

Family Strengths in Later Life

Adult Relationships

Achieving an adult relationship with one's parents in later life may not be easy but the rewards can be worth the try. An adult or mature relationship means accepting each other for who he/she is, including imperfections as well as positive traits. It means being able to give and receive help without feeling that your contribution to the relationship has decreased. Current relationships between adults and their aging parents are a product of earlier family life. In some families the parents were the authorities and continue to play this role even as children became adults. Such patterns from the past can dominate late life interactions between older parents and their adult children and prove dysfunctional. For example, being "the one in control" may put an aging parent in a position where receiving information or accepting help from an adult child is difficult because it is not in keeping with earlier roles.

Aging parents and aging children can examine how they relate to each other by asking themselves the following questions:

- Do I accept my child (or parent) as an adult who has a right to his/her own opinions, values and lifestyles even if these differ from my own?

- Am I judgmental of my chil-dren's (parent's) choices and deci-

- Do I interfere and try to control their lives?

acceptance. Each person is a different but valuable ;human being. It is difficult if not impossible to make a person over, but, accepting that person can open avenues for managing difficult traits in positive ways. For example, your parent has always insisted on having the last word in a discussion. Rather than fighting about this or sneaking in the last word, there are several approaches that might be used.

Try humor: "Now, for the last word....it's Mom!"

Try honest self disclosure: "Mom, when you must always add one last comment I feel like my ideas don't have any merit."

Or ask for direct feedback: "Mom, did you think my last idea was a good one?"

Often such approaches can initiate the development of insight by others about their behavior. With insight a person can begin to laugh at his or her own weaknesses and appreciate different shortcomings in others. Adult children and aging parents can construct new relationships by understanding their past and accepting each other as people who just happen to be related.

Supporting the Elder in Crisis

Adult children and aging parents

may be brought together by an unexpected crisis in the elders' lives. The stress of such events as sudden widowhood or a stroke or heat attack may increase the elder's immediate need for strong family support. Family members can show support by encouraging the elder to continue making decisions and expecting him or her to function up to capacity. When families jump in to help too quickly they may unintentionally undermine the strengths and capabilities of the elder. Taking over major decision making, even temporarily, can signal to the elder that adult children think he or she lacks the ability or judgement to decide. Even when a parent turns to the adult child the adult child need to encourage involvement in decision making to avoid premature dependency. Offering assurance and respecting the parents decisions, even when these differ from what an adult child considers "best", can be important ways to acknowledge the parent's capabilities as an indepen-

(Continued from Page 1) Cole, emergency room physician at Scott and White in Temple, points out that fireworks can cause burns to the fingers and hands, ignite clothing, and cause possible loss of fingertips. These cases usually occur because the handler has not released the firework before it exploded or the firework has misfired.

Dr Cole stresses that children should not play with fireworks. "These are not toys," he says. "Even children with sparklers should be supervised. Toddlers will grab at the lit sparkler, which is hot enough to burn someone."

Eye injury is another area of medical concern when it comes to firework safety. According to the American Academy of Ophthalmologists, close to 4,000 people will suffer eye injuries, with 1,000 resulting in permanent vision loss, due to faulty firework han-

Dr Richard D. Cunningham, director of the Division of Ophthalmology at Scott and White in Temple and professor at Texas A&M University College of Medicine, points out that bottle rockets are responsible for more than half of these injuries.

"I cannot describe the tragic feeling when we have to remove eyes from children or adults and know the injury was preventable. Wearing protective goggles or glasses will prevent most eye injuries," Dr Cunningham says.

Children and people who have been drinking alcoholic beverages should never be allowed to handle or ignite explosive fireworks. Alcohol has been proven to slow down response time.

Nationwide, more than half the states have adopted a model law which limits the use of fireworks to licensed displays or relatively safe fireworks such as sparklers. A three-state study indicated that there were ten times more fireworks injuries where no model law was in effect.

The best thing to do," Dr Cole adds, "is watch a professional fireworks display from a distance.'

If individuals plan to include fireworks in their festive Fourth celebration, they are urged to take the following precautions: * Always wear safety goggles or

glasses when setting off fireworks. * Only adults should handle or ignite explosive fireworks.

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
