The emergency telephone system, 9-1-1, was on the agenda again when Garza County Commissioners' Court met in regular session Monday, May 22 and heard from Dee Justice, the county's representative to the regional planning commission for 9-1-1, concerning the status of the emergency number.

Justice reported to the commissioners that, should the county go along with 9-1-1, the calls would be answered in the sheriff's office and the only cost to Garza County for installation would be the space used.

The subscriber fee for 9-1-1 is still set at .50 cents per month, per telephone line and fee collection would start January 1, 1990, if the county participates in the system. The fee would be collected for two-years before the system is installed and 9-1-1 itself could be operable in Garza County by January 1, 1992.

No decision was called for on 9-1-1 participation, but the matter was discussed in detail. It was the suggestion of Commissioner Herbert Walls, who felt that taxpayers were already burdened enough with monthly charges, that the county and city pay the .50 cent monthly fee.

Judge E.A. Howard also suggested that instead of paying the monthly fee for residents, an annual refund of \$6 could be made to those who requested it.

The 9-1-1 emergency number will be on the Commissioners' Court agenda again on June 12 after Justice has met and discussed the system with the City Council.

In other action taken, the court appointed Commissioner Sammy Ellis as the county's representative to the Community Center board. Ellis will replace Sherry Haire, who has resigned as a board member.

Reverend Charlie Shaw will deliver the invocation and the benediction, and guest speaker for the occasion will be Garza County Judge E.A. Howard, Jr. As part of the Memorial Day services, graves of all veterans buried in Terrace Cemetery will be decorated with flags and the names of deceased war veterans of Garza County will be read.

Commenting on the use of the Postex building, Dalby said the plant could be refurbished and be competitive with any plant anywhere.


"We've done our homework and this time we can talk to them about the merits of moving to Post," he added.



The Post Art Guild has named Ruth Little as Artist of the Month, and a display of her work may be seen through May at Post's First National Bank.


Ruth Little has been interested in the art of china painting for many years and has studied with many of the best teachers in the
