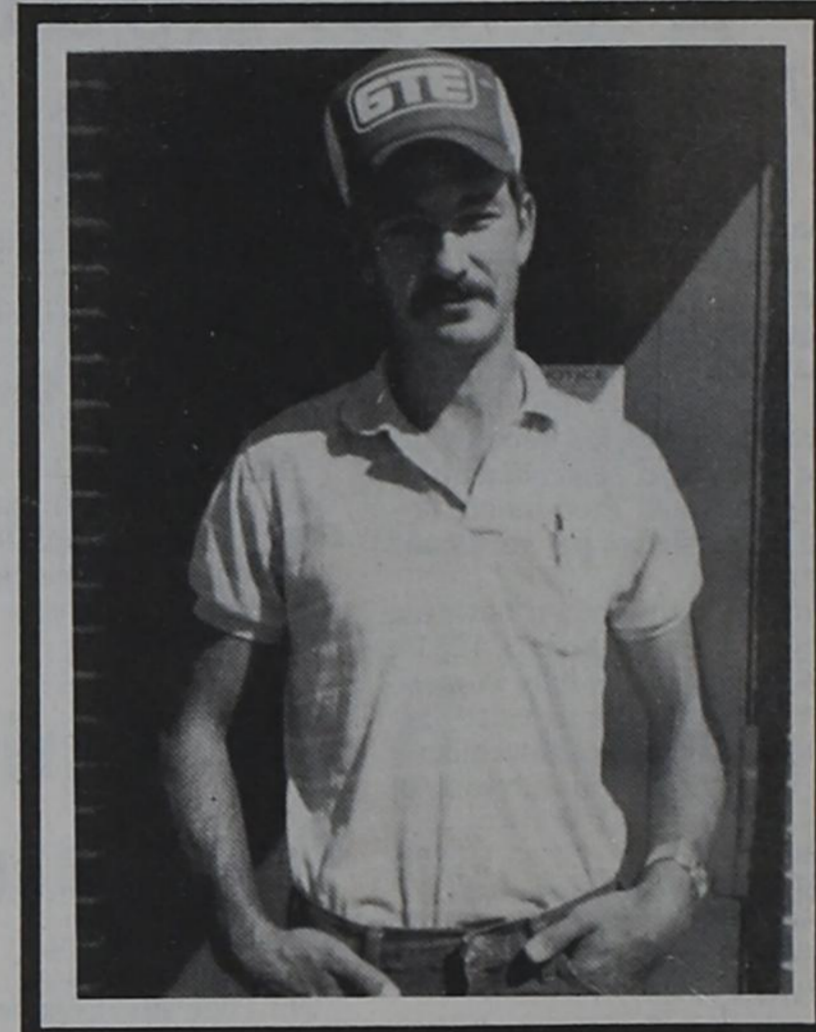

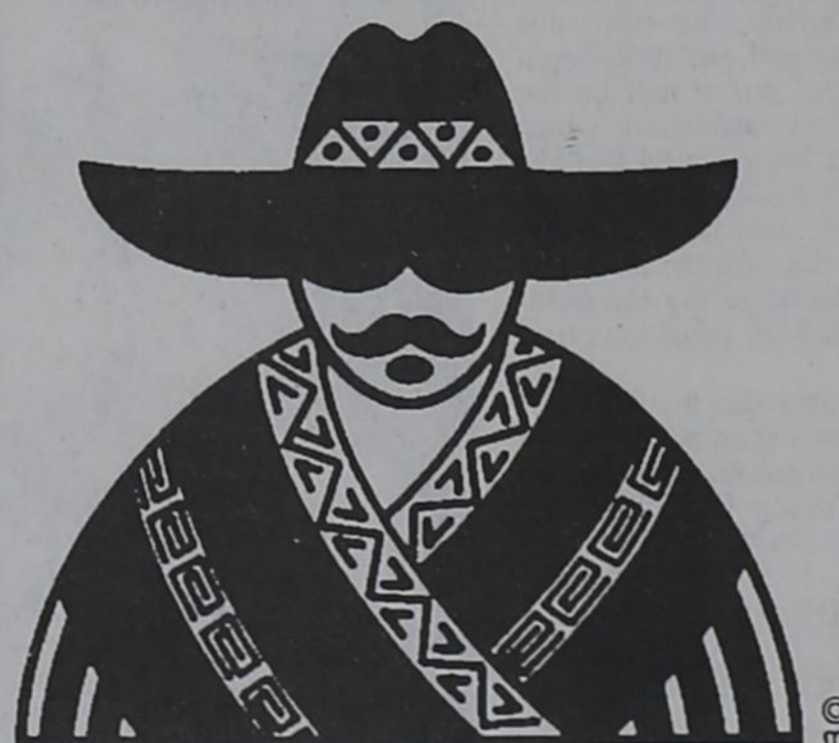

### 10 Years Ago November 15, 1979

Funeral services for Ray Norman, who came to Garza County in 1916, were held Saturday in the Church of the Nazarene.

The Garza County Commissioners' Court passed a resolution requesting Governor Clements to declare Garza County a disaster area for the period of July 1, 1979 to the present due to drought conditions.

Roland G. Walsh of Ruidoso, N.M., was named new administrator of Garza Memorial Hospital.

Garza County sheriff's deputies and dispatchers have new uniforms which they purchased themselves.

Increases in the number of fishing and water safety violations are being reported by Warden Bud Howell in Crosby and Garza counties.

The Post Does will open their basketball season with a first varsity unit composed of Donna Baumann, Melisa Tatum, Marinette Hays, Holly Giddens and Amy Thuet.

### 20 Years Ago November 13, 1969

The acquisition of the carriage, harness and saddle house from the U Lazy S Ranch in Garza County for the Ranch Headquarters at Texas Tech has been announced by Jerry Rogers, director of the Headquarters.

Roaring from behind in the final seven minutes of the fourth quarter, the Post Antelopes pulled one out of the fire to defeat Idalou 28 to 27 Friday night. Neff Walker's three 4th quarter touchdown runs, one for 51 yards, and three extra point kicks by Randy Hudman gave the 'Lopes their one-point margin.

Stanna Butler, escorted by Roger Camp, was crowned Post Antelope Band Sweetheart for 1959.

Mrs. Joan Stewart assumed her duties this week as Chamber of Commerce secretary.

Sheriff Carl Rains has returned from Farmington, N.M. where he had been seeking leads to the whereabouts of some \$3,000 worth of oil field equipment stolen from this area several months ago.

### 40 Years Ago November 17, 1949

The seed house at S.C. Storie's gin, near Gregory, burned Saturday afternoon. Six tons of seed were destroyed and the total loss was said to have been more than \$5,000.

The football traffic after the Post-Slaton game Friday afternoon was hopelessly snarled for awhile on the Tahoka highway, a block west of Broadway, and resulted in several traffic accidents.

### In the Neighborhood...

When the Corner Grocery moves from 121 E. Main to 419 E. Main, sometime in the near future, a downtown Post tradition of over 50 years will be lost. Yes, there will still be a Corner Grocery, but it won't be on the corner...it won't even be in the middle of the block...and downtown Post just won't be the same.

The Corner Grocery was opened back in the 1930s by W.F. Presson - and I know some of you are already saying that's wrong, it was W.R. Graeber. But W.F. did open the Corner Grocery in the old Algerita Hotel, where the Algerita Art Center is now located. W.R. Graeber had an M Systems store, Red and White Grocery, down in the next block, about where Trends for Men was located.

However, Graeber soon bought the Corner Grocery and that's how the Red and White moved uptown and on the corner and W.R. and Minnie Graeber became such a big part of downtown Post.

Marvin Williams went to work for Graeber at the Corner Grocery in 1945 and Kenneth Williams was about nine years old when he

started helping around the store. Actually, Kenneth sold watermelons for Mr. Graeber and did such a good job he was put to work in the store.

By 1958, the Corner Grocery had a new set of owners - Marvin Williams, Jim Hays and Mr. and Mrs. L.A. Presson.

In 1963 the Corner Grocery moved to the middle of the block and other changes were made. Jim Hays sold his interest to his son Pete Hays in 1966, and in 1970 Pete sold his interest to Kenneth Williams. Kenneth and Marvin Williams eventually bought Mrs. L.A. Presson's interest in the store and ended the Graeber-Presson connection with the Corner Grocery.

Some of us discussed the number of people who had worked for the store - in both locations and for the different owners - and decided that a list of Corner Grocery employees would probably fill the Dispatch.

We wish Marvin and Kenneth success in their new location. We will miss having them next door - and we'll also miss the occasional questions, like the one we got from a salesman who came in the Dispatch and asked, "Why does this town have a store in the middle of the block named the Corner Grocery?"

I don't remember what answer he got, but I think I told him that was the corner when the town was built.

 They are well coached and do a lot of things well, according to Osborne, including the sweep. The Cranes are successful with the sweep both to the short and wide side, although they seem to prefer the wide side.  
 They have been predominantly a "big-play" team, similar to Brownfield, mixing up the run and pass well.  
 "From here on every team is going to be a good one, you know they didn't get to where they are any other way," Osborne emphasizes. Crane uses three tailbacks in its offensive scheme, Dude Hall, Dick Garza and Jason Pettit. They operate from a Wing T and Power I, similar to the Antelope offensive alignment.  
 On defense the Cranes use a 5-2 alignment and use a lot of slants and stunts. The secondary is well coached and reacts extremely fast to the ball.

"Their backs are so fast, if they get a step on us, they are gone," Osborne adds. "We are going to have to get solid tackles on every play."

 "We are proud of this group for playing hard. They will improve every year because they don't mind working hard to get better," the coach emphasized.

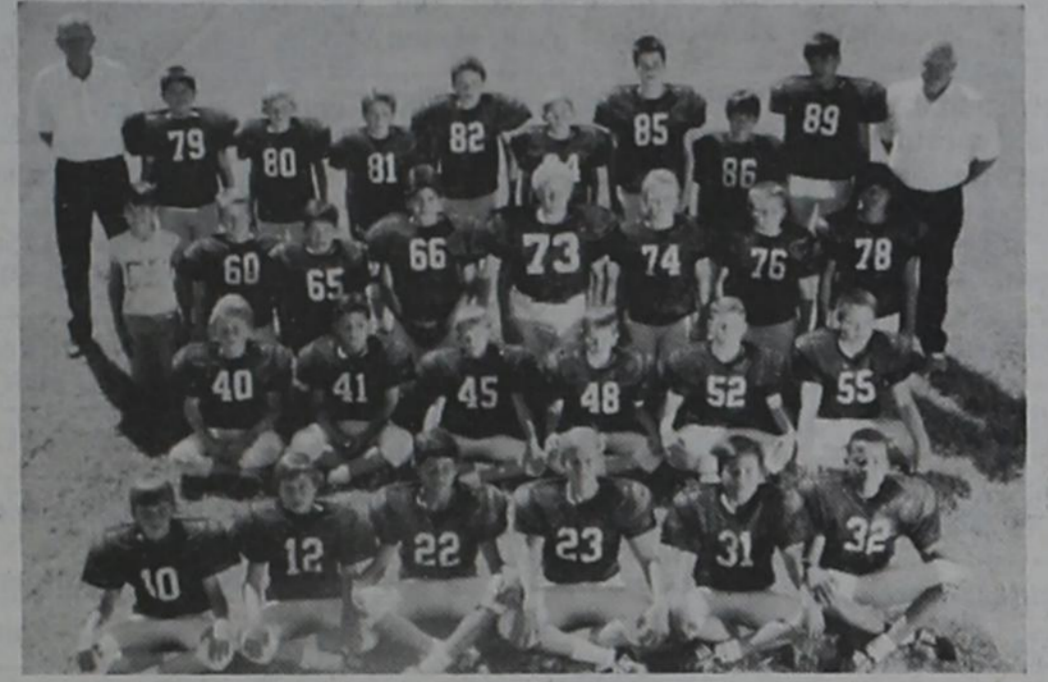

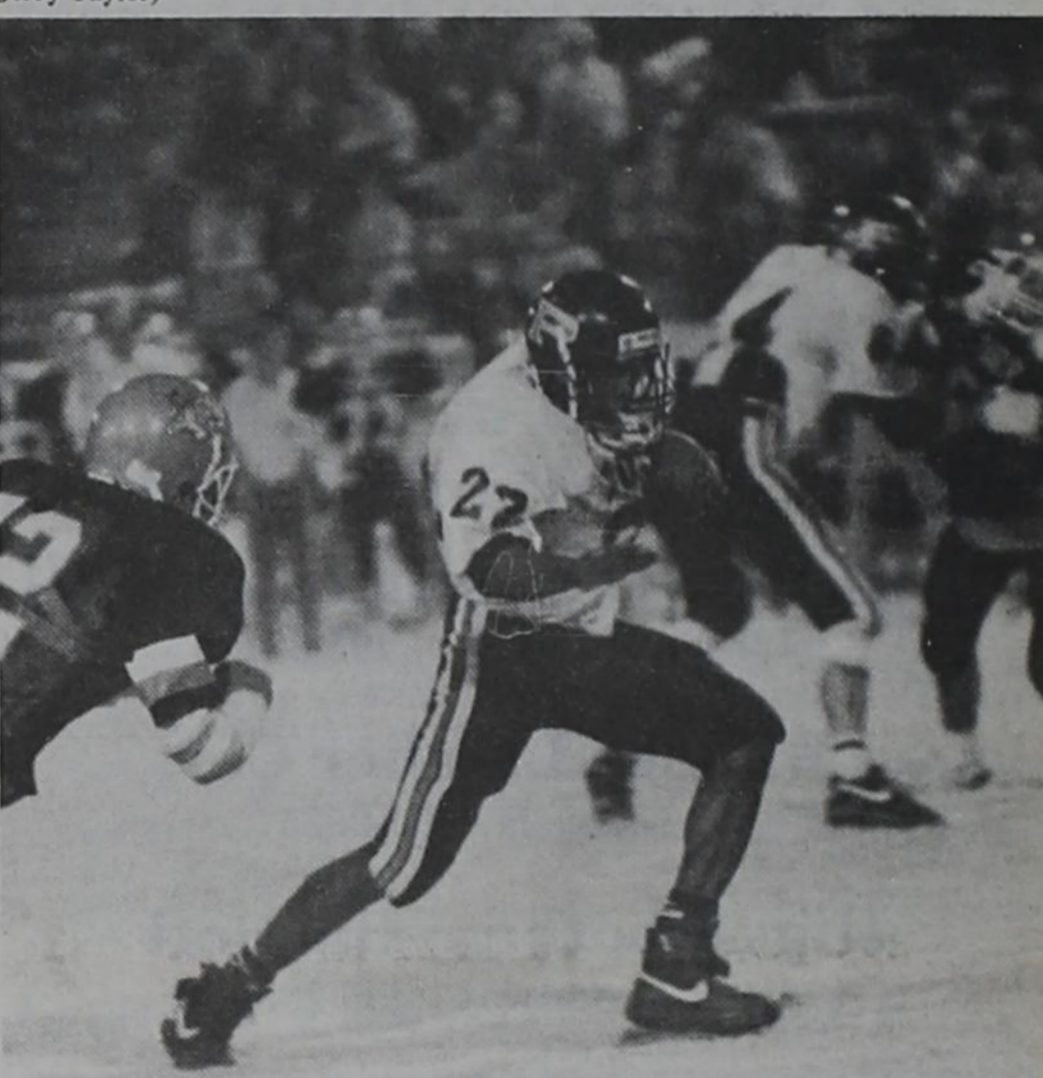

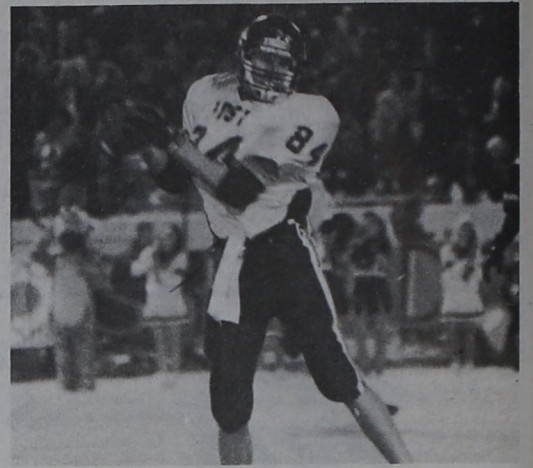
