# 1990 Garza County Junior Livestock Sale Totals \$49,588

The 1990 Garza County Junior Livestock Show and Sale held last week was termed successful and profitable. Sixty-one exhibitors sold 70 animals through the premium sale for \$30,950 plus \$5,795 in addons, \$11,454 in floor prices, \$1,388 in awards and prize money paid for a total of \$49,588.

The Grand Champion Steer was shown by Amber Cooper with Amanda Richardson exhibiting the Reserve Grand Champion Steer Saturday morning. Both girls are members of the Lucky Clover 4-H

Steven Childers, Southland FFA member, captured the Grand Champion Swine trophy Thursday night with this heavyweight Chesterwhite in the Other Pure Breed Class. Amber Hammond, also a Lucky Clover 4-H'er, took the Reserve Grand Champion Swine trophy with her lightweight

Exhibiting the Grand Champion Lamb Friday night was Dusti Cash, a Post 4-H Club member. Dusti won with her heavyweight Medium Wool. Lance Bagby, a Post FFA member, won the Reserve Grand Champion Lamb trophy with his lightweight Finewool Cross.

Brandon Bird and Russ Bird, Post 4-H'ers, exhibited the Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Heifers respectively.

The 25th annual GCJLA Show and Sale began on Tuesday afternoon with six steers weighed-in and four heifers checked-in. A total of 103 hogs and 65 lambs were weighed-in Wednesday afternoon. A total of 98 exhibitors entered the 178 animals.

At the award ceremony prior to the premium sale on Saturday, James Dye was honored with a plaque for his meritorious service for 20 years to the Garza County Junior Livestock Association.

## **Program Seeks New Class of** Young Leaders

The Texas Agricultural Lifetime Leadership (TALL) program, designed to link modern agriculture with industry and other segments of society, is now open for applicants for its second class. The deadline for consideration is February 15, said Dr. L.S. Pope, who coordinates the program for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"TALL is designed to assist young men and women associated with agriculture in developing leadership skills, " Pope said.

The first class of 24 members visited 10 agricultural areas of Texas, as well as Washington, D.C., and northern Europe. During the two-year program, members were able to interact with more than 175 outstanding leaders, Pope said. A similar schedule is planned for

Group II. The basis for selection into TALL is evidence of leadership ability and desire to take on decision-making roles in Texas agriculture, Pope said. To enter, candidates must go through a rigorous selection process, including an in-

TALL is sponsored largely from outside grants and scholarships, but participants must pay part of the cost. Members must be between the ages of 25 and 40 and be involved

in agricultural pursuit in Texas. 'Agricultural leaders must make some critical decisions in the years ahead," Pope said. "They must be well-informed on key issues and must recognize the complex society in which we live. Also, they must be able to speak out and willing to address problems facing agricul-

"It is important that they interact effectively with leaders outside of agriculture."

## Commissioners Receive Maps for Future Lake Alan Henry Road

Karl Bednarz and Frank Phillips of the Texas Highway Department presented right-of-way maps for Lake Alan Henry Road, an extension of FM 2458, to Garza County Commissioners' Court in a meeting held Monday, January 29.

The highway department representatives told the commissioners that six or seven parcels of land would have to be acquired to build the road and recommended that the county attorney begin a title search on these parcels.

After some discussion, Bednarz and Phillips agreed to redraw the maps taking the easement from one side instead of both sides, because of the high cost involved in rebuilding fences on both sides of the road as opposed to one side.

The revised maps will be presented to the court at a later date.

#### Letters to the Editor

(The following is a copy of a letter mailed by City of Post Mayor Giles C. McCrary to Sen. Phil Gramm, Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, U.S. Rep. Charles Stenholm, State Rep. David Counts and Judge Rankin, regarding new solid waste regulations.) Dear Senator Gramm:

I am pleased to know of your concern regarding the impact of new federally mandated solid waste regulations on sparsely settled non-

industrial counties in your district. Over the past several months we have given considerable attention to our landfill operation and its future. As we have been successful with existing regulations we had made plans to continue serving our citizens with a convenient local landfill. However, upon closer examination it became apparent that compliance would not be economically feasible, due to our small

Our city manager attended several area and state solid waste meetings and was appointed to the South Plains Area Task Force set up to try to find landfill solutions on a regional basis. During these several meetings it was brought out that the writers of the new regulations knew all along that compliance was not possible at a near reasonable cost unless each landfill served at least 50,000 customers.

Our county has an area slightly larger than Dallas County which has a population of almost 2,000,000 people. We have only 5,000 people and our two "downstream" neighboring counties have a combined population of about 2,000. In order to include 50,000 people in the areas away from Lubbock, a landfill district would have to be created which would be larger than some of the states in our Union.

I feel that I speak for all of the elected officials of Garza County when I state that we strongly support any practical and effective measures to assure a clean environment. Most of the Nation and large populations of the State of Texas could well benefit from the new measures. But, we feel that inflexible laws which do not address exceptional situations destroy the confidence of our citizens in the responsiveness and competence of all levels of government.

# Agriculture, Oil, Tourism Lead Economy into 1990s Actually, I think it's exciting to be same, but there is just enough gutsy

When you talk about business and industry in Post and Garza County, you have to include a wide variety of economic forces...including agriculture, petroleum, retail and tourism.

Any attempt the set dollar values of these four major industries here would be difficult, for we have traditionally been heavily dependent on agriculture and oil production for most of our livelihood. Until the closing of Burlington's textile facility here in 1983, we counted that operation as a mainstay of employment.

In the 1980s we saw a lot of changes...the biggest factors of course were Burlington's closing, with all the pain of losing 300 or more local jobs, and then the dramatic drop in oil prices, which only now is beginning to level off.

The good news is that in the process industry. of living with these economic changes, we have found new sources of income...and discovered a growing industry related to highway travel.

For years we have known that Post is a "great watering hole," to quote a frequent traveller through here, and as we enter the 1990s we can see just how important our two U.S. Highways through here will mean to our

U.S. Hwy 84 is one of the most travelled roadways connecting the northern plains and New Mexico to the metropolitan area south and east. Thousands of motorists cruise through out town every day...and hundreds of them stop here to buy fuel, food and other services.

They may not be sight-seeing, but they are tourists, and this is a tourism

Most of our new businesses which have opened in the past five years have been related to this highway traffic and the future continues to look bright for this part of our econ-

Another factor in our tourism is the continued growth of the Garza Theatre, drawing hundreds of out-oftown guests with every production. This year the theatre will offer six performances of each play, which will add to the impact locally.

It is estimated that every visitor to Post, whether stopping for 10 minutes or staying several hours, will spend approximately \$20. Multiply that times the thousands per year who stop and you can see how important this industry is to us.

I believe it will be even more important, especially with the potential of Lake Alan Henry just 15 miles southeast at Justiceburg and the pos-sibility of the Post Lake just a few miles east of town.

Still, our friends working the "oil patch" continue to provide the backbone of our employment base. Although a lot has changed the past six years, the hard working and "neversay-quit" attitude of our petroleum related businesses are inspiration to anyone who wonders why we keep

We are really fortunate to be the home of such enthusiastic and determined people. When the United States runs short of foreign oil to import during this decade, I am confident that our friends in the Garza County oil fields will still be producing fuel, even though the vast majority of consumers will probably never appreciate fully our contribution to a vibrant nation.

I also believe that farming and ranching will maintain its importance to our region, and for basically the same reasons, we provide essentials that are going to continue to be in demand...fiber and food. The weather will always be a nagging problem...but somehow our farmers and ranchers hold on to their faith...and as one of my "old-time" cotton farmer friends told me just before we got that good rain a couple weeks ago: "I remember it rained one year real good."







# **Sharp Fuel Cost Increase**

The dramatic rise in the cost of diesel fuel nationwide since late December has placed a heavy financial burden on Texas trucking companies as they start the new year, according to the president of the state's largest trucking trade association.

Texas trucking companies, for the most part, are in a survival mode as we start the new decade," said Robert Floyd, president of the Texas Motor Transportation Association (TMTA). "With diesel fuel cost increase of up to 40 percent over last year, some companies are going to go out of business unless some relief is given to them soon. The increase in diesel fuel costs is a serious threat to the health of the trucking industry.

Diesel fuel costs both in Texas and nationwide have increased from 35 to 40 percent in the past month due in part to a severe cold snap in December that dramatically increased usage of home heating oil. In addition, analysts say, a combination of events including an explosion at the nation's second largest oil refinery and events in Panama that have delayed ship traffic through the Panama Canal have contributed to the sharp rise in the price of diesel fuel.

The increase has hit Texas truckers particularly hard, Floyd said, because many transportation companies are still suffering from the effects of the downturn in the Texas economy that began in the mid 1980s. "Texas trucking companies, on the average, are barely breaking even as it is," Floyd said. "Any additional expense could be devastating for the industry, particularly smaller companies. Such a large and sudden increase in expenses might make some of the smaller companies give up and shut their

Under that scenario, Floyd said, many communities in Texas might see a deterioration in transportation service until surviving trucking companies can fill the void. The Railroad Commission of Texas (RCT) which oversees the trucking industry and insures transportation service to all Texas communities, will soon consider interim rate increase proposals that will reflect the increase in the cost of diesel fuel.

"Many of the rate bureaus that represent the various segments of the trucking industry have already approached the Commission with proposals to increase the fuel surcharge that is built into transportation rates," Floyd said. "We have made sure that all three commissioners are aware of the seriousness of the problem, and we believe they will be looking into solutions to the problem as early as next week."




