County Receives \$12,588 in Lateral Road Program

Garza County will receive \$12,588.70 as State Treasurer Ann Richards sends checks totaling \$7.3 million to Texas' 254 counties for lateral road construction and maintenance.

The Treasurer each year disburses money appropriated by the Legislature for the Lateral Road Program. The grants may be used by counties for the purchase of right-of-way and for construction and maintenance of lateral roads, farm-to-market roads or state highways.

The money is allocated to each county under a formula based on the county's area, rural population and lateral road mileage. Garza County's lateral road mileage is 346.

Annual Founder's Day Celebration Big Success

Post's third annual Founder's Day Celebration has been declared a success!

The 1989 festivities provided four days of entertainment for the estimated 6,000 to 7,000 people who attended events ranging from art shows to a cutting horse contest.

Volunteers who worked for months to make the celebration a success were rewarded for their efforts when crowds of visitors filled downtown Post, the Algerita Art Center, the Garza Theatre, the Community Center and the Garza County Historical Museum.





Remember these figures when a member of the Amigos 4-H Club comes "trick or treating" you.

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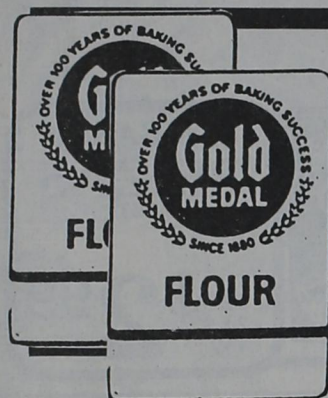

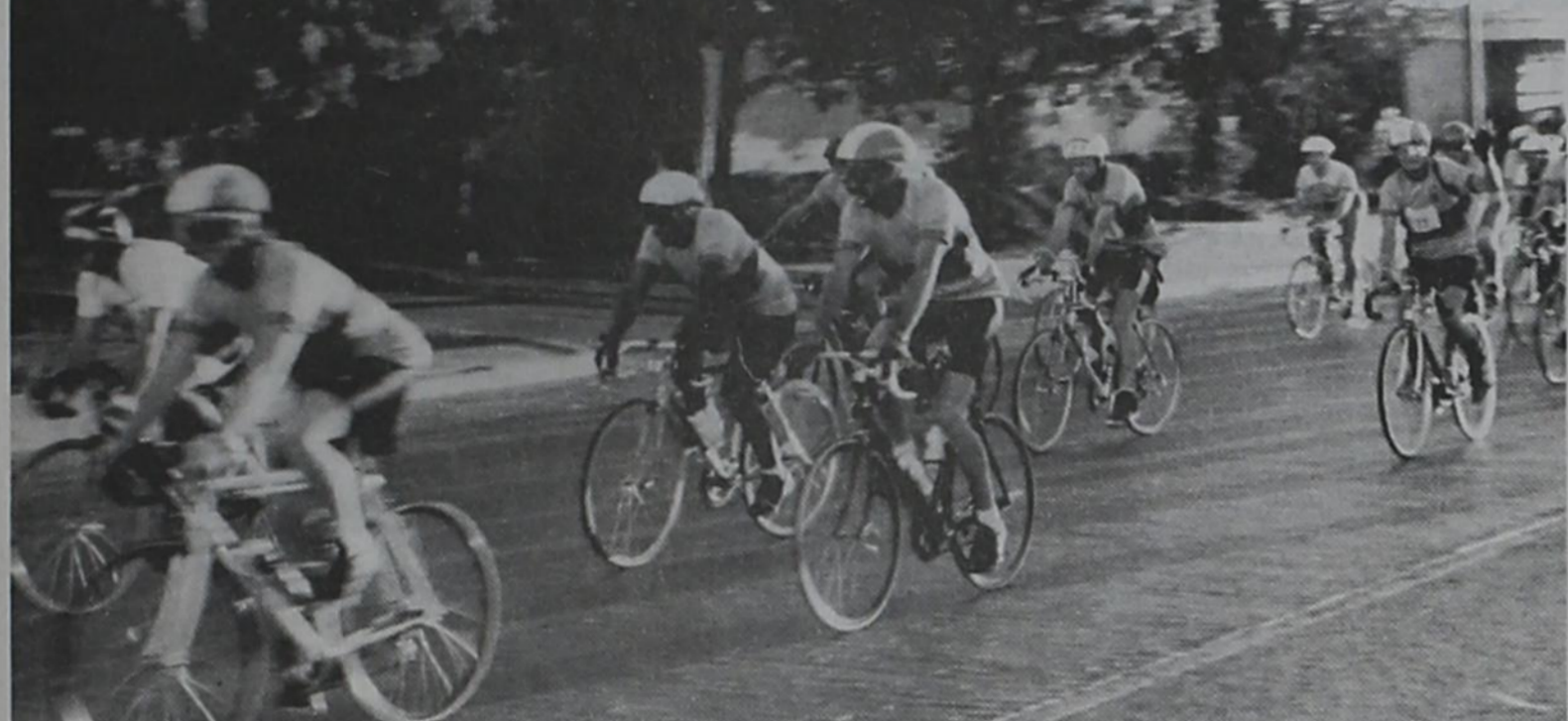

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'Lopes Get Ground Game Back, Play Great Defense in 20-7 Win Over Lamesa

Rance Sappington scored twice and stopped two Lamesa offensive drives with key interceptions to lead the Post Antelopes to a 20-7 win in the District 3AAA clash here last Friday night. The 'Lopes, now sporting a 6-0 season record, overcame a sluggish beginning, allowing the Tomatoes to score on a sustained drive following the opening kickoff. But when the Post defense got its act together, the visitors were unable to penetrate the end zone.

Facing a much larger overall team, the Antelopes proved one more time that quickness and execution, good physical conditioning and a patient coaching staff are even match for size.

The first Lamesa series, however, caught the Post defense off guard as the visitors marched smartly down the field on a 12 play, 63 yard scoring drive, using the power of the offensive line and strong running by Keene Hunter, James Williams and Johnny Baltazar.

Quarterback Michael Stansbury ran the wishbone offense well, picking up key first down conversions on third down situations. The touchdown came with 5:45 left in the first quarter as Stansbury recovered his own fumble in the end zone on a third down keeper from the one yard line.

Trailing 7-0, the Antelopes countered with a nine play drive that was snuffed out at the 19 yard line when Lamesa's Michael Stansbury intercepted a Sappington pass intended for Kevin Williams.

One play later the defense handed the ball back to the offense when Jimmy Holleman hit Lamesa's Michael Brown, knocking the football to the ground and Bill Rankin scooped it up

at the Tomado 16 yard line.

With 2:18 left in the first quarter the 'Lopes opened up a four play drive to paydirt, featuring running by Williams and Floyd Slay and a masterful fourth down quarterback keeper as Sappington faked the inside handoff, rolled to his left, broke through one tackler and slid into the end zone.

Following Junior Gonzales' extra point kick, the game was tied at 7-7 with 14 seconds left in the quarter.

The Tomatoes weren't lying down, as they roared right back, getting great field position on the kickoff with Hunter's return to the Post 47 yard line.

A 12 play drive looked rough on the 'Lope defense, as the Tomatoes collected four first downs, rambling behind Hunter, Williams and Baltazar's getting inside the Post 20 yard line.

On first down at the 19 Baltazar was hit hard at the line of scrimmage by Robby Blair and a second down pass to Jason Blake sailed out of reach.

On third down Stansbury dropped back to sling the ball toward the left end zone corner to Jason Jones when Sappington stepped in front of the receiver and just took the ball away for an Antelope interception at the six yard line.

Coach Dewayne Osborne has made some gutsy calls, but the one that came on fourth down in that series has to rank among the gutsiest.

Unable to move the ball in three plays, the 'Lopes lined up in punting formation, with Rankin set to receive the snap in the end zone...it would be safe to say that most people in the stadium, including the Tomatoes, expected a punt...Rankin got the snap, faked a kick, then lofted the football into the air over the defenders, who were making an all-out effort to block the punt, and Floyd Slay, who had drifted into the Lamesa secondary, took the ball in at the 10 and pounded his way to the 26 for a first down.

Two plays later Darren Brown broke through the line of scrimmage on a quick-opener and surprised the Lamesa secondary with a burst of speed as the nifty tailback went untouched down the right sideline 68 yards to the end zone.

A fumbled snap muffed the extra point kick and with 4:12 left in the half the 'Lopes led 13-7.

The score wasn't to change until the final second of the game, when Sappington got to show off his stuff again.

Meanwhile the Post defense went to work, shutting down a determined Tomado offensive unit with great pursuit and gang tackling and on fourth down Hunter was stopped short of a first down by four inches at the Post 39 yard line, leaving the Antelopes a little breathing room as they ran out the clock.

Second Half Action
A personal foul, the first of several second half penalties against the Antelopes, nullified a brilliant touchdown run by Lannie Lee on the series following the kickoff.

The 15 play drive was highlighted by the running antics of Lee, Williams and Slay and a smartly thrown and caught third down pass from Sappington to Bobby Blair at the Lamesa 23 yard line.

On second down from the 17, Lee hit across right tackle, slanted toward the middle behind great blocking, was hit at the five and literally carried two defenders into the end zone.

The yellow flag on the ground called the play back to the 27 yard line...and four plays later on fourth down Lee coughed up the ball at the 22.

Lamesa's next possession was cut short as Roger Adams tipped a Stansbury pass, Victor Chapa hammered Baltazar to the ground and a third down pass to Hunter sailed to wide.

A series of penalties stymied the 'Lope offense and Rankin punted on fourth down early in the fourth quarter to the end zone.

Rankin sacked Hunter behind the line, Jamie Perez and Trey Jones slammed Danny Granado on third down and the Tomatoes kept the drive alive with a pass completion to Granado at the 32.

One running play and two pass plays later, Lamesa punted the ball dead at the Post 36, a personal foul penalty on the 'Lopes set the ball at the 21.

Nine plays and three penalties later, the 'Lopes punted on fourth down, with the ball stopping at the Lamesa 18.

With 2:54 remaining in the game, tension in the stadium was high. A Lamesa touchdown and extra point loomed as a real threat.

Baltazar went over right guard to the 21 and on second down Stansbury dropped back and threw the ball high and long to Jones, as Sappington one more time stepped in front of the receiver for the interception.

Regaining his balance, Sappington raced from the Post 49 yard line to the Lamesa 14 before being hauled down.

With 2:05 left in the game, the 'Lopes smelled the end zone.

An illegal procedure call set the ball back to the 21.

Slay went over left guard to the 16. Lee pounded the same hole to the 15 and Lamesa called a time out with 1:02 remaining. On third down Lee went around left end on the pitchout to the seven and got the call again on fourth down outside right end to the five with a little extra effort, lunging past the first down marker.

The officials called time with 1:03 to bring out the chains...good by two inches.

Lee went over left guard on first down to the three and with 10 seconds left in the game, Sappington faked the inside handoff, and rolled to his right, squeezing through tacklers into the right end zone corner for the score.

With 0:00 left on the clock, Gonzales' kick put the Antelopes on top 20-7.

Antelope fans roared, and began to talk about the big showdown at Denver City this Friday.

The Denver City Mustangs have a tremendous offensive line, making it possible for a talented running back like Kenny Samaniego to rack up impressive statistics this year, and according to Post Antelope head coach Dewayne Osborne, "they are best we've played this year."

"Obviously, we'll have to stop Samaniego if we are to win the game," Osborne added, "and we'll have to get a stronger start than we did last week against Lamesa."

"We played well enough to win," the coach continued, "but I we didn't have the intensity we need, as hard as we tried not to, perhaps we were looking ahead one week. I am pleased that we got back to our ground game."

The Antelopes go to Mustang Stadium to face a Denver City team that has outscored opponents 175 to 53 and in six games are averaging 29 points per contest.

Led by junior quarterback 172 pound Brent Chamberlain, the Mustangs get the initial charge from offensive linemen seniors Ryan Simpson, 185 pound end; Edward Rivas, 248 pound tackle; Henry Hernandez, 165 pound tackle; juniors Arthur DeLeon, 185 pound guard; Mario Escobedo, 185 pound center and Rodrigo Valenzuela, 185 pound guard.

The backfield includes 175 pound senior Samaniego, senior fullback 182 pound Chance McLeroy and senior wingback 163 pound Victor Castruita.

The Mustang defense is big and quick for their size. Rivas, Simpson and junior tackle 231 pound Juan Garcia seem to always be around the ball.

McLeroy is considered the best linebacker and the secondary has good speed with Samaniego at the corner.

The Antelopes leave the field house following the pep rally at approximately 3:30 p.m. Friday for the trip to Denver City.

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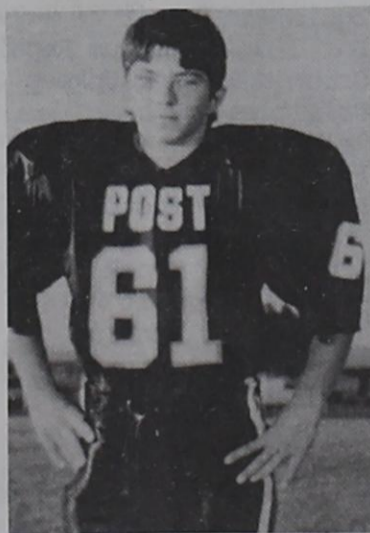
