

# Porcupines Open Post Antelopes at Regional Area Champs Finish 1989 Season 9-2-1

A steady downpour and an opportunistic Springtown Porcupine football team upended the Post Antelopes 24-12 at the Regional semi-final last Friday night in Abilene as the Bold Gold capped a 9-2-1 championship season.  
For more than three quarters of the game at Abilene both teams struggled through the cold rain, giving up the ball...but it was Springtown's conversion of the turnovers to scores that put the 'Lopes in a position they could not overcome.  
Springtown got its first touchdown with only 37 seconds left in the first half, following a 57 yard drive in 11 plays, using the quickness and speed of halfbacks Clint Hampton and Lance Campbell. Twice inside the five yard line quarterback Patrick Sherrill lost the handle on the football, but the 'Lopes couldn't get to it and the Porcupines kept the drive alive. Hampton scored from two yards out on third down and Joe Braun's kick put 7-0 on the board. The score looked good to Post fans, considering the weather and the field conditions.  
The heart-breaker for Post came on the fourth play into the third quarter, when quarterback Rance Sappington's pitchout to tailback Lannie Lee was picked off

## C-Community Election is Monday, Dec 4 for ASC

Ballots have been mailed to the Community ASC Committee election for C-Community (Kalgary, Verbena, Justiceburg) which will be held this year on December 4, 1989.  
A slate of five nominees will be developed for the community. Notices have been mailed to eligible voters in this community informing them of the right to nominate candidates by petition. Additional petitions may be obtained at the ASCS office.  
Persons nominated should be currently engaged in the operation of a farm or ranch and be well qualified for committee work. In general, a farmer is eligible to be a community committee member if the farmer lives in the community in which that person is eligible to vote. The duties of community committee members include:  
A. Serving as delegates to the community convention to elect a County ASC Committee member and two alternates and the county convention to select the Chair and Vice-Chairpersons of the County ASC Committee for the next year.  
B. Other duties as assigned by the County ASC Committee.  
ASC committee elections are open to all eligible voters without regard to race, color, religion, national origin, sex, age, marital status, physical or mental handicap.

## Candidate Filings Opens For March 13 Primary

Candidates seeking public office will be able to declare their intent to run when filings open December 4 in both Democratic and Republican parties for the March 13, 1990 primary election. Candidate filings deadline for the primary election is Tuesday, January 2, 1990.  
According to Garza County Clerk Sonny Gossett, candidates should first pick up a form from the clerk's office to designate a campaign treasurer and then file with their respective party headquarters.  
Local offices which will appear on the March 13 ballot include: county judge, county clerk, county treasurer, county commissioners precincts two and four and justices of the peace precincts one and four.

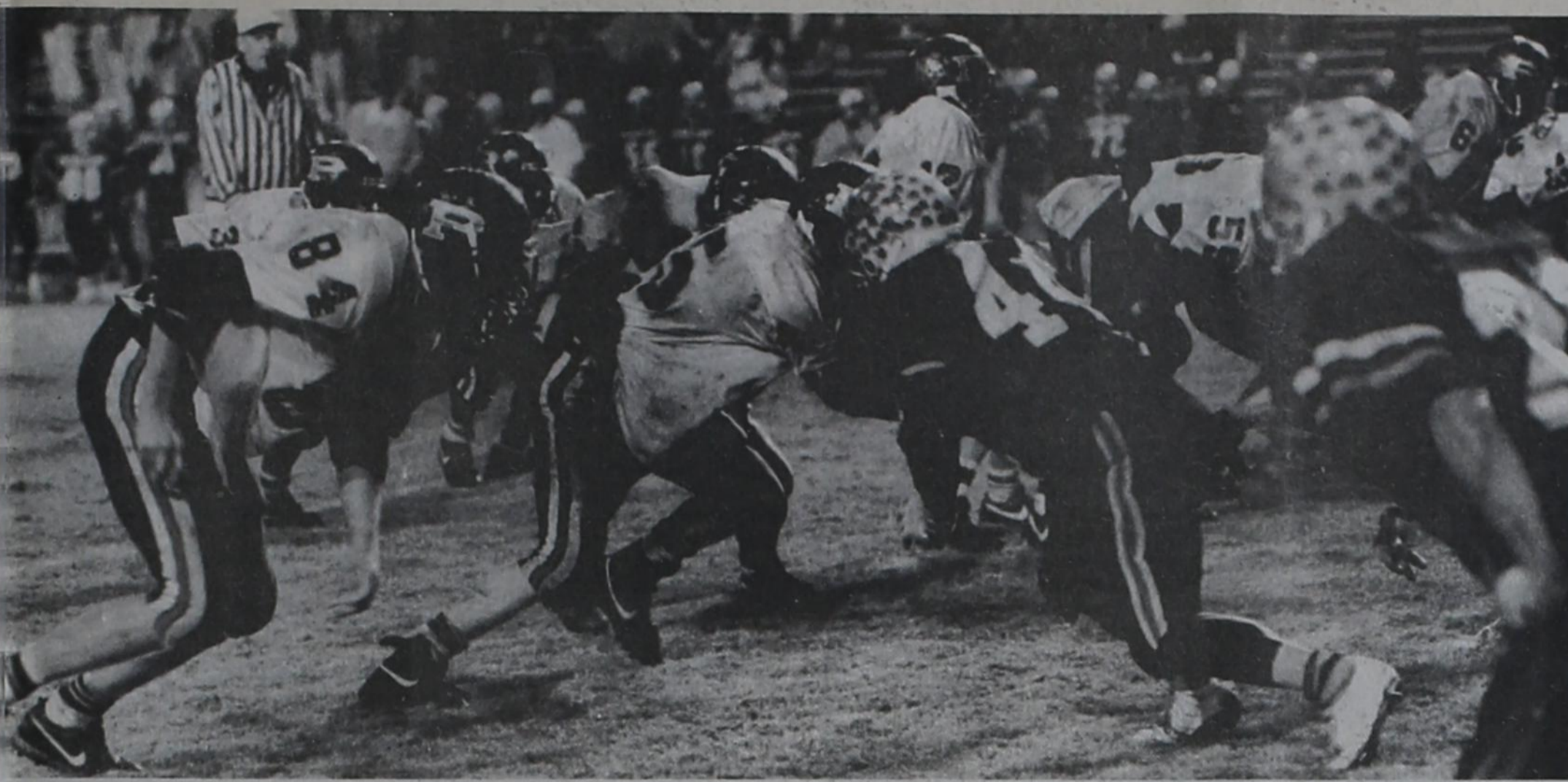

## Post ISD Board Endorses TASB 'Mandate Watch'

In response to property tax increases and an overwhelming outcry from school districts to stop the underfunding of state and federal mandates, the Texas Association of School Boards has launched a Mandate Watch campaign to keep close tabs on and to identify those bills or programs that put requirements on local school districts without providing appropriate funding to pay for them.

Although state and federal lawmakers have pledged "no new taxes," school boards throughout Texas have had to increase local property taxes in a scramble to find money to pay for new and continuing state-mandated programs. A statewide survey of property tax increases among local school districts conducted by TASB in September 1989 shows that school district property tax increases are averaging 10 percent across Texas, and local taxes are increasing at a rate approximately 2.5 times the rate of state aid increases.

TASB's Mandate Watch, which is supported and endorsed by the Post ISD Board of Trustees, is a challenge to state and federal lawmakers to stem the tide of underfunded mandates in Texas school districts.

In a resolution in support of the Mandate Watch, members of the Post ISD Board of Trustees encouraged "all state and federal elected officials to commit to ceasing the mandate madness and to work with TASB and Post ISD to provide an equitable method for adequately funding mandated programs."

## SPS's Proposed 'Cost of Fuel' Rate Cut Will Affect Area Customers

Southwestern Public Service Company retail customers, including the city of Post, will be affected by an SPS request for a lower "fuel-cost recovery factor" filed recently before the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT), which regulates the fuel-cost portion of electric rates.

The request will have an overall effect of lowering electric rates 9.2 percent, or \$42 million for the company's Texas customers.

"This reduction, on top of our 4.3 percent rate decrease completed earlier this year, will make our service area more competitive in attracting new industry and jobs," said SPS President and Chief Operating Officer Bill Helton. "We are pleased to pass on these savings to our customers. This new decrease is possible because of lower fuel and purchased-power expenses."

The cost of fuel to operate SPS power plants, plus the cost of power purchased from other companies, makes up about half of SPS's overall costs to serve customers. Electric utilities are not permitted to earn a profit on the cost of fuel or purchased power. Changes in these costs are passed on to the cus-

tomers.  
In Texas, the fuel-cost recovery factor may be adjusted periodically by filing with the PUCT. In New Mexico, Oklahoma and Kansas, SPS will pass on the savings through automatic fuel-cost adjustments.

"This decrease will make SPS one of the most competitive utilities in the state," said Helton. "SPS's average industrial rates already are lower than the averages for all re-

The amount of decrease will vary according to usage and rates applicable to different types of customers. Texas residential customers using 1,000 kilowatt hours a month on SPS's standard rate would see their monthly bills decline by \$4.87, from \$69.67 to \$64.80.

As provided by Sec. 11.14 of the Texas Tax Code, the County of Garza intends to continue to levy and collect ad valorem taxes on personal property not held for the production of income as required by law.

The County will hold a public hearing on the matter.

The hearing will be held on Monday, December 11, 1989 at 9 a.m. in the Commissioner's Court Room in the Court House in Post, Texas.

in mid-air by Springtown defensive end Chad Tedder, who had positioned himself between Sappington and Lee. Chedder raced untouched from the Post 49 to the end zone and with 10:04 on the clock, the extra point put the "Porqies" out front 14-0.

What hurt most about the turnover was the strong showing the Post offense had just demonstrated, taking the second half opening kickoff and marching from their own 39 to the 49.

Still, there was plenty of time for the Antelopes to recover, as they had done before...and after Springtown pulled out to a 17-0 lead following a field goal, the Antelope offense came to life...at about the same time that the rain stopped.

With 8:27 left in the game the 'Lopes mounted an eight play drive, starting at their own 28 yard line following a punt return by Darren Brown.

Jamie Perez slammed over right guard, and on second down Jacob Bustoz caught the Porcupine defense napping as he ripped over left guard, cut to his right and picked up a first down at the Springtown 43.

Floyd Slay hit right guard to the 35 and Brown went over right tackle, squirming his way to a first down at the 33.

Bustoz hit left guard again, cutting right and getting another first down at the 21.

A Matt Holly pass to Kevin Williams sailed out of bounds and on second down Slay would not be denied as he rammed over right guard, broke a tackle, then carried a defender five yards into the end zone.

Sappington's extra point kick was too short...the 'Lopes trailed by two touchdowns 17-6 with 5:36 left in the game.

The Porcupines slammed the come-from-behind victory door shut following the kickoff, when fullback Kyle Reeves on second down from the Springtown 47 hit the left guard spot and shot past the Antelope secondary to the end zone.

Leading 24-6, with 3:40 left in the game, the Porcupines began to celebrate.

Holly led the 'Lopes to another touchdown, following the kickoff return by Slay to the 33 yard line.

The nine play drive included a dramatic fourth down pass from Holly to Bustoz, setting up a first down at the Springtown 49.

Williams went over left guard, Holly's pass to Brown went incomplete, but a pass interference call on the Porcupines set up a first down at the 34. Holly was sacked to the 43 and then on second down he threw a pass to Bustoz who hauled it in at the 27. A roughing the passer penalty against Springtown put the ball at the 13.

Holly rolled to his right, and under pressure from three Porcupine defenders, threw the ball high into the right end zone corner to Bill Rankin, who used his height to wrestle the ball away for the Antelopes. The two point conversion pass attempt went incomplete and with nine seconds left in the game the 'Lopes looked at a 24-12 deficit.

Springtown ran out the clock following the squib kick as the Antelopes realized there just wasn't enough time left make that one last come-from-behind thrilling finish.

The Antelope defense played great football the first half, but the offense just couldn't move the ball consistently.

The first defensive turnover came on Springtown's second possession, when Sherrill's pass to Hampton was intercepted by Sappington at the Springtown 48 yard line. The offense stumbled and Rankin punted on fourth down into the end zone.

The defense held again, forcing a fourth down punt and punter Mark Bryant was unable to get the high snap as the Antelopes covered the ball at the nine yard line. Post fans could smell a touchdown in the making.

The offense got to the four yard line, then on third down Sappington's pass was batted down at the line of scrimmage and on fourth the snap from

center fell to the ground.

After both teams traded punts, the Porcupines began a drive with 10:44 left in the half, but the one play drive was cut short when Sappington recovered a fumble by Campbell after the halfback was hit by a swarming Post left defensive side.

The turnover set the 'Lopes up at the

Porcupine 32 but four plays later the team had slipped back through a sack and a bad connection between center and quarterback, setting up a fourth down punt from the Post 36 yard line. (See Wednesday's edition of The Post Dispatch for the season wrap-up details).
