by awarding of the Beef Showmanship Buckle. Presentation of special awards, 1 p.m. and Premium Sale, 1:30 p.m.



# 911 Emergency Phone Issue Postponed as Commissioners Study Pay Schedules and to offer programs designed to strengthen and expand those same

Emergency telephone number 9-1-1 was on the agenda again for Garza County Commissioners' Court in the Monday, January 23 session when Mike Pedigo of South Plains Association of Governments asked the commissioners for approval to include Garza County in 9-1-1 area planning.

Garza and Cochran are the only counties in the 15 county area served by SPAG who are not included in the regional planning for the emergency telephone system.

Commissioners voted to postpone any decision on the system until the next meeting, to give new commissioners Sammy Ellis and John Valdez and County Judge E.A. Howard time to look into the

matter further. Former sheriff's department employee Terry Beames appeared before the court with a request for pay for vacation time which was accrued in 1988. Beames, who stated she was entitled to twoweeks vacation when her employment with the county ended in December 1988, had used one week

of that time off. The court voted to pay Beames for seven days vacation pay.

In other action, bonds were approved for Garza County employees and a report was made on Bailey County leased land which was inspected recently by Judge Howard and Commissioners Ellis and Valdez.

The county-owned land in Bailey County is currently leased to Rodney Claunch of Enochs for \$7 an acre. With the lease renewal. Claunch asked the court for a three-year lease instead of the usual one-year lease, in order to get an FHA loan.

Both the lease renewal and the three-year lease were approved by the court.

The commissioners also voted to approve the county's approximately \$3,000 in annual support to South Plains Emergency Medical Service for the communications system between ambulances, hospitals and doctors.

At the request of a county official who asked that he be paid twice a month instead of monthly, the decision was made to change the payment schedule for elected county officials from monthly to semi-monthly - for those officials

County's tax rate currently ranks who would prefer semi-monthly salary checks. counties. Also included on the agenda

was another item relating to county salaries, but no decision was called for on the matter. Judge Howard reported that he had asked County Tax Assessor-Collector Chita Hataway to make a survey of county salaries in surrounding counties and found that Garza County salaries were below all the counties contacted, except Lynn.

Howard asked the commissioners to take this into consideration and to think about possible changes in the new county budget and county tax rate which will be discussed in February. Garza lower than most surrounding Also discussed and tabled until the next meeting was the Post





#### the Lubbock area. Fix-Up Time for Farmers and Ranchers

Most things we use in everyday life must be maintained and perhaps "fixed" from time to time if they are to give full measure of safe service.

As county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, I would like to outline a number of things for farmers, ranchers and homeowners "to do" to prepare for a safer, more productive year.

- Stop hazards before they start by doing preventive maintenance on structures, equipment, electrical system, lightning protection system, vehicles, appliances, ladders and walking surfaces.

- Keep your place free of unnecessary clutter that could cause a fire or fall.

When a hazard or unsafe condition is spotted, correct it as soon as possible. If you can't remedy the situation, warn others verbally or use tags or signs. Take faulty equipment out of service until corrected.

- Check older equipment from stem-to-stern before the season starts, replacing troubleprone parts. Repair or replace damaged or missing guards. Be extra careful when operating older machines as they may lack safety features of modern equipment. Stay away from unguarded moving parts. Stop machines before attending to trou-

## Letter to the Editor -

Dear Editor

I recently read with interest the letter of Mr Ray Diekemper concerning the price he paid for White River water to support his waterflood and your response in regard to the problem.

I think a little history would be

helpful in helping the people in the community resolve what is right and what is wrong in regard to this

In the early 1950s, it became obvious that Post was rapidly running out of underground water and something had to be done.

At that time, a proposal was made that the county create itself into a water district with an ad valorem tax to support the building of a dam (such action would not need the approval of the legislature).

After studying the matter carefully, it was quite obvious that rural people probably would not vote a tax upon their property to provide water for city people, nor should they be responsible for providing water for their city cousins since they had adequate water for their needs.

The next idea was to have the City of Post created as a separate water district (needing legislative action) but it became obvious that the property of the City of Post and its water consumption would not support \$2 to \$3 million cost of building a dam in Garza County.

When the dilemma seemed unsolvable, our mayor at that time, the late James Minor, hit upon the idea of trying to get several of the adjoining towns to create a water

Tahoka was not available since it was receiving water through the Canadian River Project.

A proposal was made to have Crosbyton, Ralls, Spur and Post ask the legislature to allow them to create a water district for the purpose of building a lake, centrally located, which meant the White River site.

At that time, Crosbyton and Ralls had sufficient underground water but were persuaded to go along with the idea on the premise that they would be closest to the lake and would benefit more for recreational purposes.

Spur had an adequate supply of water but it was just barely potable. Post, as above stated, was sim-

ply running out of water.

cities petitioned the legislature to create the White River Water District, consisting of the four towns as they then existed and as they might exist by extension of their city limits lines.

The legislature authorized the project, and all four cities voting separately, each voted to create the water district and to place a tax upon all the property within the district to supplement the revenue bonds that would be issued to build

the dam. If memory serves me correctly, one of the conditions upon which the towns of Crosbyton and Ralls got into the program was that the district would be allowed to sell water outside the four cities creating the district, at any price they determined reasonable.

Obviously, Garza County would be the greatest purchaser of water, since we were the only ones that had extensive oil fields that would require future waterflood-

If memory serves me correctly, the people of the four towns in the water district paid an ad valorem the operation of the lake.




