Jarvis was never a mother herself, but she did believe that sons and daughters should pay tribute to their mothers at least once a year. The mother's sevices spread to more churches the following year.

In 1912, a Mother's Day International Association was founded to encourage greater observance of a special day, and in 1914 Congress designated the second Sunday in May as Mother's Day. In that same year, President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation urging people to display the American flag on that day a "a public expression of our love and reverence for the mothers of the country.

It took Anna Jarvis, Congress and President Wilson to make us aware of something we should've known all along - Mothers are very special people and deserved their own day long before 1908.
