## 'Desperate Hours' Thursday at Garza Theatre

"After seeing several performances, I just had to get back on stage," Roxa says.

"I am really enjoying working with Will," she adds, "he is just a great teacher."

Roxa is a 1976 graduate of Van Horn High School, where she performed in two U.I.L. productions, advancing to regional competition her senior year in the play, "J.B."

She was named to the all-star cast after winning district competition.

"I made a comment after a play last year that it sure looked like fun," Roxa adds, "and my friend Linda Ellis just kind of pushed me in the direction of the stage."

Roxa attended Texas Tech University where she majored in elementary education.

Post theatre fans also appreciate the dedication shown by Loving, who is traveling 100 miles round trip for rehearsals from Brownfield.

The play was first presented at the Ethel Barrymore Theatre in New York City on February 10, 1955. Karl Malden starred as the father, and Paul Newman made one of his first appearances on Broadway as the escaped convict leader.

The prestigious 1989 Overall Sportsmanship Belt Buckle for hard work and outstanding contributions throughout the show went to Keith Peel, a Close City 4-Her and Post F.F.A. member.

Thursday night the Grand Champion Hog was exhibited by Haley Hutchins, a Southland 4-H member. Her first place heavy-weight Hampshire weighed 232 pounds and sold to Citizens Bank of Slaton for \$750.

Shawn Henderson, a member of Post F.F.A. exhibited the Reserve Champion Hog. The first place heavy-weight Cross weighed 245 pounds and sold to Joe Kirk Fulton, Fulton's Quien Sabe, and J. Martin Basinger for \$700.

Dana Morris, a member of Post F.F.A. and Close City 4-H, was presented with the Swine Division Showmanship Buckle.

Friday night, the Grand Champion Lamb of the show was exhibited by Lance Bland, member of

the Post F.F.A. Bland's 145 first place Finewool Cross sold to Bob Dickson and Bobby Dickson for \$750.

The Reserve Grand Champion Lamb was shown by Labeth Jones, a Lucky Clover 4-H Club member. Labeth's first place Light-weight Medium Wool Lamb weighed 119 pound and sold to Production Credit Association of Tahoka for \$500.

The Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Heifers were owned by Brandon Bird, a Post 4-H Club member.

Brazos Electric Power Cooperative, Inc. ("Brazos") hereby publishes NOTICE that it has filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas a Statement of Intent and Petition for Authority to Implement a Temporary Reduction in Rates pursuant to the provisions of Article 1446c, Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes and the Commission's Substantive Rules. Brazos is seeking an interim order to implement the lower rates effective with Brazos' billing cycle for December 1988. 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# City Manager is Guest Speaker at Culture Club

The Woman's Culture Club met Wednesday, January 11 in the Woman's Clubhouse with Jan Crawford and Peggy Ellis as hostesses.

Bob Turner, Post City Manager, presented a video on economic development. The film was made in Cuba, Missouri, a community of 5,000 people that had lost its basic industry.

Cuba surmounted its obstacles by practical hard work based on a realistic and workable plan, using citizens with enthusiastic motivation and workable priority lists. They had a plan with community input, positive, non-partisan activity and enthusiastic responsibility.

Rural America is in the process of rejuvenation, and communities such as Cuba demonstrate that progress is made through preparation, hard work and the application

of sound business principles. We need to capitalize on what we already have.

"Mr. Post's Beautification Program" was the subject of Katharine Cathcart's talk.

C.W. Post had two 320 acres experimental farms, one on the plains and one in the breaks below the Caprock. Farm crops and vegetables were grown in each. He had a one hundred acre orchard set out on the west side of town.

Each farm had a three-acre orchard. Homes on the farms and those in town had their yards plowed and set in Bermuda grass and shrubs.

There was a nursery with more than 100,000 tree seedlings of California poplar, black locust, catalpa, mountain ash and Chinaberry trees planted in the nursery in the spring of 1909.

By the fall of 1909 all the streets in town were lined with trees. Trees were planted on either side of the road from the cemetery into town and from the top of the Caprock to the northwest corner of town (the old Lubbock highway went out Fifteenth Street, west, in front of what is now Minnie Lee Tanner's home).

Mr. Post encouraged the planting of flowers to beautify the community. He often brought or sent flower seed to be distributed for planting to the citizens. One of Mr. Post's favorite projects was the

parks in the middle of the three block area of downtown. These parks had trees, grass, flowers, hitching posts and an attractive fence. Special wagons were equipped to water the many trees and shrubs.

C.W. Post, the farsighted man who was such a genius at planning and executing these plans, not only planned the practical, basic necessities of an efficient, thriving community, but he also planned for Post City to be a beautifully attractive place in which to work and live and rear children.

Mrs. Cathcart stated that the main purpose for studying the past is to help us to improve on the present and future. She appointed each member present to act as a committee of one to help improve our

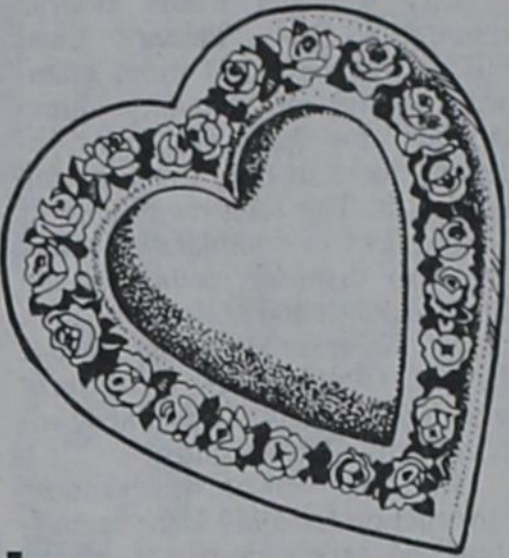
residential area by encouraging block by block beautification, beginning with our own homes.

Each member was encouraged to plant a tree, a shrub, a rose bush, a row of bulbs - any outdoor plant - on January 20, Arbor Day.

Delicious refreshments were served from tables decorated with a circus theme. The tables were

centered with clever music-boxes surrounded by balloons and lollipops.

## Deadline for Ordering Trees March 1

The Garza County Soil and Water Conservation District announced recently that the deadline for ordering windbreak trees is March 1, 1989.

Several types of evergreen trees and various hardwood trees and shrubs, sold in lots of 30 and 100, are available for purchase. Price will vary, depending on the type of tree and its size.

Windbreaks properly located and containing the right tree type will provide wind and snow protection for farm homesteads as well as livestock.

One source stated that homestead windbreaks in the High Plains and Rolling Plains showed reduced costs as great as 15 percent.

Living windbreaks, or greenbelts, also provide nesting places for small insect-eating birds as well as food and cover for numerous High Plains game birds.

Windbreaks for shelter or wildlife habitat are permitted under CRP contracts.

Advanced planning is very important for the successful establishment or renovation of shelter belts.

The installation of a drip irrigation system for windbreak est-

ablishment is highly recommended and information on installation is available through the Garza SWCD.

To help make the tree planting a success, technical assistance is available from the USDA Soil Conservation Service in planning and designing windbreaks, drip irrigation systems and windbreak management.

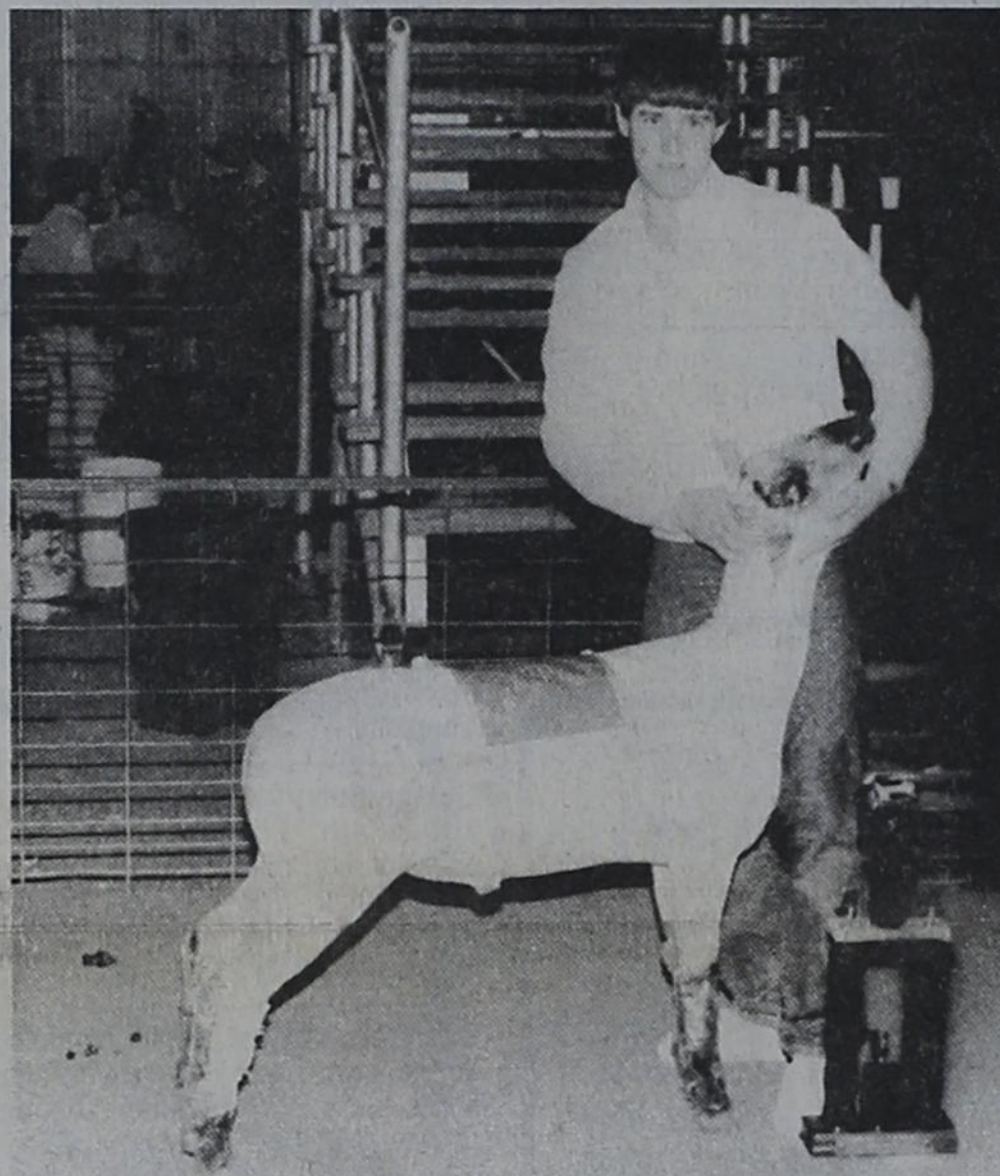

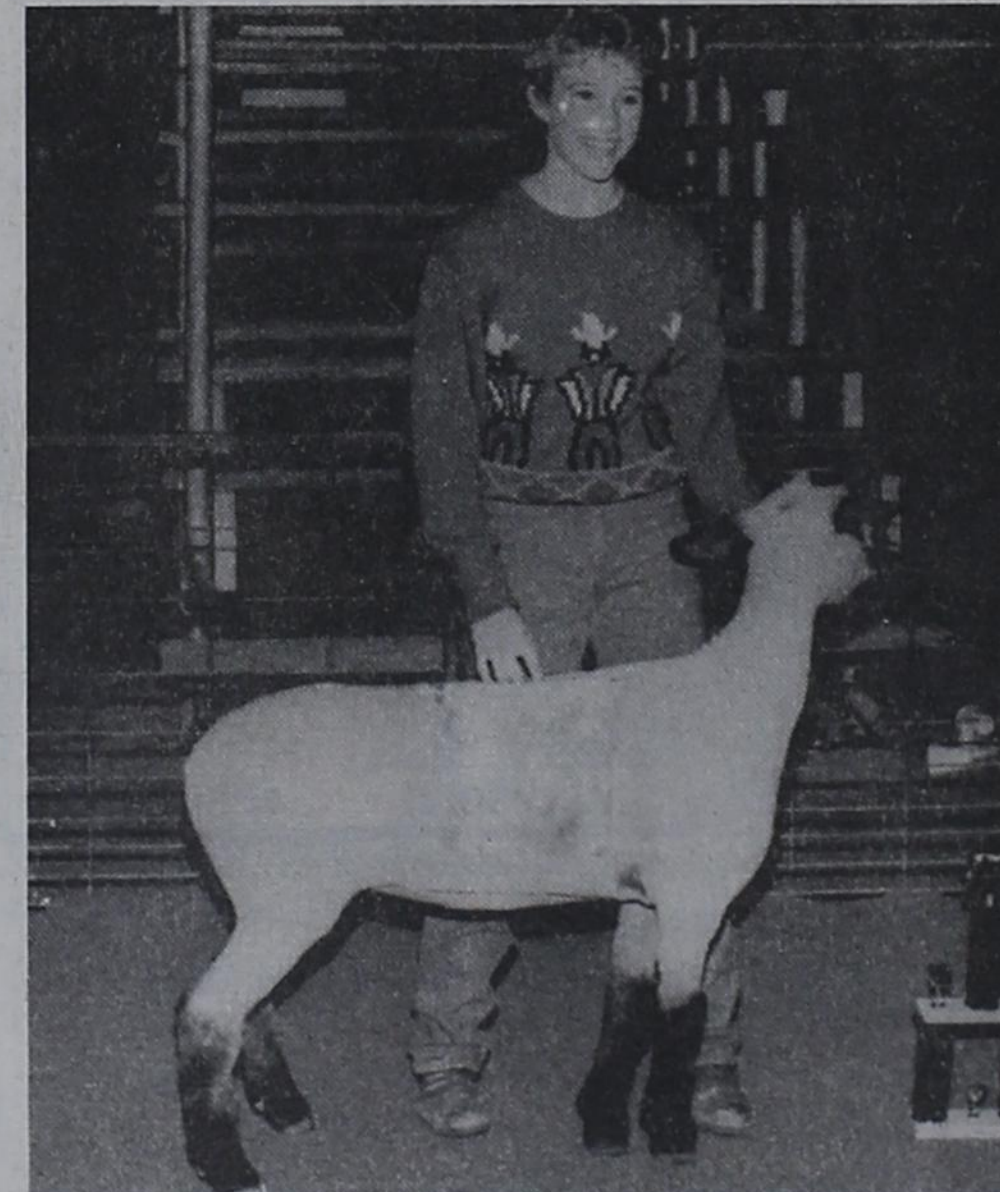

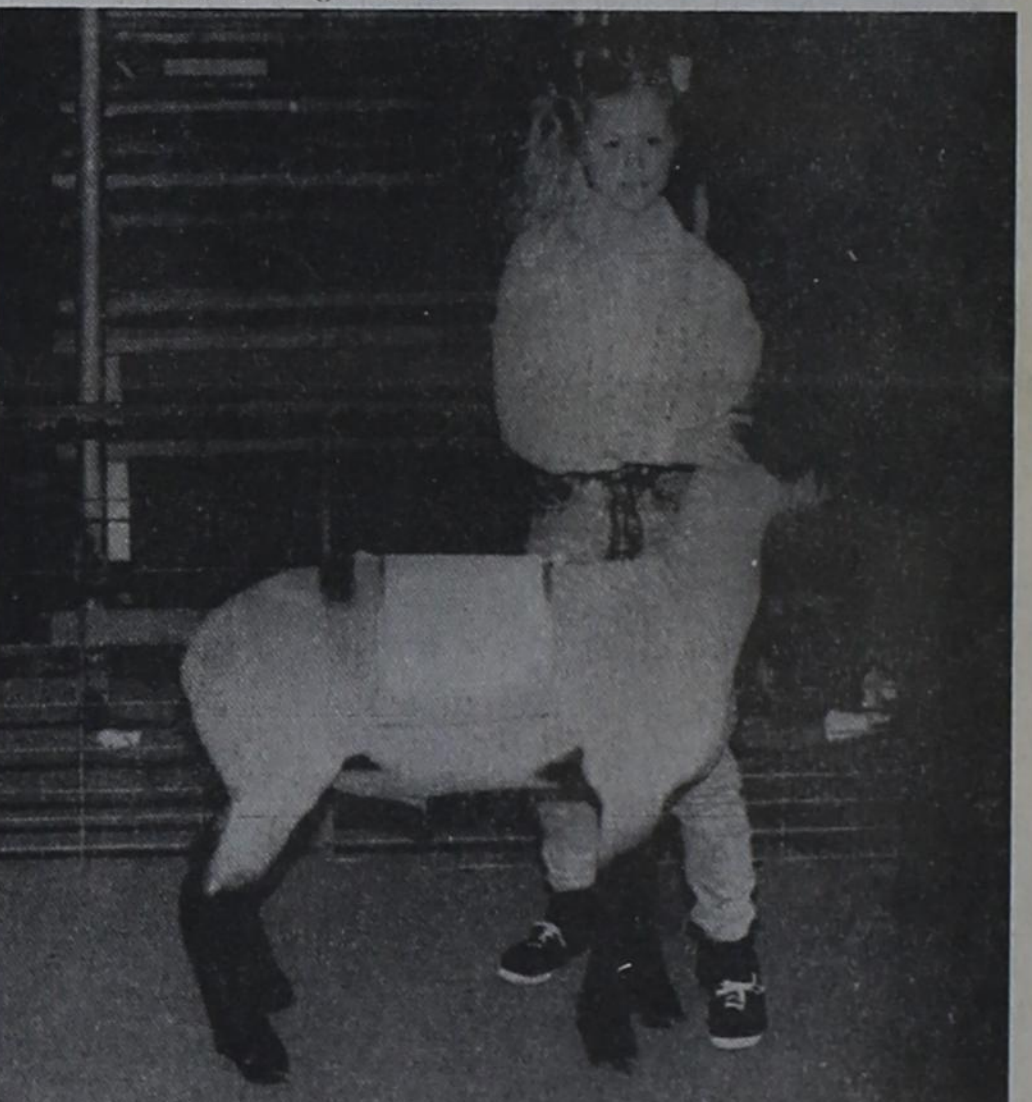

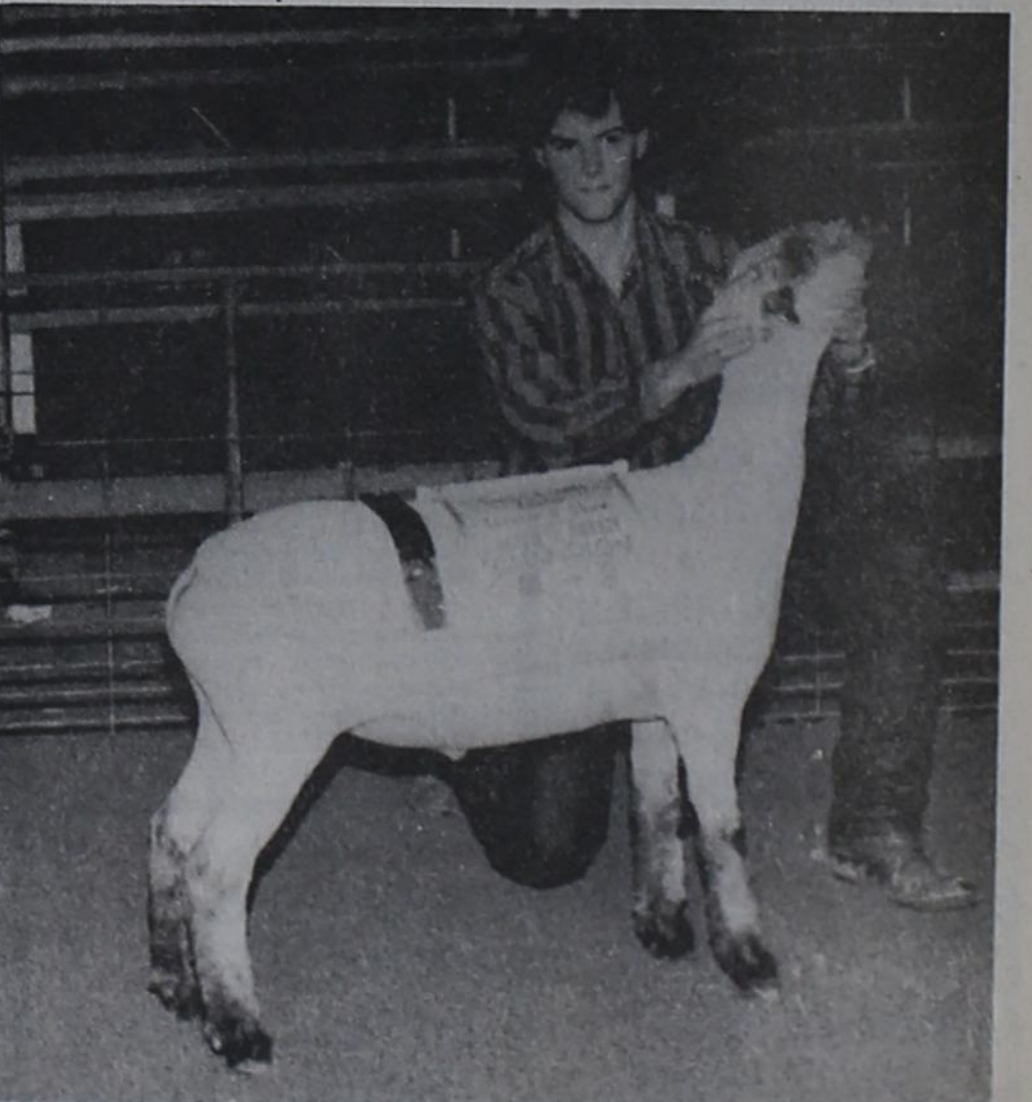

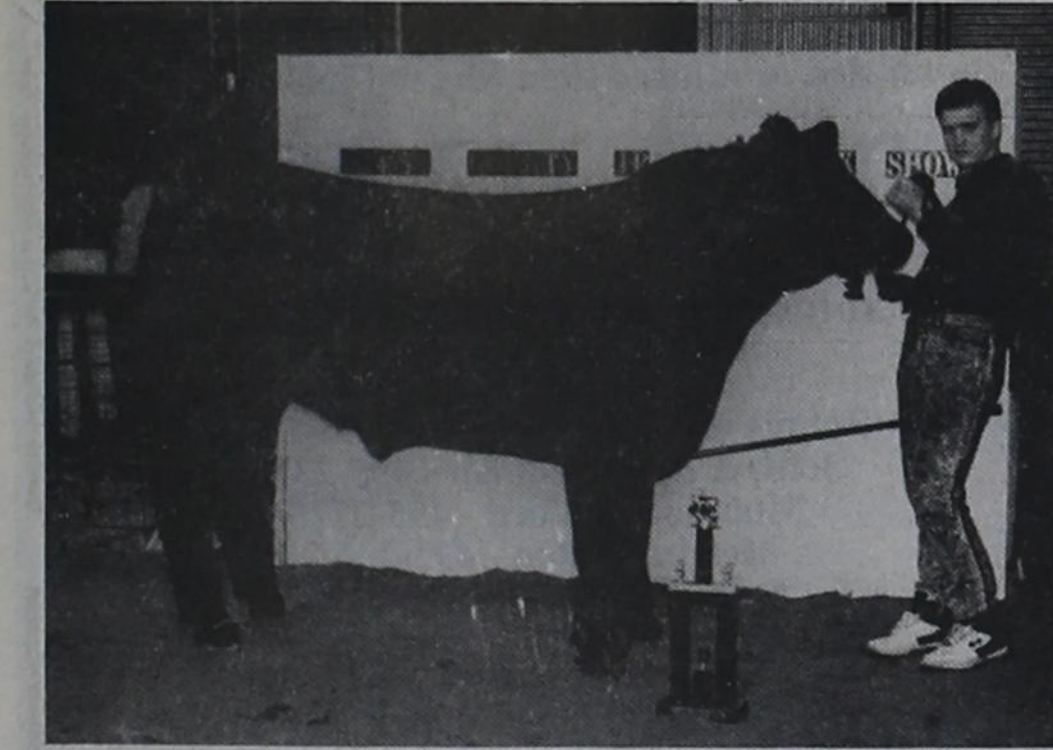

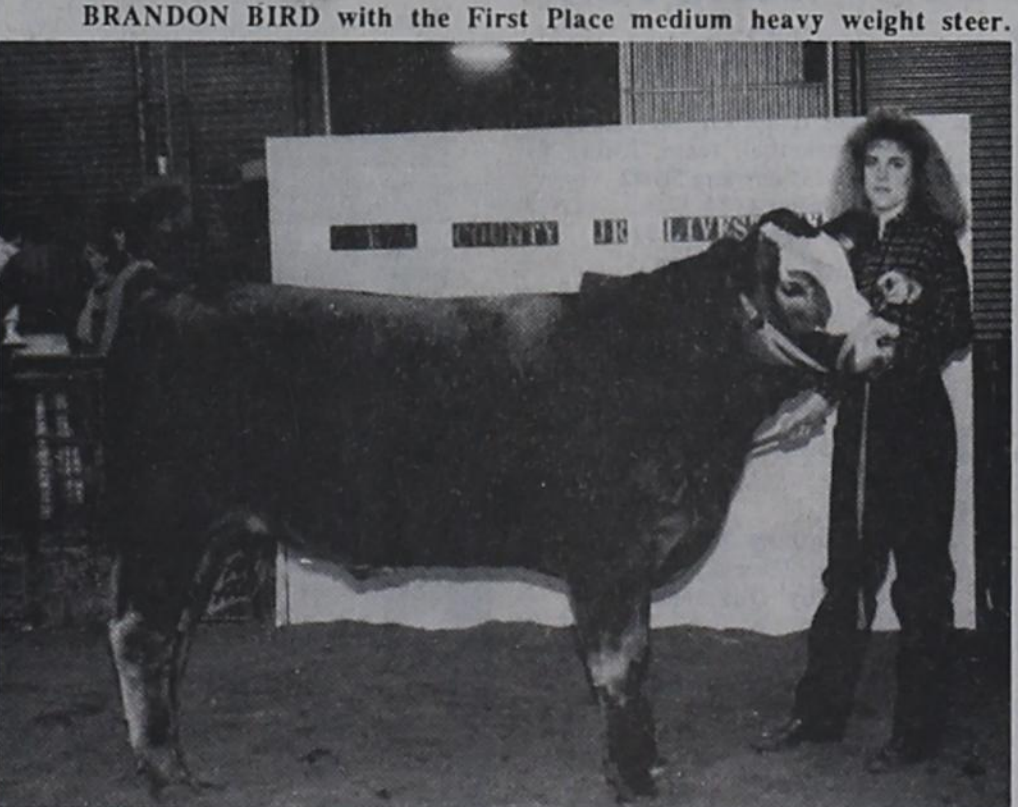
BRANDON BIRD with the Grand Champion heifer.



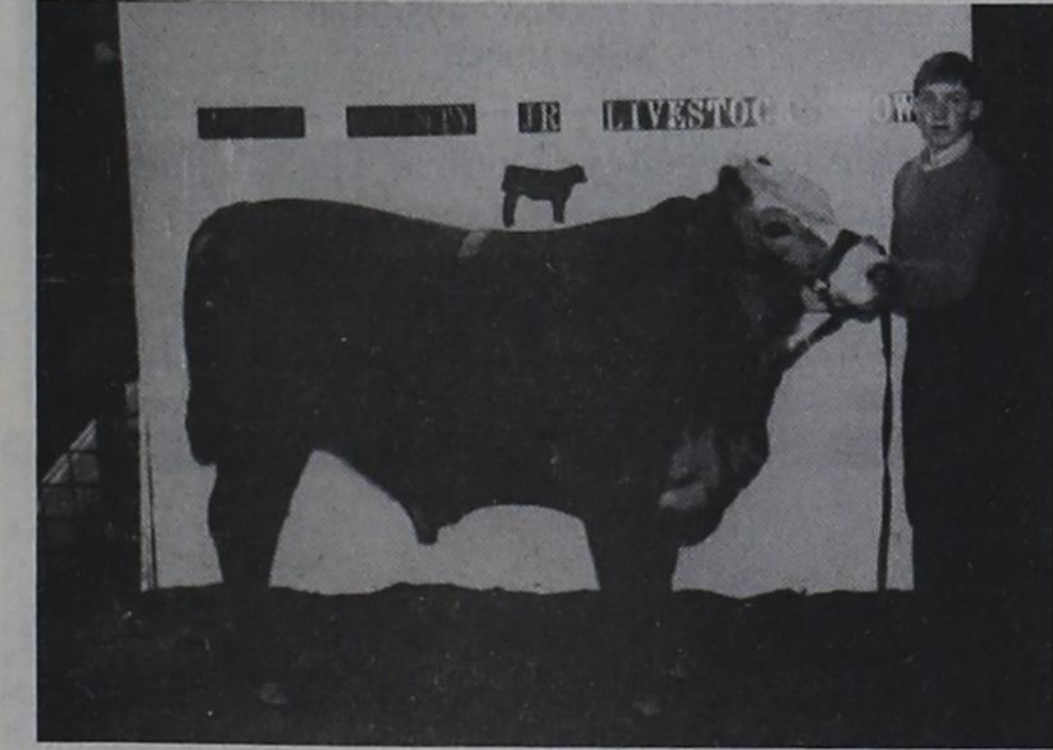
RUSS BIRD showing Brandon Bird's Reserve Champion steer.



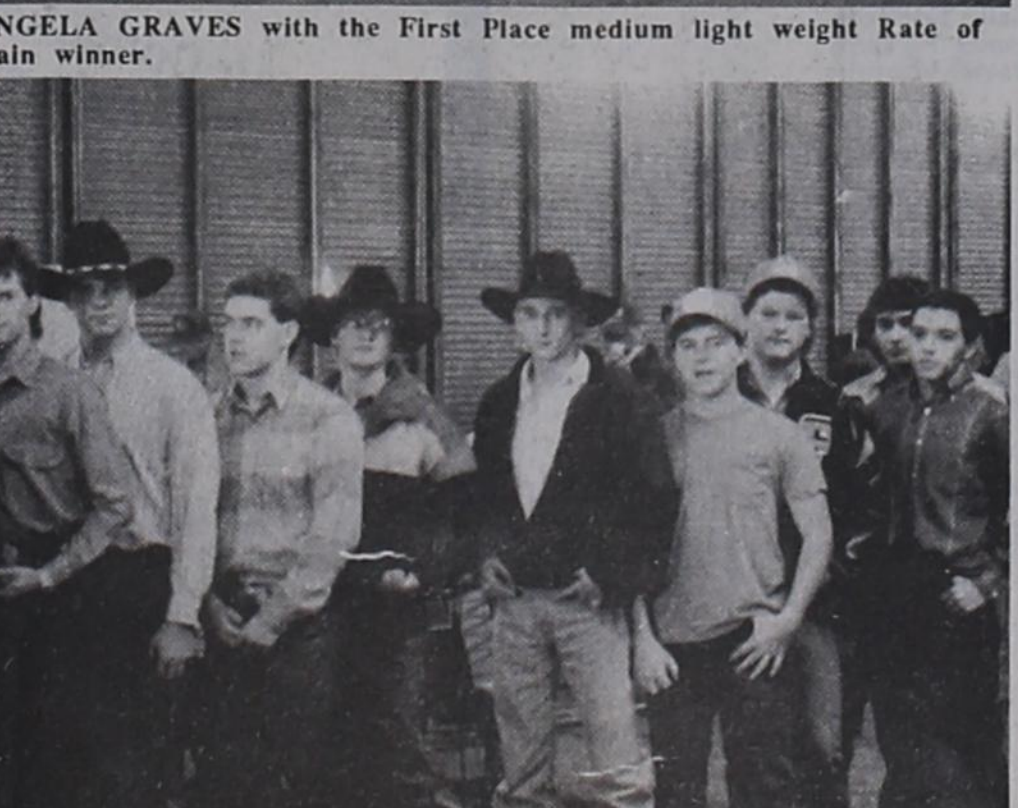
BRANDON BIRD with the Second Place heavy weight steer Reserve Grand Champion.



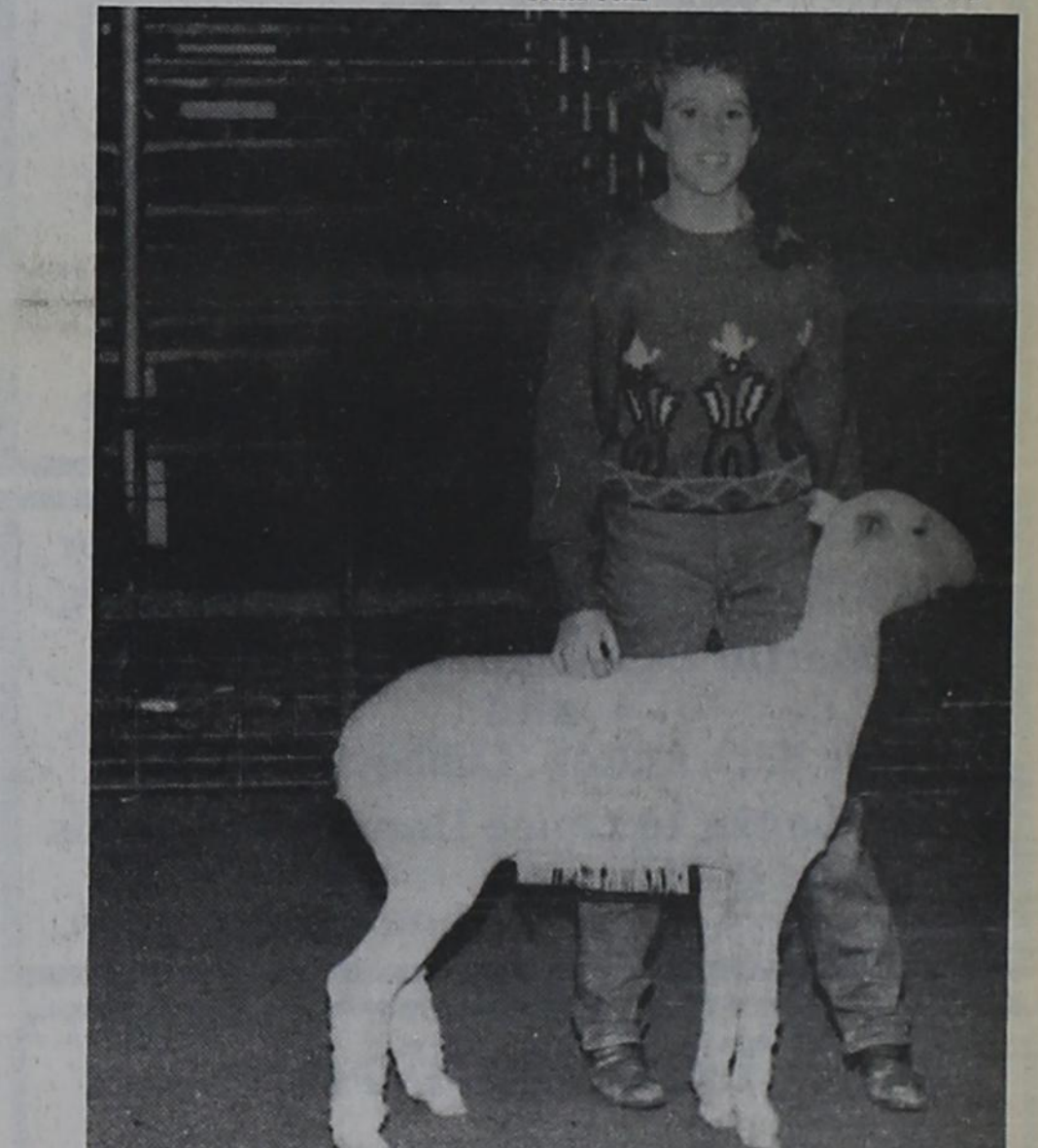
