Garza Memorial Hospital Audit Shows Sound Financial Position

Larry Anderson, of Mason, Warner and Company said that Garza Memorial Hospital was "in a sound financial position" when he presented the 1988-89 audit to GMH's Board of Directors, meeting in a regular session Tuesday, December 12.

Anderson said that the utilization trends reflected in GMH's audit were common to all area hospitals, although it was encouraging that hospital utilization here was up slightly.

In other business the hospital board approved the application of James A. Balch, M.D. of Lubbock as consulting staff pathologist. Dr.

Balch replaces Dr. Gerds as consulting pathologist.

Recommendations to raise hospital room rates and to consider employee raises were tabled and

will be considered at a later date.

The board voted to turn delinquent accounts in the amount of \$208.46 over to HRS and delinquent accounts in the amount

\$2301.65 over to Retail Merchants.

Program for Delinquent FmHA Loans

In a recently issued report of the Texas Agricultural Loan Mediation Program (TALM), officials say that the state is likely to receive more than \$3 for each dollar spent furnishing mediation services to delinquent Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) borrowers.

The loan mediation program at Texas Tech University was certified in November 1988 by the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture as the state agency to mediate between delinquent farm borrowers and their lenders under the Agricultural Act of 1987. The legislation required the FmHA, the Federal Land Bank Associations and the Production Credit Association to restructure distressed loans if restructuring proved to be a less-costly alternative than foreclosure.

"We don't get that kind of return from money spent in the judicial system which involves legal fees, court time and other financial elements," said Gary Condra, director of the program at Texas Tech.

Condra said the projected savings to the state does not take into consideration the benefits of mediation to other creditors. Participation in the program also includes organizations such as commercial banks and trade creditors.

"For example, when an FmHA loan is restructured, there are generally a number of other creditors who will receive at least a portion of the debts owed to them, which they would not have received in bankruptcy or involuntary liquidation of FmHA debts," he said.

The report, issued for the period from October 1, 1988, through September 30 this year, also states that of the 79 cases that were closed, 64 ended with an agreement between the lender and the borrower. Of those, 29 cases were completed by restructuring the loan, and the remaining 35 cases involved were either buy-out of the loan at net recovery value, voluntary liquidation, debt settlement or some other mutually agreed upon solution.

State Pesticide Law Changes Proposed by TDA

Several substantial changes in the section of the Texas Agriculture Code which regulates use of pesticides have been proposed by the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) and could become effective in January.

One of five public hearings on the proposed new and amended regulations will be held in Lubbock at 10 a.m. December 20, it is reported by the West Texas Agricultural Chemicals Institute (WTACI).

The Lubbock hearing will be conducted by TDA in the auditorium of the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center on FM 1294, just east of I-27 at the Shallowater exit.

Under the TDA proposal, several additions and amendments will be made in Chapter 7 of the code, which regulates use of chemicals under authority of the Texas Pesticide Control Act.

"Who's Who" students also compete for over \$65,000 in scholarship awards and participate in

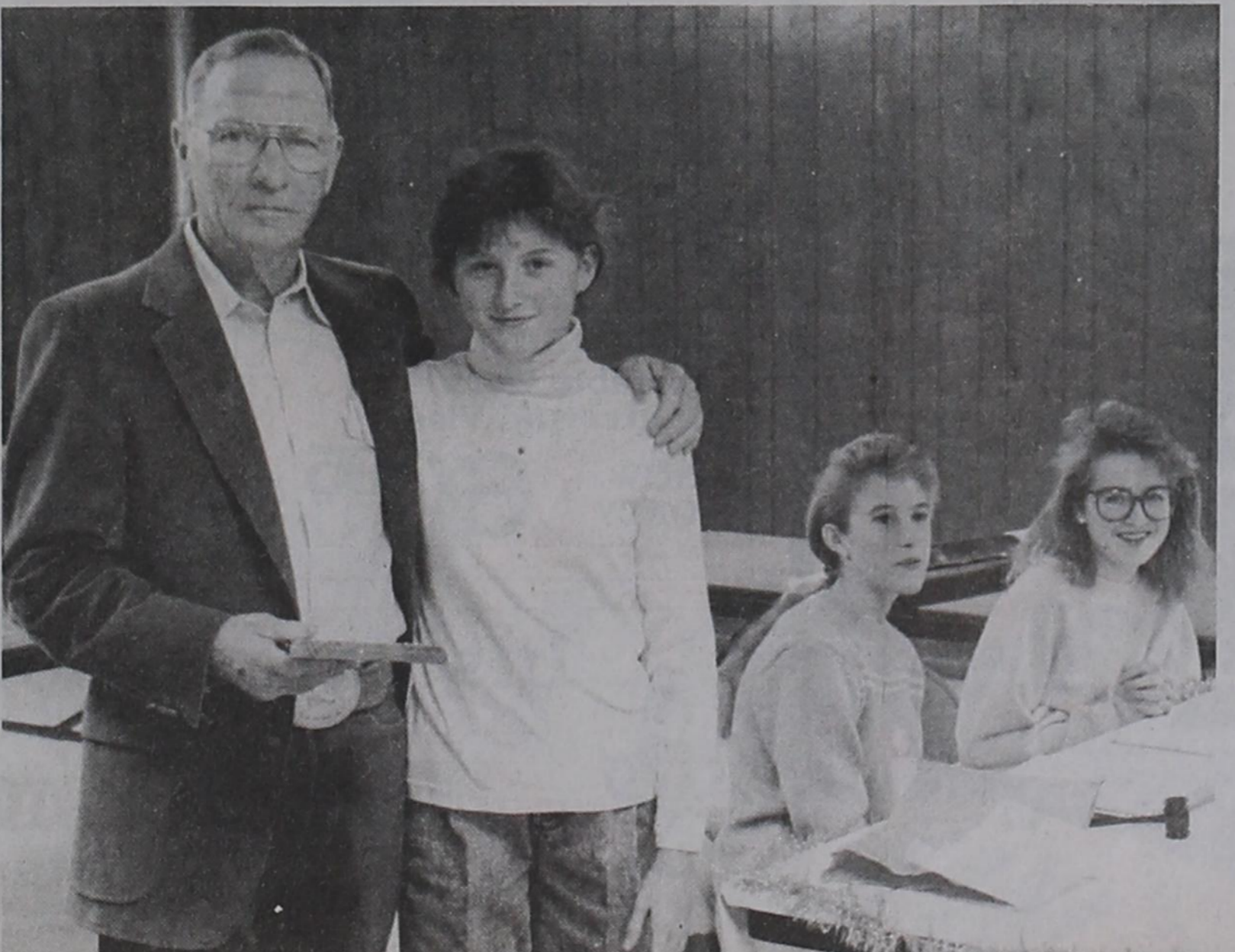
publication's annual opinion poll of teen attitudes. The book is distributed to 15,000 high schools, colleges, universities and public libraries throughout the country.

The coach was quoted as saying, "Jeremy gave up riding the good buses, sitting in the honor section at pep rallies and eating steak with the big boys because the team needed him."

As he walked up to accept his award, the varsity team saluted him with "high fives."

The Unicorns, by the way, have been designated as the "Team of the Decade" in Texas based on their record of 99 wins, 22 losses and two ties. The high school has an enrollment of 1,467 students.

A Tax on Christmas

As millions of Texans stretch their Christmas budgets buying gifts, decorating their homes, and otherwise preparing for the holiday, they should keep in mind that not all Christmas items and services are subject to state sales tax, State Comptroller Bob Bullock said.

"In order to stretch their shopping dollar by not paying more in taxes than necessary, consumers should be aware of what is and is not taxable," Bullock said.

Most traditional holiday decorations, including the tree, ornaments and Christmas lights, are taxable. Food staples such as fruits, vegetables, breads and meats, are not subject to sales tax, but prepared food usually is. Liquor, beer and wine are taxable. Candy canes and party trays are taxable, but eggnog and fruitcakes are not. Frozen tamales are not taxable, but hot tamales are.

A turkey dinner prepared at home would be tax free, but a turkey dinner at your favorite restaurant would be taxed.

A photograph of the children with Santa is taxable because it's tangible personal property. A gift wrapping booth at the mall would not charge sales tax, but if the store that sold the merchandise wraps the gift, tax is collected because the wrapping is a service connected with a sale. Fruit and vegetable plants are not taxed, but other plants, such as poinsettias, are. You would pay a tax on a rose bush, but not on an orange tree.

Having a home professionally decorated for Christmas is not taxable unless the decorations, lights or other ornaments are rented from the company that puts up the decorations.

During the Christmas season, may shoppers turn to mail order catalogs to avoid the local Yuletide shopping mall crush. Many mail order catalogs charge a "use tax" if they have any business activity in Texas.

A use tax is charged to the consumer to insure that the out-of-state catalog store doesn't have an unfair advantage over Texas merchants. The tax is collected by the company and sent to the State Comptroller's office.

A company can be considered engaged in business in Texas if it has representatives here. The definition of "engaged in business" in Texas has been expanded to include many mail order companies.

"Consumers should be aware of what is and isn't taxable because sometimes business people make

honest mistakes," according to the State Comptroller's office.

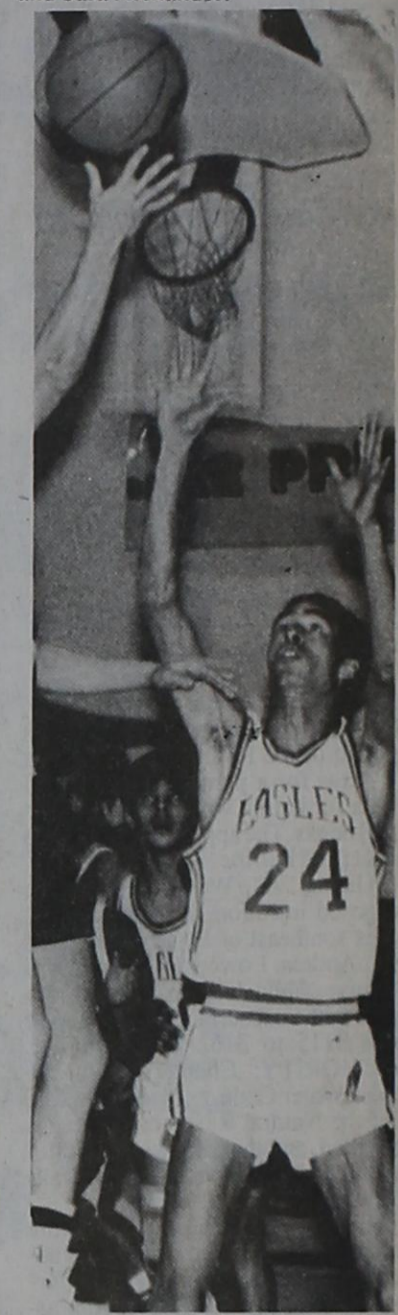
