

# Taba'na Yuan'e Ceremony Features Authentic Ritual

The Sunrise Wind, Taba'na Yuan'e - a phrase from the Comanche Indian Language - will be celebrated this year on Tuesday, March 22, 1988 at the City-County Park, on the south side of town, off US Highway 84 in Post.

The festivities begin at 6:49 Tuesday morning at sunrise, the sunrise time given for that date by the National Weather Service. Guests should arrive by 6:00 a.m

## John Beatty **Houston Winner**

The term "hard-luck" proved to be good luck for John C. Beatty, an FFA student from Southland.

During the March 5, 1988 matinee performance of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, John competed against 27 other zealous youngsters in a fast-paced calf scramble.

Even though John was not able to secure a hold on one of the 14 calves released on the 2.75 acre Astrodome floor, his enthusiastic attitude prompted the presentation of the "hard-luck" calf, sponsored by Charlie Wyatt.

This special award is given to several scramblers at each rodeo performance for their determined perserverance.

They are chosen by a select number of volunteer Calf Scramble Committee members who watch carefully as the scramblers seek the elusive calves.

Each "hard-luck" winner receives a \$600 certificate to purchase a registered beef or dairy heifer.

The winner raises the calf for one year under the supervision of his or her vocational agriculture teacher/county extension agent and returns to Houston the following year to compete in special showring competition.

Through the years, the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo has furnished, with the help of generous sponsors, 10,796 calves valued at more that \$2 million for deserving young Texans.

Net proceeds from the event provide scholarships to more than 1,000 students attending Texas colleges and universities.

The ceremony, a careful observation of an ancient Plains Indian spring ritual, begins with the lighting of the fire and constructing the circle of council.

The Taba'na Yuan'e tradition, which dates to earliest memories of the Plains Indians, began here in 1906 when early pioneers in Garza Country recalled the legend as told by the Indians.

The ceremony is held each year on March 22, as visitors and Garza County residents gather around a circular ceremonial ring to watch a dancer, clad in traditional beaded buckskins and feathered headdress, perform an Indian version of an

extended weather forecast. The ceremony is performed on the day after the sun reaches the halfway point in its journey from south to north - the day after spring begins.

The wind's direction at the exact moment of sunrise was believed to determine success during the coming year.

A fire is lighted using natural materials, followed by the singing of a tribal prayer of thanks for the

'Chief" Frank Runkles then performs a Four Winds dance and presents a pipe of peace to the four directions; then to Mother Earth and to Wakantanka, the great spirit above, to seek their blessings.

The wind-blown smoke from the fire is checked and if the wind is from the east or northeast, the coming year will be a very good



Texas has 23.4 million acres of woodlands and of these, 10.9 million acres in East Texas - extending over 43 counties and including four national forests, are known as the "Piney Woods."

Timber production in 1985 was 551.5 million cubic feet of lumber, 1.98 billion square feet of plywood and 2.6 million cords of pulpwood. Not to worry, Texas plants

more trees than are cut annually. Three of the national forests are part of the Texas Forest Trail. The Angelina, the smallest, with 154,916 acres in Angelina, Jasper,

Nacogdoches and San Augustine Counties. The Davy Crockett, with 161,497 acres, is in Houston and Trinity Counties. The Sam Houston, with 160,443 acres in Montgomery, San Jacinto and Walker Counties. This historic land's valuable

timber is second to oil in the economy of East Texas. Whatever the season, this area is beautiful - from spring blossoming to summer's flowers; from autumn's blaze to the evergreen winters.

Our starting point on this trail is Tyler, the "Rose Capitol of the World." More than half of the field grown rose bushes sold in the United States come from fields

within fifty miles of Tyler. Tyler's municipal rose garden is a 28 acre tract devoted to roses -35,000 plants of 375 varieties. If you visit around Easter, take the azalea trail; if you come in October, you can celebrate the Texas Rose Festival.

North of Tyler is the little town of Lindale. During the civil War over 3,000 workers were producing salt here for the Confederacy. The beautiful magnolia trees remind you this was once part of the Old

Up the road is Mineola, the home town of Texas' first nativeborn governor, James Stephen Hogg. Texas is indebted to his daughter, Ima, who has preserved much early Texas heritage through her restoration and preservation of historic homes and buildings.

At Quitman, north of Mineola, is a stat park named for Governor

Hogg, where a dogwood festival is held in late March and early April.

On northeast is Pittsburg, county seat of Camp County. In 1902, an inspired preacher-inventory. tor build an airship based on a Biblical description in the first book of Ezekiel. Said to have flown briefly, the machine was de-stroyed in a rail accident on the way to the St. Louis World's Fair in 1904. A replica is displayed in a

A the northernmost tip of this trail is Daingerfield. Coal and iron ore were found in this area making it important to the Confederacy. The deposits of ore are still utilized in the Lone Star Steel plant. Daingerfield State Park is a showplace in spring when the redbuds

downtown restaurant.

and dogwoods bloom. Our trail curves downward to Jefferson, along the north edge of beautiful Lake O' the Pines. Laid out in 1842, today it is one of Texas' most historic towns.

Over 50 sites are marked with official historical markers. For half a century Jefferson was the leading inland port of Texas. Some 226 steamboats from as far away as New Orleans tied up in Jefferson in

So important was the river to the city that the citizens refused to give right-of-way to Jay Gould for his railroad. Gould declared "grass would grow in the streets" and in anger wrote in the Excelsior Hotel register, "The end of Jefferson." (The town has a population now of only 2,519.)

Incidentally, his luxurious private railroad car sits in a city park within a stone's throw of the Ex-

Our trail curves down toward Caddo Lake, a favorite of naturalists, photographers and sportsmen. It is believed the lake was formed by the great New Madrid earthquake in 1811.

The logiam that resulted raised the water level in Caddo Lake permitting riverboat traffic.

Pearl hunters swarmed to the lake at the turn of the century when pearls were found in freshwater mussels.

Later an oil boom caused dozens of wells to be drilled in the lake itself.

Next is Karnack, hometown of Lady Bird Johnson and on down the trail is Marshall. Marshall became very important when Texas seceded from the Union.

It was one of the biggest and wealthiest cities in the state. It produced saddles, harnesses, clothing, powder and ammunition for the Vera Cruz.

When Vicksburg fell, Marshall became the seat of civil authority west of the Mississippi and also the Forest Trail route was well estab-

wartime capital of Missouri.

We go southwest to Longview. This area was settled in the early 1800s. Planters from the South brought rapid development. The oil boom in 1930 more than doubled the population. The largest brewery in Texas is here, producing 4,500,000 barrels yearly.

Next on our trail is Kilgore. Plantation owners settled here before the Civil War, but the town was not established before the railroad came. The greatest concentration of oil wells in the world once stood on part of one downtown block and 1,100 one stood in the city limits.

South of Kilgore the trail passes through New London. On March 19, 1937, 286 teachers and school children were killed when a gas accumulation under the school exploded only ten minutes before school was to be dismissed.

Three miles south is Turnertown. East of here, two miles off the trail, is a monument to early day oil field workers in the "Joe Roughneck Park". "Joe" is a bronze bust on a piece of drill pipe.

Also in the park is a wooden derrick built by old-time rig builders who came out of retirement to build this replica of the kind that was used in the boom

A few miles east where US 79 and FM 1798 intersect, a historic treaty was signed. In 1836, Sam Houston negotiated treaty with the southern Cherokees giving them title to the land in return for their promise to remain peaceful during the revolution.

The Indians honored the treaty; Texas did not.

Next is Nacogdoches, an Indian settlement centuries before the Europeans arrived on the east coast. This area was visited by LaSalle in 1687. The first permanent building was the Spanish mission, Guadalupe, built in 1716.

Texas Highway 21 is part of the historic El Camino Real, laid out in 1690 and reaching from St. Augustine, Florida to San Antonio and down through Mexico City to

A branch of the El Camino Real led to Santa Fe and on past San Francisco. This part of the lished and well traveled when the first English colonists came ashore.

We go east to San Augustine, "The Cradle of Texas." J. Pinckney Henderson, Texas' first governor lived here.

Halfway House, an excellent example of an early stagecoach stop, built in 1830, is worth a visit, as is the Cullen House, built in 1839. The builder, Ezekiel Cullen, wrote the law funding Texas public schools with public lands.

From here, we drop down south and turn west into Angelina National Forest, crossing two forks of huge Sam Rayburn Reservoir to arrive in Lufkin.

Here are fifteen forest and wood products industries, one of them Southland Paper Mills which

developed the process using high resin East Texas pulpwood to make

The Forestry Museum has flora and fauna exhibits, early logging machinery, early fire fighting equipment, an old railroad depot, antique railroad and sawmill steam engines.

A 40 minute drive northwest of Lufkin takes to to Rusk, the railhead for the Texas State Railroad, and the only state park with a real

steam locomotive. Another 40 minute drive south

of Lufkin takes you to the tangle of the Big Thicket, 85,000 acres made into a national preserve.

Our wandering trail takes us across Lake Livingston and down into the eastern edge of Sam Houston National Forest to Con-

The Conroe oil field discovered in 1931 did much to make Houston the city it is today. A wild well fire burned for three months in 1933 until the first directional drilling killed the fire. The crater left by

From Conroe, we turn northwest to Montgomery and re-enter Sam Houston National Forest and go on to Huntsville.

the blow-out is now a small lake.

Huntsville was found in 1836 as an Indian trading post. Today it is the center for agriculture and lumbering. Beautifully landscaped grounds surround historic buildings including Sam Houston's home, his law office and the Steamboat house where he died. His shrine and an excellent museum are high

points of the entire Forest Trail. We go north to Crockett, the fifth oldest town in Texas and named for Davy Crockett. The trail turns east and enters the Davy Crockett National Forest with its many camping and recreational fa-

cilities. Northwest is Palestine, home of the Texas Dogwood Trails, which began in 1939 and attracts thousands of visitors each April.

Near Palestine is the Scientific Balloon Base operated by NASA. Balloons as large as 300 feet in diameter are launched to make stud-

ies of the upper atmosphere. North of Palestine, you might want to visit an old-time mill to watch corn being stone ground. Ribbon Cane syrup is made and sold here.

We turn northeast and cross Lake Palestine. Six miles north of the lake of the little town of Noonday -- named because the meeting to choose a name was called at

Seven miles north of here is Tyler, the start of our trail.


The federal government acted in the late 1800s to prevent the forests of Texas from being completely destroyed.

food-borne illness. Most food-borne illness occurs when bacteria grow in inadequately cooled or heated food, or due to cross contanimation from raw animal products.

To avoid these problems invest in: (1) an acrylic cutting board about \$5-7, depending on size.

Knives leave gashes in cutting boards and juices from raw meat or poultry can get into those gashes. If you don't deep clean the board with 1 teaspoon to 1 tablespoon of bleach with 1 cup hot water scrubbed and rinsed, bacteria remaining in the gashes can spread to other foods.

(2) Meat thermometer, about \$4. With a meat thermometer you can make sure that meat and poultry cook all the way through. Beef and pork are generally considered done when the internal temperature reaches 170 degrees F. Poultry is done at 180 degrees.

#### **Interest Rates on Delinquent Taxes**

County Judge Giles C. Dalby, Chairman of the Appraisal District Board, has stated that the officials of the tax entities have been made aware that the general public does not know the penalty and interest rates on delinquent taxes.

The rate is 20 percent for the for the first year and 12 percent a

year back through 1981.

Prior to 1980 the penalty and interest is six percent a year.

In the month of March 1988 a 1978 tax carries a 100 percent rate. The tax payer will have to pay double the amount he would have paid in January 1979.

For your interest and your protection we are publishing the State Property Tax Board mandated schedule of penalty and interest for March 1988.

The chart is published in fractions rather than percents. An example for March 1988: A taxpayer owes \$100 for 1939, \$100 X 3.345 = \$334.50 + \$100 or \$434.50. For juice. 1987 \$100 X \$9.00 = \$109.00.
