history," Teasurer Richards said.
State law requires that all state funds invested by the State Treasury be fully collateralized at all times. This means a bank must put up
collateral with the State Treasury collateral with the State Treasury
before the bank can have state deposits.
For example, if a bank has $\$ 500,000$ in state deposits, the
State Treasury requires $\$ 100,000$ in federal deposit insurance and $\$ 400,000$ in collateral before it re-
leases the deposit to leases the deposit to the bank. This
collateral is usually in the form of municipal bonds and US Govern-
ment securities.
Should that bank fail, the State Treasury, which has actual posses-
sion of the bank's collateral, simply sion of the bank's collateral, simply
converts that collateral into cash. This collateral is checked every day by Treasury staff to make sure
all 1,700 state depositories have sufficient collateral to cover their state deposits.
"This system was called upon 40
times in 1987 and passed the test "Unfortunately, bank failures have almost become a way of life in the last few years and experts say
there may be as many bank failures in 1988 as last year," Treasurer "The fact that the Treasury staff has kept on top of the situation is testimony that our system works."' In total, 40 of the 50 state banks
that failed in 1987 held $\$ 14.8 \mathrm{mil}$ that failed in 1987 held $\$ 14.8$ mil-
lion in state funds. Richards said she also wanted to remind Texans that their personal money is safe in Texas financial institutions with federal insurance
coverage as long as their total deposits at any single institution do not exceed $\$ 100,000$.
