### ISD Trustees Request Study of P.E. Problems

The regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Post Independent School District was held Tuesday, July 11, 1989 and was attended by members Don Payne, Jerry Hays, Prudencio Basquez, Jack Kirkpatrick and Royce Hart and Superintendent W.F. Shiver.

Motion was made by Payne and seconded by Hart for Shiver to investigate P.E. problems in the Primary and Elementary schools, future minority hiring and the possibility of more art instruction. The motion included the tabling of action until the August meeting on the request for an art teacher.

In further action, the board approved the leave of absence request from Mrs. Diann Windham and the reassignment of Mrs. Debbie Palmer to Mrs. Windham's position. The board also approved the recommendation to employ Mrs. Wanda Osborne as a teacher for Middle School Special Education. Mrs. Osborne, a fully certified regular classroom teacher, has agreed to pursue the proper Special Education endorsement.

The resignation of band director, Jim Laughlin, was accepted and the recommendation of hiring Aaron Rathbun as his replacement was approved.

A report was made to the board concerning contracts for the repair of the high school roof. The roof is scheduled for completion by the end of July.

The members voted that letters be written acknowledging the appreciation for the board for the General Foods Scholarship Endowment Agreement between General Foods and the E.A. Franklin Trust, G.C.

### GTE Southwest's Rate Changes Begin July 19

Residential and business telephone rate changes resulting from the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) ruling on GTE Southwest Incorporated's Docket 5610 rate filing will appear on customers' bills beginning July 19, GTE Southwest President E.L. "Buddy" Langley announced today.

The rate changes will be effective February 23, 1989, the date of the commission's order. Most customer's basic local service rates and extended area service rates will be reduced approximately 17 percent. Monthly rates for touch-calling will be reduced by 50 cents, while rates for all other custom-calling features will decrease approximately 10 percent.

As examples of the new rates, the average residential bill for basic local monthly service for a customer in Irving will be reduced from \$18 to approximately \$14.90; in San Angelo, from \$10.40 to \$8.60; in League City, from \$17.55 to \$14.55; and in Brownfield, from \$10.15 to \$8.40.

The rate changes also apply to local directory assistance calls and other services, including customer requests for operators to verify a line as busy or to interrupt a call, mileage charges for customers outside the base rate area and rate-case surcharges.

Langley said there is "little doubt that reductions of this magnitude will have a dramatic impact on the company. Undoubtedly, it will affect the timeliness of our response and the pace at which further service enhancements can be brought in line." But despite the commission's ruling, Langley said GTE Southwest's primary objective continues to be "to provide the very best service possible to all of our customers. We are committed to quality service at fair and reasonable rates."

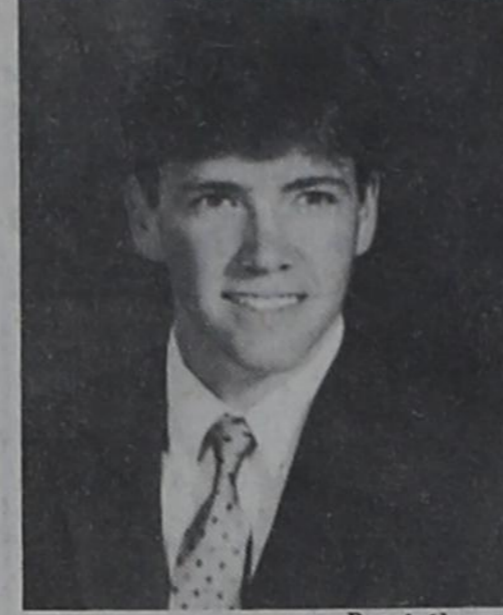

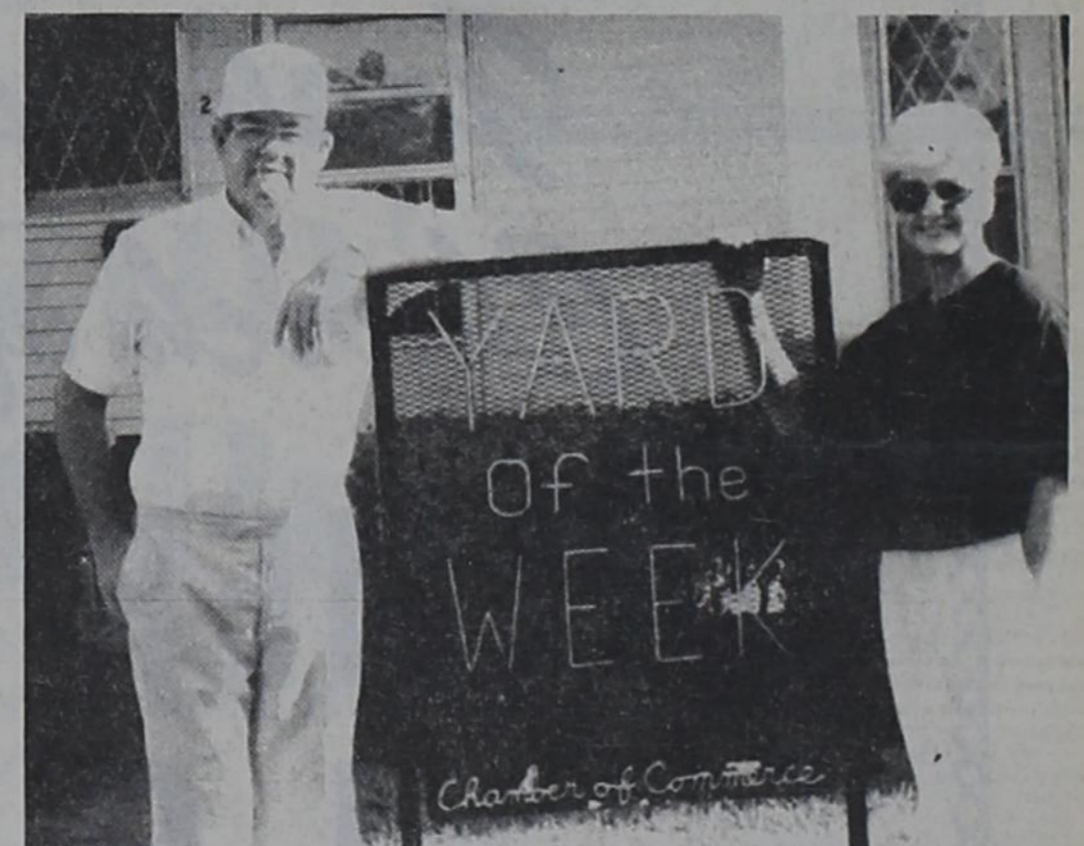
### Post's Summer Festival Features 'The Tempest'

## Local July Tax Rebate Shows Slight Decrease

Statewide, local sales tax rebates continued to climb for the month of July, but for the City of Post the current rebate check of \$9,974.88 is down 1.36 percent from the rebate of \$10,112.29 received for the same period in 1988.

Post's total payments to date, \$87,843.29, are down 9.17 percent from 1988's total of \$96,711.49.

Area cities and July rebate totals include:

Crosbyton, \$2,868, a 21.17 percent increase over 1988's \$2,367. 1989 payments to date, \$29,356.11, .88 percent increase over 1988's \$29,099.18.

Ralls, \$3,121.25, a 1.52 percent increase over 1988's \$3,074.51. 1989 payments, \$31,314.15, a 1.35 percent increase over 1988's \$30,896.81.

Spur, \$1,896.04, a 26.87 percent decrease from 1988's \$2,592.62. 1989 payments to date, \$6,501.69, a 76.78 percent decrease from 1988's \$28,002.39.

Slaton, \$12,829.84, a 19.74 percent decrease from 1988's \$15,985.72. 1989 payments to date, \$114,771.50, a 3.26 percent decrease from 1988's \$118,638.37.

Tahoka, \$3,773.97, a 20.77 percent decrease from 1988's \$4,763.46. 1989 payments to date, \$36,369.32, a .54 percent increase over 1988's \$36,172.60.

Rebate checks totaling \$68.7 million were mailed to 939 cities that impose local sales tax at either one or one and one-half percent.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock reported that across the state rebates have increased by 12 percent over last year's July payments.

"National economic indicators seem to be showing a slowdown, but the trend in Texas remains upward," Bullock said. Our diversifying economic base should ensure that we continue to do well."

"Oil and gas, construction, banking and real estate appear to have bottomed out. And some of the areas in Texas that lagged behind in economic growth are beginning to show signs of improvement," Bullock said.

July's checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in May and reported to the comptroller's office by June 20.

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### PUBLIC NOTICE CITY OF POST COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT FUND

The City of Post is planning to file an application with the Texas Department of Commerce (TDOC) for a Texas Community Development Program (TCDP) grant under the Community Development Fund. This application will be submitted to TDOC on or before September 14, 1989.

A public hearing concerning the proposed grant application will be held at 7:30 p.m. on Monday, August 7, 1989 in the council chambers at City Hall, Post, Texas. The purpose of this public hearing will be to discuss the range of eligible activities, the amount of TCDP funds available for projects in the South Plains State Planning Region and the grant application process.

All citizens are encouraged to attend this public hearing and present their views on the City's community development project needs. Written comments will be accepted by the City until the time that the City's application is submitted to TDOC.

A second public hearing will be held at a later date and announced by public notice to discuss the specific details of the application which the City of Post will be submitting to TDOC. A copy of the City's application will be available for inspection during normal business hours at the City Hall, 105 E. Main Street, Post, Texas.

The basic intent of the TCDP grants is to provide programs to benefit low and moderate income persons, to prevent or eliminate slums and blight and to meet other urgent community development needs. Eligible activities include improved streets and drainage, utility systems and other public facilities improvements. Housing improvement programs are also eligible as are certain public service activities which meet one of the three primary TCDP basic intents noted above.
