The Post ISD Board of Trustees voted to re-bid the roofing work on schools after receiving new information on the actual state of the roofs from school engineer Bill Stracener at the board's regular meeting on Tuesday night, August 9.

Stracener informed the trustees that around \$10,500 more damage was found after the contractors met with the insurance adjuster and re-inspected all of the roofs.

Stracener also showed the trustees drawings of the damaged areas and explained to them what, in his opinion, needed to be done.

## Post Notes...

In a few weeks our family will observe our seventh anniversary in Post as we complete our sixth year here.

It's a good time to reflect on the changes we have seen, as well as express our thanks to all of you who have made our living here such a pleasure.

Economically, we have seen some really dramatic changes...the most obvious is of course the effect of depressed oil prices on our friends trying to survive in the oil patch.

When we arrived in September 1982 very few people could see that \$28 per barrel oil would go as low as \$10 within three years.

The security of the oilfield seemed about as safe as any occupation in the world.

Now look at our tax base, eroding at the same pace as unemployment and lower wages in the oil patch.

The first economic shock to our new found home came about six months after arrival as Burlington Industries announced plans to shut down their manufacturing here.

That left about 350 people unemployed.

For almost two years Garza County reported unemployment rates as high as 22 percent.

Agriculture, which had been depressed for several years, finally made a come back last year with a bumper crop.

### A Little Bit of Good News

Surprisingly, the population here has increased a little dab, when most "naysayers" were predicting a slide into oblivion.

Merchants and other civic minded people joined forces to secure the designation of Post as an official Texas Main Street Project city, and just look at the improvements we have experienced in less than two years.

Then Will McCrary came home for a visit and launched the most aggressive community theatre in West Texas, drawing audiences from a wide area every six weeks.

The highway traffic has steadily grown, a life-saver for those businesses catering to the traveling public.

And it is difficult to measure, but those dollars spent by travelers are critically important to our economy.

Every dollar brought to town by the highway and the theatre replace that dollar you and I spend in Lubbock at the movies or whatever.

Lubbock announced the settlement with land owners at the Justiceburg lake site, with construction on Lake Alan Henry expected to begin by the fall of 1989.

In addition, there is still hope

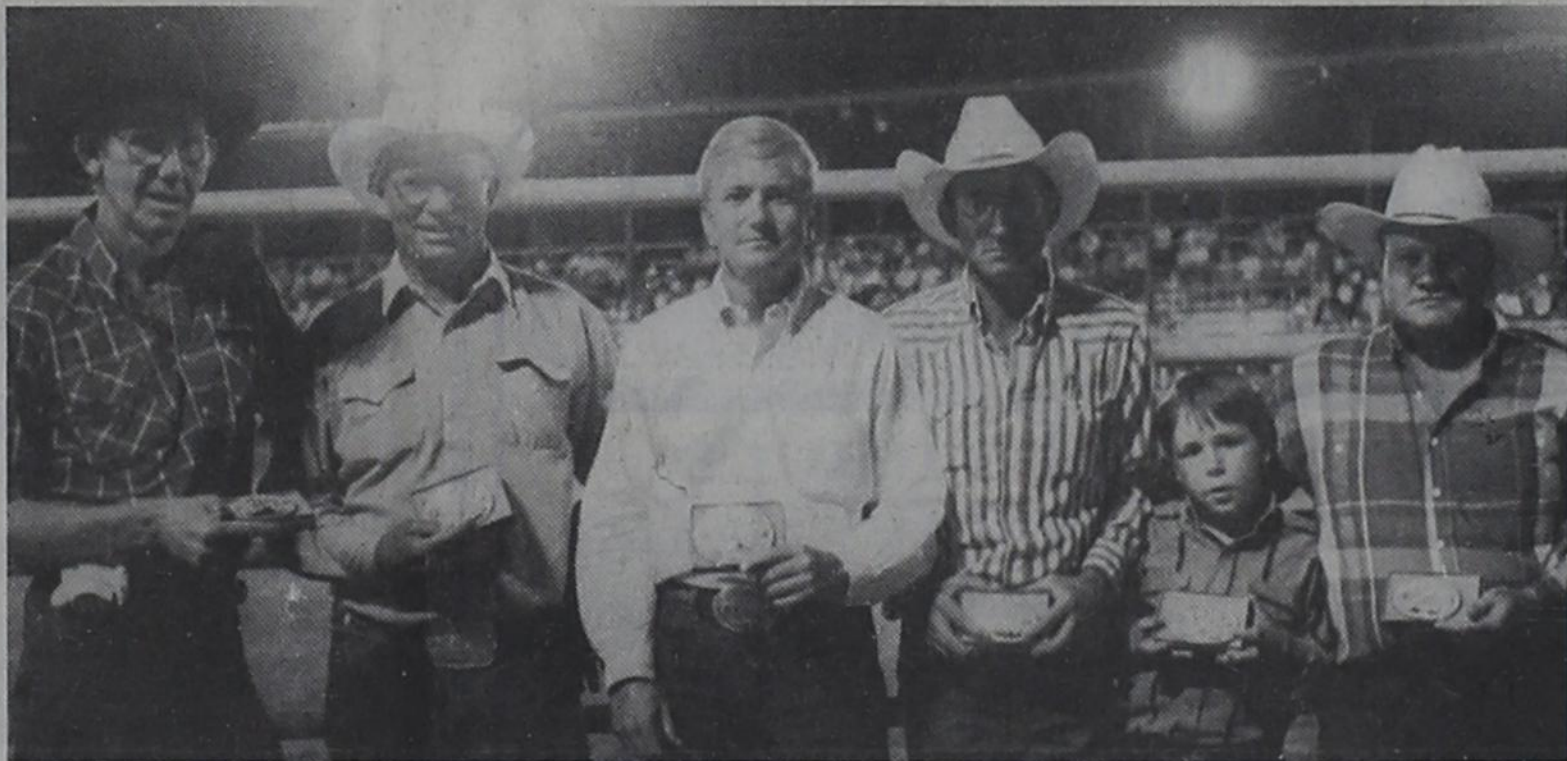

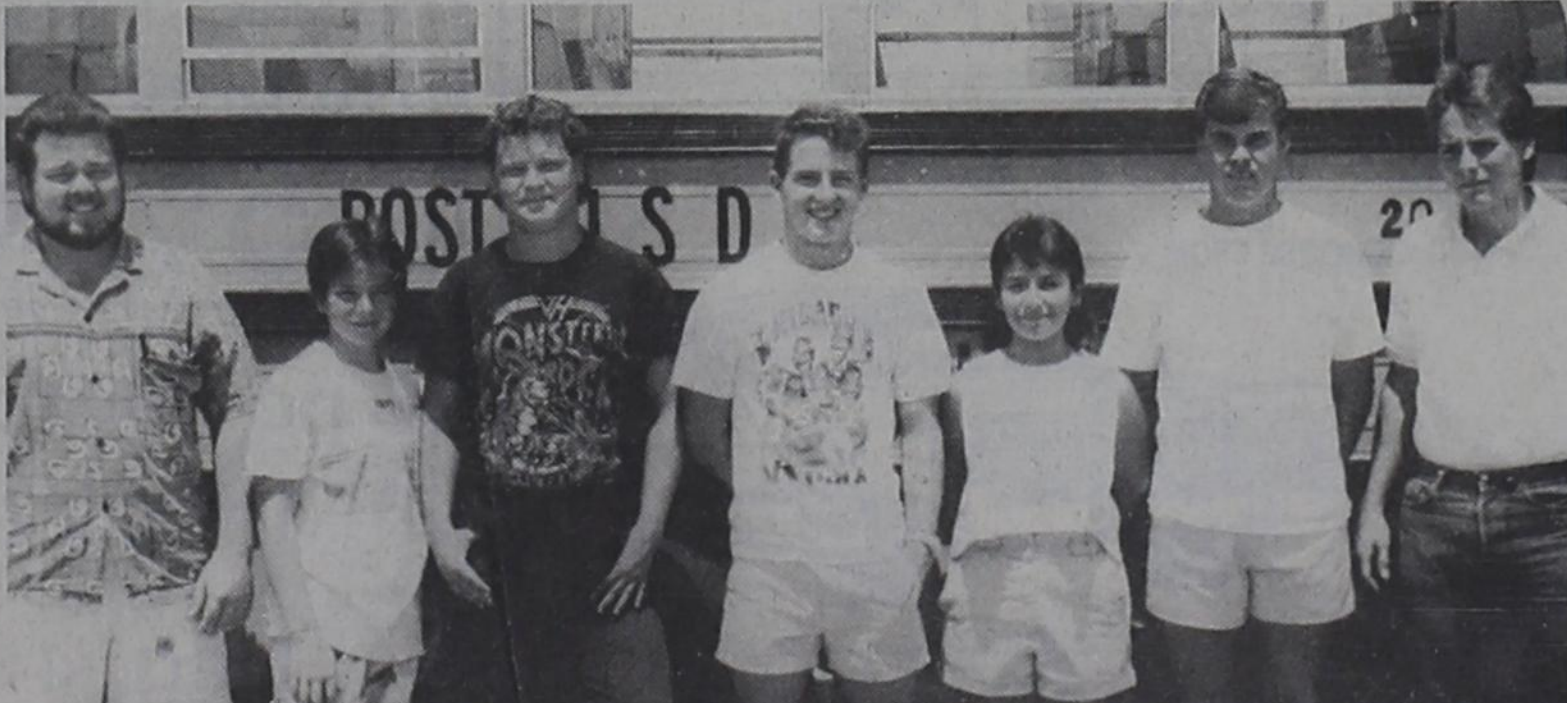

Notice is given that White River Municipal Water District HCR 2, Box 141, Spur, Texas 79370-9607 applicant, seeks an extension of time, pursuant to Section 11.145, Texas Water Code, and Texas Water Commission Rules 31 TAC Sections 295.1, et seq. to commence and complete construction of an authorized dam (Post Dam) and reservoir authorized by Certificate No. 12-3711. The certificate, issued to White River Municipal Water District on February 20, 1985, authorizes the construction and maintenance of a dam in Garza County creating a 57,450 acre-foot reservoir, approximately 6 miles east of Post, Texas on the North Fork Double Mountain Fork Brazos River, tributary of the Double Mountain Fork Brazos River, tributary of the Brazos River, Brazos River Basin. The certificate also authorizes the annual diversion and use from the reservoir of not to exceed 5600 acre-feet of water for municipal purposes, 1000 acre-feet of water for industrial purposes and 4000 acre-feet of water for mining purposes.  
The project was previously authorized by Water Use Permit No. 2590 (A-2798), which was issued July 24, 1970. Permit No. 2590 was superseded by Certificate No. 12-3711. Several extensions of time for commencement and completion of the project have been granted by the Commission. Construction plans and specifications for construction of the dam have not been approved by the Commission and construction has not begun.  
The applicant is requesting the date for commencement of construction be extended from the presently required date of July 24, 1988 to July 24, 1992 and the date for completion of construction be extended from the presently required date of July 24, 1991 to July 24, 1995. The District is requesting a four-year extension because the financing of the project is dependent upon the District entering into a contract with the City of Lubbock for use of water authorized by the certificate and the contract "... has not been completed due to a case in District Courts Travis County, Texas."  
The application for Extension of Time was received on June 20, 1988, and accepted for filing on July 20, 1988. The Executive Director has reviewed this application and declares it to be administratively complete.  
No public hearing will be held on this application unless an affected person requests a public hearing. Any such request must be in writing and contain (1) the name, mailing address and telephone number of the requester; (2) the application number or other recognizable reference to this application; (3) a brief explanation of how the requester, or persons represented by the requester would be adversely impacted by the granting of this application; and (4) a clear statement of the objections of the requester or represented persons.

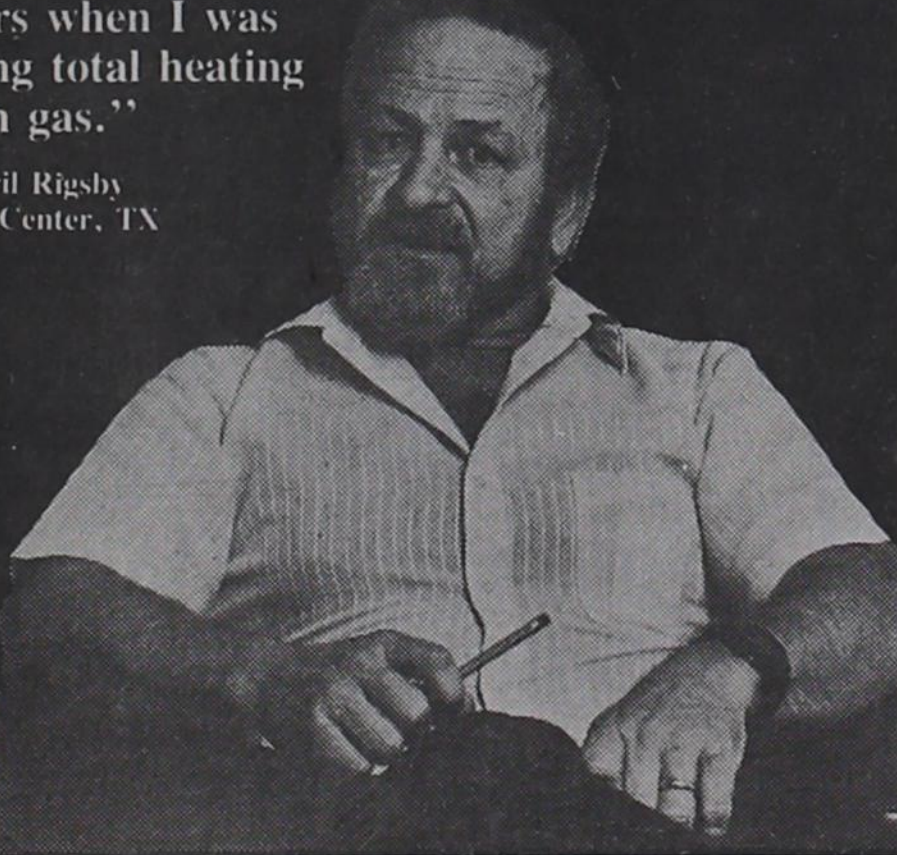

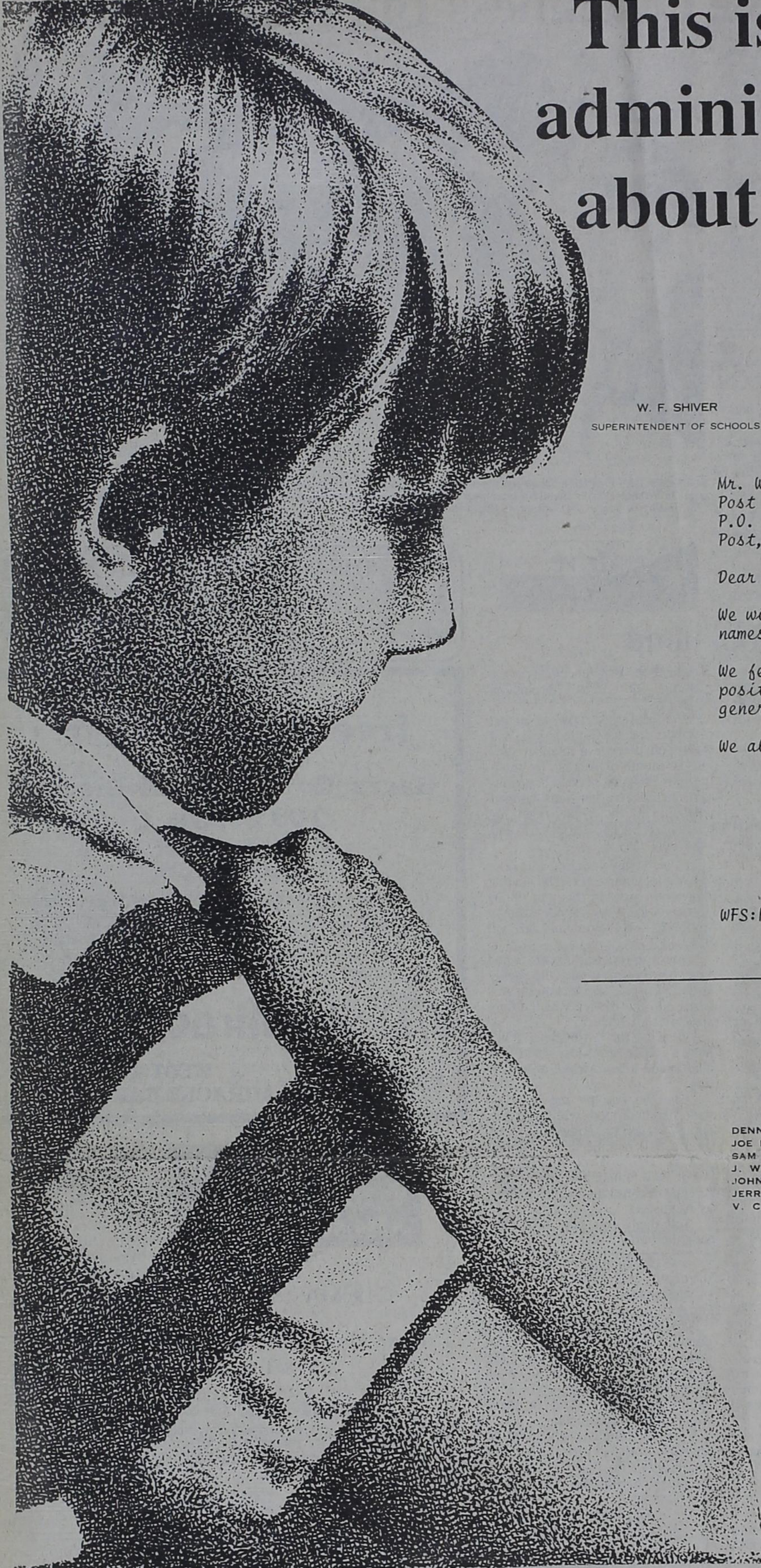
