Not Only are Fireworks Dangerous... Use in City Limits is Unlawful Here

The sale and use of fireworks within the city limits of Post is unlawful, according to an old city ordinance, number 165, which has been on the books for a number of years.

Ordinance 165, signed by the late James L. Minor, Mayor, states: "1. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to sell or offer for sale any fire works of any kind or character within the city limits of the City of Post, Texas.

2. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to set off, shoot or explode any fire works of any kind or character within the city limits of the City of Post, Texas. Any

person, firm or corporation violating any section or provision of this Ordinance shall be subject to a fine of not less than One (\$1.00) Dollar nor more than One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars for each offense."

But city ordinance or no city ordinance, fireworks are used every year by individuals. They are as much a part of the Fourth of July as a picnic in the park.

They are also extremely dangerous.

In one year, at least 12,600 people in the United States were injured by fireworks, according to the most recent yearly report issued by the Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC).

This is the highest number recorded in the 13 years since statistics on the problem have been collected by the federal agency.

This total number of injuries was more than a thousand higher than the previous high set in 1981 of 11,400 injuries. This estimate is also 2.4 times higher than 1974, when national estimates of these injuries were first calculated.

Estimates of fireworks injuries are obtained from hospital emergency rooms by the CPSC. In all likelihood, many more fireworks-related injuries are handled in doctors' offices and are not captured by any national tracking system.

of part or all of a finger, are not uncommon -- and fireworks incidents sometimes result in death.

In an article for the 1987 July 4th edition of the Dispatch, Steven Payton contributed some good advice on fireworks safety.

If you are going to buy and use fireworks this Independence Day, the advice bears repeating:

"CPSC and the National Council on Fireworks Safety offer the following safety tips:

Always follow label information.

Buy from reliable dealers.

Texas Employers Raise Uproar Over Increases

Over 300,000 Texas employers received 1988 unemployment tax notices recently. Over 60% of those notices showed at least a 200% increase from the previous year. As a result, the Texas Employment Commission has been besieged with telephone calls concerning the new rate.

"This hike in the tax rate is a direct result of the Texas economy," said agency administrator Bill Grossbacher. The following all had an impact on the 1988 rates:

* Overall Poor Economic Conditions - at the peak of Texas' unemployment problems approximately 750,000 Texans were out of work.

* Increased Unemployment - many employers were forced to lay off workers during 1987. Benefits paid to these workers are "charged back" to the employer over a three year period causing the employer's tax rate to increase.

* Increased Bankruptcies - a significant number of employers were forced to close their doors in bankruptcy during 1987. Benefits paid to their former employees are

"socialized" and repayment is spread to all employers through a "replenishment" calculation which also increases an individual employer's tax rate.

* Insufficient Tax Revenue - benefits paid in 1986 and 1987 exceeded the revenues in the trust fund by some 500 million dollars, placing the trust fund in an insolvent condition and forcing the Texas Employment Commission to borrow from the federal government to continue benefit payments.

Legislative Changes Made

Federal loans must be repaid with interest and the fund had to be returned to a solvent condition. To accomplish this, the legislature explored numerous approaches in order to insure the lowest cost to employers while still maintaining the benefit program required by both state and federal law.

* Since 1983, unemployment insurance taxes in Texas have been payable on the first \$7,000 of each employee's wages. This is the minimum taxable wage base allowable under federal law. Recent legislation increased the \$7,000

Sales Tax Rebate Check Increases 99.95 Percent

The city of Post experienced a healthy revenue increase from local sales taxes with the recent receipt of an allocation check for \$16,684.63 - a hefty 99.95 percent increase over the \$8,344.43 received for the same period in June of 1987.

1988 payments to Post to date, totaling \$86,599.20, also show an increase for the year. Payments from the State Comptroller's office are up 28.40 percent from the 1987 to date total of \$67,446.57.

Other cities in the area also experienced increases in sales tax revenues:

Slaton-\$11,601.60, an 18.08 percent increase over 1987's \$9,825.43. 1988 payments to date, \$102,652.65, 30.14 percent increase over 1987, \$78,881.65.

Tahoka-\$4,238.49, a 27.05 percent increase over 1987's \$3,336.14. 1988 payments to date, \$31,409.14, a 9.61 percent increase over 1987's \$28,654.63.

Ralls-\$4,514.12, a 92.39 percent increase over 1987's \$2,346.39. 1988 payments to date,

\$27,822.30, a 27.20 percent increase over 1987, \$21,858.70.

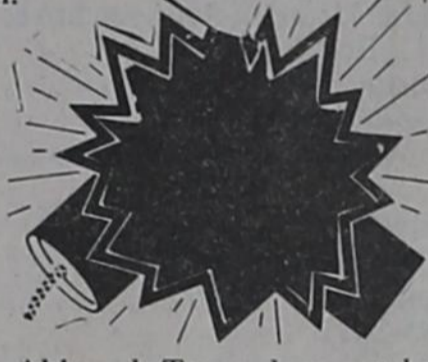
"Local governments will continue to see a healthy increase in revenues from their sales taxes as the state's economy mends and consumer confidence grows," State Comptroller Bob Bullock said.

Texas' economic outlook will continue to improve, barring a national recession or a collapse in oil prices, Bullock added.

Since January, the state has sent \$465.9 million in local taxes to cities across the state, an increase of 10.3 percent over last year's allocations during the same period.

"This increase is too great to be attributed to the Legislature's broadening of the sales tax base, which was estimated to bring in an extra 3.5 percent in local revenues," Bullock said.

Bullock projected that local sales tax revenues statewide will continue to increase at an average rate of more than eight percent a year through 1991.



Although Texas does not have a comprehensive burn-injury tracking system, fire data from the Texas Fire Incident Reporting System (TEXFIRS), indicates that fireworks were responsible for at least 605 fires, which injured at least one person and destroyed more than one-half million dollars in property in 1986.

Fireworks incidents are only reported through the TEXFIRS if a fire occurs as a result of the misuse of fireworks.

Statistics compiled by the CPSC show that overall, two-thirds of those injured by fireworks are under age 21, and more than one-fourth are less than 10 years of age.

Burns, abrasions, fractures and lacerations account for most of the wounds, although very severe injuries, such as loss of sight, or loss

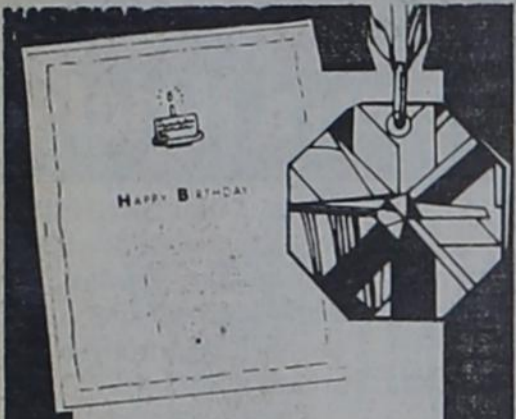
After crossing the creek, the women set a wolf trap; stop, load and shoot at four different places; and then cross back over the creek.

After they throw the knife or tomahawk - whichever's left from the beginning of the contest - they have completed the run.

The Mountain Woman Run is a 150 yard course, 75 yards there and 75 yards back - and Christy won first place, finishing the run in five minutes.

Conference To Address 'Selecting For Beef Profit'

Texas cattlemen from the Panhandle to the Rio Grande Valley are trying to determine what production and marketing options will maximize profitability. And that objective will be the focus of the second Beef Industry Conference at Texas A&M University July 7-8.

Texas and national leaders will be presenting their views on current and future trends and directions of the cattle industry, said Dr Larry Boleman, beef cattle specialist with the Texas A&M Agricultural Extension Service.

Speakers will first characterize current beef cattle production practices across Texas and then discuss alternative practices, giving particular attention to the increased emphasis on lean beef and carcass merit.

"Many cattlemen are confused with the lean beef issue," Boleman said, "and are turning exclusively to producing cattle with less fat, often at the expense of feedlot performance and reproductive efficiency. Reducing the fat level of cattle sent to the packer is important. However, the move to leanness must be put into the whole cattle production picture, which is the major objective of this year's beef conference."

Dr Dan Hale, Extension meats specialist, said that some exciting research results will be released for the first time that examine carcass value of several breed types all the way to the retail meat case. Several speakers will address misconceptions many cattle buyers and feedlot operators have regarding different cattle breed types.

The opening session of the Beef Industry conference begins at 9 a.m. on July 7 at Rudder Center on the A&M Campus. Special sessions will focus on lean beef, beef nutrition, carcass cutability, meeting industry needs, and cattle production and marketing options.

Conference details are available at any county Extension office.

Show, Rodeo Scholarships Over \$1 Million

The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo recently presented in excess of \$1 million in scholarship monies at a "Million Dollar Scholarship Banquet" in the Astrodome.

More than 200 students from all over Texas shared in the excitement as Hal Hillman, Show president, handed them scholarship certificates assuring them a chance at continuing their educations.

Fred McClure, former Houston Rodeo scholarship winner and current Texas Air Corporation government affairs vice president, was the keynote speaker.

This year, the Houston Show committed to 100 \$8,000, four-year scholarships, 50 each to the Future Farmers of America (FFA) and 4-H; 73 one-year, \$2,000 scholarships to Go Texas counties and Metro Go Texas areas around Houston;

One four-year, \$8,000 scholarship to a Go Texas sweepstakes-winning county; four one-year, \$2,000 scholarships to the Texas Christian University Ranch Management Program;

Two doctoral assistantships at Texas A&M University at a total cost of \$22,000; 20 \$6,600, one-year graduate assistantships at 12 Texas universities;

Two \$2,000, one-year dedicated endowed scholarships; one \$4,000, one-year veterinary medicine assistantship, three one-year, \$2,000 school art scholarships; and, one four-year, \$8,000 school art scholarship.

The Show also presented 13 Texas universities with endowment funds, providing a basis for more financial aid for students.

Including scholarships, junior show auction payments, research funds and other other agricultural and educational programs, the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo contributed \$3,300,920 to Texas youth in the 1988 fiscal year.

taxable wage base to \$8,000 in 1988 and \$9,000 in 1989.

* The replenishment tax, a portion of an employer's overall tax rate, is designed to recoup 50% of unrecovered benefit costs - in other words, the "socialized" cost of the system. This tax increased from .44% in 1987 to .57% in 1988.

* The deficit tax will now be applied to ALL experience rated employers but cannot exceed 2%. The deficit tax will remain in effect as long as the Unemployment Trust Fund is below the statutory floor of \$400 million. Long-range projections indicate that the deficit tax will decrease in 1989 and drop off by 1990.

* The maximum benefit amount is frozen at \$210 per week for 26 weeks. The automatic escalator clause found in the unemployment compensation law was suspended for two years to assist in limiting the amount of benefits paid until the trust fund regains solvency.

* A provision was included to allow TEC to implement an interest surtax not to exceed .2% to pay interest on federal loans. This tax is only utilized when TEC is forced to borrow money from the federal government.

Things To Remember

1. As bad as it is, it could have been worse had no corrective action been taken and federal tax credits been lost as a result.

2. Of all Texas employers eligible for the computed rate, over half will be at the MINIMUM rate allowable by law in 1988.

3. The taxable wage base in Texas, even after the increase to \$8,000 in 1988 and \$9,000 in 1989, is still below the national average.

4. It is currently estimated that even with the increased average cost for unemployment insurance in 1988, Texas is still below the national average payout per employee for this coverage.

There Is Good News Too!

Benefits payouts to unemployed Texans were once totaling \$6 million per day. Job orders being received at the Texas Employment Commission are up 70% over this same period last year. Initial claims for benefits are down 28%. Things are definitely looking up!

DPS Designs CARE Program for July 4th

The Texas Department of Public Safety has estimated that 36 persons will die as the result of traffic mishaps in the state during the 78-hour Fourth of July weekend.

"There is a greater potential for accidents during the summer months because of the increases in the number of vehicles and miles driven on Texas roadways," DPS Director Leo Gossett said. "We appreciate the recognition of this potential by the careful Texas drivers who observe the laws. Our troopers and local officers hopefully will be getting the attention of careless motorists through enforcement of these statutes."

The DPS counting program for traffic fatalities begins at 6 p.m. on Friday, July 1 and ends at midnight on Monday, July 4th.

During the 1987 July 4th period, also 78 hours in length, 37 traffic deaths occurred. Three additional fatalities were reported later from critical injuries suffered during the holiday program. A total of 58 percent of the fatalities occurred in accidents where speed or driving while intoxicated was listed as a contributing factor.

"Our agency is cooperating with the Texas Coalition for Safety Belts program, supporting the goal of a 'deathless day' during the 101 Driving Days of Summer," Colonel Gossett pointed out. "The last deathless day on Texas roadways occurred on January 5, 1977."

Along with the usual duties, the DPS will be working in Operation CARE (Combined Accident Reduction Effort) with the Louisiana State Police, Arkansas State Police, Oklahoma Highway Patrol and the New Mexico State Police to reduce drunken driving and speeding along interstate highways during the July 4th period.

"Available troopers in Texas and these four states will be increasing their cooperation to reduce fatal accidents as part of the Operation CARE program," according to DPS Lt Charles Dorbandt of DPS Austin Headquarters, who also serves as the CARE regional president with Texas and the four neighboring states.

"The CARE program is designed to increase the smoothness and safety of the traffic flows on the interstate highways in the U.S.," Lt Dorbandt said. "We'll be working with the state troopers in the four contiguous states to minimize dangerous driving practices on these roadways through enforcement. However, we will also provide assistance to the motoring public."

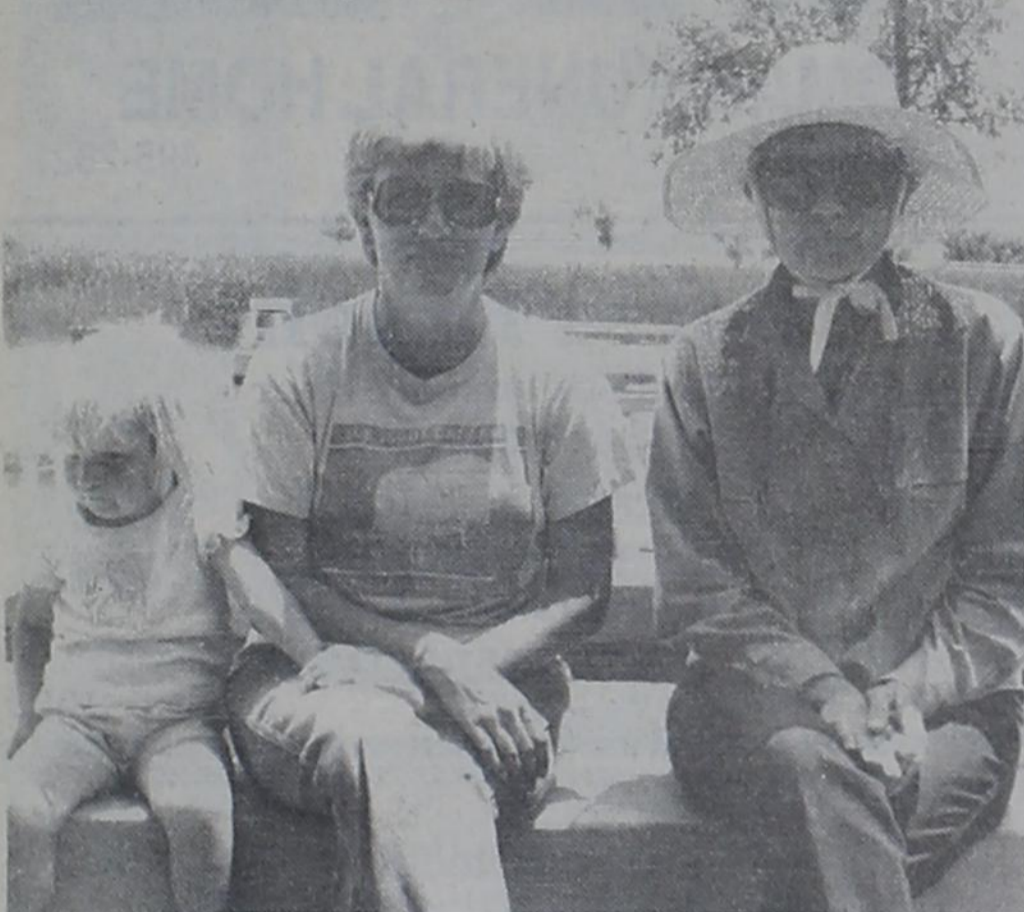
