Area Teachers Attend Arts Workshop

Nancy Norman, Nancy McDonald, Debbie Palmer and Marge Tannehill, of the Post schools, and Ann Chaffin, Dena Gamble, Lynn Wilke and Jane Witt, of the Southland schools, will represent Garza County at the July 10-14 teacher-training fine arts workshop to be conducted in Lubbock by the Texas Arts Council, statewide nonprofit organization for local arts agencies, in cooperation with Region XIV Education Service Center.

Post's Caprock Cultural Association will be one of the workshop's hosts, along with the Lubbock Cultural Affairs Council, the Plainview Cultural Council and the Floyd County Arts Association.

Workshops will be led by teams of arts specialists, one each in music, visual arts and creative dramatics, using a format developed by the Center for Learning Studies in Houston. Teachers will participate in hands-on-activities in music, visual arts and creative dramatics and learn how to coordinate these essential elements across the curriculum to enrich the teaching of other basic subject areas as well.

"We are very excited about this

fine arts essentials be taught in the public schools, depleted state and local funds have made this task a difficult one in many communities.

'Too often there are no arts specialists in the critical lower grades, and the task of teaching fine arts falls to classroom teachers with little or no specialized training in teaching the arts. We feel that this program is meeting an immediate educational need in our state which is not currently being addressed in any other way, and will underscore the need for arts specialists in the lower grades," Fox added.

The course has been accredited by the Texas Education Agency for 30 hours advanced Academic

Training (AAT) credit which can be applied toward the career ladder. Graduate credit is available from Texas Christian University in Fort Worth upon completion of additional work.

Locally, the Caprock Cultural Association has collected funds to supply the teachers with the necessary workbooks and supplies, and CCA members will be present at the workshop to help with registration, refreshments and scheduling.

Founders' Day Committee Volunteers Are Needed


The Founder's Day Committee is already at work planning for a successful celebration in October of 1989 and volunteers are still needed to help with the activities.

Weather Takes **Heavy Toll on Texas Cotton**

From the High Plains to the Coastal Bend, unfavorable weather is taking a heavy toll on the Texas cotton crop.

In some areas, it's a matter of too little rainfall, while in others it's too much moisture, hail or wind which is causing the problem for the state's \$1.3 billion cash crop.

Parts of the state have been spared - up to now - from the erratic weather. Among these areas are the "pima pocket" around El Paso, parts of the Rolling Plains and Central Texas Blacklands and some of the Rio Grande Valley.

But the high production areas of the High Plains and West Texas, which annually account for more than half of the state's cotton crop, literally have taken a beating, report county agents and crop specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The 25 High Plains counties around Lubbock, in which some 2.7 million acres have been planted to cotton, have lost an estimated 200,000 acres to thunderstorms, hail and winds in the last few weeks. Hale County alone lost 100,000 acres of the 190,000 planted a month ago.

Not only the severity, but the timing of recent heavy rains and hail across much of the state has

cotton farmers in a squeeze, according to Extension Service cotton specialists.

It is too late to replant cotton and expect it to mature and provide a profitable yield in many of the storm-ravaged areas of the High Plains, said Dr. James Supak, cotton agronomist at Lubbock. Yield expectations decline sharply when cotton plantings are delayed beyond the optimum planting periods. For this reason, farmers participating in federal crop insurance programs aren't required to plant cotton after pre-determined cutoff dates.

On the High Plains, for example, the cutoff dates for counties in the northern sector were June 1-5;

Dickens Electric Refund Total Largest Ever

Dickens Electric Cooperative has announced that the Cooperative's capital credit checks have been mailed. The capital returned to those who were members of the Cooperative in 1970 totaled \$135,693.96.

The checks were sent to 1332 persons and businesses. The recipients will receive checks in a prorated amount according to the patronage they contributed during that year.

The amount of each individual check is determined by totaling the revenue left over after all expenses, then dividing it among those who used the service at that time on a patronage basis.

The members who used more electricity will received larger checks while those who used less power will receive smaller checks, according to what percent of the Cooperative's total revenue they contributed.

Such complaint must be filed not later than 90 days after the alleged discrimination, or by such later date to which the Secretary to 50 words free, limit one insertion of Agriculture or the Rural Electrification Administration extends the time for filing. Identity of the complainants will be kept confidential except to the extent necessary to carry out the purposes of the Rules and Regulations."





those in the central portion were June 5-10; and southern counties had until June 10-15. "Planting cotton after those dates is extremely risky. Farmers who do so are going to be giving up considerable yield potential," Supak said.

By regions, the Texas cotton situation looks like this:

High Plains - Estimated 200,000 acres of 2.7 million planted has been lost to heavy rains, severe hail and high winds. Some areas have just gotten enough rain for proper planting or to ensure germination, reported Supak. Acceptable planting dates expired between June 1-15. Possible alternate crops include sesame, soybeans, grain sorghum, sunflower, pintos and blackeyed peas but contracts are limited and some seed of preferred varieties is in short supply.

West Texas - About 50 percent of acreage was lost to severe hail. Dryland areas around Mitchell, Howard, Midland and Nolan counties just got enough rain for planting. Much planting and replanting was occurring at cutoff date.

Cotton around San Angelo escaped hail and looks good; soil profile in that area is full of water, says Charles Stichler, Extension Service agronomist at Ft. Stockton.
