Baird Wins 7-B, Defeats Gorman

Baird Bears clinched the District 7-B championship at Gorman Friday night, defeating the Panthers, 27-14.

Bear halfback Ronnie Ault scored two tallies to lead the scoring and end Ross Odell kicked three extra point tries.

The first score came during the initial series of plays after kickoff when halfback Mike Odum plunged 5 yards to end a 70-yard drive. Later in the first quarter, Ronnie Ault drove 10 yards to cap a 50-yard drive. Odell booted the extra point.

Fullback Don Hargrove ran 45 yards off tackle to climax a 60 yard drive that was the only score in during the period. Odell again kicked the extra point.

Gorman drew its first blood in the third quarter when halfback Jackie Simpson made a 6 yard run to complete a series of plays that netted the Panthers 60 yards.

Ault then lashed back for the Bears on a 6 yard play to finish Baird's scoring. Odell kicked the extra point.

Gorman scored in the final quarter as Harrison ran a 2-yard scoring play that was set up by a 21-yard pass play from Harrison to end Richard Watson. End Larry Anderson made the conversion on a pass from Harrison.

Co. Hospital Sets New Policies

The Board of Directors of Callahan County Hospital has advised Mr. William Meade, Administrator, that a \$35.00 deposit will be required by all patients upon admission to the hospital. However, Hospitalization Insurance may be used in lieu of the deposit, effective December 1st.

New visiting hours have been set by the hospital. The new hours are from 2 p. m. to 4 p. m. and 7 p. m. to 8 p. m. There will be no visiting hours in the evening.

The Hospital Board asks that the residents of Callahan County please cooperate in this matter. These hours will enable the medical and nursing staff to carry out their duties and assure needed rest periods for the patients. No children under 12 years of age will be allowed to visit the patients.

A new pre-payment plan is available for all obstetric patients. The expectant parents can come by the hospital and make arrangements to pay a sum each week or each month before the blessed event. After the baby is born and the patients are ready to leave the hospital, a large amount of the bill will have been paid. This will enable the parents to leave the hospital without having to worry about a large bill. This plan has proved most satisfactory in many hospitals, and should prove most satisfactory in Callahan County Hospital.

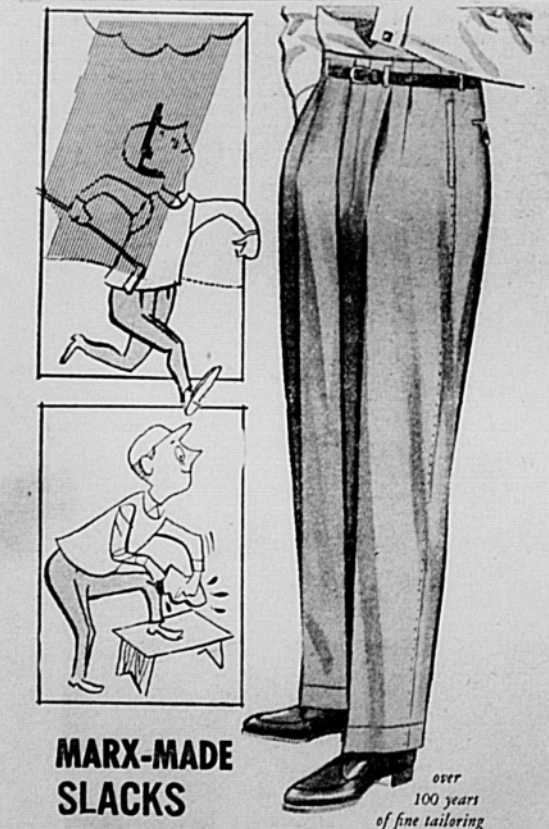

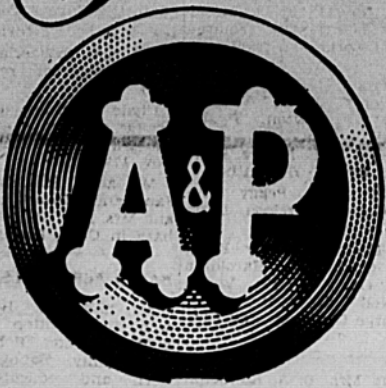

"Let every no-accident day be a day of thanksgiving," J. O. Musick, General Manager of The Texas Safety Association declared today.

"Thousands of really good drivers in our state can look back on 326 days of no-accident driving thus far in this 'leap year' of 1960," he said.

"For them, the driving privilege has been taken seriously, and they have proved themselves worthy in meeting the tests of varying road, weather and traffic conditions," he added.

"Others, not so fortunate, became involved in accidents—some meeting their death, some being injured, some escaping harm but suffering damage to their vehicles and other property," Musick pointed out.

"The Thanksgiving Day weekend ahead will be the occasion for many family gatherings around the festive board," he declared.

"We hope none of these get-togethers will be marred by absence of guests who fail to arrive because of a traffic tragedy," he added. "But holidays seem to be Death's favorite days for breaking that family circle."

Musick urged all holiday travelers to "take stock" of themselves. "Check that car of yours before you start homeward. Don't rush so fast that you speed your own death. Keep your mind on driving. On a long trip, stop for an occasional 'rest break' and non-intoxicating beverage. If by chance snow storms should develop, or if rain turns to sleet, be sure you have had the foresight to carry a set of reinforced tire chains, ready for use when the going gets rough."

Musick concluded, "Among those drivers who have had no accidents thus far this year there may be some who will not be able to make a similar boast at the end of this year. Although a past good performance is a pretty good indicator of future accomplishment, it is not an absolute guarantee. Consistent application of common-sense driving rules, however, is pretty certain to deliver good results — preventing death, avoiding injury, and making travel convenient and enjoyable."

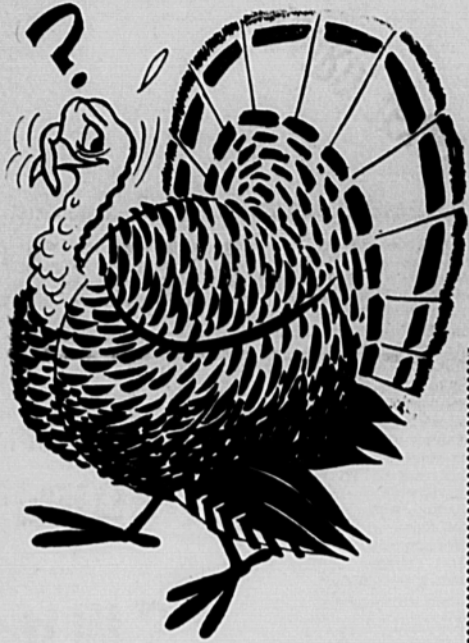
