Commissioners Talk About 911

The emergency telephone system, 9-1-1, was on the agenda again when Garza County Commissioners' Court met in regular session Monday, May 22 and heard from Dee Justice, the county's representative to the regional planning commission for 9-1-1, concerning the status of the emergency number.

Justice reported to the commissioners that, should the county go along with 9-1-1, the calls would be answered in the sheriff's office and the only cost to Garza County for installation would be the space used.

The subscriber fee for 9-1-1 is still set at .50 cents per month, per telephone line and fee collection would start January 1, 1990, if the county participates in the system. The fee would be collected for two-years before the system is installed and 9-1-1 itself could be operable in Garza County by January 1, 1992.

No decision was called for on 9-1-1 participation, but the matter was discussed in detail. It was the suggestion of Commissioner Herbert Walls, who felt that taxpayers were already burdened enough with monthly charges, that the county and city pay the .50 cent monthly fee.

Judge E.A. Howard also suggested that instead of paying the monthly fee for residents, an annual refund of \$6 could be made to those who requested it.

No problems are expected in implementing the system in the city limits, but in the county some problems will have to be worked out in the planning stages on re-routing calls.

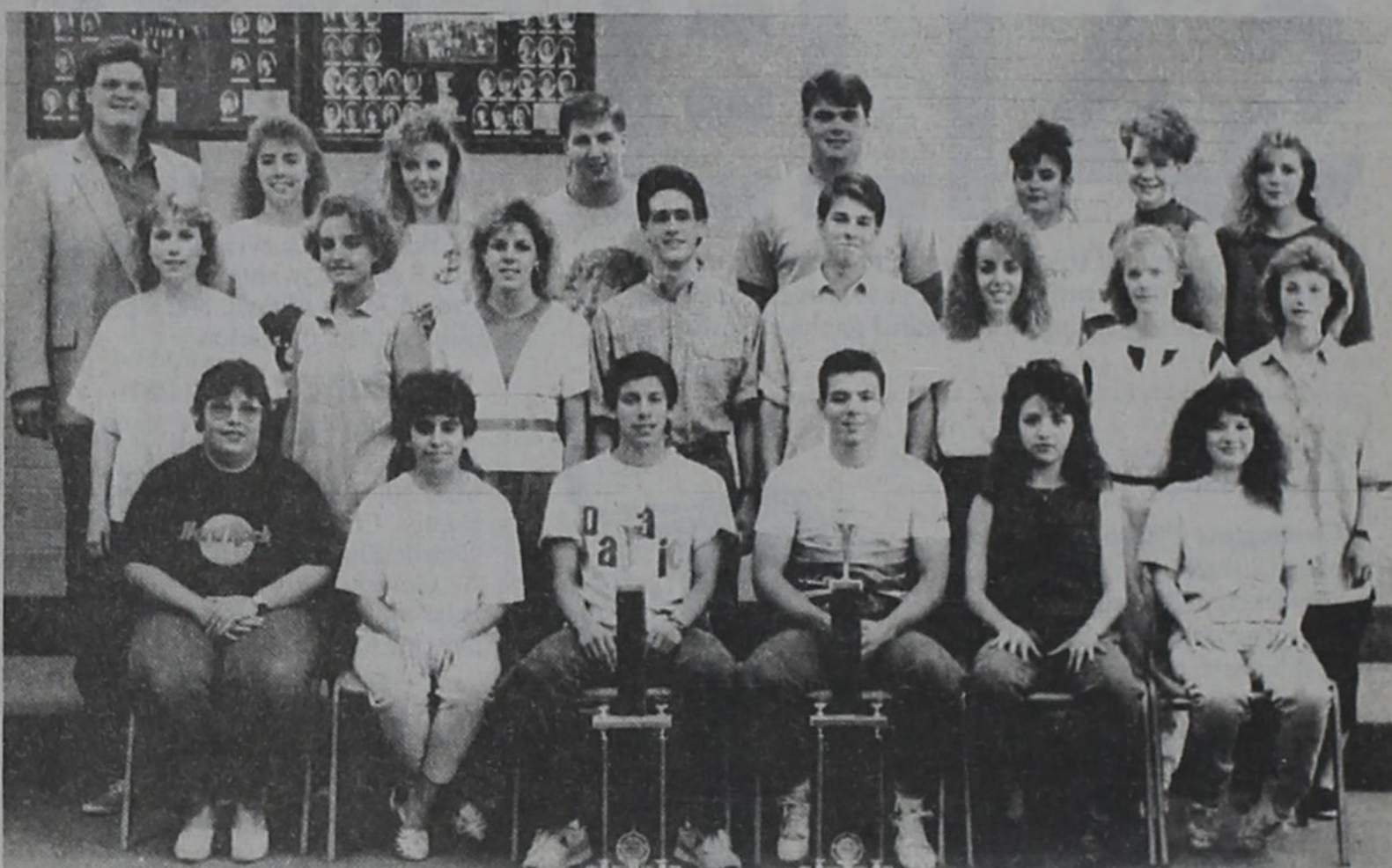

PEDC Members Look for Business in Carolina

Post Economic Development Corporation representatives Giles Dalby, Patty Kirkpatrick and Lewis Earl, along with Joe Pate of Postex Warehouse Company, left Sunday, May 21 for Greenville, South Carolina where they were scheduled to talk with contacts about the possibility of a towel plant locating in Post.

The PEDC members will also meet with the Piedmont Group, a team of engineers that conducted a feasibility study of Postex Mills in April, and go over the reports and findings of that study.

PEDC member Giles Dalby also reported that he has talked with Abdul Yaqub of Eastern Imports Ltd., who has also expressed an interest in locating a towel plant here using locally grown cotton.

Dalby said Yaqub would be in Post next month to discuss the plant, which could produce 200,000 pounds of towels a week and employ around 250 people.

Commenting on the use of the Postex building, Dalby said the plant could be refurbished and be competitive with any plant anywhere.

"We've done our homework and this time we can talk to them about the merits of moving to Post," he added.

Graveside services were held in Roaring Springs at 2 p.m., Saturday, May 20, 1989.

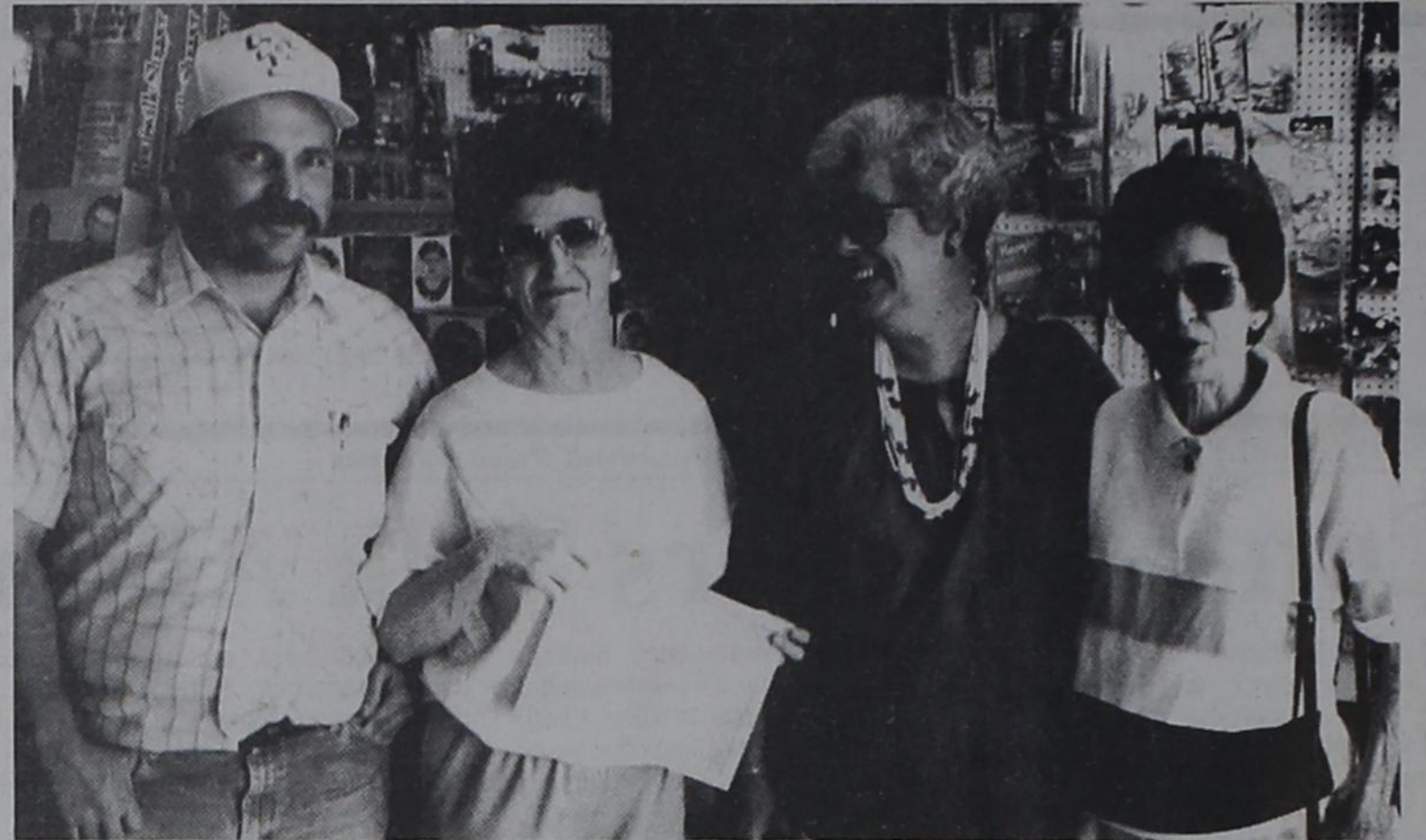
Funeral arrangements were under the direction of Hudman Funeral Home.
