# Big Voter Turnout Expected

On Tuesday, November 8, Garza County voters will join with other voters across the country to mark their ballots in support of favorite candidates.

While national and state candidates have generated a great deal of interest, spirited local campaigning and write-in candidates have created even more interest in the immediate area.

Candidates for Garza County Judge, unexpired term, are Republican David Stelzer and Democrat E.A. HowardJr.

In the Garza County Sheriff's race G.M. (Max) Chaffin, Republican, and Freddy W. Cockrell, Democrat, are vying for that posi-

Joining Chaffin and Cockrell in the sheriff's race is write-in candidate, current Deputy Billy Timms.

Unopposed candidates on the ballot include Preston Poole for County Attorney; Laura "Chita" Hataway for the position of County Tax Assessor-Collector; Sammy' Ellis for County Commissioner, Precinct 1; and Lonnie Gene Peel for Constable, Precincts 1 and 3.

In the County Commissioners' race for Precinct 3, John Valdez is being opposed by write-in candidate Tommy Young, current Precinct 3 Commissioner.

For the position of Constable, Precincts 2 and 4, three candidates have filed for the write-in position: Mike Harper, Charles Propst and Bruce Ledbetter.

November 1, 1988 is the last day to request applications to vote absentee by mail for the November 8 general election. Marked mail-in absentee ballots must be mailed back to the County Clerk's office in an envelope bearing a postmark not late than election day, Novem-

Absentee voting by personal appearance will continue in the Clerk's office until Friday, November 4, 1988.

Any qualified voter may cast an absentee ballot in the election, and a voter no longer has to be out of the county on election day, or older than 65 years of age in order to vote absentee by personal appear-

Voters requesting mail-in ballots must be 65 years of age or older, disabled or expect to be absent from the county on election

Anyone with a voter registration card is eligible to vote in the general election and they can vote in the local races regardless of whether they voted in the primary





### U.S. growing as biggest debtor nation

from The Lubbock Avalanche Journal, Wednesday, June 24, 1987 WASHINGTON (AP) The United States owed the rest of the world \$263.6 billion at the end of 1986, more than double the previous year's total as the country accelerated its plunge as the world's largest debtor nation, the government said Tuesday.

The annual report from the Commerce Department showed America's foreign debt burden shot up 135 percent last year, outpacing the combined debt of Brazil, Mexico and Argentina, the three previous debt leaders.

Foreigners now own more in U.S. investments than Americans own in foreign investments, something that had not occurred since 1914.

As recently as 1982, the United States was still the world's largest creditor country, with an investment surplus of \$141.1 billion. But since that time, Americans have transferred billions of dollars into the hands of foreigners who took the money in payment for cars, television sets and other imported products.

By 1984, the string of record trade deficits had shrunk the U.S. investment surplus to \$3.6 billion and in 1985 the country became a net debtor for the first time in 71 years, ending the year with a foreign debt of \$111.9 billion.

The income tax extracts about 40% of the government's revenues, at the cost of our liberty. If we cut the budget 40%, we would be able to abolish the IRS. Ron Paul considers that a good first step towards responsible, Constitutional government.

Establish a Pro-American Foreign Policy.

The job of the U.S. government is to defend the people, property, and liberty of the United States. Period. It is not to run the world. It is not to fund wealthy clients like Germany and Japan. It is not to install and overthrow dictators in Central America. It is not to intervene on the side of totalitarian socialist Iraq and Big Oil in the Persian Gulf. Ron Paul would enforce the Constitutional foreign policy of Washington and Jefferson: peace and commerce with all who want them, no entangling alliances, no foreign meddling, and a strong defense for our shores.

Restore the Gold Standard and Abolish the Fed.

When the bankers and the politicians took control of the people's dollar, and established the Federal Reserve and abolished the gold standard, they set the stage for tremendous profits for themselves and untold suffering for the rest of us. Since the Fed was created, in 1913, the dollar has lost 96% of its purchasing power. Ron Paul knows that the Founding Fathers were right in rejecting paper money and central banking. He will protect the value of your money by restoring the gold standard and abolishing the Federal Reserve.

**Protect Our Civil Liberties.** 

Why should politicians be able to tell us how we can behave on our own property, or what we can consume? In the 1920s, the unbelievable violation of our liberties called Prohibition strengthened public and private criminals at the people's expense. The same is true of the "War on Drugs." Government tells cancer patients what medications they can take, parents how to raise and educate their children, and churches and church schools how to operate. Government spies on American citizens for opposing its unconstitutional policies and invades our financial privacy in the name of "money laundering." It wants to make us all serfs on its plantation. Only Ron Paul puts the people before the government, and upholds our privacy and other civil liberties as absolute
