USDA Lists Drought Rules county ASCS offices, together with As provided in the announced crop acreage reports and accept-

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has announced the federal regulations and procedures which county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) offices will follow in carrying out the provisions of the Disaster Assistance Act of 1988 (Public Law 100-387).

Under the new provisions, disaster payments will be available to eligible producers in losses which are greater than 35 percent of normal production. Producers could begin receiving drought assistance payments starting October 3, 1988, provided that an eligible producers annual gross revenues are less than \$2 million.

City of Post to Receive **Housing Grant**

The city of Post has been announced, as a recipient of a Comprehensive Improvements Assistance Program contract totaling \$42,500, according to U.S. Senator Phil Gramm.

Senator Gramm announced the Post grant along with grants totaling \$48 million to 71 other Texas

CIAP is a program of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. The contract obligates the fed-

eral government, through annual contribution, to pay the principal and interest on project notes sold by the local housing authorities over a period of 20 years. The funds will be used to mod-

ernize low-income housing units.

Subsequently, the total amount of payments and benefits a person may receive for combined crop and livestock emergency losses in 1988 may not exceed \$100,000 with emergency livestock program benefits not to exceed \$50,000 in any calendar year.

All livestock and crop producers are encouraged to promptly organize their production data and evidence in advance to quicken payment for qualified drought-related damage. Disaster applications for crop losses must be filed not later than March 31, 1989 at local

This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law.
