TO THE EDITOR
Even as I write this I've some doubt that it will be printed but I would like to complain about your front page article about Golden Plains Care Center. In my opinion

this is a case of irresponsible and selective reporting. Irresponsible because (1) did you consider that among the residents of Golden Plains Care Center there are many who can and do read your news paper. These people are some of our most vulnerable citizens and certainly the article caused many of them needless concern. This facility is their home and they felt the same distress anyone feels when the security of their home is threatened. (2) In a community where we are ever aware of the need of more industry, it seems irresponsible that the local paper should print an article almost guaranteed to retard the growth of this business, if not indeed cause it to shrink. The salary that I earn, which is always paid on time and in full, is spent in local businesses, as is the salary of almost all the employees here. So you see we do add to the economy of our town, and (3) it is not our owner Mike Mayo who feels most the lash of such an article for he does not live here. He would be a stranger to most of our townspeople. But it is those people who work in the facility, dedicated to making it as pleasant a home as possible for the residents, these are the people your article most hurts.

I call the reporting selective because since this article came out many incidents have been brought to my attention concerning deeds or misdeeds of some of our most respected citizens, that while being reported in a Lubbock paper, some how never was printed in our local paper. The idea being that the home town paper shouldn't add to the embarrassment of these important citizens or their families, an idea I totally agree with. Well this is a home town business with home town employees and home town old time settlers are residents. Give us a break. Is there anyone among us who has never had an overdue bill, any business that hasn't been late with some financial obligation?

Have you some future plans to search through all the past due notices mailed out each day and print the amount of indebtedness on your front page. That certainly would seem an invasion of privacy. Last, allow me to quote from a page in a book that has sold more copies than any other book in the world, Let him who is without sin cast the first stone.

Publisher's Note

It is important that readers understand the policy of this newspaper is to report accurately and as completely as possible the official proceedings of our government units.

Some of the information from these public meetings may be considered "bad news" by some folks.

That is the nature of news, it is not our role as communicators to decide to publish or not publish the news based on whether or not the information is "bad" or "good."

We are charged with the responsibility to attend these meetings and then translate the information into a readable format so that the citizenry will be as well informed as possible about the activities of their elected officials.

Frequently that means we will be unpopular with certain folks who would prefer the information to remain "private."

If we were to follow the sug-

gestion in this letter, we would be in a heap of trouble, trying to be selective on some things and not on others...our credibility would be zero.

What goes on in our government meetings is not private, it is public and the people have the right to know.

The fact that very few citizens attend the public meetings makes it even more important that we report the information...we are the eyes and ears of most of the people...we represent those who can not or will not attend for themselves, they have the right to expect their hometown newspaper to keep them informed.

And that is precisely what we do.

In the specific case referred to by this letter, any insecurity felt by clients or employees was not created by this newspaper. The responsibility for insecurity rests squarely upon the management.

In the six years that we have been attending city council meetings, never before has a delinquent water account been brought to the attention of the council in a public meeting.

Had this particular business been a service station or a newspaper, the city staff would have shut off the water without any fanfare, as they are charged to do by the city ordinance.

The fact that this overdue issue was brought to the attention of the city council should be evidence enough of the seriousness of the situation and it is not the responsibility of this newspaper to set the agenda or the discussion at government meetings.

As to the letter writer's charge that certain "respected and important" citizens are protected from adverse publicity in "the hometown newspaper," we ask, how do you define "respected and important"?

We believe all our citizens are to be respected and are important and we also believe that we have demonstrated more than once that no matter who it is, if an elected official is found guilty of misdeeds this newspaper will as a matter of policy present this information to its readers.

We are offended by the charge that we discriminate...it simply is not true.

We ask that specific cases where we have erred on this issue please be brought to our attention.

It is a fact of human history that frequently the bearer of news is held accountable for the content...we accept this as part of our calling.

We pledge to our readers that The Post Dispatch will continue to follow the traditional ethical and professional standards they expect from their newspaper.

That is the only way we know how to be.
