GMH Directors Review Renovation

An update on the approximate costs of renovation and furniture for Garza Memorial Hospital rooms was presented to the GMH Board of Directors by hospital administrator Maritta Reed at the board's regular meeting Tuesday, June 13.

After studying price quotes from two different hospital suppliers, the board voted to approve the renovation of one hospital room as a model for any further renovations.

In addition to repainting, the room remodeling will include an electric bed, mattress, overbed table, night stand and new carpet.

Administrator Maritta Reed told the board that the last improvements to hospital rooms were made six years ago, and then only new carpet was put in some of the rooms. She also reported that some of the hospital furniture now being used was the original furniture put in when the hospital first opened in 1953.

In other business, the hospital board approved an application by Debbie Reiter for scholarship money in the amount of \$1,595 to take a correspondence course to become a Respiratory Technician.

Approval was given to turn delinquent accounts in the amount of \$138 over to HRS and delin-

quent accounts in the amount of \$1,875.88 over to Retail Merchants.

Whether or not to continue the hospital's Home Health program was reviewed and discussed, but no action was taken. Home Health

was tabled and will be reviewed again at a later date.

Anice Reed to Conduct Seminar Here

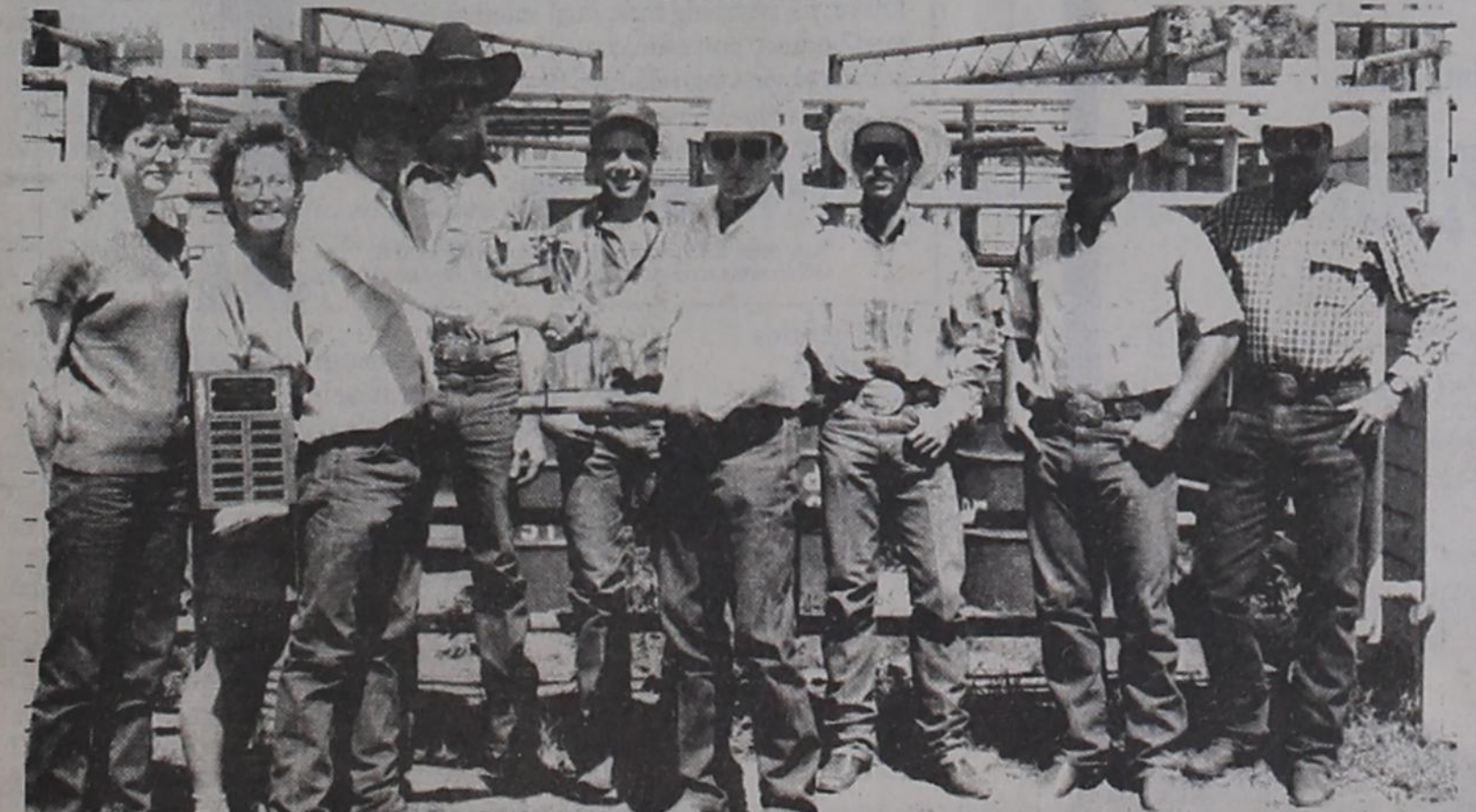

Dispute Resolution Center Working in Garza County

Garza County has been a part of South Plains Association of Government's Center for Dispute Resolution since November of 1987, and according to Dee Justice, member of the advisory committee for dispute resolution, "it's working for Garza County."

Through mediation, the Center provides a fast and fair means of helping people resolve disputes on their own by providing help to work out lasting solutions to conflicts in a manner that is quick, informal and inexpensive.

During mediation both parties

have an opportunity to explain their side of the problem and, according to SPAG, nearly 75 percent of all mediations produce an agreement which both sides see as fair.

With the help of a third party, groups or individuals can take an active part in resolving their differences. These third parties, or mediators, are certified volunteers from the community who are trained to help people reach a settlement.

Local Student, Teacher At Science Symposium

Roger Adams, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Adams of Post, and Post High School teacher George Pierce joined more than 400 outstanding high school science students and teachers at the 29th annual Texas Energy Science Symposium in Austin June 12-15.

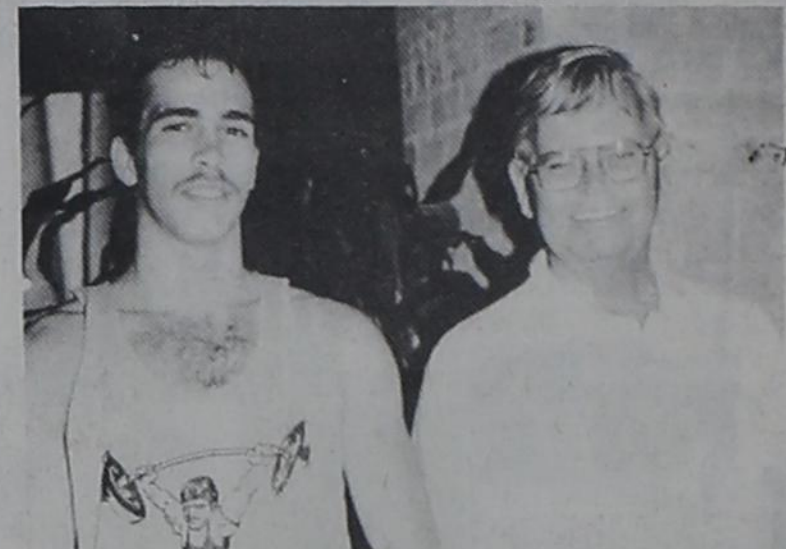
The two were among 40 students and teachers, representing schools throughout the Panhandle and South Plains, sponsored by Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS).

The symposium, at the University of Texas campus, is an annual event sponsored by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation (TAERF). The foundation is composed of 10 electric utilities in Texas, including SPS. Although SPS does not own or operate a nuclear power plant, the company's membership in TAERF reflects its commitment to many kinds of en-

ergy research. The four-day symposium, featuring a keynote address by NASA astronaut Kathryn Sullivan, was packed with tours and presentations on such subjects as fusion, a form of nuclear power, and the "greenhouse effect," a term that refers to heat becoming trapped in the Earth's atmosphere.

A highlight of the symposium was a tour of the university's Fusion Research Center and its tokamak, a machine that uses magnetic fields to attempt to confine the fusion reaction.

The tour was especially noteworthy in light of recent experiments in so-called "cold fusion," a process that purportedly uses room-temperature liquids to create fusion. Prior to these experiments, whose results have yet to be verified, fusion was believed possible only at temperatures near those of the sun.

Cotton Talks

from Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

Indications are that acreage planted to cotton on the High Plains in 1989 will fall over 400,000 acres below the acreage planted in 1988.

That's the conclusion drawn by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock, after studying preliminary cotton program sign-up figures received from the state Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) in College Station.

The raw figures show planting intentions at 2,740,189, down 486,811 acres from 1988's 3,227,000. But, stressing that the numbers are "preliminary," PCG has adjusted the total to an even 2.8 million based on conversations with ASCS employees in counties where the figures obviously are incomplete.

As an example, officials cite Gaines, largest of the 25 counties in PCG territory. The preliminary count there came to 219,320 in-

tended acres, down almost 76,000 and an unrealistic 26 percent from the acres planted last year.

Two factors account for the overall reduction, PCG notes. Farm program regulations in 1989 require participants to idle 25 percent of base acreage, up from 12.5 percent in 1988. And, producers since last year have reduced effective bases by putting another 147,000-plus acres in the 10-year conservation reserve program (CRP). That brings total High Plains cotton acres in the CRP to just over 723,000.

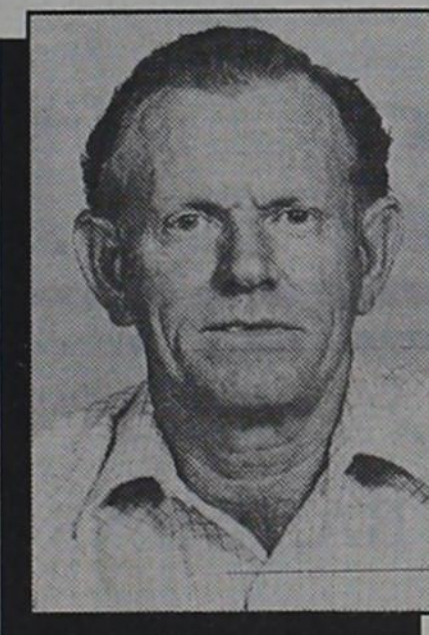
What about harvested acres? "With the drought and the weather we're having," says PCG Executive President Donald Johnson, "that's still anybody's guess."

ASCS reports Garza County's total base acres as 54,828; effective base (total less CRP and miscellaneous acreage reductions), 44,496; enrolled base acres, 42,243; and 1989 planting intentions, 31,625.

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



Heat Stress Increases With High Humidity

Recent sporadic rains, coupled with the early onset of hot weather in Texas, have created a weather hazard usually expected later in the year - heat stress, or hyperthermia.

Even people accustomed to the Texas climate sometimes fail to realize the dangers posed by the combination of high humidity and heat. The affect of humid heat can be most dangerous for the very

young, the elderly, and persons already weakened by illness.

Dr. Clift Price, Associate Commissioner for Personal Health Services at the Texas Department of Health (TDH) said a recent report shows that in an average year, 200 people in the U.S. die as a result of hot weather.

The report stated that overall mortality rates increase dramatically during severe weather. The National Center for Health Statistics has calculated that since an extreme heat wave was the unique factor during the summer of 1980, when mortality rates jumped sharply, as many as 1,700 deaths nationally may have been heat related.

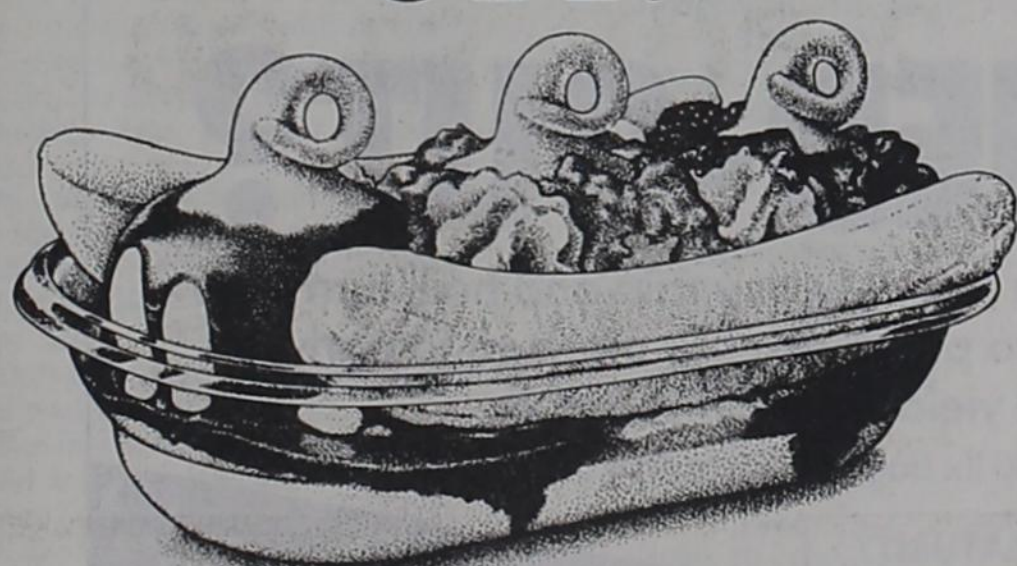
Dr. Price said that high temperature alone is physically tolerable to most people, but in combination with humidity, it can cause a person's cooling mechanism, perspiration, to work overtime. "If one fails to replace the fluids and salts lost through perspiration, dehydration can follow," he said.

Symptoms of dehydration are muscle cramps, nausea, dizziness, headache and low blood pressure. If fluids are not replace, heat stroke can ensue, causing sudden weakness, severe headache, loss of consciousness, brain damage and death if the victim is not quickly treated.

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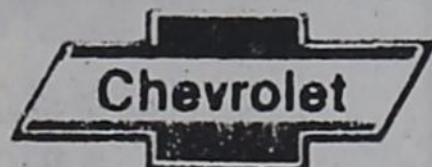

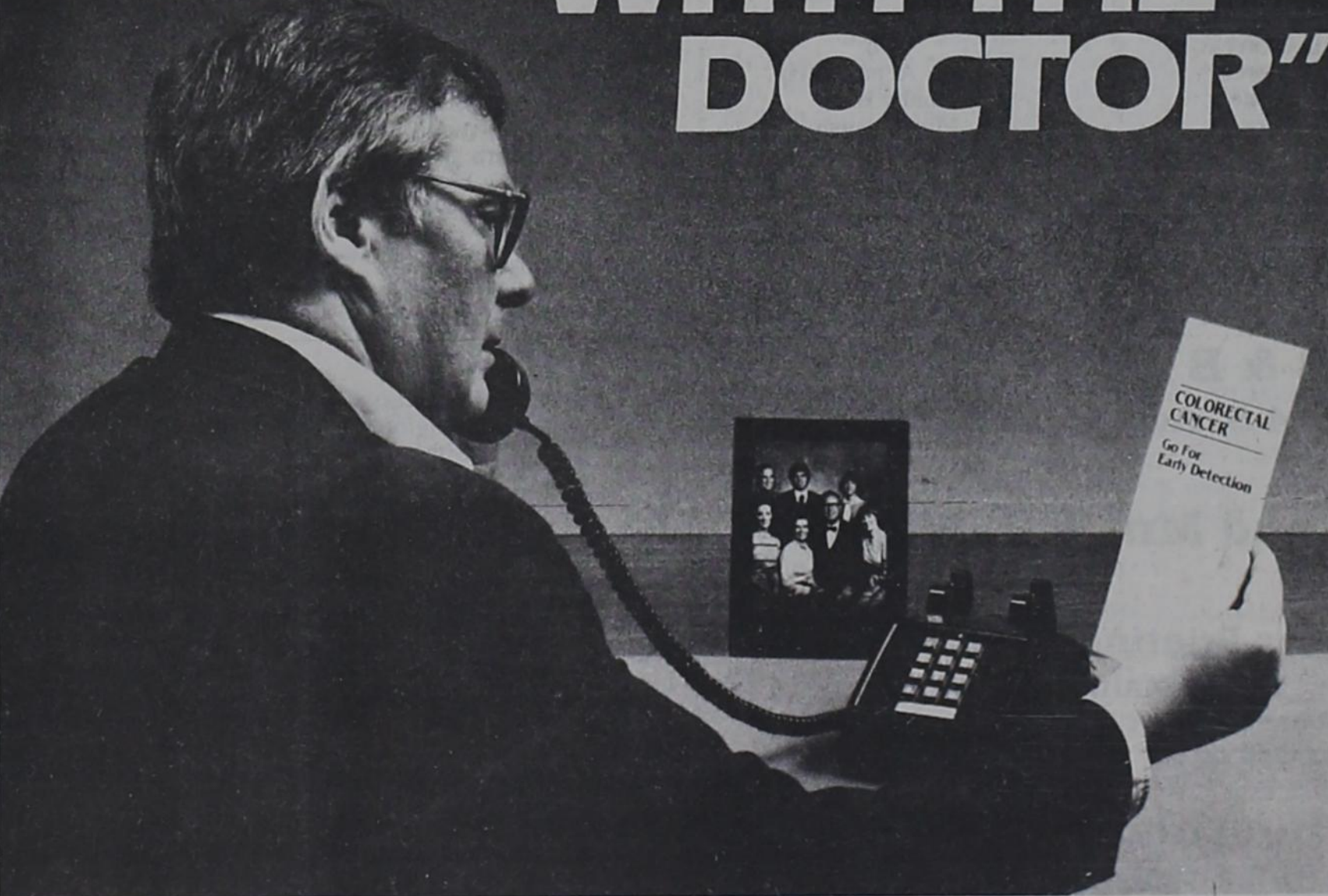
