The annual Taba'na Yuan'e "Sunrise Wind Ceremony" will be held tomorrow morning, with "Chief" Frank Runkles, assisted by Ken LeBlanc, performing the ancient custom beginning at 6:15 a.m. adjacent to the south side of South Lake, just off U.S. Hwy 84 near the Community Action Center. Following the ceremony, the Algerita Art Center will conduct an open

house and reception, featuring antiques and special exhibits. There is no charge to attend the ceremony or the art show.

Taba'na Yuan'e is a careful observance of an ancient Plains Indian spring ritual, which begins with the lighting of the fire and construction of the circle

The Taba'na Yuan'e tradition, which dates to earliest memories of the Indians, began here in 1906 when early pioneers in Garza County recalled the

Runkles has been faithfully keeping the ceremony true to its original form since 1973. Before he became involved with the annual ritual, the custom was preserved for 40 years by early Post resident Noah Stone.

According to the Indian legend, if the wind is from the east or northeast, the year will be good one. A north or northwest wind means an average year. West or southwest winds promise a poor year, and south or southeast winds predict

The direction of the wind precisely at sunrise will indicate this year' Taba'na Yuan'e prediction.

A full catered breakfast will follow the Taba'na Yuan'e ceremony. ost Art Guild Collector's Show

The Collector's Show begins at 9 a.m. at the Algerita Art Center and features antiques of the 1895 to early 1900s era from the collection of Mrs Ruth Little and Rayma Patterson of Lubbock. The exhibit will be open to the public at no charge Thursday through Saturday, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Sunday from 1 to 4

A special addition to this year's exhibit will feature Mrs Little's new book, "Food For Thought." She will be at the center to greet friends and to autograph copies of her book.

A special book signing reception, honoring Mrs Little, will be held Sunday from 1-4 p.m. at the Algerita Center.



Angela Tobias Chosen for Science Research Intern Program

Angela Tobias, daughter of Francisco and Carol Tobias, has been accepted to be a research intern this summer at the Research Science Institute in Washington, D.C. Because of the honor of selection to participate in this program, the Texas Academy of Mathematics and Science, which Angela now attends, will pay her transportation to and from Washington, D.C. this summer.

A division of the center for Excellence in Education, the Research Science Institute is based at George Washington University in Washington, D.C. It was founded by Admiral Hyman G. Rickover, the father of America's nuclear submarine fleet, and is a non-profit program designed for top math and science students from the U.S. and abroad.

Participants are chosen on the basis of their PSAT scores, scholastic records, essays and teacher recommendations. The students must score a minimum of 70 out of 80 on their PSAT math section. The average is 77 on the math and 70 out of 80 on the verbal section of the PSAT.

The RSI program is the only one of its kind that is international in scope, having included students from 49 states, the District of Columbia, Australia, Germany, India, Italy, Pakistan, the Peoples Republic of China, Spain, Singapore, Thailand, and the United Kingdom. From the U.S., there are 90 students that have been chosen to participate this year.

The six week summer program, which is at no cost to the participants, starts with one week of intensive lectures on up-to-the-minute research topics and math, as well as humanities. The next four weeks are spent doing research with scientists in actual labs in the Washington, D.C. area. During the final week, the students present papers on their research work to be published by the Center for Excellence in Education.
