## Council Plans Mayoral Vote Recount

A formal request by mayoral candidate Jim Jackson for a recount of the votes in that race was discussed at the Monday, May 8 meeting of the Post City Council and plans were made to notify all the candidates in the mayor's race of the date and time of the recount before the Monday, May 15 deadline. A date and time were to be decided on Tuesday, May 9.

In other business considered, the council heard from Robert Wall representing the Post Volunteer Fire Department. Wall requested that the council consider a raise in the fee paid for fire practice from \$1 per man to \$3 per man. Council

members assured Wall that the request would be taken under consideration during upcoming budget meetings.

The council voted to approve a seal coat bid from Ronnie Zahn of Lubbock totaling \$62,415. The bid, presented by Butch Davis of Parkhill, Smith & Cooper, included \$19,536 for work on Main Street. Since \$60,000 had been budgeted for the seal coat project, the

council agreed to include Main Street in the work to be done.

Projected completion date for the seal coat project is late July or August.

In other business the council: Canvassed and approved voting records in the May 6 election; approved motor repair or replacement in a city owned Mack truck; and approved Southwestern Public Service Company's request to lower

rates.

Present at Monday night's meeting were Mayor Giles C. McCrary; City Council members Irene Fry, Larry Waldrip, Jack Alexander and Larry Mills; Wanda Wilkerson; Bob Turner; and Harvey Morton.

member Larry Mills to office, with Dan Lamb taking the council seat held by Jan Crawford.

A total of 800 plus voters cast ballots in the city election, the largest voter response in the city's history.

McCrary collected 303 votes, with mayoral challengers Jim Jackson getting 274 and Lewis Earl picking up 221 votes.

Other candidates Cecil Foster Sr got 25 votes and Mike Vyas, 23.

Mills led the council votes with 444, followed by Lamb with 383, Crawford with 291 and Alice Cruse with 250.

Post ISD board of trustee candidates Don Pay (Place 2) got 554 votes, Ronnie Gradine (Place 4) picked up 276 and incumbent Prudencio Basquez (Place 5) collected 447 votes.

Place 4 write-in challenger Jay Pollard got 247 votes.

Southland ISD unopposed candidates Dennis McGhee and Joe Basinger were re-elected to the board of trustees.

Incumbents Zoe Kirkpatrick, Jack Alexander and David Nichols were all re-elected to the Garza Memorial Hospital Board of Directors.

Those who will be registering children need to bring the following: birth certificates, immunization records and social security numbers.

## Emergency Haying Approved

Due to continuing dry weather conditions, causing a shortage of hay and forage for area livestock producers, authorization has been received to allow emergency haying and grazing of ACR (set-aside) and CU (conserving uses) for pay acres.

These acreages were previously subject to the April 1 through August 31 non-grazing period. This authorization allows a haying and grazing period from now through December 31, 1989.

Small grain covers on ACR and CU for pay may not be hayed or grazed if the producer paid the \$10 visual inspection fee to leave the cover standing past the disposition date of May 1.

Small grains left standing past the disposition date have been excluded specifically from the authorization to hay or graze.

Eligible covers on ACR and CU for pay may be hayed or grazed by producers' own livestock with the enrolled producer's permission.

The cover may be hayed, green chopped, or ensiled for feeding to the producer's own livestock, for feeding to another producer's livestock, for current use or storage for future use. Covers shall not be harvested for grain or seed.

Producers may not charge for the value of the vegetative growth, but may recover normal and reasonable costs for other services such as cutting and baling, installing temporary fences, pumping water for grazing livestock, etc.

Producers interested in haying or grazing eligible covers on ACR and CU for pay must sign a register at the local ASCS office at 208 W. Main in Post.

## Record Voter Turnout

A record voter turnout in the city election May 6 returned Mayor Giles McCrary and city council

that is "designed to be firm but fair" according to Shelly Veselka of the firm.

The decision to sue for back taxes was made in a 3-2 vote by the court, with Judge E.A. Howard and Commissioners John Valdez and Ted Aten voting for the motion.

The Austin firm, which specializes in county tax collections, will begin work soon in the Tax Assessor-Collector's office on the first stage of the collection proceedings. Stage one, which will take at least six weeks, will be to use tax office records to compile a delinquent tax record listing account numbers and all taxes due for that number. A spokesman for McCrary, Veselka, Beck & Allen estimated that this work alone will take until the end of June.

In July, the first notice will be mailed to all property owners on the delinquent tax list. This will be the first opportunity for taxpayers to correct the records if they are incorrect.

In August, files will be updated to deduct payments that have been made and to be sure any errors that occurred have been corrected. In September a second notice will be mailed. Many taxpayers on the delinquent list will receive only these two letters.

A third letter will be mailed only if a lienholder is found during a title search of the property.

Free blood pressure checks are offered every Wednesday afternoon.

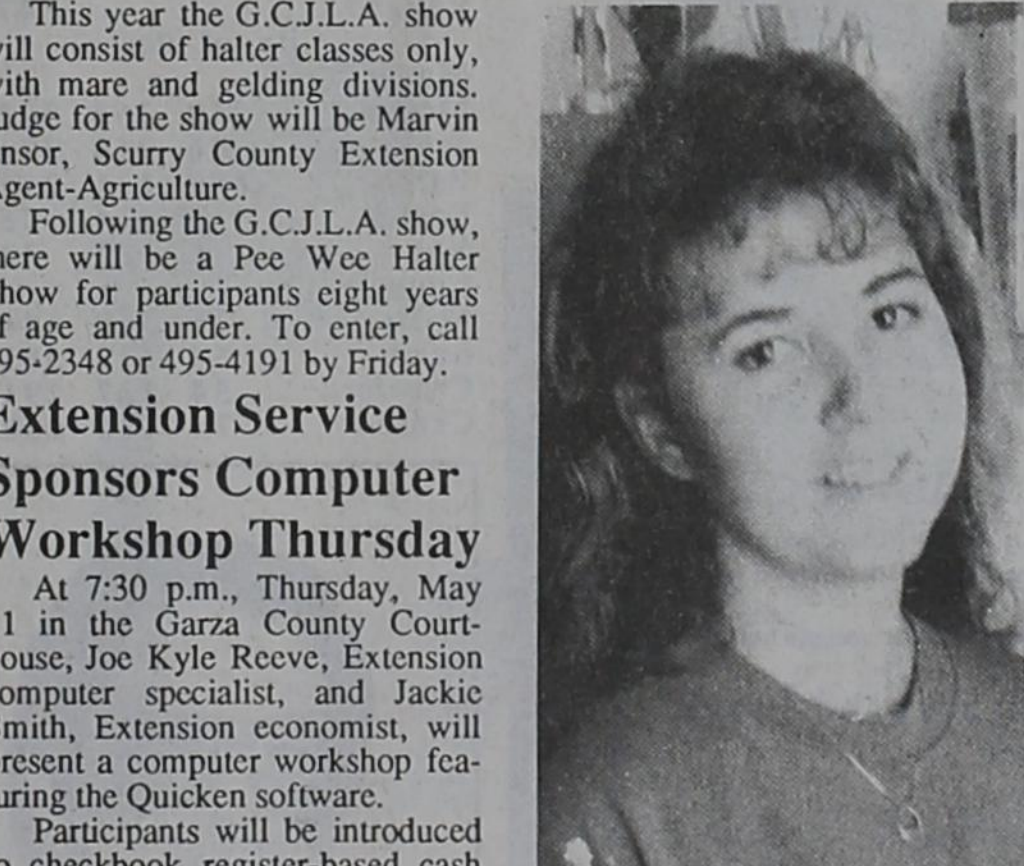
Garza Memorial Hospital has served the citizens of this area since 1953.

Interment was at Terrace Cemetery under the direction of Hudman Funeral Home.

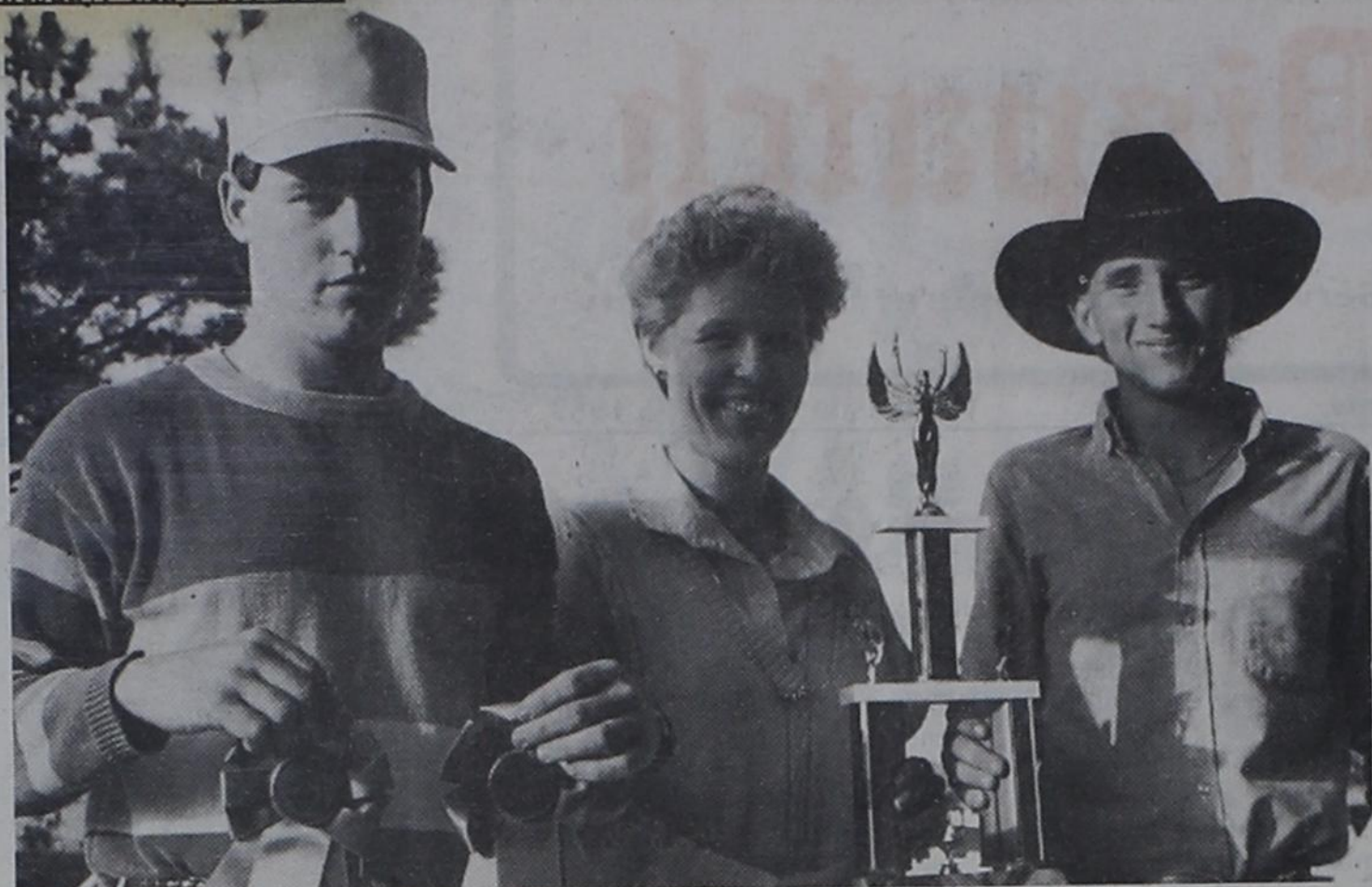
Mrs Bishop was born Feb. 8, 1910 in Anson, the daughter of F.E. Trull and Edna P. Parr.

## House Approves Oil Tax Incentive Bill

A bill hailed by Railroad Commissioner John Sharp as the "first tax break for the oil and gas industry ever passed in the history of the Texas Legislature" won final passage in the house recently.

House Bill 428, drafted by Sharp and sponsored by Representative Rick Perry (D-Haskell), will now be sent to the Senate where Senator Steve Carriker (D-Wichita Falls) has sponsored a companion bill.

Sharp said the bill is designed to stimulate new oil production in the state by granting a 10-year exemption from the state's severance tax to oil produced from new enhanced recovery projects.

"With this legislation we reaffirm our support of the Texas oil industry and their efforts toward maximum development of the state's oil resources," Sharp said. "Today, over half of Texas' oil production, more than 390 million barrels, is produced from enhanced

recovery projects. And there remain tens of thousands of reservoirs that are possible candidates for these advanced techniques.

"If these estimates are in the ballpark, we could see tens of millions of barrels of new oil production each year as a result of this incentive," Sharp said. "Remember, every million barrels of oil will add \$40 to 50 million in benefits to our state economy at current prices.

Oil produced from new enhanced recovery projects would receive a 50 percent severance tax exemption for 10 years, once the project had been qualified by the Railroad Commission. Any casing-head gas produced from project wells would be taxed at the normal severance tax rate for gas.

"Everyone has an opportunity to win in this legislation," Sharp said. "The industry will receive a 50 percent reduction in their taxes on this new oil, the state will receive tax revenue from oil that otherwise would not be produced, and the Texas economy receives the benefit of the additional funds created."

The court also voted to advertise for proposals for a courthouse computer system. Proposals will be accepted until 5 p.m., May 25 and will be opened June 12 for study.

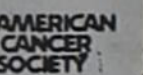

## In the Neighborhood

Mothers should appreciate the contribution made to them by Anna M. Jarvis. Without Jarvis' inspiration, Mother's Day, May 14, might never have existed.

As it happened, Jarvis first arranged for a special service in honor of her late mother in her Grafton, West Virginia church on May 10, 1908 and, at the same time, a service was held in what had been her mother's Philadelphia church.

Jarvis was never a mother herself, but she did believe that sons and daughters should pay tribute to their mothers at least once a year. The mother's services spread to more churches the following year.

In 1912, a Mother's Day International Association was founded to encourage greater observance of a special day, and in 1914 Congress designated the second Sunday in May as Mother's Day. In that same year, President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation urging people to display the American flag on that day as "a public expression of our love and reverence for the mothers of the country."

It took Anna Jarvis, Congress and President Wilson to make us aware of something we should've known all along - Mothers are very special people and deserved their own day long before 1908.

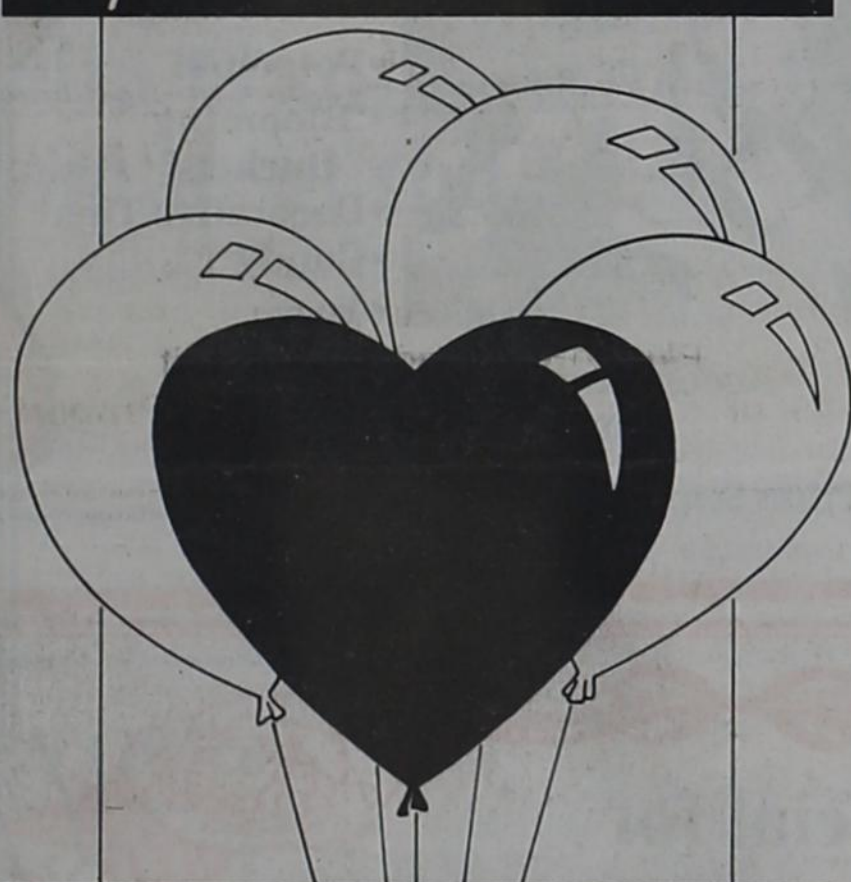

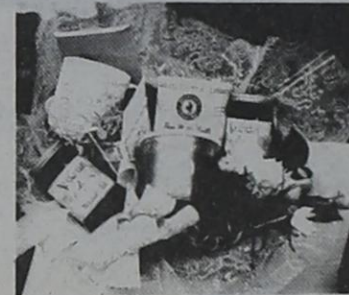
