Presenting the "Woman of the Year" award to Mrs. Gunn was County Judge E.A. Howard, Jr.

This year's recipient has dedicated many hours to supporting the goals of Extension Homemakers Clubs. She is serving as an officer for her club and has served as an officer for the County E.H. Council. She has presented numerous programs to her club and has spent many hours working at the County Fair and in the stockshow concession stands. A 4-H and youth supporter, she has spent many years as a leader for the Foods-Nutrition and Clothing Projects where she also served as a judge on the district level.

ASCS Office Advises Final Planting Dates

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office advises that final planting dates are June 10 for cotton and June 30 for grain sorghum. Producers are required to replant cotton and sorghum acreages through these dates.

If a disaster condition occurs after these dates, replanting is not required for program purposes. Planting for the first time after these dates could cause a problem if the crop is insured with multi-peril insurance. Check with your agent first.

At this point, 0/92 is available only for small grains and feed grains. Only 50/92 is available for cotton. As in the past, cotton must be planted to earn deficiency payments regardless of moisture condition.

Victor Ashley of the ASCS office also reports that funds are available for cost-sharing of annual conservation practices under the Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP), such as stockwater pipelines, shrub control, etc. Cost shares are set at 50 percent of a flat rate set by the county committee. Applications for cost-sharing will be accepted through Friday, May 19.

Another date the ASCS office asks you to mark on your calendar is May 31 - the last day to place 1988 crops of grain sorghum and cotton into the price support loan.

City's Bingo Tax Receipts Total \$1,116

The two-percent local gross receipts tax levied on bingo earned the City of Post \$1,116.64 for the three-month period from February 1, 1989 to May 2, 1989.

This recent check brings Post's total 1989 bingo receipts to date to \$2,206.77.

First quarter 1989 bingo gross receipt tax checks totaling \$2.2 million were mailed out by the State Comptroller's office to 65 counties and 105 cities that have legalized charity bingo and levy the two-percent tax.

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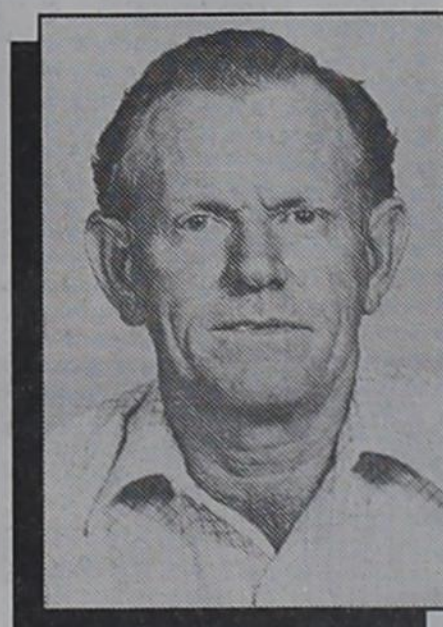
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Hogue, Foster Married in May 13 Ceremony

PHS Girls Shatter 1600 Meter Relay Record at State Meet

Thousands of fans at Memorial Stadium in Austin know about Post following the record-setting performance of four Post High School athletes last Saturday.

The foursome of Dana Morris, Sara Alexander, Kim Wulfjen and Crystal Clay brought oohs and aahs from the spectators in the huge stadium as the PHS 1600 meter relay team stretched out a commanding lead over the other seven Class AAA teams.

When Morris took the baton and sprinted the final 400 meters, it was obvious from the stadium clock in the south end zone that a new state record was about to be set.

A few minutes later at the winners' stand, the announcer made it official, Post had broken the 1977 Bellville High School record of 3:52.7 by almost a full second with a time of 3:51.9.

As far as can be determined, the 1600 meter relay team is the first in the history of Post High School to set and hold a state record in track.

First there were tears of joy, then big smiles filled the faces of Post's relay team, joined by alternates Dusti Cash and Trudy Woods along with manager Megan Bush.

"You know, the closest the competition came to them was at the start," Dispatch general manager Rodney Marshall commented later.

"You could just feel that nothing was going to stop them," coach Bill Gordon emphasizes. "Our youngsters created a lot of fans in Austin and everyone associated with them knows how hard they worked."

"I can't say enough about our senior," Gordon added, "Kim was always there, dependable and an excellent leader...we are going to miss her."

The coach also praised alternates Trudy Woods and Dusti Cash, who

"worked very hard with no complaints, even though they knew they probably would not be running," he said.

The girls also broke a Post High School record in the 800 meter relay with a second place time of 1:40.7, just 5/100th of a second behind first place Bonham, which set a new state record in the event at 1:40.2.

The old record was held by Marlin at 1:40.3 set in 1985.

Bonham's 800 meter relay team had not lost this year, and came to the meet with the second fastest time in the event following regional competition.

Post and Bonham battled through each leg of the race for first and second place, with sprinter Michelle Johnson just barely ahead of Dana Morris at the finish line.

Johnson earlier in the afternoon took first place in the 100 meter dash with a time of 11.7 seconds. Morris was timed at 12.57 in the event.

Post was tied for second at the state meet with Palacios and Sour Lake Hardin Jefferson with 36 points. Bonham won the meet with 66 points.

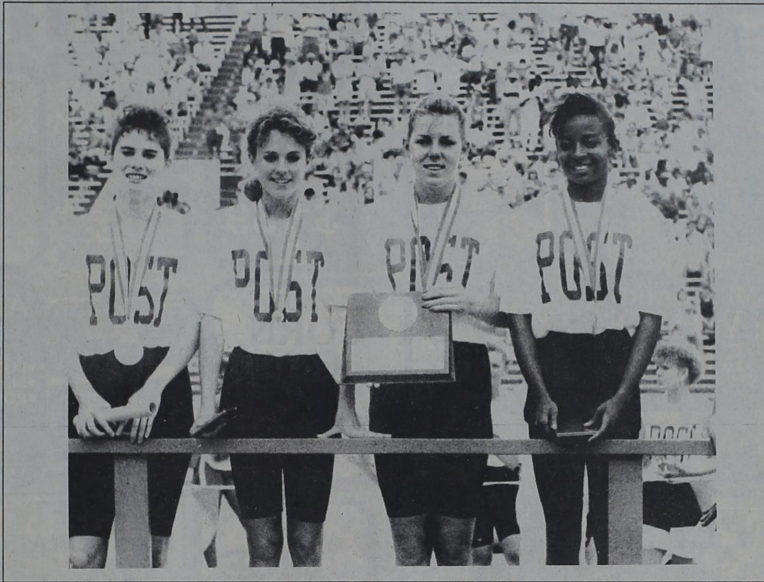

filing suit for delinquent taxes, but did make it part of the record that action would be at the expense of the delinquent taxpayers and no cost to the school district.

As the result of a recent visit to the Post Public Schools by the TEA Accreditation Team and a report of overcrowding in Elementary P.E. classes, the school is now required to reduce the student load in those classes.

Offered by Superintendent Bill Shiver as a solution to the problem, which could benefit students and teachers, was the recommendation to add an Art teacher to relieve the overcrowding and also to enable regular classroom teachers to devote more time to basics.

After board member opposition, Superintendent Shiver suggested that no action be taken until the next meeting at which time he would try to have a solution to the problem acceptable to the board.

The motion was made by Hart to table action and was seconded by Payne. All were in favor of the motion.

In other action, Level II Career Ladder recipients were approved, with each Career Ladder II teacher receiving \$1,750.36 this year for a total of \$68,264.04.

Contracts of librarians were extended to 11 months for the 1988-89 and 1989-1990 school years.

Approval was given to the expenditure of Federal Chapter I Funds, after extensive discussion and planning by the board.

A report was made to the board concerning the completion of Post I.S.D. three-year goals and the need to set new goals for the district, with a starting date of June to begin work on goal planning.

Students are also required to score 550 in math and 450 in English on their SAT and have three teacher references. Most applicants are then eliminated as semi-finalists are picked to go to the University for an interview with faculty members. After the interviews and a math examination, 100 finalists are chosen to actually attend the Academy for what would have been their junior and senior years in high school.

As students of the Academy, finalists will reside in the coed McConnell Hall and attend the normal college-level courses, some of which have been modified to encompass material which the students would normally have as high school upperclassmen.

The program is tuition-free, but Academy students are required to reside in McConnell Hall and have a few additional regulations - considering their ages.

Some of the classes include English, physics, political science, history and at least eight semester hours of elective credit, and foreign languages are encouraged.

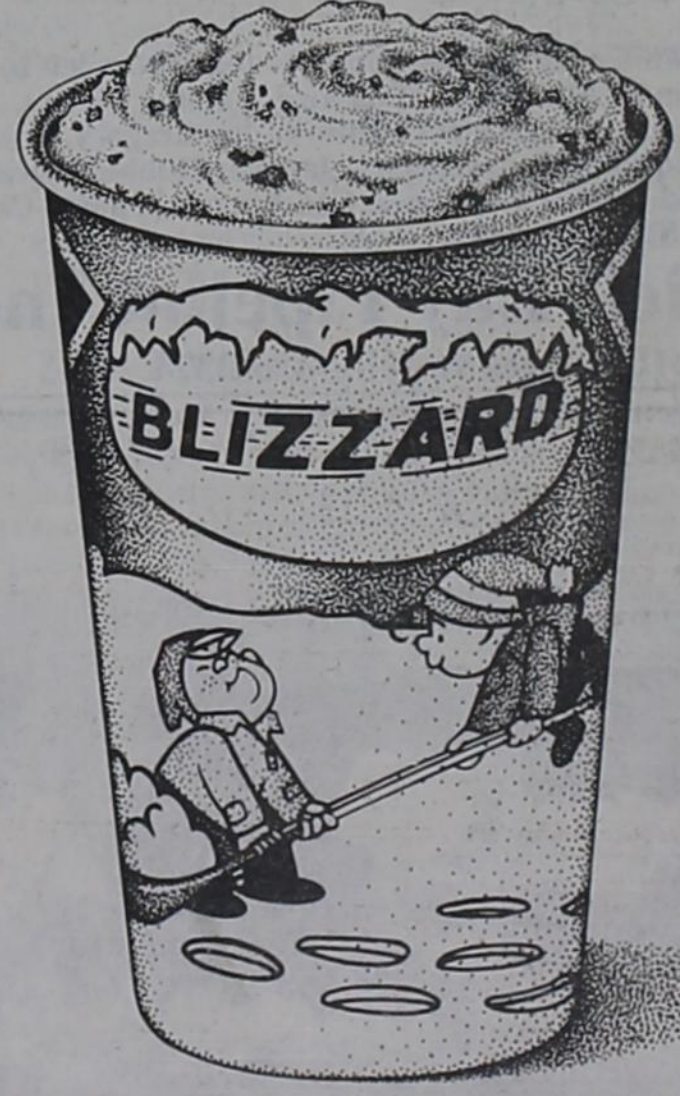

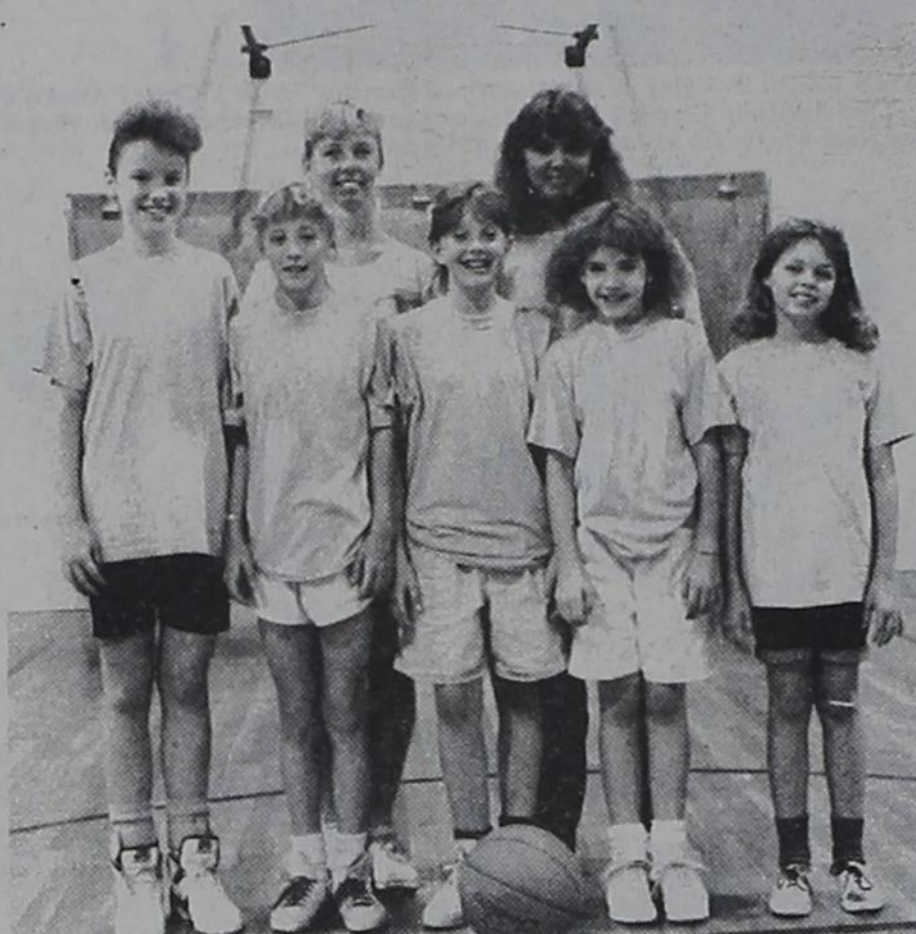
