## Conner Announces Retirement

The announcement of his retirement, effective August 31, 1989, by longtime Garza County employee Syd Conner, County Extension Agent-Agriculture, was the first item on the agenda as County Commissioners' Court met in regular session Monday, July 24.

In a letter to the Commissioners, Conner, who has been with the Extension Service 33 years and has served as Garza County Agent since January 15, 1962, said, "I am grateful for having had the opportunity to work with wonderful people from all walks of life on a county, state and national level. Through the educational programs the Extension Service offers, people are better able to work to their greatest potential and I am pleased to have been a part of that program."

"The support of the Garza County Commissioners' Court has certainly enhanced the program for the people of Garza County and for this I will always be thankful."

"Lil and I plan to continue living in Post and plan to continue supporting the future of Garza County citizens."

The Court regretfully accepted Conner's retirement and expressed appreciation and thanks for his years of service and dedication to the county.

Also expressing regret at the retirement of Conner was Bob Robinson of Lubbock, District Extension Director, who was present at the meeting to assure the commissioners that every effort would be made to hire a replacement "as good as Syd Conner."

Robinson said that he expected a large number of applicants for the position because of Garza County's reputation for being supportive of a good agricultural program.

## Grand Jury to Rule on Ranch Deaths

Mystery still surrounds the Chimney Creek Ranch shooting deaths of H.C. Lewis and his son-in-law, Larry Bownds, almost a week after the two men were found dead Thursday morning, July 20.

An official ruling will now be delayed until the complete results of autopsies, performed by Ralph Erdmann of Lubbock, and laboratory testing by the Texas Department of Public Safety are available.

When these results are received, all evidence will be placed before the Grand Jury for a ruling on the matter, Garza County Sheriff Freddy Cockrell said Tuesday.

Few facts have been made public about the shootings, but Garza County Sheriff Freddy Cockrell released the following statement this week:

"On July 20 at 7:45 a.m. the Garza County Sheriff's Office received a call concerning an incident at Chimney Creek Ranch. Deputies of Garza County Sheriff's Office arrived at the ranch and found the bodies of H.C. Lewis and Lewis Bownds. Both had suffered gunshot wounds. Shelia Melton pronounced the two men dead at the scene and ordered autopsies."

"Evidence was collected at the scene and submitted to the Department of Public Safety laboratory in Austin for analysis. No formal ruling will be made until the results of all the lab tests are received."

The outcome of the shootings now hinges on the reports and testing and the decision of the Grand Jury.

## Post Box Tops to Benefit Founder's Day

Post Cereals box tops will be worth money to the Founder's Day Celebration, according to an announcement made recently by Post Cereals and General Foods, Inc.

In an effort to assist the Main Street Project in continued funding of the annual Celebration, and to meet expenses, Post Cereals and General Foods, Inc. have agreed to reimburse the Founder's Day Celebration \$1 for every five (5) Post Cereals box tops collected between now and October 14.

Drop stations for the box tops will be placed throughout town in early August, but, until the collections stations are available, box tops may be left at the Main Street Office in City Hall.

Support Founder's Day and ensure continuation of the event by saving your Post Cereals box tops.

In other action, the commissioners voted to keep the \$5 road and bridge tax on vehicle registrations, after hearing from Tax Assessor-Collector Chita Hataway that the county had three options regarding the yearly assessment. According to Hataway, the county could cancel the tax, keep the tax at the current rate of \$5, or raise the tax to \$10.

Hataway also pointed out that from November 1984 through July 21, 1989, the county had realized \$100,927 from the road and bridge tax.

County Judge E.A. Howard, Jr., as a representative of the Garza County Senior Citizens, announced that with the cancellation of the job which was held by Joan Blacklock at the Trail Blazers until July 15, the approximately \$400 paid to her monthly by the county was now available and could be used in another area.

Citing the Trail Blazers' poor financial condition and the group's need for funds, Howard asked for the \$400 a month to help the senior

citizens' center.

The commissioners unanimously agreed to the suggestion, and that amount will be available to the Trail Blazers for the next two and one-half months, until the new budget goes into effect.

Additionally, the commissioners voted to reimburse the Slaton Fire Department for 26 fire calls in Southland answered by the Slaton unit since July 1988 at \$225 per call.

The amount had not been paid because a contract, objecting to Slaton's proposed \$350 per call and offering a counter-proposal of \$225 per call, had not been received in Slaton and a statement had not been mailed.

Budget hearings and planning were on the agenda when the court reconvened at 1 p.m. Monday.

## Emergency Farm Loans Available for Farmers

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by tornadoes, flooding and severe storms which began May 4, 1989, are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Tahoka, FmHA County Supervisor Curtis Barlow said today.

Garza and Lynn counties are two of 60 in Texas recently named by the Secretary of Agriculture as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the tornadoes, flooding and severe storms.

Barlow said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses of the operating loan needed to continue in business, or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Mr. Barlow said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from these programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until February 26, 1990, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Barlow said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Tahoka is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday.

## Most VA Money Goes Directly to Veterans

Texas veterans directly received more than half of the \$2,047,430,102 U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) expenditures in Texas during fiscal year 1988, according to Waco VA Regional Office Director Dr. Stephen L. Lemons.

Estimated VA expenditures for Garza County veterans totaled \$238,445. This includes \$209,266 for compensation and pension, \$4,787 for education and vocational rehabilitation, and \$24,392 for insurance and indemnities.

"Texas veterans received \$1,901,366,207 as compensation for disabling injuries or diseases incurred while in the armed forces, or as pensions for wartime veterans with limited incomes," Lemons said. "They also received \$90,064,083 for education and vocational rehabilitation benefits."

He added that \$101,214,233 for insurance and indemnity payments, \$96,367,576 for facility construction, and \$668,417,903 for medical services and administrative costs were expended in Texas.

"Veterans of Texas have earned these benefits through their military service to our country, and my first priority is to serve them," said Lemons, whose office administers benefit programs for 233,833 in northern Texas.

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## SCS Offers Combination for Safe Summer Fun

(The following is the first in a series of four articles provided to The Post Dispatch for publication by the local Soil Conservation Service office.)

Warm weather, ponds and water sports - the right combination for fun in the summer sun, but care

must be taken to make that "fun" as safe as possible.

"People are naturally attracted to lakes and ponds during this time of the year," says Obie Kelley, District Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service in Garza County. "Families and friends use

our nation's two-million farm and ranch ponds as places to fish, swim or boat; but unsupervised children passing by may get into very dangerous situations in these areas. Keeping these ponds secure is very important."

Here are some suggestions for landowners from the Soil Conservation Service and the Garza County Soil and Water District:

1. Before constructing a pond, find out about liability. Check your community or state's laws regard-

ing liability in case of injury or death resulting from the use of your pond, whether you authorize such use or not. You may need to protect yourself with insurance.

2. Select the proper site and have your pond built by a reliable contractor who will follow engineering specifications.

3. During construction, remove trees, brush and any other obstructions from the pond bottom that might hinder safe boating or swimming.

4. Eliminate sudden drop-offs and deep holes in the swimming areas.

5. Once your pond is completed, mark the safe swimming areas and place warning signs at danger points. Tell swimmers not to swim alone. If needed, post safety instructions.

6. Place lifesaving devices such as ring buoys, ropes, planks or long poles at swimming areas in case rescue operations ever become necessary.

"Farm or ranch ponds can be a source of profit, as well as enjoyment, but only if they are safe," Kelley concludes.

## Overexposure to the Sun Poses Skin Cancer Risk

Some 400,000 new cases of skin cancer, the most common form of human cancer, will be diagnosed in the U.S. this year. Most of them, recent studies conclude, will be the result of repeated overexposure to the sun. And as might be expected, because of the state's climate, many of the patients will be Texans.

Dr. Clift Price, TDH Associate Commissioner for Personal Health Services, said, "Texans, used to outdoor work and recreation, sometimes fail to realize that the temporary discomfort of a sunburn is not as serious as the permanent radiation damage that goes unnoticed, sometimes for years. Some people think of sunburn as an annual ritual they have to live through in order to get a glamorous tan."

Dr. Price warned that the repeated ill effects from the sun are cumulative. "It is as if each person has an individual tolerance for how much of the sun's ultraviolet light he or she can stand in a lifetime." He explained that children and older people, especially those with light skin, generally have a lower tolerance to overexposure than those with dark. "But even dark-skinned people have their limits," he said.

People should watch for warning signs of skin cancer as they grow older, since the likelihood of skin cancer increases with age, he said. Warning signs include a sore that does not heal or any unusual skin condition, such as a change in size or color of a mole or birthmark.

The American Cancer Society recommends a monthly skin self-examination. Use a full-length mirror and hand mirror to study the whole skin carefully for overall conditions and tiny changes, including the skin of the scalp and between the toes. Any noticeable change warrants a medical opinion.

To reduce the risk overexposure to the sun, Texans are advised to:

- \* Wear protective clothing, including hats, long sleeves, even gloves.

- \* Choose - and use - sunscreens which are best suited to skin sensitivity. Apply a waterproof sunscreen (rated 15 or higher) at least an hour before going into the sun, and reapply after swimming or heavy perspiration.

- \* Avoid sun exposure between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m., when the sun's ultraviolet rays are most intense.

- \* Do not use sun lamps or tanning pills.

- \* Be especially cautious of sunlight when using prescribed drugs, since some tend to increase the skin's light sensitivity.

"These precautions and common sense can help most people to avoid skin cancer. And if they do develop skin cancer, they will discover the condition early if they routinely examine themselves," Dr. Price said.

He added that with early detection, most cases of skin cancer can be completely cured.


## Wortham Joins Midwest for Rural Effort
