Fourth Quarter Was Exciting

When Post Antelope head coach Dewayne Osborne recalls last Friday's 24-20 win at Seminole he says it was one of the team's better games of the year.

"And boy, that fourth quarter was exciting," he adds.

"We had great team and individual effort for our defense," the coach continues, pointing to the performances of Jimmy Holleman, Victor Chapa, Tyge Payne, Keith Peel, Neal Gibbs and Richard Hudman.

Remembering a critical third down and

short yardage play that kept Seminole from continuing a drive, Osborne credited Oliver McDougle for stripping the ball away from Indian running back Jerrold Hill.

"That was a key play," the coach adds.

"We are fighting for third place in the district," Osborne says, "and it's going to be tough one this Friday."

The coach refers to the visiting Slaton Tigers, who come to Post with a four win, five loss record this season.

"They are an extremely dangerous team offensively," the coach observes, "they can explode for big points in a short amount of time."

Osborne says that Tiger running back Gaylon Davis is probably the best back in this area and "the best we've seen this year."

Getting the blocking for Davis on offense is a solid front line consisting of 175 pound sophomore tackle Chris Brown (72), 190 pound senior guard Cody Alford (51), 163 pound junior center Trey Wood (65), 226 pound senior guard Ruben Ledesma (71) and 195 pound senior tackle Vick Bryant (75).

Michael Cone (10), a 181 pound senior quarterback also hands the ball to 167 pound sophomore fullback Marcus Kirkwood (32), who gives good blocking for Davis.

The Tigers have six players who start both on offense and defense.

Playing defense are Ledesma, Bryant, 174 pound junior end Mario Avila (82), Brown, Cone and 139 pound junior safety Billy Wilbom (86).

The game will be played at Southland Friday, November 4, beginning at 7:30 p.m.



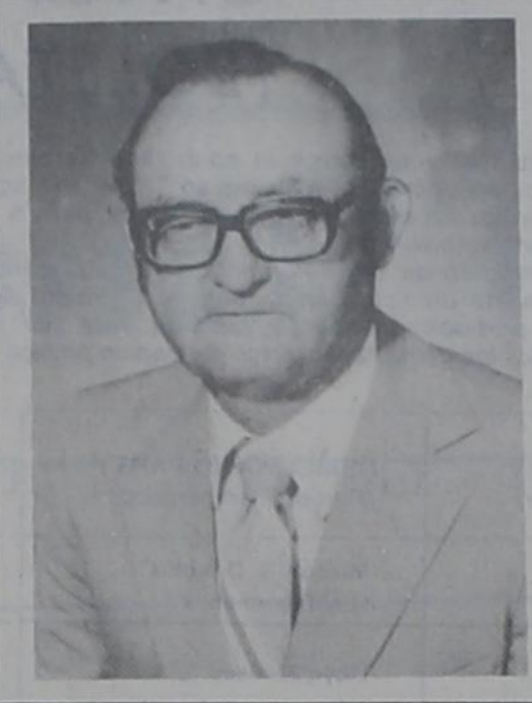
