On view for the first time on opening night will be a buffalo skull sculpture entitled "Ancient Spirit," a gift to the theatre from sculptor Bill Jamison of Coyote Studios, Aspen, Colorado.

Jamison, friend of theatre director Will McCrary, discovered the original skull in Spring Creek off the Colorado River, where it had evidently washed down off a high mesa, and the Colorado Historical Association later dated the skull at over 300 years old.

County, City Consider Regional Jail Facility

A regional jail facility for the area has moved a step closer to becoming a reality after a recent meeting in which County Judge Giles Dalby asked for support for the project and Mayor Giles McCrary indicated that the city was in favor of the project and did have available land that could be used for such a project.

In a special called session Wednesday, April 20 at the Garza County Courthouse, members of the Garza County Commissioners, Post City Council and Post Economic Development Corporation were present for a combined meeting to discuss the proposed regional jail facility for the area.

A regional jail facility located in Garza County has long been a goal of Judge Dalby's who spearheaded the original drive to get county officials together to discuss the project.

After several meetings and planning sessions, bids have now gone out on the jail facility and May 3 has been listed as the deadline for interested counties to submit bids to South Plains Association of Governments in Lubbock for location of the facility.

Three Post High School students will compete at the State U.I.L. academic meet May 7 in Austin following competition last weekend at the regional meet in Odessa.

Advancing to state are Jill Richardson, Mike Wells and Christina Martinez.

Richardson won first place in calculator and number sense, Martinez got a first place in feature writing and Wells placed third in calculator.

Richardson's 304 score in calculator is the highest recorded by a PHS student, according to instructor Mrs Juanita Thompson.

Teresa Lofton placed fourth in editorial writing and is listed as an alternate.

One Act Play

Cheryl Thompson was named best actress and Eric Reece got an honorable mention and All-Star Cast role for their parts in the One Act Play, "Children Of A Lesser God."

The play was rated third in the region, behind second place Tulia and first place Muleshoe.

The regional competition covers 66 percent of the land mass of Texas with 200 class AAA schools.

"It's the toughest region in the state to advance from," PHS drama teacher Candace McConnell comments, "and with all the diversity it is really hard on the students."

CareLink Visits Garza Memorial

If you were near Garza Memorial Hospital Tuesday, April 19 and saw something landing there, what you saw was a twin jet engine SA 365N-1 Dauphin 2 - better known as Methodist Hospital's air ambulance helicopter.

The helicopter was visiting the local hospital to acquaint persons in the area with the expanded emergency transport care for residents of West Texas and Eastern New Mexico, christened CareLink - a cooperative aeromedical helicopter venture of Methodist Hospital and Lubbock General Hospital.

Making the helicopter trip to Post were CareLink lead pilot, Scott Bass, Pete Christensen co-pilot, Sandy Willis, R.N., and Mark Brock, technician.

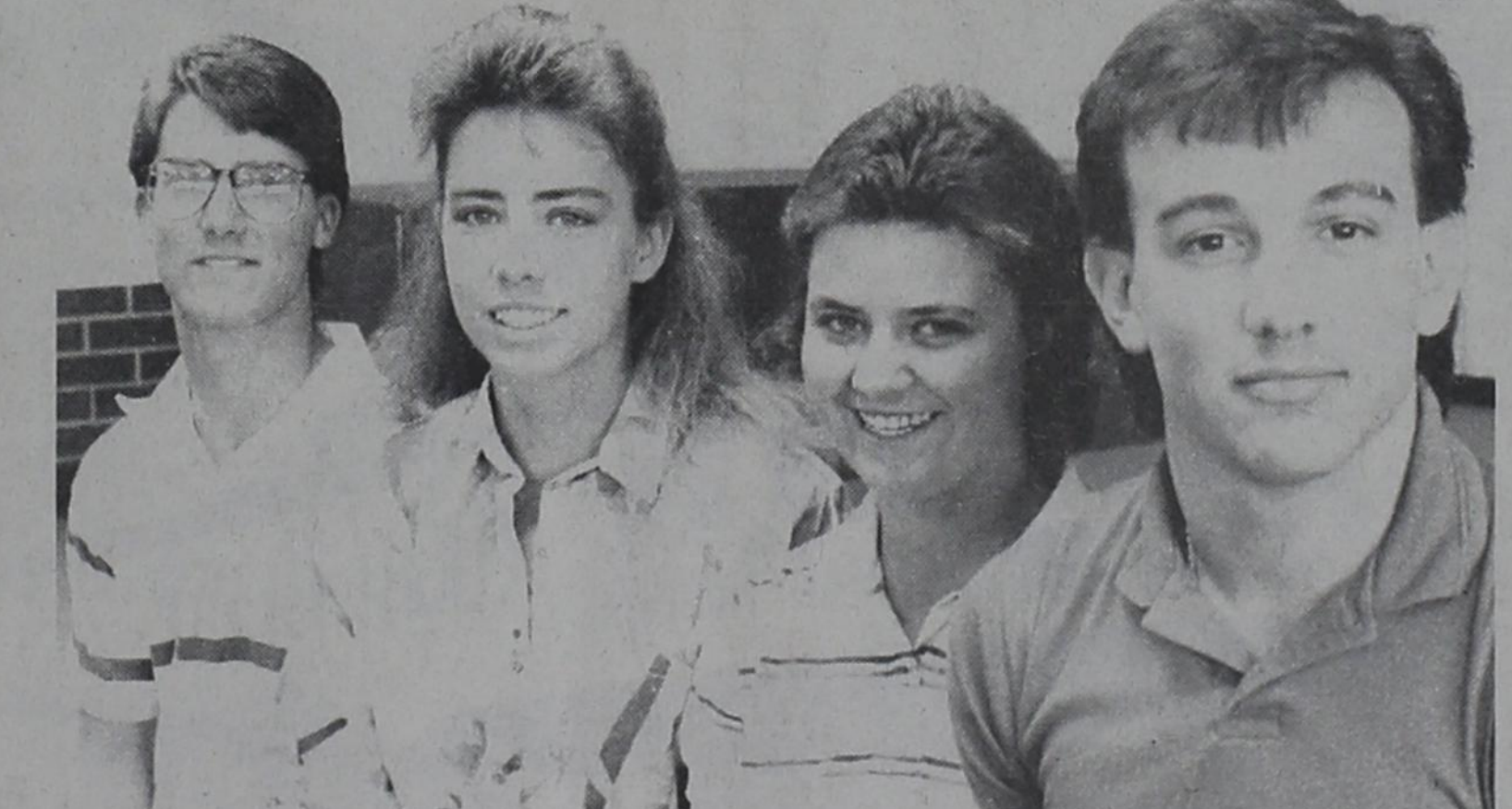
According to Judge Dalby, Crosby, Lubbock and Hale are all interested in their counties as the site for the facility, and Crosby County is offering 20 to 40 acres and utilities to secure location of the facility there.

Hale and Lubbock Counties would probably work together to secure the facility for a location on the two county borders.

A facility of 125 beds to start would call for employment of 50 to 75 people. A 200 bed facility would employ 90 people and 250 full-time employees would be needed if the facility reached a projected total of 500 beds.

The economic result of such a facility would have a great impact on the area and at Wednesday's meeting, Dalby said, "We have to decide now if we're interested, and if we are - get a proposal together to submit on May 3."

Court hears from Engineering firm on Airport Improvements

Monday was around \$28,550, \$10,450 less than the projected figure of \$39,000 given in the February meeting. But in the reconstruction of the existing taxiway and apron, the projected cost had risen from the \$27,000 estimate in February to the current estimate of \$43,000. Davis pointed out to the commissioners that poor drainage con-

ditions and deterioration of the edges of the apron had contributed to the increase of the reconstruction estimates. Balancing out a higher estimate in one area and a lower estimate in the other, this total projected cost for airport improvements would be \$5,400 more than originally estimated.

Davis also recommended to the commissioners, as he had recommended in February, a double asphalt surfacing on the existing runway, at an additional cost of \$9,076. This increase, however, is only a suggested increase. As Davis pointed out, the original estimate was for a seal coat on the runway and not the double asphalt surfacing.

The overall increase on the project, with the double surfacing, as outlined by Davis on Monday, was \$14,500. The commissioners were in agreement as to the need for the work at the airport, and Mayor Giles McCrary, who attended the airport improvement portion of the meeting, said, "We have a tremendous investment at the airport that needs to be protected and maintained to the best of our dollar ability."

At the conclusion of Davis' presentation, the commissioners agreed to advertise for bids on the project, then meet to review and evaluate the bids. Judge Dalby did not take part in the airport discussion or agreement due to a conflict of interests. If the commissioners vote their approval of the project at a later date, the cost of the construction would be shared jointly by the city

and county and work on the project could be done this summer and completed before fall. The commissioners also heard from Robert Littlefield, Massachusetts Mutual representative, regarding the voluntary termination of a pension plan due to the upcoming retirement of many of the employees covered by the plan.

Littlefield set a later date to meet with employees concerning their pension plan refunds. In other action, Sam Ellis was appointed to the Garza County Historical Commission to join present commission members Jack Alexander, Vada McCampbell, Ruby Kirkpatrick, Frank Runkles, Doll Haire, Maxine Earl, Voda Beth Gradine, John Strubhart, Joyce Strubhart and Ted Aten. County Judge Giles Dalby announced the appointment of Dr. Kathy Volanty as District Extension Director-Home Economics. Dr. Volanty moves into a position previously held by Dr. Catherine Crawford who retired on April 1 after 28 years with the Extension Service.

Present at the meeting, along with Judge Dalby, Mayor McCrary, Davis and Littlefield were Commissioners Herbert Walls, Tommy Young, and Ted Aten; County Clerk Sonny Gossett; County Treasurer Voda Beth Gradine; City Manager Bob Turner; and Sam Ellis.

"We need support and must be prepared to go forward with an offer if we want it here. If we could offer a 20 acre site with utilities, we could get in," Dalby added. Mayor Giles McCrary said that the city could provide a 20 acre site with a 20 acre option and that engineers could be brought in to see what the cost of utility extension for such a project would be. McCrary added that the city agrees with the proposed plans, but that final agreement would be subject to the final recommendations of the engineers.

The regional jail facility would be built, financed and operated by a private corporation who would charge the involved counties a per diem rate of \$35. The contract for the jail will be let on June 3 and completion would be within 11 months. Attending the called meeting were Judge Dalby, Tomray Young, Buck Craft and Herbert Walls, for the county; Mayor McCrary, Jack Alexander, Larry Waldrip and Larry Mills for the council; and Patty Kirkpatrick and A.C. Cash for PEDC. Also attending were City Manager Bob Turner, County Clerk Sonny Gossett, Melissa Cunningham, Sam Ellis and E.A. Howard.

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Zoe Kirkpatrick Presents Program at TWU Texas Wildflower Day Event

Zoe Kirkpatrick, a noted naturalist, photographer, amateur archaeologist and authority on Texas Plains wildflowers, was one of the featured speakers at last weekend's Texas Woman's University sponsored Texas Wildflower Day at the Denton campus.

The first official Wildflower Day celebration was held at TWU in 1980.

Carroll Abbot, Texas' only registered wildflower lobbyist, was instrumental in getting legislation passed that created that first Wildflower Day.

TWU was designated as the location for the annual celebration.

The serving table was decorated with pink and grey with Lisa Robison serving the punch.

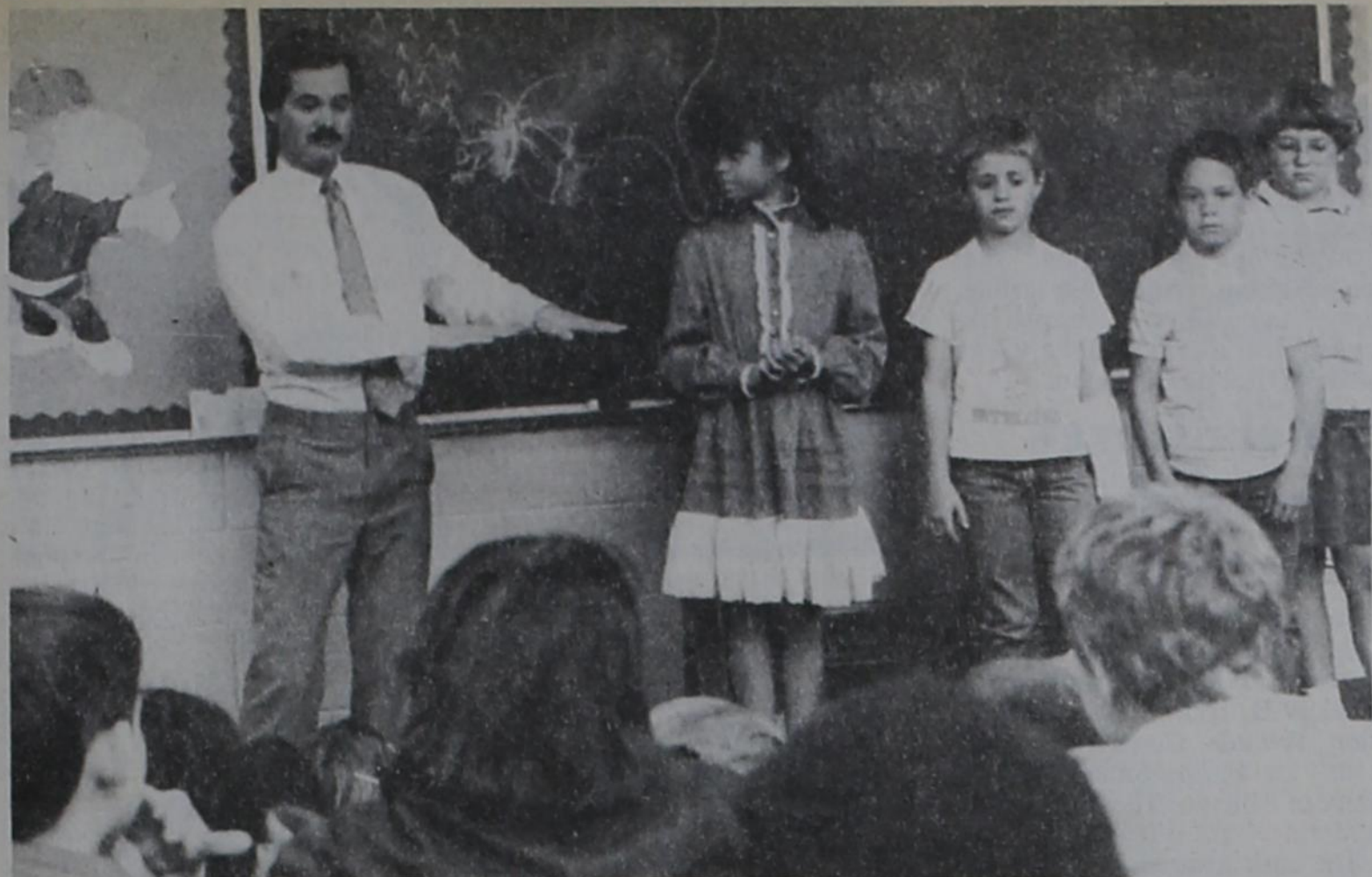

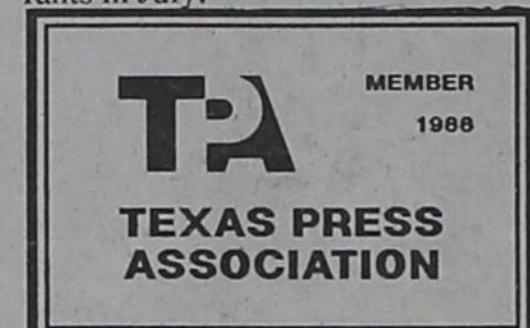

each position within a certain time period.

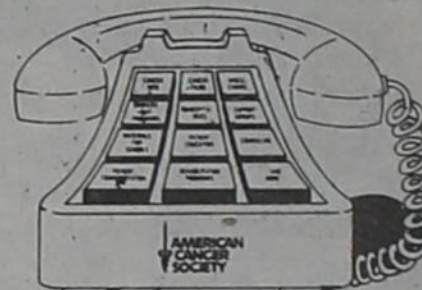
4-Hers Darren Wood, DeLynn Wood and Kyle Glidewell all competed in the Decision Making competition.

Brian Gibbs will have to run under 2:00 if he is to continue. Kane Harris of Greenwood comes in with a 1:59 while Rogelio Flores, Dalhart, and David Medrano, Floydada, have ran a 1:59.4 and 1:59.7 respectively.

In the girls division, fans will get to see the best in the state in the 400 meter dash.

Dana Morris knows of the tough competition from district rival Kim Robinson of Slaton but she will also be facing the second and third fastest times in the state at our region.

Sonja Smith of Whitney has run a 57.7 while Sheryl Pavelca, West, turned in a 58.1.

Local Students Chosen to Compete at Bowl

Cody Collier, Jayson Fry, Kelly Line, Chanda Moreman and Brant Windham of Post Elementary and Middle School have been selected from among 1,100 groups of students statewide to compete at the Texas Future Problem Solving Bowl. On Friday, April 29, these students along with 95 other teams will convene in Austin, Texas, for the Opening Ceremony of the State Bowl.

During a team creative problem solving competition Saturday morning, these groups of fourth through twelfth graders will attempt to generate solutions to problems related to immigration. Each four-member team of students will spend

two hours completing a written booklet that combines research with creative approaches to solving immigration problems.

Winning teams at the State Bowl will advance to the International Future Problem Solving Conference at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor on June 12 through 15. Representatives from Canada, almost every state in the United States, and several other foreign countries will be invited to attend the conference.

Whether competing at the International Conference or working in a hometown classroom, students benefit greatly from their involvement in the Future Problem Solving Program. In addition to creative problem solving skills, the program develops team work and an awareness of the importance of the different views that each member brings to a team.

Dr. E. Paul Torrance, an expert in creative thinking, developed the Future Problem Solving Program in 1974. Since the beginning of the program in Georgia, participation has increased dramatically throughout the country. Statewide this year, approximately 22,000 students participated in Texas Future Problem Solving activities.

Beef Referendum Voting Instructions

Following instructions when voting in the upcoming Beef Referendum is important, particularly regarding absentee voting.

Voting in the referendum will take place in county Extension offices during normal business hours on May 10, points out Syd Conner, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

However, producers and beef importers who are unable to vote in person may request an absentee ballot from Dr. Milo Shult, Beef Referendum State Extension Coordinator, System Building 105A, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas 77843; telephone: 409-845-7907.

Absentee ballots will be available through April 29 and must be marked and returned to the county Extension office serving the county of voter residence by the close of business on May 3, says Conner.

When requesting an absentee ballot, an individual must provide his or her name or name of company if voting for a business, mailing address, telephone number and county of residence or the county where the business headquarters is located.

Once the absentee ballot is received, it is important to read the accompanying instructions and to follow them properly, Conner emphasizes.

The absentee voter must return the ballot to the county Extension office in the county of residence or location of business headquarters.

The ballot must be in the special envelope that is provided and the voter must put his or her name and address on the outside of that envelope. Failure to follow these procedures will make the vote invalid.

Eligible voters are all producers

and importers of cattle who owned or acquired cattle, beef or beef products during the period of October 1, 1986, through March 31, 1988.

This includes 4-H, FFA and other youth who owned cattle during the designated period of time, Conner points out.

Ballots will be counted by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. The ASCS also will determine eligibility of challenged voters and ballots, and report referendum results.

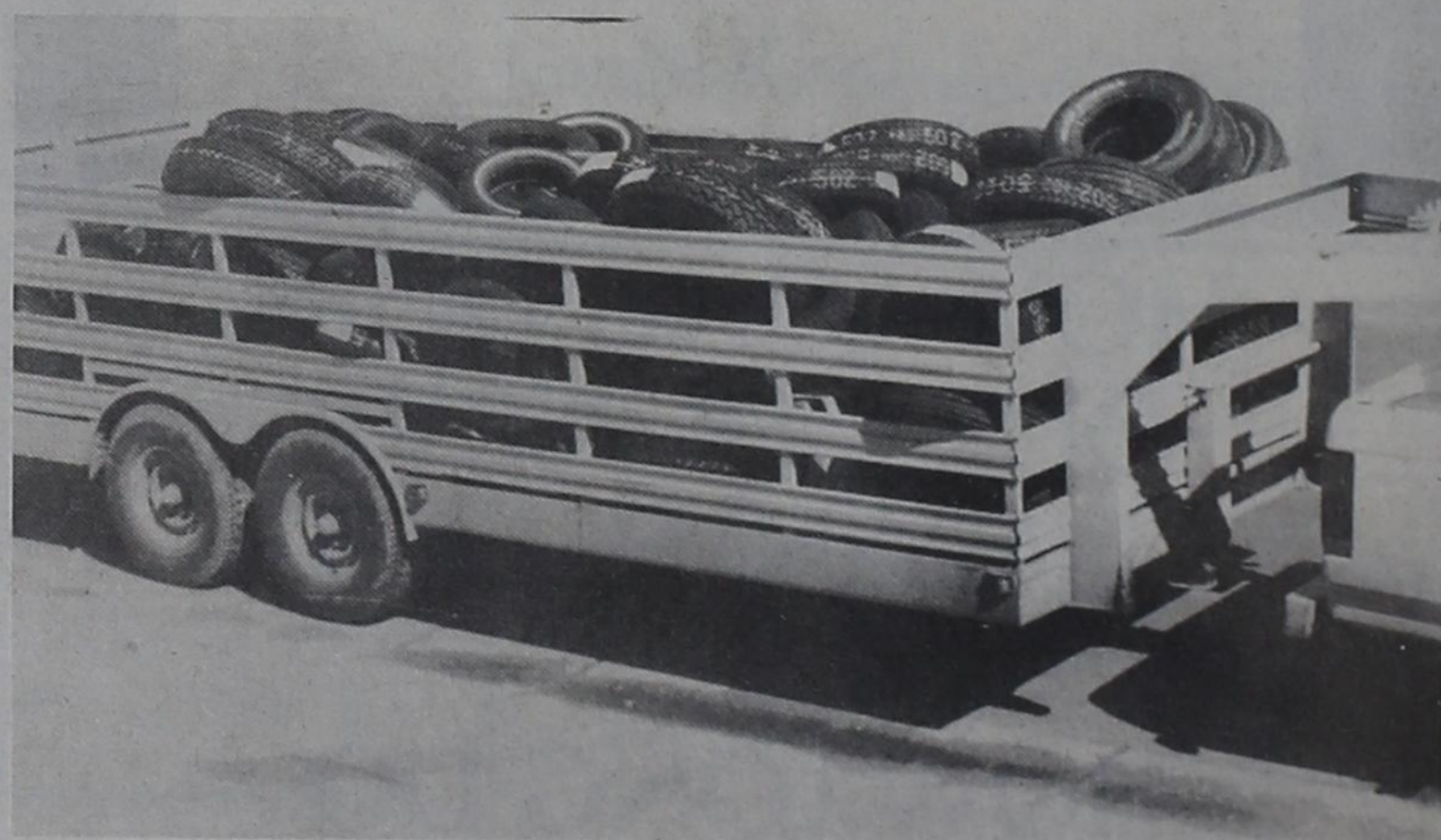
