City Council Considers Remote Control Track

The Post City Council met in a regularly scheduled meeting Monday, November 6 with mayor pro tem Jack Alexander presiding.

In a citizens' audience, Arnold Fry appeared before the council members with a request to put a radio controlled car track at David Nichols Park. Fry represented a long list of signers who support the proposed track.

He said that the "ideal spot at the park" was not being used for any other purpose at this time and that a car track would provide recreation for a number of people in Post, of all ages, who don't have a place to race their remote controlled cars. He also said that, if the idea was approved, a club would be formed and races would be held on Saturdays.

Fry asked the council for permission to use the park land and build the track, with a proposed mid-May completion date, and also asked if the city could help either in clearing the land or in other ways.

Mayor pro tem Jack Alexander said he saw no objection to the proposal, but suggested that, just as a formality, the recommendation for the track should be made to the city council by the park board and that a meeting with that board could be scheduled for December.

City Manager Bob Turner told the council that there would be no cash outlay for the project from the city with the location chosen. He also advised the council that a track of this kind would be covered under the present city insurance.

In other business, council members discussed Tom Power Insurance Company's bid of \$8,788.38 for umbrella coverage for liability insurance. The current policy, also from Power at a cost of \$9,031.72, will expire November 15.

The council voted its approval of the Power insurance coverage with the stipulation that the city receive a certificate of assurance that the proposed policy contains everything the current policy contains.

The council also approved a

proposal to advertise for bids on roof repairs at the Post Community Center. Council member Larry Mills, who was not present at Monday's meeting, had earlier recommended that the cost of the roof repairs be shared jointly by the city, Garza County and the Community Center, and had appeared before county commissioners' court with the proposal. No further information was available on this recommendation.

The purchase of a used sweeper from the state highway department for \$2,000 was approved on the recommendation of Larry Waldrip. Waldrip had talked with a representative of the highway department who said the machine was in good condition and that parts could

still be bought for it.

Under the general administration departmental report, Turner reported on delinquent water accounts and the council voted to charge-off \$1,388.87 in delinquencies. Turner pointed out to the council that these accounts were not charged-off and forgotten. Records are kept and would be available if the person owing the delinquent bill applied for city service in the future.

At the conclusion of the meeting, Alexander encouraged everyone present to vote in the Tuesday, November 7 election.

'Texas Releaf' Project Set for Veterans Day

Veterans across the state will take part in a major tree-planting project to improve the environment as part of Veterans Day activities on Saturday, November 11, Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro announced recently.

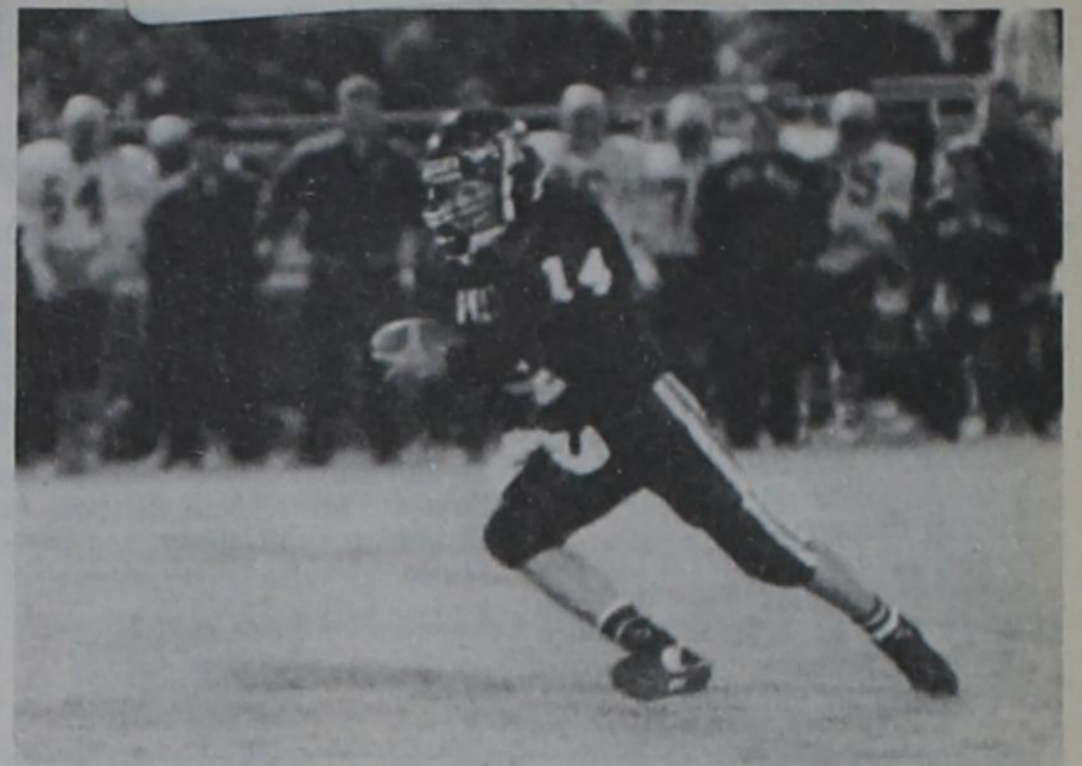
"Texas Releaf," a project designed to honor veterans and enhance the Texas environment, is sponsored by the Texas Veterans Land Board (VLB) and the Texas Association of Nurserymen (TAN). On Veterans Day, veterans will receive discounts on tree purchases at approximately 120 nurseries throughout the state, including Wolfe Nurseries in Lubbock.

Mauro said that America, which has only one-twentieth of the world's population, releases nearly one-fourth of the total carbon dioxide in our global environment because of our energy policy and consumption.

He noted the planting of trees will help combat the damaging environmental impact of the Greenhouse Effect. Trees remove carbon dioxide, a major contributor to the Greenhouse Effect, from the atmosphere.

Global Releaf, a program of the American Forestry Association, has set a goal of planting 100 million trees by 1992 in cities that are now turning into urban "heat islands." That could offset America's carbon dioxide emissions by 18 million tons a year and allow American consumers to save \$4 billion a year on energy costs.

As chairman of the Veterans Land Board, Mauro administers three unique loan programs for Texas veterans that provide up to \$57,500 in low-interest land, housing and home improvement programs.

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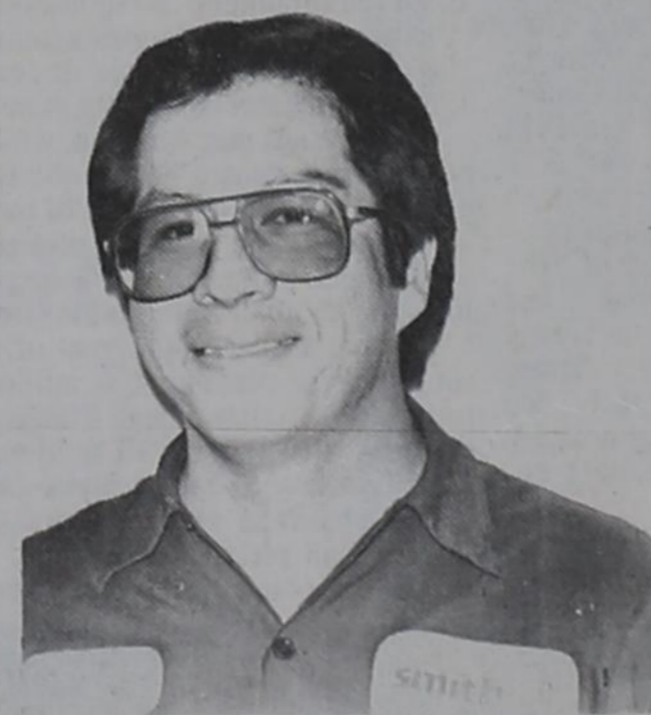
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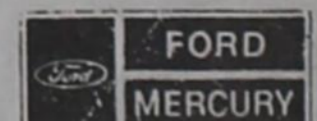
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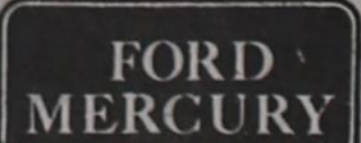
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Classes of '49 and '50 Hold Reunions Saturday

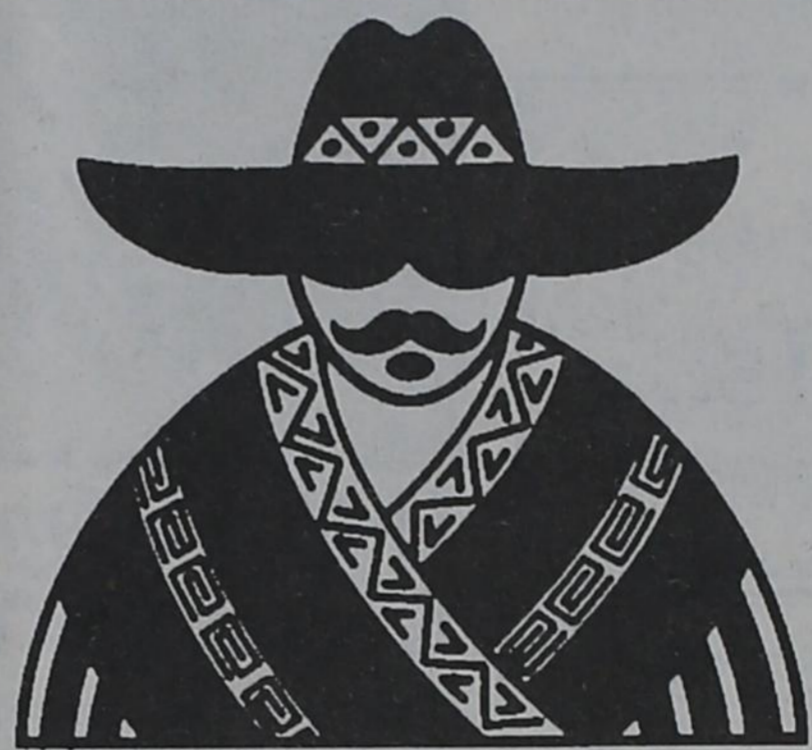

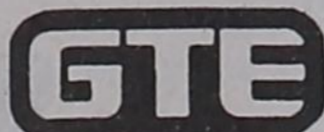
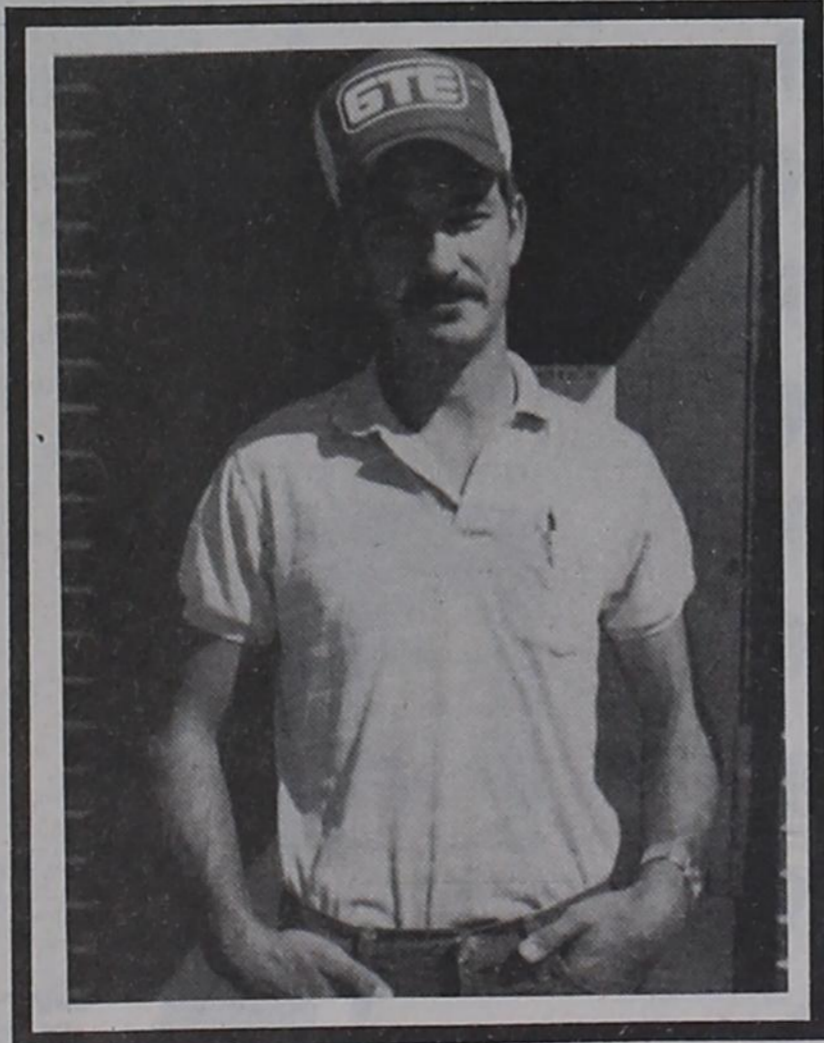

Good Reasons to Eat Potassium-Rich Foods

While many people are aware that too much sodium can intensify high blood pressure, few may know much about its counterpart, potassium.

Dr. Mary Kinney Sweeten, nutritionist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said while sodium can increase blood pressure in some people, and indirectly contribute to heart disease or stroke, potassium can help control blood pressure and regulate heart rhythm.

She said that many experts agree that just as there are good reasons to avoid too much sodium, an ingredient of salt and other food additives, there are good reasons to eat foods that contain plenty of potassium.

According to a recent Tufts University "Diet and Nutrition Letter," there is evidence suggesting that if a diet is rich in potassium, the likelihood of falling victim to high blood pressure or hypertension lessens.

Sweeten said an article in the New England Journal of Medicine also said one extra serving per day of potassium-rich food can cut the risk of death from strokes as much as 40 percent.

"You're more likely to have a healthier diet by eating potassium-rich foods because usually these foods contain other nutrients," Sweeten said.

The nutritionist said lean cuts of fish, beef and poultry are good examples of foods that contribute large amounts of potassium (in relation to sodium content) while offering plenty of vitamins and minerals such as iron.

Fruits and vegetables also provide potassium, but this changes if the foods are heavily processed, according to Sweeten.

"The less a food is tampered with, the better the chance of eating a high-potassium, low-sodium item," she said.

The "Diet and Nutrition Letter" stated that one baked potato with the skin, which has five milligrams of sodium and only a tenth of a gram of fat, contains several hundred milligrams of potassium, some Vitamin C and four grams of fiber.

Other good sources of potassium are bananas, cantaloupes, broccoli, honeydew melons, oranges, tomatoes, peas and dried beans.

Hance Names Booth Garza County Chairman

Butch Booth of Post has been selected by Republican gubernatorial candidate Kent Hance as the Garza County chairman of his campaign.

Hance, who announced his candidacy for governor on August 15, said, "Butch is one of the best grass-roots leaders in our party. With strong support from people

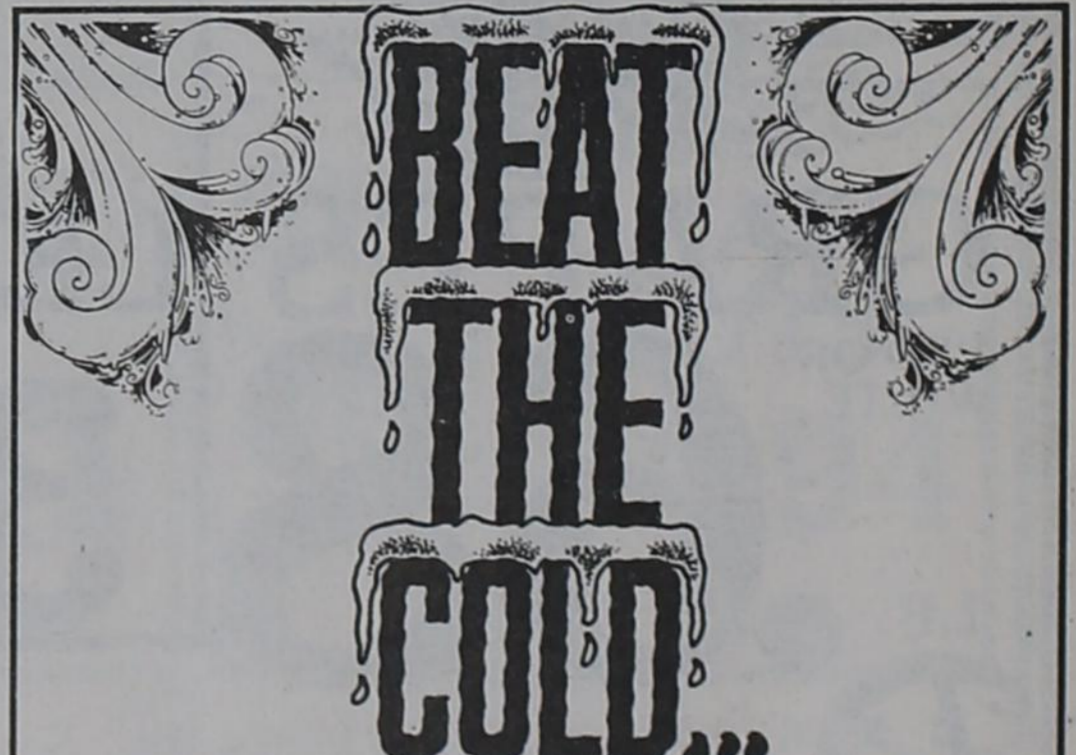
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'Lopes Aim for Share of District Title, Playoffs
