"UNCLE DAN" HOUGHTON DIES AFTER SHORT ILLNESS

Uncle Dan Houghton suffered a stroke of paralysis a few days ago, but his friends thought that he was getting better when suddenly he passed away, about 3 o'clock Wednesday morning.

Bro. Houghton was born in Liverpool, England, April 18, 1844, came to America in 1867 landing at Galveston. He worked for the Texas & Pacific for forty years but retired some years ago and has resided in Baird for the past seven years. Bro. Houghton was reared in the Episcopal Church, but had joined the M. E. Church, South eight years ago and was a member of the Baird Methodist church and order of Knights of Pythias and was interred by that order. He is survived by his wife and three children.

The funeral services was held at the Methodist Church yesterday, Thursday at 3 p. m., conducted by Rev. Cal C. Wright, assisted by Rev. Joe R. Mayes, Pastor of the Baptist Church and Rev. A. W. Yell, Pastor of the Presbyterian Church.

SHAW MOTOR CO. BUILDING

Modern and Well Equipped Building Being Erected on Site of Old Building

The Shaw Motor Company, whose building was badly damaged by fire the early part of December, is rebuilding, the work of tearing away the damaged part of the building beginning Tuesday morning by a force of workmen under W. L. Cook, who has the contract for erecting the new building. The new building will be made of corrugated iron, walls 14 feet high with a flat roof of tar and gravel. The roof will be built so as to be used when the temporary wall will be replaced with brick.

The new building will be arranged altogether different on the inside so as to give more room in both the show room and repair shop, which will be equipped with the most modern machinery. Mr. H. H. Shaw, the manager, informs us that the new building will be ready for occupancy by the latter part of February.

On the roof of the building, which will be flat will be painted the name Baird in large white letters. This is done at the request of the Ford Motor Company, who have been awarded contracts for carrying the U. S. mails by airplane it being for the convenience of the pilots in distinguishing the town over which they are flying. They request that the name of the town extend east and west with the top of the letters to the north with an arrow pointing to the north immediately following the name of the town. A similar request is made of the ten thousand Ford dealers in the United States.

CODY WILSON DIED AT OLNEY

T. C. (Cody) Wilson, age 51 years a long time resident of Baird, died Wednesday night at Olney, following a long illness. The body, accompanied by members of the family, was brought to Baird today for burial, the funeral being held at 3 o'clock at the Presbyterian Church, and interment made in Ross Cemetery.

Mr. Wilson has been in ill health for a long time and with his family had been on a trip to North Texas, and were returning to Baird when he became too ill to travel and the family stopped at Olney, where he died after several weeks illness. 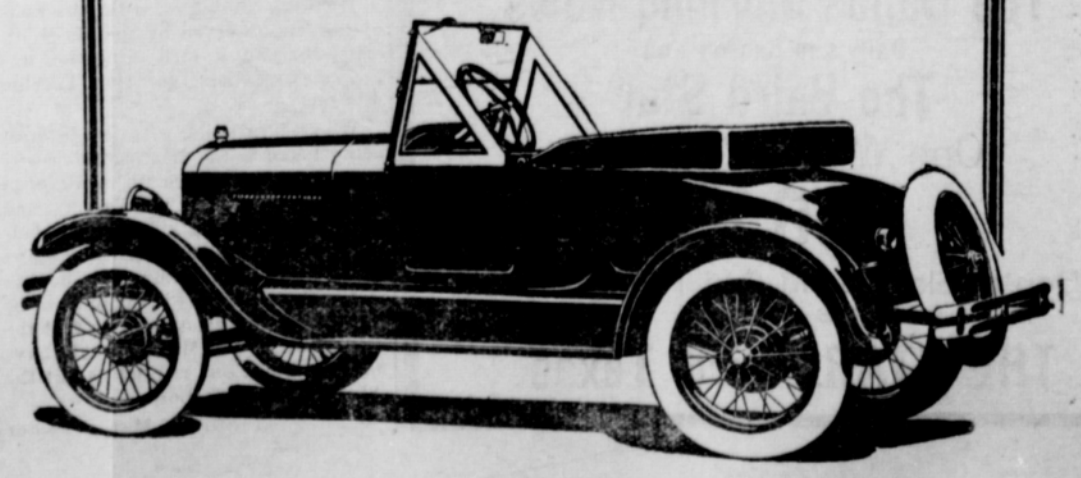

MAY TURN TO BLUE FOR ARMY UNIFORM

Not Enough Olive Drab to Clothe Soldiers.

Washington, D. C.—A careful survey
of American resources for the manu-
facture of khaki breeches has con-
vinced army officials that if it became
necessary to put a force of two million
men into the field in less than eight
months, most of them would have to
fight in their shirt tails.

Faced by this appalling possibility,
the industrial mobilization wing of the
national defense planning machinery
started a study of its own. It found
that it would be entirely possible com-
pletely to uniform two million men
from head to foot in 15 days provided
blue cloth instead of khaki was used.

The trouble with the khaki outfit is
that not enough cloth of that color is
in ordinary civilian use. There are
ample stocks of blue and gray, both
wool and cotton fabric. The result has
been the working out of a tentative
blue training uniform which could be
supplied in ample volume for a mobil-
ization, to be discarded as units com-
pleted their preliminary preparation
and moved out for final training near
the zone of operations.

By that time complete khaki outfits
with tan leather trappings would be
ready for them, giving them the neces-
sary degree of low visibility in the
field.

The contemplated blue training uni-
forms would consist of a four-button
blouse, dressed with red shoulder
knots to give a military touch; blue
cloth overseas caps; blue breeches,
tan canvas leggings of the lacing vari-
ety and black shoes. Tan shoes would
be preferable, but the survey dis-
closed only a limited quantity of tan
Munson last shoes in the market while
there are always plenty of blacks to
be had.

The matter has not passed as yet
beyond a study stage in the War de-
partment.

Iron Chain of Civil War Unearthed by Landslide

Hickman, Ky.—Buried under a bluff
since the site was surrendered by Con-
federate soldiers in 1861, part of the
mile-long chain, composed of 10-pound
iron links that was stretched across
the Mississippi river by soldiers of the
South to prevent the passage of Union
gunboats, has been bared at Colum-
bus, Ky., 20 miles from here, by a
landslide that hurled two acres of
ground into the stream.

Sixty feet of the chain were ex-
posed by the slide. The anchor to
which the Kentucky end of the chain
was attached has been dug out. Its
shaft is 16 feet long and the arms
7 feet.

Offer Wild Horses for Sale at \$5 a Head

Portland, Ore.—Stockmen in
eastern Oregon have promised
that they will deliver between
30,000 and 50,000 wild horses to
the railroad at \$5 a head if there

Wade, field officer for the Ore-
gon Humane society, reported,
on his return to Portland after
two months in the eastern por-
tion of the state. Already the
animals are being rounded up in
the southern portion of the state
and shipped to Petaluma, Cal.,
he declared.

Among the wild horses is some
stock of value, said Mr. Wade,
but the majority are small,
scrubby animals. He favored the
idea of using them for fer-
tilizer, thus making room on the
range for cattle with real mar-
ketable value.

Mother's Vow Results in Miniature Church

Cresco, Iowa.—The mother of John
Gaertner, a French explorer, who was
with Napoleon's forces at the burning
of Moscow, vowed that if God would
safely return her son she would build
a church.

The son returned, but his mother,
because of financial difficulties, was
unable to carry out her plan. Her
granddaughter, Mrs. Mary Anna Hu-
ber, however, took up the work, and
the result was the building in 1885 of
St. Anthony's Catholic chapel.

The church is of native lime rock.
It is 11 feet wide and 17 feet long. It
has four stained-glass windows, a tall
belfry, a cross, four pews, a center
aisle, a main altar and two side al-
tars. It seats eight persons.

The tiny edifice, dedicated to the
memory of John Gaertner, was main-
tained by the Huber family until 1924,
when St. Anthony's Chapel associa-
tion, formed by 65 grandchildren of
Mary Anna Huber, took over its care.

More Texas Cotton Mills.



Unless all indications are wrong, Texas will build a number of cotton mills in 1926. Texas cotton mills have steadily been making money. There is more capital in the state with which to build than ever before. There is less farm indebtedness. Money is seeking profitable investment, and farm loans can not absorb all the idle capital. It will almost be forced to go into manufacturing. A good start for 1926 was made on January 7, when a number of capitalists met at Center Point to study the feasibility of erecting a cotton mill there. Center Point is a place in Kerr County of less than 1,000 population, but it is on the Guadalupe River and has plenty of water power to operate the \$1,000,000 mill that is contemplated. Texas should invest at least \$10,000,000 in cotton mills in 1926 and in all probability it will do so.

Texas Wool Enriches the East.

Texas produces more wool and mohair than any other state in the union, but all of it is sent east to be manufactured. The state once had two woolen mills—one at New Braunfels and one at Waco—but for some reason their operation was discontinued. That was many years ago, when Texans had an idea that factories could not be made profitable in Texas. The woolen mills in the state quit business more because there was no one interested enough and enthusiastic enough to keep them running than because they did not pay. The principal owner of the Waco mills often talked to this writer about the 20 and 25 per cent profits that were being made, but he was temperamental and nervous and when he became tired of the work there was no one interested enough to take his place. Men with money reasoned that banks could make as large dividends as mills and without so much effort, so why worry with factories? "Let the East have them and sell us our goods." But times are changing, and Texas should be manufacturing Texas wool.

Texas Grapefruit Best.

If you eat grapefruit and have tried that grown in the Rio Grande Valley of Texas in comparison with the California and Florida fruit, you know that the Texas grapefruit is by far the best. Grocers all know this and yet they buy and sell about as much California and Florida grapefruit as ever. Neither grocers nor housekeepers appear to give any special preference to the Texas product—they buy whatever is offered them and more with regard to the looks than the quality. Every Texas grapefruit should have "Texas" stamped on it, and consumers should insist on getting the home products. If we are going to build up Texas we should use Texas products, especially when they are as good as those grown elsewhere.

Oil Fields Spreading.

It has not been many years since Spindle Top, near Beaumont, was about the only oil field known to Texans that was considered worth while. There was some oil development around Corsicana, but not enough to interest many people. Where is "the" oil field of Texas now? It can't be definitely located in any part of the state, for it seems to be just anywhere in Texas that capital decides to go down in search of oil. The development of gas is going right along with oil. Gas is being produced faster than capital can be found to confine and pipe it for use of fuel. Geologists say that Texas has hardly started on the production of oil and gas and that there are riches beneath the surface of the soil hardly yet dreamed of.

Those New Year Resolutions.

Did you make any resolutions for the New Year? Have you broken any of them yet? Perhaps you are answering yes to both questions. Most people are weak and need a constant "renewing of the spirit". There is no need to be discouraged over failure, even over repeated failures. There are few of us who can keep our spiritual and moral batteries charged for an entire year without a renewal. Every day starts a new year for each of us. Why not make resolutions daily if that is necessary to their keeping. I take my physical "setting up" exercises regularly every morning, and then have to pound myself occasionally during the day if I sit too long at a typewriter. An exercise of that kind once a year would do very little good, but I keep fairly fit by the constant effort. That is not a bad way to go about insuring the keeping of your resolutions.

Roller-Bearing Trains on Concrete Beds Seen

Chicago.—A new age of transportation with crack passenger trains running safely at terrific speeds on concrete roadways reinforced with steel trusses was predicted by Frank H. Alfred of Detroit, president of the Pere Marquette railway, at the meeting of the American Railway association.

Cars of the new trains will run on roller bearings and their speed will be almost as fast as airplanes.

Mr. Alfred, with the assistance of Paul Chapman, engineer, has worked out the plan.

"To the airplane theory, our answer is 'safety,'" said the Pere Marquette president. "The new roadbed and bearings will give railroad trains speed comparable to that of the planes and the superior safety of the rails will continue."

CONGRESSMEN GET STRANGE REQUESTS

Appeals Often Test the Wit of Legislator.

Washington.—Your congressman's mail, which attains considerable volume during the season, is an odd assortment of letters, containing everything, from facts to fiction, from truth to trouble, from nuggets of suggestion to "nut" requests. If the legislator has a sense of humor he may come to enjoy the latter; the difficulty lies in knowing whether the writer really meant to be funny. Here is a letter that came to a certain legislator:

"I urge that a commission be appointed to go to Germany and lay the matter before the authorities there, pointing out that the surrender of Bergdoll by the Germans would add very materially in smoothing out the feeling engendered by the late war. Upon Germany's surrender of Bergdoll to the United States, I would have him shown at theaters in different parts of the country and the proceeds taken in at the door applied to the care and maintenance of some invalid overseas veteran. If such proceedings are contrary to any laws or treaties now existing, would suggest that such treaty action be taken as will make this possible."

Wants Male and Female Fish.

This letter happens to mention the slacker Bergdoll, although it might refer to any topic under the sun. One congressman tells of "an old fellow who wrote asking for a male and female fish, so that he could go into the business of raising fish, and he also wanted a law compelling people to eat fish at least once each week." Many a legislator is asked for a lock of the President's hair to be raffled at some entertainment for charity.

"The funniest I've ever had," said this congressman "is from an ardent peace advocate, who wanted us to obtain from the barber of the secretary of state some hair trimmings. In this instance the secretary of state was Hughes, and the trimmings wanted were whiskers."

"I keep in a separate file the letters making odd requests," said another congressman. "Among them is one from a man in my state, although not a resident of my district, informing me that he wanted to come to Washington in order that he might settle a dispute. He was a stakeholder for two of his friends and wanted to know if it were possible for me to obtain him a railway pass, inasmuch as I had been discussing railroad legislation. He naively stated that he had no other reason for coming to Washington, that he was not particularly interested in what congress was doing, but he did want to settle the bet between his friends fairly and without prejudice. The subject of the wager was whether one of the paintings in the rotunda showed an Indian with five or six toes on one of his feet! At first I thought that it was a josh letter, but found out later that the man was regarded as a sort of a Solomon in all disputes in the section in which he lived, and that he had written in good faith."

Answers Them All.

One legislator, instead of paying no attention to peculiar requests, takes pains to answer every one. "I make it a point to answer them because they might not seem as absurd to the writer as they do to me," he explained.

A congressman who has delivered lectures on patent law says that "not a week goes by without requests from inventors. The latest one asked if it is possible to patent a device that will prevent the juice from a grapefruit from squirting on one's shirt front. Since radio has become such a fad I have received more than a hundred letters asking if I could have the Navy department furnish sets free of charge."

"We don't get as many letters as we used to from persons who claim to have solved the problem of perpetual motion, but we have dozens of requests for recipes for home brew."

"About a year ago we received a most peculiar composition. We puzzled over it, then sent it to a decoding expert. He found it contained a request for flower seeds and for the Congressional Record. After we had complied with his request the writer explained that he had written in code to see if his congressman was mentally keen enough to decode it." Now he declares that his congressman is the brightest man in the country.

"Another letter suggested that the money owed to the United States by the allies be used to construct a bridge across the Atlantic ocean."

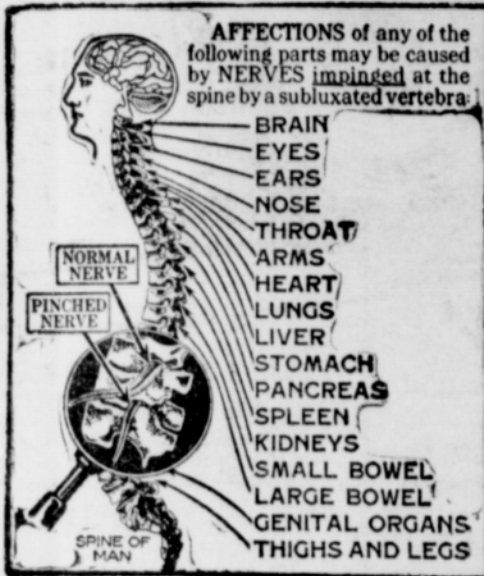
