

Cunningham Named to Prestigious Program

The National Main Street Center, National Trust for Historic Preservation in Washington, D.C., announced recently that Melissa Cunningham, Manager for the Main Street Program in Post, has been accepted into the prestigious Main Street Certification Institute in Professional Downtown Management.

The Institute provides advanced-level training in downtown economic development through historic preservation. Cunningham was one of 23 downtown revitalization professionals selected from a field of applicants from communities from across the country, from Hawaii to New Jersey.

A committee of seven state and national revitalization leaders reviewed all applications and made the selections based on applicants' leadership skills, understanding of the comprehensive nature of the revitalization process, and specific knowledge of downtown economic issues. The Main Street Certification

Institute in Professional Downtown Management was developed and is sponsored by the National Main Street Center, a program of the National Trust for Historic Preservation. The National Main Street Center is a leader in the field of downtown commercial revitalization through preservation, providing training and technical assistance to over 500 towns and cities throughout the United States.

To become certified by the National Trust for Historic Preservation, a registrant in the Main Street Certification Institute must successfully complete all four segments of the Institute - in the fields of design, promotion, organization and economic restructuring.

Institute segments are led by a team of National Main Street Center staff members and other nationally-recognized downtown revitalization practitioners from historic preservation, marketing and economic development professions.

Cunningham will attend the first session of the Institute in Austin, March 1-3, 1989.

The Garza County Soil and Water Conservation District is taking orders through March 1, 1989 for windbreak trees.

Several types of evergreen trees and various hardwood trees and shrubs are available for purchase.

Price will vary, depending on the type of tree and its size, and are sold in lots of 30 and 100.

Windbreaks properly located and containing the right tree type will provide wind and snow protection for farm homesteads as well as livestock.

One source stated that homestead windbreaks in the High Plains and Rolling Plains showed reduced heating costs as great as 15 percent.

Living windbreaks, or greenbelts, also provide nesting places for small insect-eating birds as well as food and cover for numerous High Plains game birds.

Windbreaks for shelter or wildlife habitats are permitted under CRP contracts.

Advanced planning is very important for the successful establishment of renovation of shelter belts.

The installation of a drip irrigation system for windbreak establishment is highly recommended. Technical assistance is available from the USDA Soil Conservation Service in planning

and designing windbreaks, drip irrigation and windbreak management.

The Garza SWCD wants to help make the tree planting a success.

Drip irrigation systems and information on installation are available through the Garza SWCD.

Programs and assistance from the USDA Soil Conservation Service are available to people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, handicap or national origin.

I'm still waiting for our state politicians to take a serious look at the high cost of compulsory attendance in public schools.

I read with interest about the recent confab in Lubbock, where state legislators and education officials hashed out financial problems.

One of the major problems is finding money to pay for the expensive proposition that every child must attend school, regardless of the attitudes of the child or the parents.

The question is also raised as to how to get parents involved with their children's education.

This is a social and cultural problem, and why our state leaders think schools, teachers or administrators can change these cultural attitudes is beyond me.

The purpose of public schools should be first, to provide an education to those children who express a desire to learn.

Expressing a desire to learn starts with being in school.

A person attending school against his or her will is not exactly what I call expressing a desire to learn.

We should concentrate our limited educational resources toward people who want to be educated.

If education were to be treated as an important function of our society, and not something crammed down the throats of its citizens, then perhaps the attitude of those parents not currently involved would change.

I call on our state legislators to take a serious look at the impact of compulsory attendance.

I think it is clear that we can not afford to continue the current system of mandatory attendance, where our educators spend more time trying to motivate and cajole and play prison guard, baby-sitter and other social roles when valuable education time is put on the back burner.

The theatre production will follow at 7:30 p.m. Limited space is available.

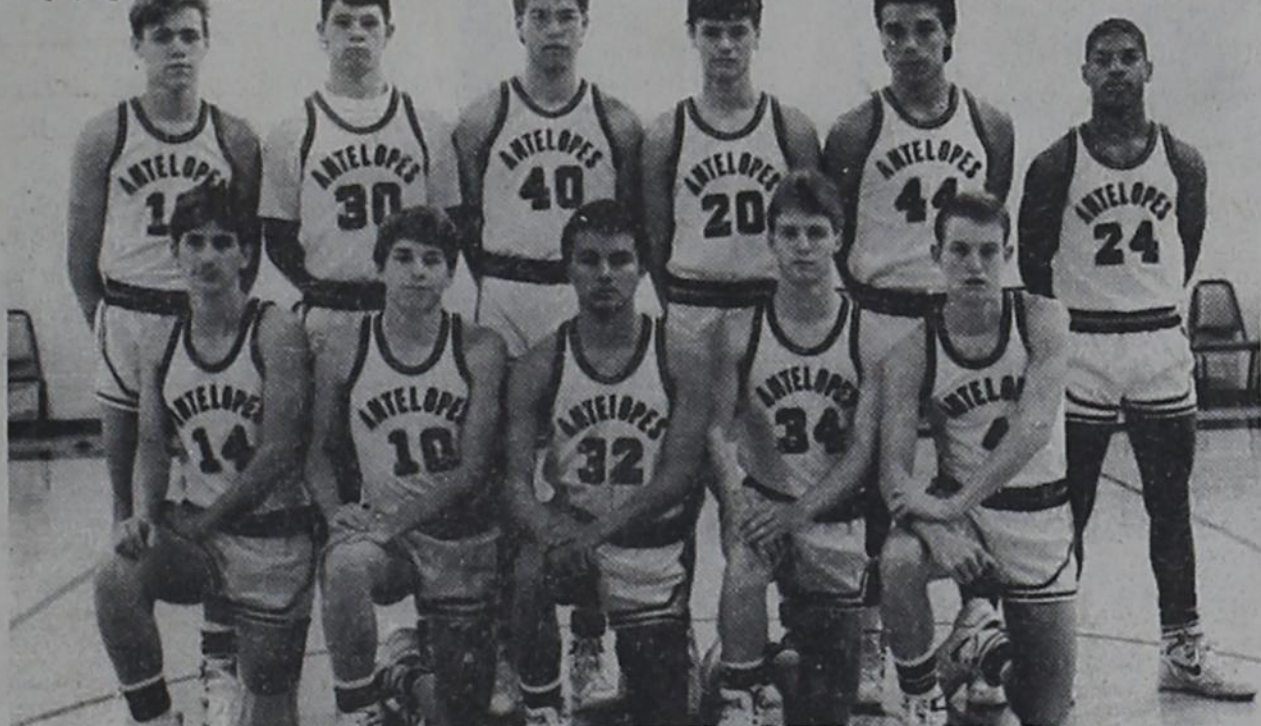

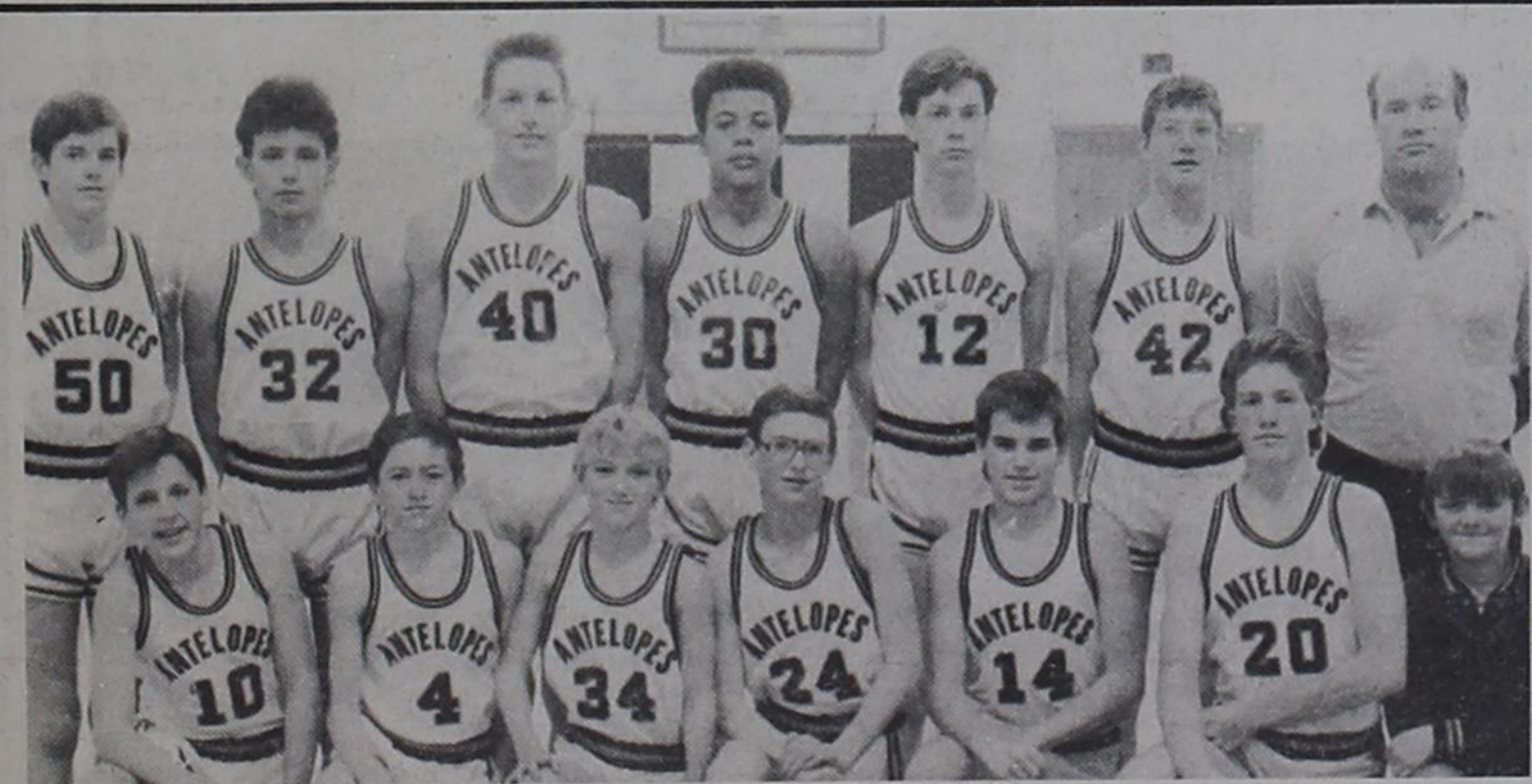

Now folks, I have a lot of tolerance, but this is really getting ridiculous.

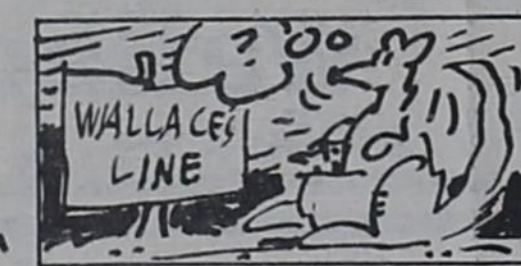
If anyone ever thought that there is any sanity left in the fanatic Iranian government, let this latest episode be the guide.

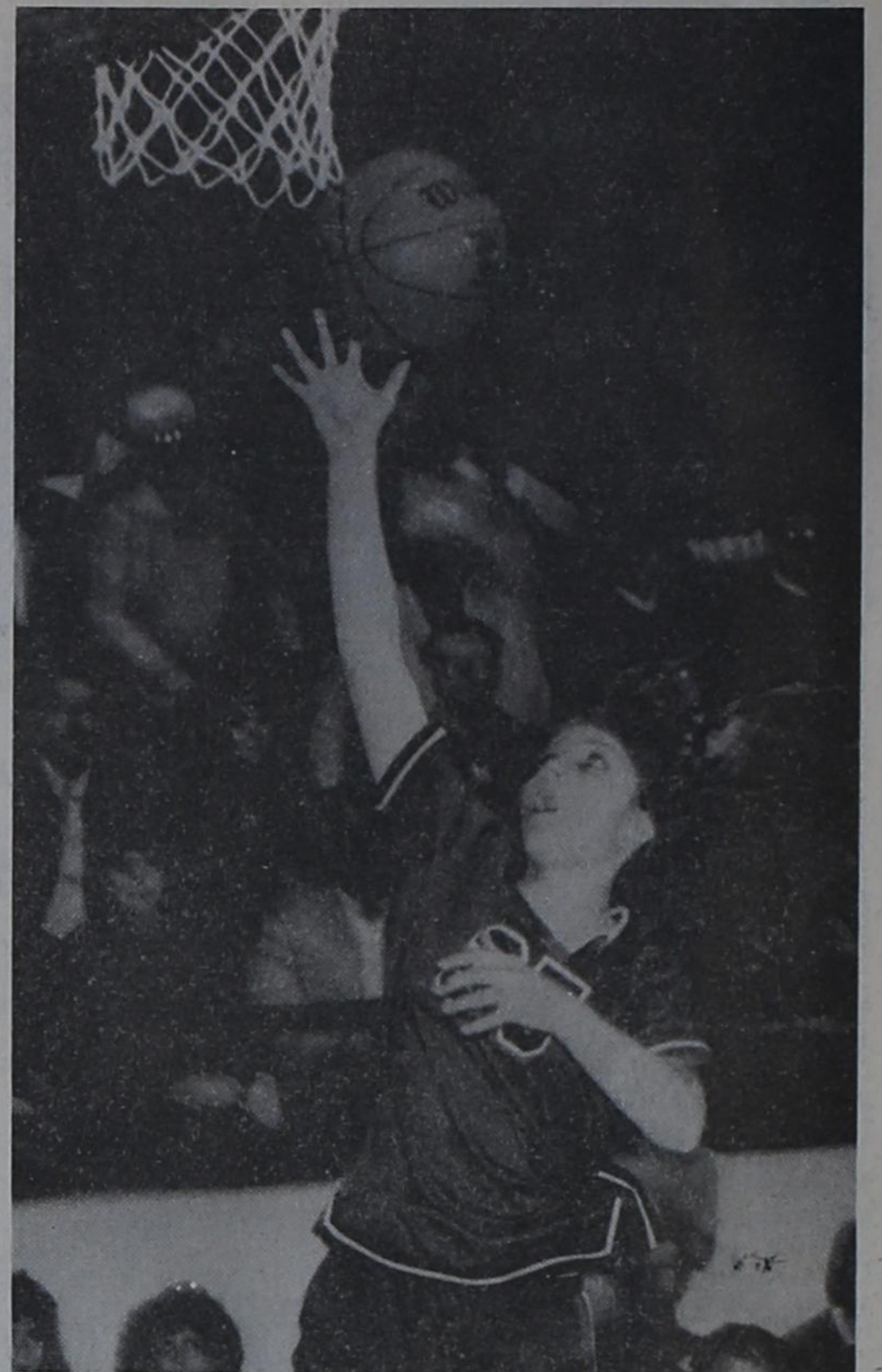
DPS Issues

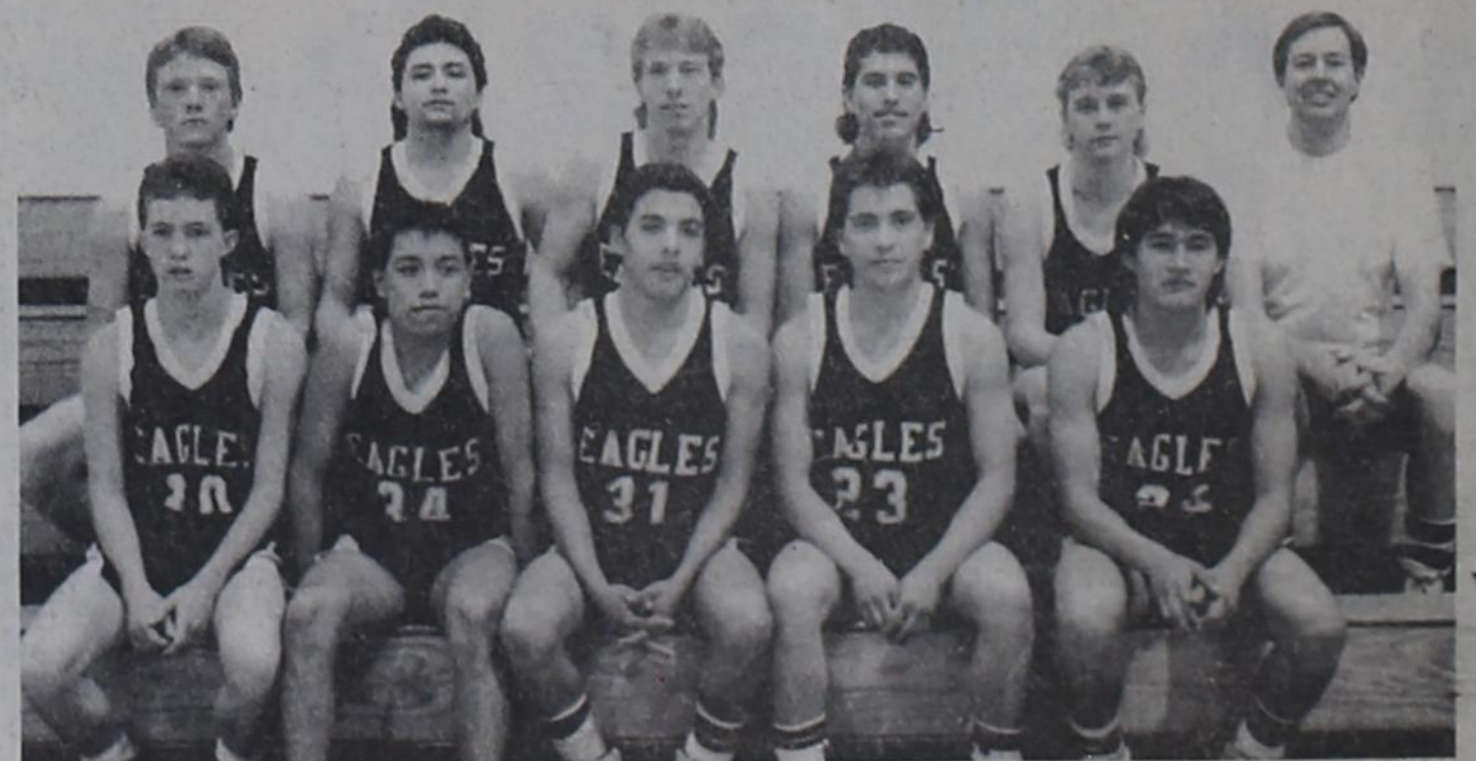
