Music for the dance will be provided by area favorite country-western artist Jody Nixon and his band.

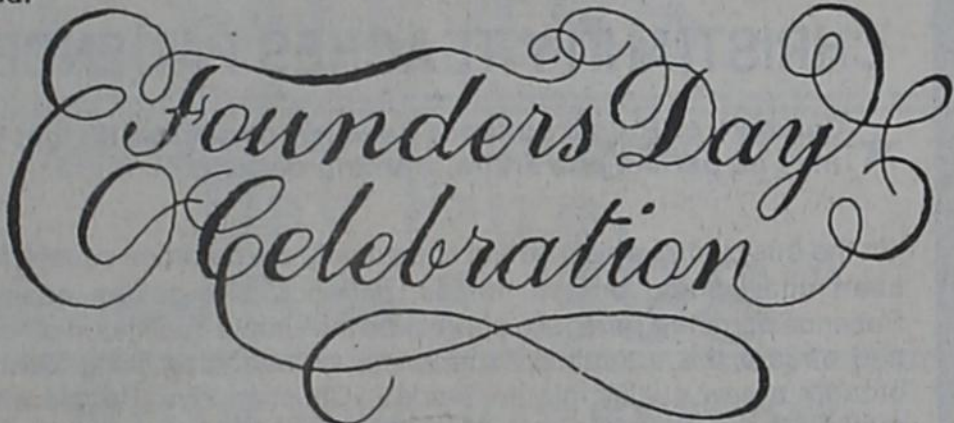
During the dance intermission, a silent auction will be held and a drawing will take place for the winner of a 20 gauge shotgun.

'Rip Van Garza' Gives Old Flavor to Founder's Day

The melodrama, "Rip Van Garza", to be performed at the Garza Theatre in Post on Founder's Day, Saturday, October 15, has a special significance to the history of this city.

One of the first plays C.W. Post saw as a child was "Rip Van Winkle", starring the most popular actor of his day, Joseph Jefferson.

Post saw the play in his hometown of Springfield, Ill., shortly after the Civil War.

Years later as a young merchant in Kansas City, Post saw the production again and made an acquaintance with Jefferson.

Years later, when Post built his first "dream city", Postumville, sometimes called White City or Post Addition in Michigan, he included his own theatre...and one of the first productions staged there was "Rip Van Winkle", starring of course his by now old friend Joe Jefferson.

In the adaptation of this American classic, Garza Theatre director Will McCrary presents the

story as the first citizens of Post in 1908 might have done the production as entertainment for the founding father, C.W. Post.

Post particularly liked the story of "Rip" because of the several adventures and restarts of his own life. He especially liked the story of a man given a "second chance."

USDA Lists Drought Rules

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has announced the federal regulations and procedures which county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) offices will follow in carrying out the provisions of the Disaster Assistance Act of 1988 (Public Law 100-387).

Under the new provisions, disaster payments will be available to eligible producers in losses which are greater than 35 percent of normal production. Producers could begin receiving drought assistance payments starting October 3, 1988, provided that an eligible producer's annual gross revenues are less than \$2 million.

City of Post to Receive Housing Grant

The city of Post has been announced, as a recipient of a Comprehensive Improvements Assistance Program contract totaling \$42,500, according to U.S. Senator Phil Gramm.

Senator Gramm announced the Post grant along with grants totaling \$48 million to 71 other Texas cities.

CIAP is a program of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

The contract obligates the federal government, through annual contribution, to pay the principal and interest on project notes sold by the local housing authorities over a period of 20 years.

The funds will be used to modernize low-income housing units.

As provided in the announced program regulations, wheat, feed grains, cotton, rice and soybean minimum yields have been established and, if an eligible farmer's production is equal to or less than the published yield, any crop production will be considered zero.

Furthermore, all eligible producers will crop losses greater than 65 percent must agree to purchase multiperil crop insurance for the 1989 crop for which disaster payments are made. However, this requirement may be waived by the county ASC committee under certain conditions.

In addition, disaster payments will be computed by utilizing the target price for eligible producers of wheat, feed grains, rice and upland and ELS cotton who are participating in the 1988 program and for producers who are not in these programs, the county loan rate will be used.

Subsequently, the total amount of payments and benefits a person may receive for combined crop and livestock emergency losses in 1988 may not exceed \$100,000 with emergency livestock program benefits not to exceed \$50,000 in any calendar year.

All livestock and crop producers are encouraged to promptly organize their production data and evidence in advance to quicken payment for qualified drought-related damage. Disaster applications for crop losses must be filed not later than March 31, 1989 at local

county ASCS offices, together with crop acreage reports and acceptable crop production evidence.

In a related matter, USDA also announced that the sales closing date for all 1989 FCIC winter wheat crop insurance will be extended until October 31, 1988. Such an extension will accommodate the crop insurance purchase requirement of the Disaster Assistance Act where appropriate.

Due to the complexity of the provisions of the Disaster Assistance Act of 1988, all farmers and ranchers are encouraged to rely strictly upon the advice and instructions provided by their respective county ASCS offices.

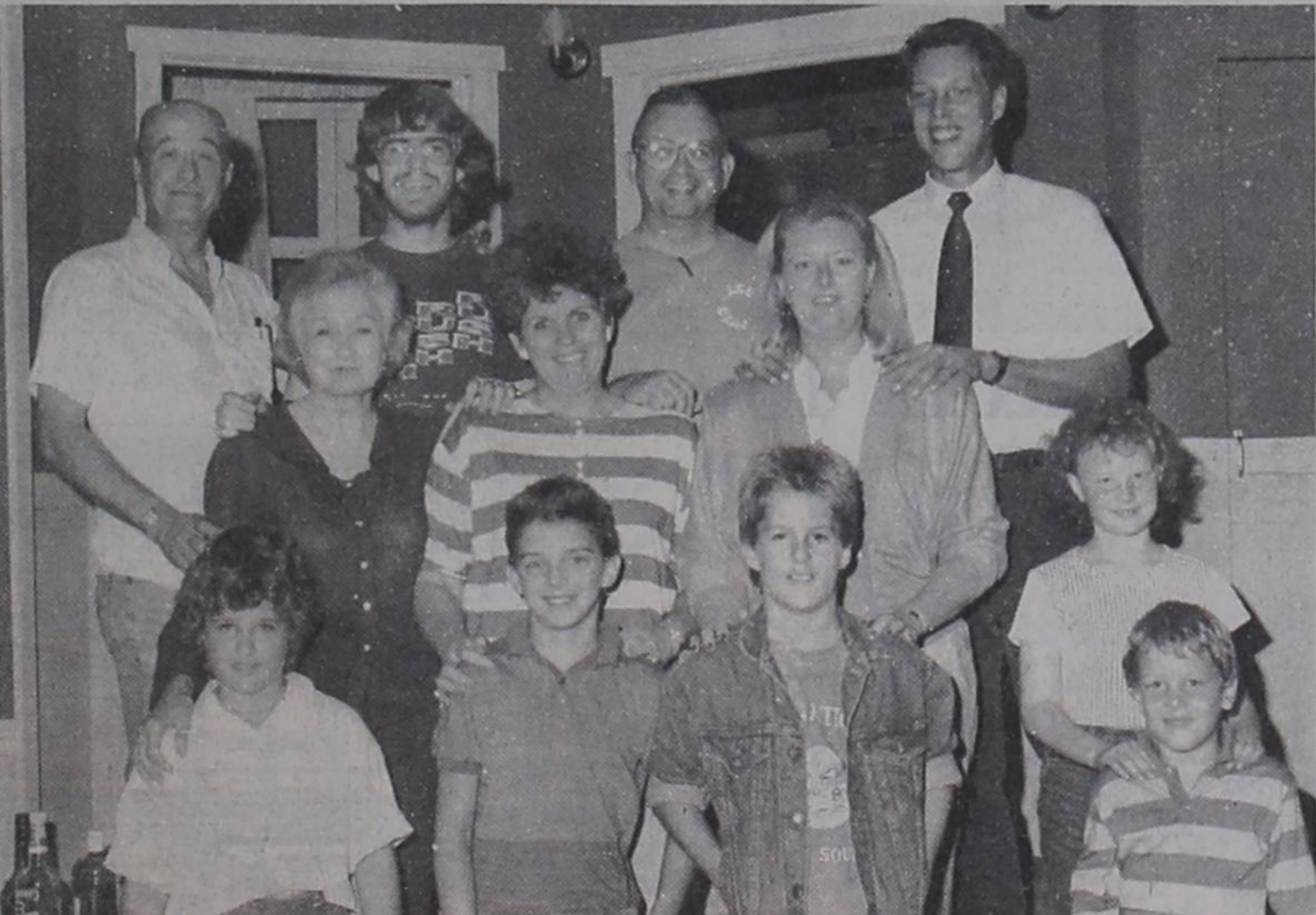

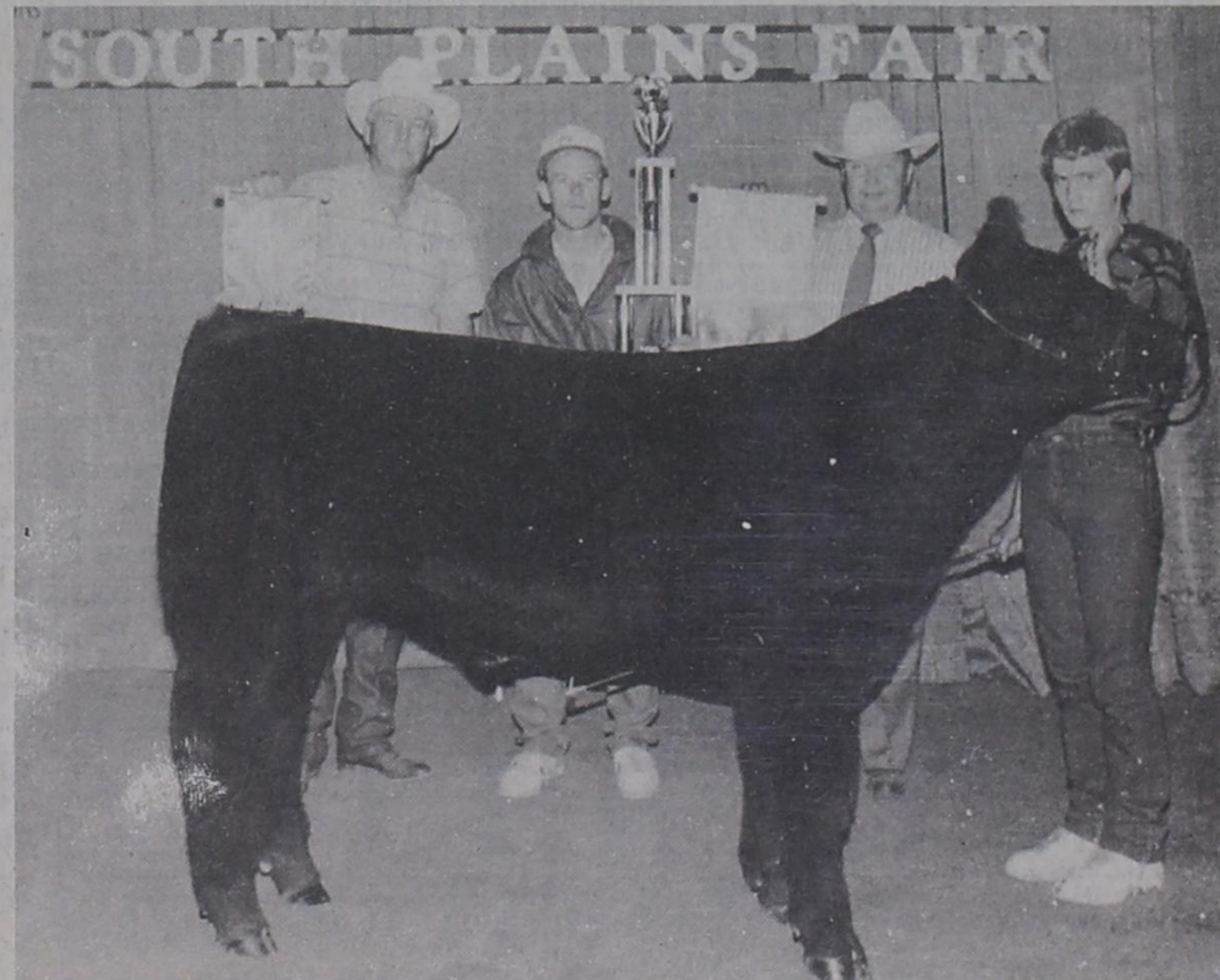

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Notice of Effective Tax Rate

19 88 Property Tax Rates in the City of Post

This notice concerns 19 88 property tax rates for the City of Post. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. Compare it to the tax rate the taxing unit proposes for this year. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.

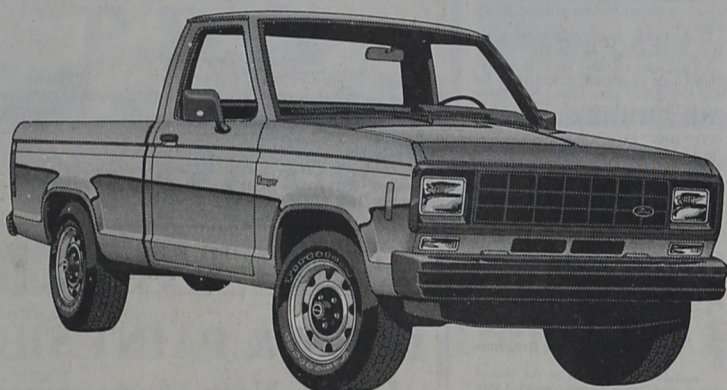
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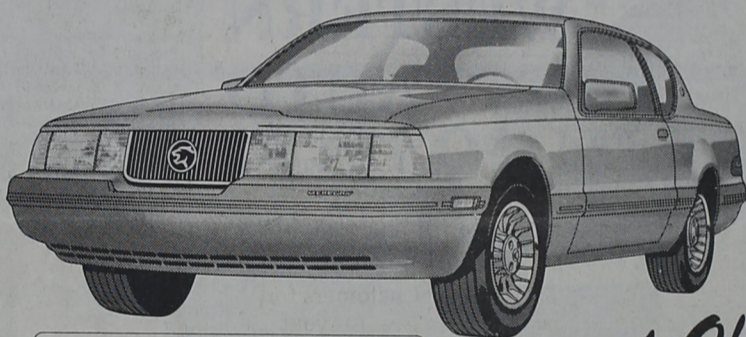
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Three Way Out-mans Southland Eagles 41-24

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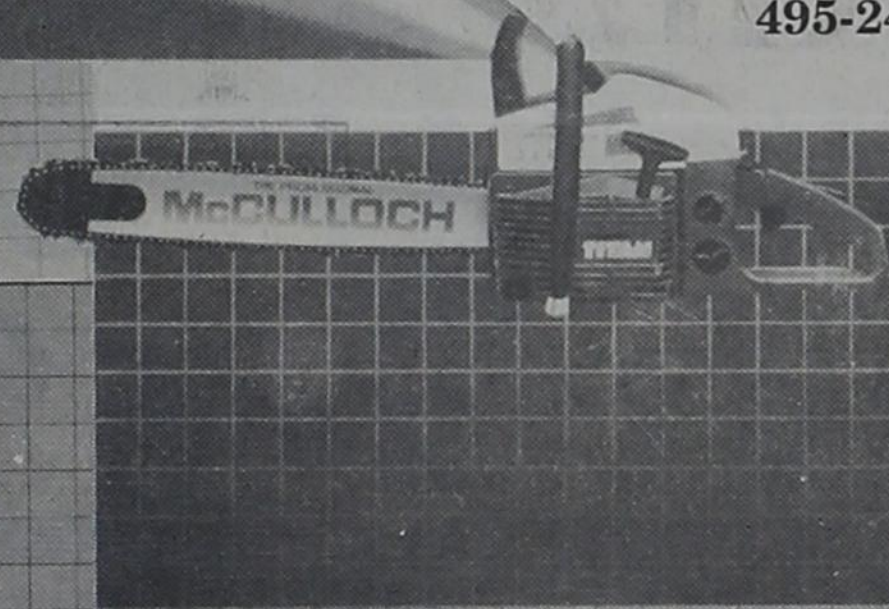
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Southland Jr High Loses 27-12

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Post Notes

Last Friday morning I went to Idalou to the Isom farm, along with two or three thousand other area folks, to hear Massachusetts governor Michael Dukakis, Democratic Party presidential candidate.

What was billed ahead of time as a "major agricultural policy" speech, didn't exactly measure up to the advance billing, but I will say that the governor is a good speaker.

As he was delivering his message, I couldn't help but think about the similarities to President John Kennedy...in appearance as well as style.

I never had the opportunity to see President Kennedy in person, but from the television exposure, I felt there was much about Dukakis that reminded me of Kennedy.

Which is not all bad. It's not all good either.

For one thing, Dukakis makes me just a little bit nervous when he says that all employers should pay for health insurance for all employees.

I'm not sure the governor has ever been exposed to the world of small business, or he would certainly temper his idea a tad.

The simple economic fact is, that the overwhelming majority of small businesses (such as The Post Dispatch) simply do not have enough revenue to pay the tremendous costs of health insurance.

The other thing that bothers me about the governor's message, although he didn't touch on it last Friday in Idalou, is his call for more power for the IRS to collect taxes.

Hey, folks, if the IRS gets any more power than it has now, there'll be no one left to lock the doors.

Actually, what needs to be done is to strip the IRS of much of the power it currently enjoys.

If you've ever had to face that monster bureaucracy, you know what I mean, if you haven't, then you have really led a sheltered life.

But even with my misgivings about those two issues, which I sincerely hope will be diffused later, I still give Dukakis an edge over Bush in the category of decent talk.

Both candidates, much to my disappointment, spend too much time bad-mouthing the other.

But Dukakis seems to me a little less abrasive about it.

I wish he would have been more specific about how to correct the economic injustice facing the agriculture and petroleum industries.

His comment about the sale of Mercedes Benz autos being up 57 percent and tractors down 60 percent was well received and an important message.

But that alone is not enough, I'd like to hear the plan for setting things right.

Neither candidate has done that, and I am beginning to think they will not.
