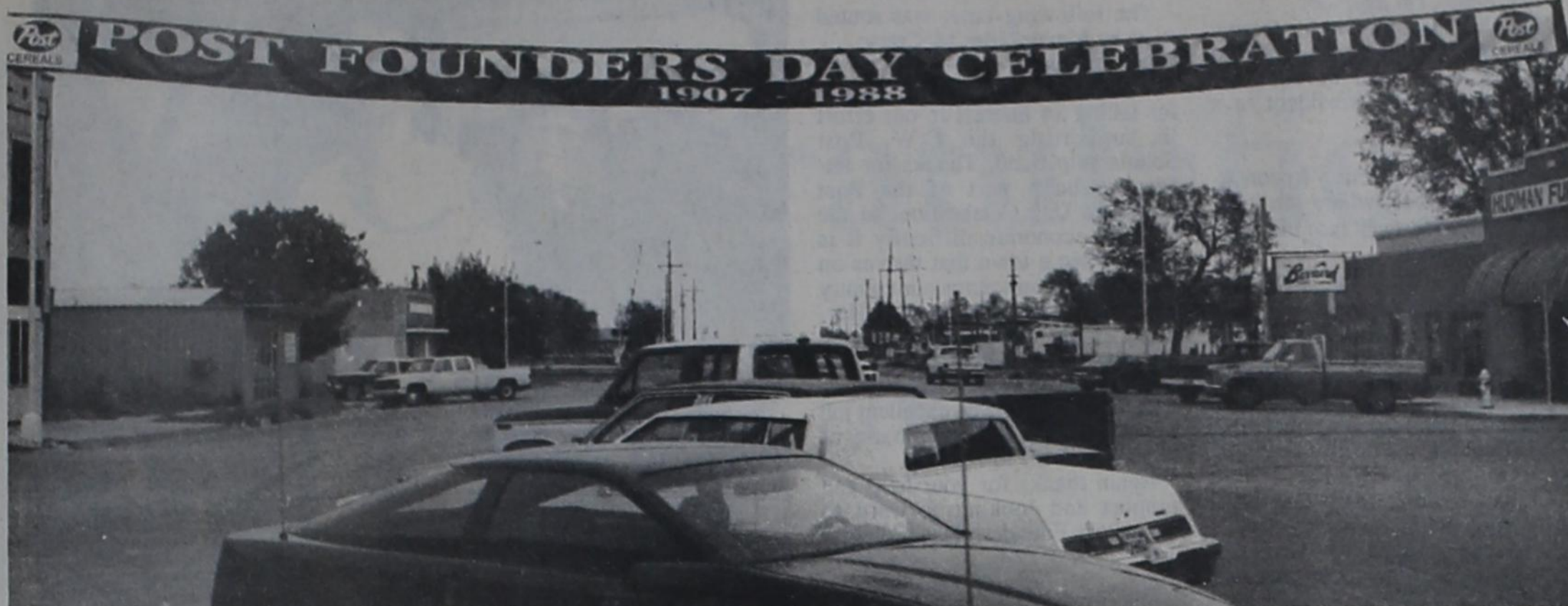

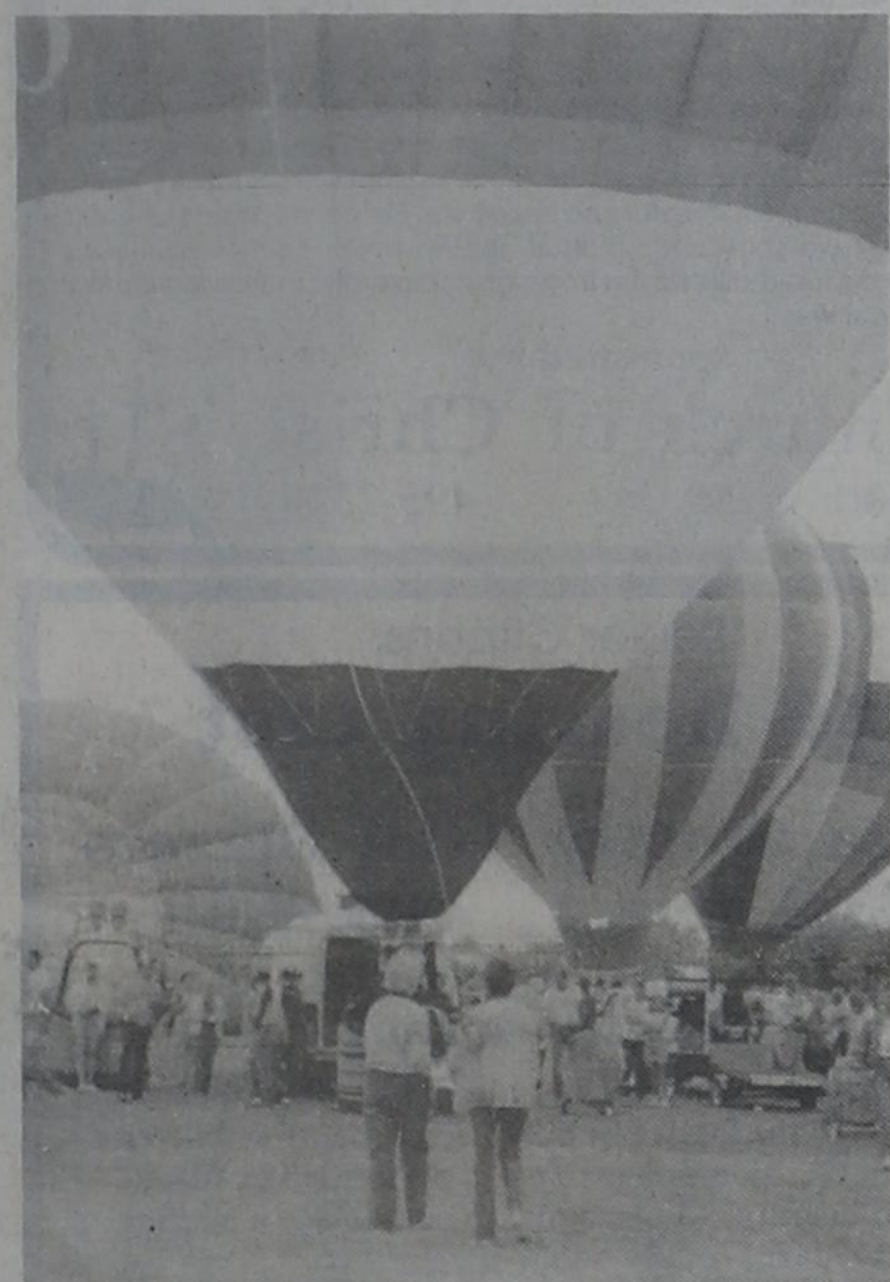

## Founders Day Saturday

There are several good reasons for getting up early this Saturday morning - and all of them have to do with Post's Founder's Day Celebration.

Saturday, October 15 promises to be a day filled with a round of activities that starts off for the early-risers with a 7 a.m. Sunrise Chuckwagon Breakfast at the Spining Ranch, four and one-half miles south of Post on U.S. Highway 84.

While you're enjoying your breakfast with the cowboys and trail bosses at the ranch, prior to the cattle drive, you'll have an opportunity to watch colorful hot-air balloons from the Hot-air Balloon Club of Lubbock as they are launched at sunrise and take off across the West Texas sky.

After breakfast and the balloon launch, the cattle drive itself gets underway at 9 a.m. Approximately 350 head of cattle from five area ranches will be driven from the Spining Ranch, along U.S. 84 to F.M. 651 and the Santa Fe Depot where the cattle will be sold and loaded.

For those who prefer to stay in town, the morning's activities begin with the Post Century - another cycling adventure brought to you by the Lubbock Bicycle Club.

The starting time for the Century Plus is 8:30 a.m., with rides of

102 miles, 70 miles, 50 miles and 25 miles, beginning from the Algerita Park area.

At the Algerita Art Center, a one-man show featuring the work of artist Vicki Diggs continues and can be viewed from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

A Garza County Historical Museum exhibit, from the Southwest Collection, will feature an outstanding display of materials, documents and photographs from the C.W. Post Estate, collected when Post was trying to secure the location of Texas Tech for the town he founded.

The museum will also feature two additional special displays - a memorial to Representative George Mahon, and an Indian burial exhibit.

At 9 a.m. the Harvest Festival begins at the Post Community Center, with county fair exhibits which include crafts, education, handwork, flowers, art, photography, culinary, clothing, canning and agriculture.

A Harvest Queen will be chosen in a contest to be held on the courthouse lawn at 10 a.m., as lovely young ladies from the area compete for the honor of representing Garza County.

During the day, from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m., local restaurants will serve Southwest food favorites in a "Festival Food Court" at Algerita Park. Out of town vendors, and some local vendors, will be serving food in the park all day.

Performances of "Rip Van Garza and the Nine Dwarfs" will go on at the Garza Theatre at 1 p.m., 3 p.m. and 5 p.m. The melodrama offered by Will McCrary and a troop of Garza performers is open free to the public.

Demonstrations by the 4th Cavalry Memorial Association will be at 2 p.m. and 4 p.m. in the Santa Fe Depot area and will include vi-

With the deadline now past for registering to vote in the November general election, the Garza County Clerk's office is turning its attention to absentee voting for the election.

Applications for absentee ballots to be voted by mail in the general election will be accepted in the County Clerk's office through Tuesday, November 1.

Marked absentee ballots must be mailed back to the County Clerk in an envelope bearing an election day, November 8, postmark.

The period for general election absentee voting by personal appearance at the County Clerk's office in the courthouse begins on Wednesday, October 19 and continues through Friday, November 4, 1988.

### City Council Seeks Grant Application

The Post City Council approved at its regular meeting Monday night, plans for submitting an application for a Community Development Block grant, for the purpose of improving streets in low and moderate income areas of the city.

The grant will be submitted before October 31 through the South Plains Association of Governments.

Public hearings will be held October 13 at City Hall and October 20 at the Pleasant Home Baptist Church, both to start at 6 p.m.

"It is important that these hearings be well represented by citizens who will benefit from the grant," Mayor Giles McCrary emphasized.

Approximately 40 applications are expected to be filed for the various grants, with only six to be approved.

### Commissioners Okay Temporary Help for County Clerk Through General Election

Temporary extra-help for the county clerk's office and comp-time for the sheriff's department were the main items on a brief agenda when Garza County Commissioners' Court met in regular session Monday, October 10.

County Clerk Sonny Gossett asked the Commissioners for the temporary help for his office, at least through the November 8 general election, basing his request on the recent loss of an employee and the added work during the election period.

The Commissioners approved Gossett's request and voted to authorize an additional 120 hours, at an hourly rate, to carry the clerk's office through the upcoming election time.

Regarding comp-time for the sheriff's department, County Judge Giles W. Dalby suggested that some documentation be drawn up to present to the sheriff requesting information on that department's overtime.

The Commissioners voted that Judge Dalby would draw up a resolution to present to the sheriff's department, asking the members of that department to substantiate all overtime. The sheriff's office would be asked to supply information as to the case the overtime was spent on, why the overtime was necessary, etc.

The Judge will draw up the resolution for the Commissioners' final approval at the next meeting.

Sandy Tomlinson, County Extension Agent-Home Economics presented her monthly report to the Commissioners and also reported on the success of Saturday's well-attended 4-H Banquet.

Deputy Billy Timms appeared before the court to explain bills that were in question, before they were approved for payment.

The monthly bills in question included charges from Garza Memorial Hospital and Collier Drug for medical care and prescriptions for county jail inmates.

The bills were satisfactorily explained by Deputy Timms and were approved for payment by the Commissioners.

Other business conducted by the court included approving the monthly bills for payment and approving minutes and monthly reports.

even the semblance of choice by the electorate.

"One man makes the decision," he said, "and that is a dangerous situation."

The vice president is, to use a trite and worn expression, a heart-beat away from the presidency.

Doesn't it make sense that the woman or man in that office face the electorate directly?

And now, I owe an apology to our readers. Last summer, just before the Democratic convention, I editorialized about the way vice presidents are appointed, and in that editorial I reminded readers that the constitution established the office as one decided by the people.

Well, maybe I was wrong...I

looked at a sample ballot the other day and realized that when you vote for a presidential candidate, you also vote for the vice presidential candidate of that party.

In other words, voters do not have a choice in the election of a vice president. I don't believe that was what our founding fathers (and mothers) had in mind when they wrote the constitution.

(And don't question me about our founding mothers, I'm sure many of them had a say in the document which historians have ignored). If the vice president is to serve the people, he or she must be accountable to the electorate, not the president.

What bothers me most about this is my ignorance...I don't even know how long this travesty has been going on.

I can't remember what a ballot

looked like four years ago.

Yes, Eddie, I'm mad too!

The very idea, forcing me to vote for a vice president that I may or may not want, just because the person running for president says so.

Baloney! Let's insist on a return to constitutional elections, where the individual candidate must face the electorate stark naked.

If you take this idea of "packaging" a vice president with the president to its natural limits, you would get to the point of every candidate of a particular party linked on the ballot...in other words, you'd be forced to vote for all Democrats, or all Republicans or all Libertarians or all Communists...

Ooops, I didn't really say that nasty word, did I?

Why not? That's the way it's done in those other countries we say are so bad.

We're not that far away from the truly socialistic election...a free country to vote...as long as you vote for the "party" candidate.

Yes, it could happen, especially with the massive amount of apathy the electorate in this country have shown over the past two generations.

Maybe that's what we deserve. Me, I'm in favor of returning to constitutional government.

You haven't heard the last of this yet...let me do some research on the constitutional question...I'll be back with more.

The City of Post is planning to file an application with the Texas Department of Commerce (TDOC) for a Texas Community Development Program (TCDP) grant under the Community Development Fund. This application will be submitted to TDOC on or before October 27, 1988.

A public hearing concerning the proposed grant application will be held at 6 p.m. on October 20, 1988 at the Pleasant Home Baptist Church, 601 N. Ave F, Post, Texas. The purpose of this public hearing is to review the City of Post's proposed 1988 request for TCDP funds including the amount of funds to be requested and the scope and location of proposed project activities. No displacement of residents is expected as a result of the proposed 1988 TCDP project.

All citizens are encouraged to attend this public hearing and present their views on the City's community development project needs. Written comments will be accepted by the City up until the time that the City's application is submitted to TDOC. A copy of the City's application will be available for inspection during normal business hours at the City Hall, 105 East Main, Post, Texas.

The basic intent of the TCDP grants is to provide programs to benefit low and moderate income persons, to prevent or eliminate slums and blight and to meet other urgent community development needs. Eligible activities include improved streets and drainage, utility systems and other public facilities improvements. Housing improvement programs are also eligible as are certain public service activities which meet one of the three TCDP basic intents noted above.

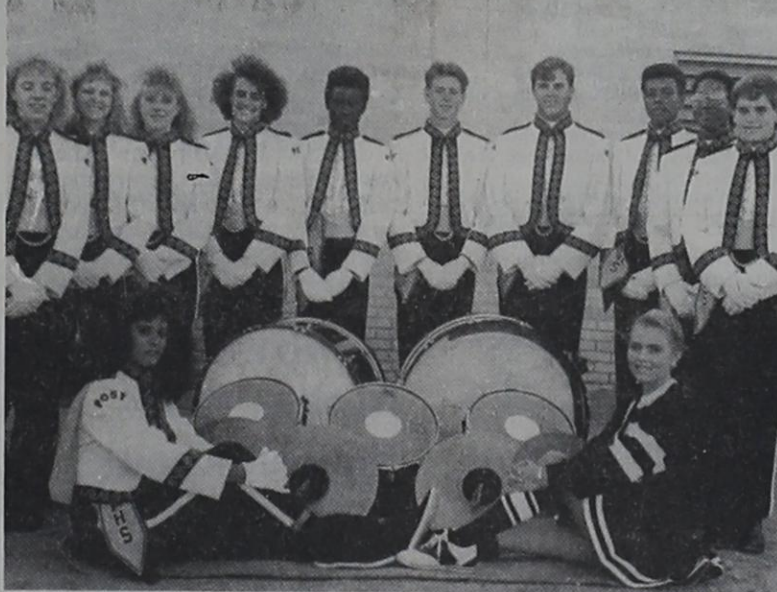

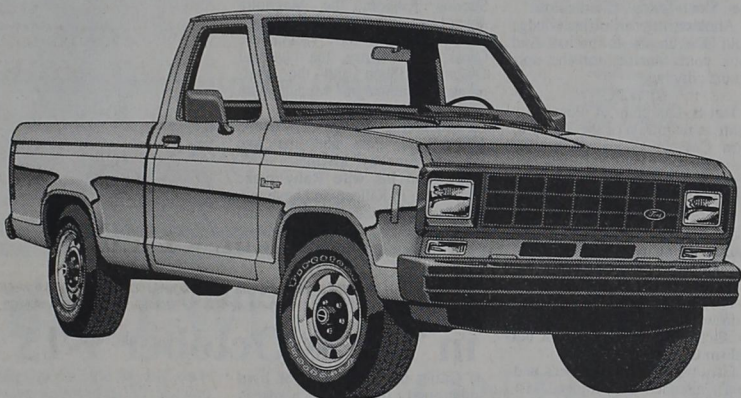

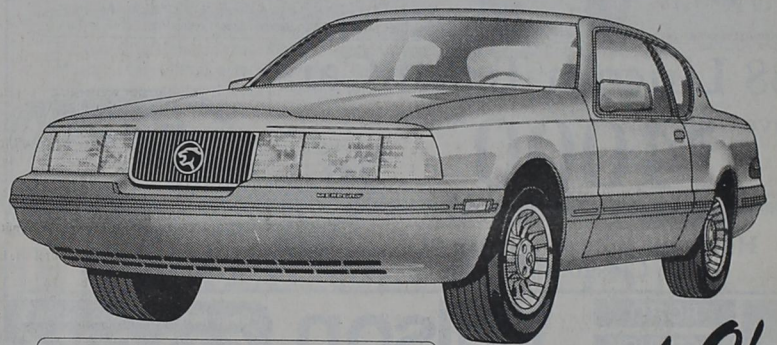

state and we urge every citizen to practice fire prevention every day in an effort to conserve our valuable Texas resources."

This year marks the 66th anniversary of National Fire Prevention Week. The week-long observance was first established in 1922 by President Warren Harding in memory of the so-called "Great Chicago Fire" of October 9, 1871.

That conflagration killed 250 people and destroyed 17,430 buildings at a cost of \$168 million. People began thinking in terms of fire prevention in addition to fire fighting as a result of this fire.

"We've been getting tremendous support and it's going to be a great event," she said.

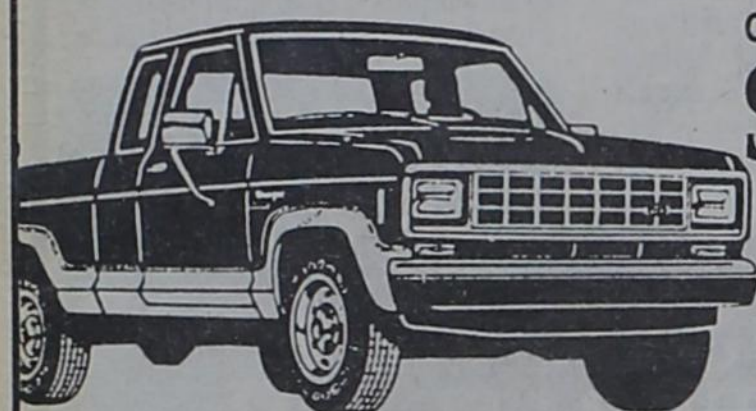

Starting at the Lamesa 38, the 'Lope offense, mixing up running and passing plays, drove to the three, where on fourth down Perez was stopped short of the goal line at the one.

The drive featured running by Floyd Slay, a pass reception from Sappington to Rankin for a first down and a scramble by Sappington from the 24 to nine for another first down.

**Antelopes Score**  
The end of the first quarter found Lamesa with a third down at their own two yard line, following hard hitting by Victor Chapa followed by a quarterback sack by Lee Wayne Greathouse and Tyge Payne.

Keith Peel stopped the next play, setting up a fourth down punt.

Sappington got the punt at the Lamesa 45 and returned it to the 41.

On first down Lupe Perez took the handoff from his wingback position, cut through a terrific trap block over left guard and out-raced the Tor defenders to the seven yard line.

On first down Sappington rolled to his right and lofted the ball out in front of Rankin in the right side of the end zone for the touchdown.

It all looked so easy, but oh so nice for Post fans.

Matt Pennell kicked the first of two successful extra points and the 'Lopes went out front 7-0 with 10:49 left in the first half. The drive started with 11:19 showing on the clock.

Most of the second quarter was a defensive battle as neither offense could mount a sustained drive.

The defensive highlights following the ensuing kickoff included tough hitting on the line by Peel, Richard Hudman, Payne and Greathouse, with strong outside rushing by Rankin and Pennell.

Lamesa managed to get inside the Post 44 yard line, but two consecutive plays set the Tors back as on first down quarterback Paul Lopez was hammered at the 40 by Rankin and Greathouse and on second

down Lopez fumbled the ball and was sacked by Chapa and Hudman.

Third down wasn't much better for the Tors as Rankin raced into the backfield, slamming Lopez to the ground at the Lamesa 45.

Lamesa got the ball back after three tries and a Post punt, and the 'Lope defense kept up the pressure.

Hudman and Peel clamped down the running attack at the Lamesa 49, Jimmy Holleman and Hudman stopped the draw at the 44 for a loss of five and on third down Tim Hogg was banged to the ground by Chapa at the 47.

With 1:46 left in the first half, the 'Lopes mounted a sustained drive with time running out, getting to the Lamesa 14 before the half ended.

The six play drive was highlighted by a great pass and reception from Sappington, rolling left from the Post 27 yard line, throwing the ball toward the left sideline to Bobby Blair, who made a great diving catch coming back to the ball at the Lamesa 37.

Again Sappington found Blair on a pass at the 30 and the tough running receiver rammed to the Lamesa 24.

Post called time out with 39 seconds left, and on first down Sappington kept the ball over right tackle to the 20.

Another time out was called with 32 seconds remaining. A pass to Rankin on the right side was incomplete, Post was called for illegal motion, setting the ball at the 25.

Sappington rolled right and scrambled out of trouble to the 14, but failed to step out of bounds with 13 seconds on the clock.

The offense didn't have time to get set following the first down and time ran out.

**Second Half Action**  
The Antelopes didn't waste any time

setting the pace in the second half as they took possession on the kick off and scored four minutes later at the end of a nine play drive.

The clincher on the drive came on third down at the Lamesa 44 1/2 yard line with the 'Lopes needing about one inch for a first down.

Sappington took the snap and rammed in behind blocking by center Chad Davis and Pennell for the first down.

The drive started at the Post 29 after Rankin took the short kickoff from the 25 yard line.

Jamie Perez got the pitchout around right end to the 36, Sappington threw the quick pass to Rankin at the 46 for a first down and Jamie went over left tackle to the Lamesa 49, and on second down took it over right guard to the 44 1/2.

The official measurement put the ball just short of the first down by about an inch. Jamie Perez was injured on the play and was helped to the sidelines.

Bobby Curtis went in at the tailback slot and following Sappington's plunge for first down, the quarterback scrambled around left end to the 37.

Curtis got the pitchout on second down to the 33, picking up another first down.

Sappington went nowhere over right guard, and on second down Curtis took the ball on a draw play over left guard, turned on the afterburners, cutting to the left outside and simply outran the Lamesa secondary to the end zone for the touchdown.

The drive started with 11:55 on the clock and following Pennell's kick with 8:53 left in the third quarter the 'Lopes led 14-0.

Lamesa put on a determined effort after the kickoff, picking up three first downs and getting to the Post 27 before running out of downs when Holleman stopped the reverse in its tracks, tackling Johnny Baltazar at the 37.

The Tors used the pass play effectively with the run, as the 'Lope defense sagged, but regained its intensity at the right time.

The fourth quarter opened up with Lamesa forced to punt, and the following Post offensive drive was halted by the second fumble, as Slay lost the football at the Post 39 yard line.

Lamesa went to work, using the run and pass, surprising the Antelopes and getting to the 11 yard line.

Keene Hunter was stopped cold on first down by Rankin on the option around left end.

Lopez' pass downfield was deflected by Chapa and almost intercepted.

On third down Lopez tried to get a pass off to Baltazar, but Neal Gibbs put too much pressure on the quarterback.

On fourth down Lopez rolled to his right and threw the ball toward the end zone, Sappington jumped up in the air, grabbed the ball at the five yard line and raced back to the Lamesa 40.

The ball was brought back to the Post 12 yard line as three flags went to the ground during the run-back, they were all clipping calls.

The offense sputtered and punted. Lamesa tried again, getting three first downs, one on a fourth down situation, as the Tors got as close as the two yard line.

Defensive highlights for Post included Pennell, a quarterback sack by Gibbs on second down at the five, Pennell, Peel and Jamie Perez stopping Hunter around right end on third down for no gain and finally on fourth down Rankin, Payne and Pennell ganging up on Lopez at left guard at the two.

With 2:43 left in the game, the Post offense went to work to run out the clock.

A quick pass to Rankin got a first down at the 12, Curtis was sacked for a one yard loss at the 11 and Sappington, rolling to his left, was caught for a big loss at the one yard line.

Slay got the ball out to the four, setting up a fourth down.

The Tors called time out with 59 seconds remaining in the game, before the ball was set, the Antelopes called time out.

Rankin went toward the back of the end zone, took the snap, faked to punt, then stepped out of the end zone for a safety.

With 14-2 on the scoreboard and 55

seconds left in the game, Rankin punted from the 20 yard line.

Lamesa got the ball with 52 seconds left, Lopez dropped back to loft the desperation pass, and Lannie Lee jumped in front of the receiver for the pass interception at the Post 25, returning the ball to the 43.

Two snaps of the ball and the final 43 seconds expired...the Post Antelopes celebrated their first district win this season.

Fans roared their approval when the 'Lopes sprinted the traditional 50 yards to the locker room...running right along side was the team's elated coach Dewayne Osborne.

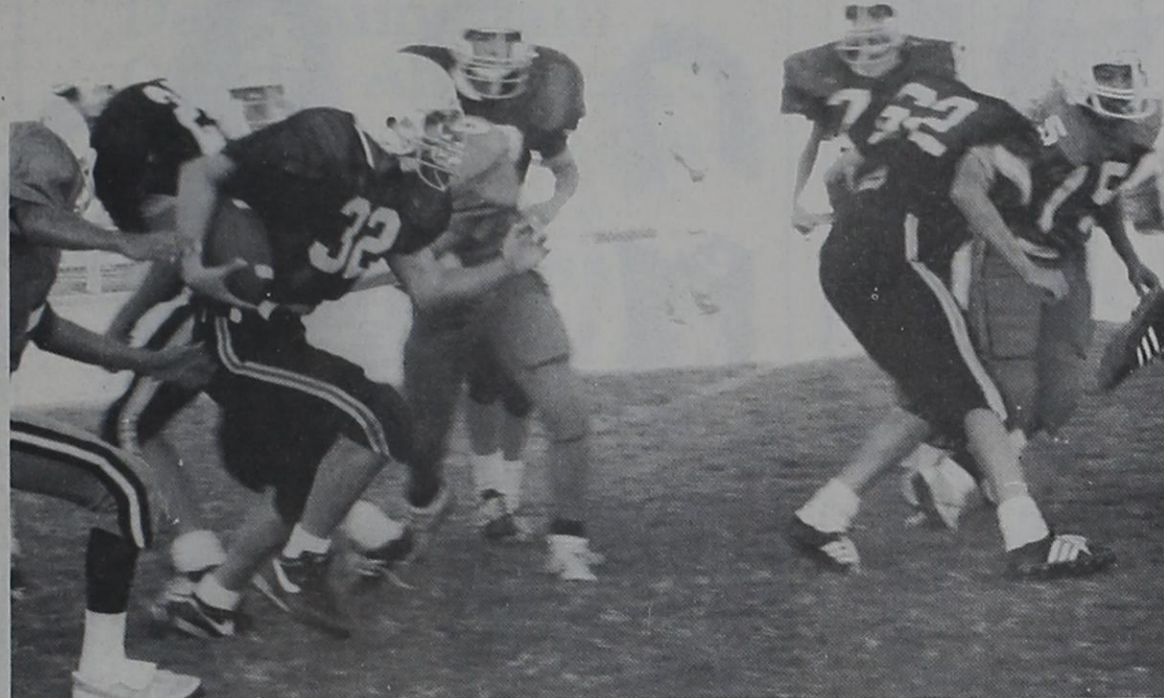

# Founders Day Celebration

## The Post Main Street Project and Salute

### Charles William Post



C.W. Post, founder of today's Post Cereals, became interested in nutrition and health when his own health failed. In an effort to improve his condition, C.W. Post developed a nourishing wholesome cereal beverage named Postum®. Two years later, C.W. Post introduced one of the first ready-to-eat cereals: Grape Nuts®. Grape Nuts® was made of wheat and malted barley, baked in the form of bread loaves, then ground into crisp nuggets. C.W. Post named his cereal Grape Nuts® because he believed that "grape sugar" was formed during the baking process and because the cereal had a nutty flavor.

Post Toasties® was C.W. Post's third success at creativity and producing a healthful cereal. In 1904, he introduced a "double thick" corn flakes product which he called "Elijah's Manna." A devout man himself, he was puzzled when some persons objected to the use of a religious name to sell cereal.

Nevertheless, in 1907, Post renamed the product "Post Toasties." Like Postum® and Grape Nuts®, Post Toasties® was sold as a health food, and in each package of cereal C.W. Post included a copy of his pamphlet, "The Road to Wellville."

Later in 1907, his health still ailing, C.W. Post looked to a dryer, warmer climate. When in 1907 West Texas was opened for settlement, Post purchased approximately 225,000 acres of land - a portion below the Caprock Escarpment - for the purpose of developing a 'dream city' to be called Post City. He advertised his farmsteads and many farmers who had eaten Post Toasties® and drank Postum® put their faith in the Post name and headed West.

As part of the elaborate self-sufficient plan, Post hired stone masons to quarry sandstone in the area to be used in the construction of numerous commercial buildings. (Many of these historic structures have been restored in recent years.) A brick factory and a cotton mill were also operated.

A program involving landscaping within the city limits was instituted late in 1907 with trees being planted along every 30 feet of city streets. A nursery was opened and by 1909, virtually every city street was lined by trees, for Post believed landscaping was an integral part of a healthy social environment. Thus, the Main Street Project is currently working to once again landscape the Main Street area of historic Post City.

C.W. Post's vision, determination, and dream are still very much alive both within Post Cereals and in Post, Texas. We invite you to be a part of the ongoing dream by participating in the October 15, 1988 Founder's Day Celebration in Post, Texas.
