County Audit Looks Good

Commissioners Study Collections

Garza County was pronounced in good shape financially when Steve Sawyers, of Hartman and Sawyers, P.C., Certified Public Accountants, delivered the annual auditor's report at Monday's regular session of the Garza County Commissioners' Court.

Also conducting business with the court Monday morning was Shelby Veselka, attorney with McCreary, Veselka, Beck and Allen, an Austin firm specializing in delinquent tax collections.

Veselka had met with County Tax Assessor-Collector Chita Hataway and visited in the Tax Appraisal office regarding Garza County's delinquent taxes and, after making a study of the local tax situation, presented his findings to the court.

Veselka's firm would recompile the county's delinquent tax record and work with the county and the county taxpayers to secure payment of these taxes through initial letters and follow-up work.

The commissioners voted to study the issue, but Commissioner Herbert Walls' opinion was that "this is a bad time to try to collect delinquent taxes."

New vehicles for the sheriff's department were on the agenda again Monday, after bids had been received and awarded earlier. The bids could not be completed, however, because the supplier could not meet the delivery date set by the court.

Due to the urgent need for the vehicles by the sheriff's department, the court voted to negotiate with Vyas Motors of Post for one "police package" vehicle, which would be available immediately, if Vyas would let the county have the

1988 vehicle for the \$13,529 price listed in the bid.

The commissioners also voted to advertise again for bids on a 1989 "police package" vehicle for immediate delivery. The bid will be awarded at the February 27 session.

A vote was called for on the 9-1-1 emergency telephone system and it was the unanimous decision of the commissioners that Garza County would not participate in the regional planning for 9-1-1.

The motion not to participate was made by Commissioner Sammy Ellis and was seconded by Commissioner Herbert Walls.

Ellis felt that the system would be good in town but did not see how it could work out in the county and Walls had stated in previous discussions of the 9-1-1

number that he didn't think the people of Garza County would accept the idea of any extra charges being added to their telephone bills or anything else.

The court also voted unanimously to accept a two-year bid from the First National Bank of Post, presented by Charles Hardin, for the county depository account which would be in effect until the second Monday in February, 1991.

A statewide sewer ordinance which will go into effect September 1, 1989 was discussed, but no decision was made at Monday's meeting.

The ordinance states that no cesspools can be dug after September 1 and that septic tanks must be dug instead. The state will also require an inspection of all existing cesspools at that time, with an ap-

proximate cost of around \$200 if the inspection is done by the state.

The sewer ordinance will be put on the agenda for the next meeting, February 27.

County Extension Agent Syd Conner asked the court for full-time secretarial help for his office due to a backlog of work that could not be caught-up with the office's present part-time secretary.

Walls made the motion that the part-time help be assigned to the office full-time for six months and the matter looked into again at the end of the six-month period. Seconded by Ellis, the motion was approved.

Post Notes

Eddie Warren, former publisher of The Post Dispatch and former Post city manager, visited the office last week, shedding additional insight on the 1959 annexation story.

According to Eddie, who was city manager at the time of the annexation, the main reason for annexing was to include the new housing subdivisions on the west side of Avenue S.

A side matter was the fact that one of the original members of the White River Municipal Water District (WRMWD) board of directors, Rube Jennings, lived in one of the "mill" houses on Avenue F, which was at that time not inside the city limits.

The annexation included that property also, which satisfied the requirements for Jennings to serve on the board and also brought additional property values into the city.

Warren also reminded me of the serious water problem facing the citizens of Post during the time of the development of White River.

"We were leasing water rights from landowners, and many of these wells we drilled just didn't produce enough water," he explained.

Warren also pointed out that the rates charged to the "mill" was on the same rate charge as all other customers.

"There were five meters at the mill," he added, "and each meter was read separately, and the mill was charged individually on all five meters."

Which in effect meant that the "mill" rarely got the value of its total gallons per month usage, because the rate was charged to each meter, not the sum of all five.

Concerning the sale of water to third parties, Warren emphasized "there was never any discussion on that issue at any city council meeting during my tenure."

Warren was city manager from 1957 until 1969.



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



Librarian is Guest Speaker at Gamma Mu

Maury Shiver, Post Elementary School librarian, spoke to Gamma Mu sorority at its 7 p.m. Tuesday, January 24 meeting in the home of Amy Easterling.

Shiver spoke on children's literature, parents' guides to buying children's literature and the importance of reading to children. She gave several brief reviews of books she suggests for children and recommended several authors who have proved to be very good children's literature writers.

Shiver also told the group about three parents' guides to buying good books - "The Horn Book," "Parents' Guide to Buying the Best Books for Children" and pamphlets from the International Reading Association.

Shiver also discussed the importance of reading to a child at an early age to develop the child's interest in reading. She said there are crucial times in a child's reading development - in the third and sixth grades.

Shiver also pointed out the importance of reading aloud to a child from the time he is a baby to whenever, but certainly past the third grade or whenever a child can read by himself. Even though a child can read by himself, he still likes to be read to. This helps to develop his interest and level of reading. Reading to one's child also promotes a close relationship between the child and parent.

Having the child read aloud to the parent is another good way of developing not only reading skills, but listening, vocabulary and speaking skills as well. It also develops better comprehension, and the amount and quality of books that are read, according to Shiver.

Kathryn Floyd, Chamber of Commerce manager, and Joy Fluit of Southwestern Public Service, were among sixty community volunteers who attended a one-day training session sponsored by the High Ground of Texas, January 17 at Wayland Baptist University.

The program was designed to assist volunteers in making telephone contacts to advertising responses generated by a regional marketing association.

The High Ground is a cooperative regional effort designed to establish a positive image for the communities in the Panhandle and South Plains. Five sponsoring entities have funded a \$45,000 marketing program offered to area cities for a \$500 participation fee.

Fourteen South Plains communities are now members of the High Ground: Brownfield, Crosbyton, Denver City, Earth, Hale Center, Levelland, Littlefield, Lubbock, New Deal, Olton, Plainview, Post, Spur and Sundown.

The five sponsoring agencies are: Lubbock-Garza Private Industry Council, Panhandle Regional Planning Council, South Plains Community Action, Inc., South Plains Association of Governments and Southwestern Public Service Company. Some of the funds are from the Job Training Partnership Act, which is designed to train the unemployed for jobs.

The challenge of adding jobs to an economy traditionally based on oil and agriculture is a challenge that faces every size community.

The High Ground of Texas program places a series of seven ads in "Area Development Magazine" which is nationally marketed to professionals who may be seeking new locations for manufactur-

ing facilities. The responses to the ad will be forwarded to each participating community so they can present their opportunities to those in a relocation process.


