Thad thought about publishing a U.S. flag in the upper right hand corner flag-burning incident, I decided that, since a lot of people still burn trash and frequenuly use the newspaper to get the fire started, that maybe I'd
better not subject the Dispatch to criticism of being unpatriotic. So, to all those people who are rushing around trying to enforce their
ideas of symbolism at the expense of individual fredom, ideas of symbolism at the expense of individual freedom, consider the
consequencesof a constitutional amendment forbidding desecration of the flag. What happens to people in China who burn the flag? They are accused of fomenting insur
Is that the kind of freedom we want for America?
Do we really want to stifle individual expression, just so that a piece of
material, with three different colors arranged in a certain way, can be protected
The flag is simply a symbol...and symbols have different meanings to different people...to some the flag might symbolize the enforced slavery that was considered legal for the first 90 years of this nation's history.
To others the flag is a symbol of liberty and freedom. To many the flag has come to symbortize an oppressive federal govern-
ment unwilling to hear the cries of agony and suffering by the massive ment unwilling to hear the cries of agony and suffering by the massive poverty of its people.
To others the flags To others the flag symbolizes the greed and fraud of its so-called leaders
and elected officials. Many a politician has hidden his or her evil deeds and elected officias. Nany
To those who opposed the war in Vietnam the flag symbolized a
government gone crazy, killing innocent people and ruining the lives of those young men and women we sent to Southeast Asia, trying to enforce our idea of government on a people unwilling to change.
And to many of those young women and men who suffered in that war the flag symbolizes what they were fighting for.
To everyone it means a little something different.
Try as hard as they will, politicians will never be able to put in a simple
statem statement the symbolism of the flag that will meet the ideas of all the
citizens. If we. are to maintain the idealism of our founding mothers and fathers,
who literally suffered and died to tear down the symbolism of oppression who literaly suffered and died to tear down the symbolism of oppression
in their time, we must insist that individual freedom of expression be protected. Liberty, especially individual libertry, can be lostsoceasily, and
once it is gone, it is extremely difficult to recover that precious idea to reality.
U.S. military veterans of all ages have put their lives on the line to ensure U.S. military veterans of all ages have put their lives on the line to ensure
that our idea of individual freedom and liberty be maintained...from the
battlefields in the 1780 s battlefields in the 1780 s through today's world-wide uncertainties. These
men and women were not fighting for a flag...they were fighting for an men and women were not fighting for a flag...they were fighting for an
idea, the idea was symbolized by a flag.
On this July 4th, as we celebrate the courageous act of our ancestors' declaration of independence from a tyrannical govermment, let us remem ber the sacrifices that it took to gain the freedom and liberty we enjoy
today...and with continued deligence this same freedom may be enjoyed by our grandchildren and beyond.
Let's be careful about how we enforce our ideas on others, lest we ourselves become victims of oppression to another form of tyranny...the
tyranny of conformity at the expense of individual freedom.
