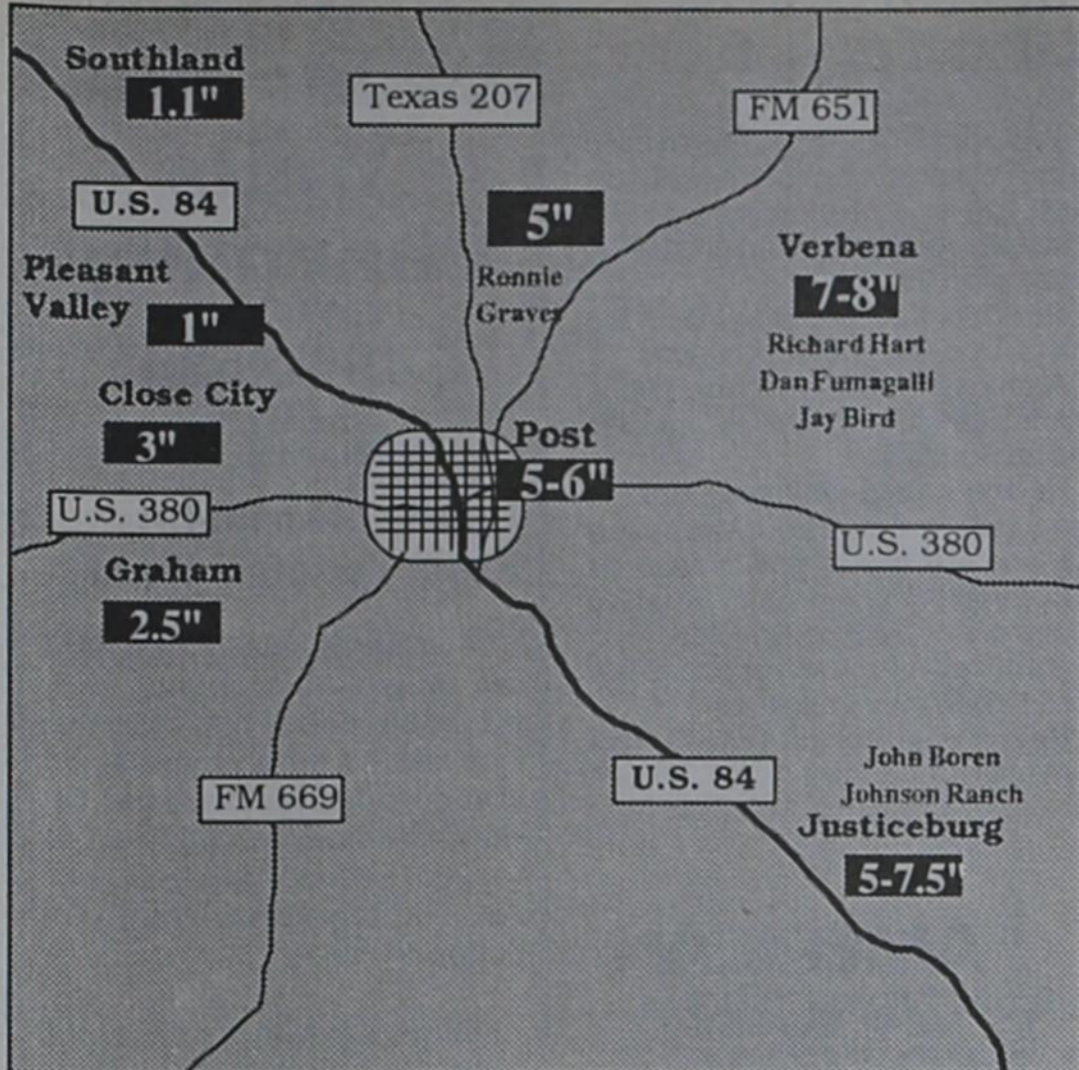


Where it rained...



Heavy Downpours Friday Fill Tanks, Create Flash Flood

Early Friday morning people around here woke to the sound of thunder and flashes of lightning as the rains began...and continued with heavy downpours through most of the day.

Flooding on Post streets became a problem for travelers in mid-afternoon, as U.S. Hwy 84 was covered with water and the intersection at 15th and Broadway caused numerous vehicles to stall.

High water across U.S. Hwy 380 West, on top of the "Cap" a few miles west of town also created problems, as motorists had difficulty maneuvering through the heavy rain and surging rush of water.

In Post, a number of streets were near impassable, with special problems on the west side of the railroad tracks at East Main and other locations going toward the South Lake.

Water began rising above the sidewalks on the south side of East Main Street in mid-afternoon, causing concern by retailers anxiously watching the water rise. There were no reports of water entering buildings downtown.

Small hail, mixed with heavy rain and high winds, put Garza County under a severe thunderstorm warning for a large part of the day, as the series of storms began building southwest and moved northeast and east into Kent County.

Crop damage appears to have been light to spotty, with a few replantings scheduled due to high water and a scattering of hail damage. In the Graham area approximately 25 percent of the cotton will be replanted.

Area ranchers are smiling from ear to ear as they received the generous "soaker" with open arms and filled tanks.

The whole thing reminded me of the Sutton County sheep rancher who leaned back in his chair one day at the Sonora "Wool House" after hearing his friends griping about the three month drought... "well, fellows," the seasoned West Texas rancher observed, "I've noticed through the years that after every drought there's usually a pretty good rain."

'It took lots of folks pulling together to get the job done...'

The culmination of years of dreaming, planning and work were capped with a special dedication ceremony downtown last Saturday afternoon at the new Main Street Plaza at the corner of East Main and Avenue 1 when state and local officials shared the speakers' platform.

Post Main Street manager Wanda Mitchell opened up the ceremony and introduced Mayor Giles McCrary, who ticked off a list of efforts through the past five years that paved the way for the improved look downtown. She also announced that McCrary had contributed approximately one-third of the total cost of extending the landscaping project from Broadway west to the courthouse.

Among the guests recognized were Post Economic Development Corp. chairman Giles Dalby, city manager Bob Turner, Chamber of Commerce secretary Ann Stelzer, Post Main Street Advisory Board chairman Sammie Pollard, Texas Highway Department district engineer Mel Pope and his assistant Woody Marcy, State Representative David Counts and State Senator John Montford.

"We just could not have accomplished this project without the total cooperation of so many people, it took all of us to get it done," McCrary explained. He expressed the city's appreciation to Montford for his "untiring efforts" to help get things going in Austin and to Counts for his continuing support.

McCrary also pointed out that the expertise and cooperation from Pope and his staff were instrumental in seeing the project through. Montford, Counts and Pope all expressed their admiration for the citizens of Post for the pride and inspiration in developing a landscaping project that all of west Texas could boast about.

"I come here to get my batteries recharged," Counts emphasized. "I always get a great feeling when I come to Post," Montford said. In her remarks, Mitchell pointed out that all of the work by members of the advisory board, which was organized in 1987, have been instrumental in the success of the project. Mitchell also praised the work of former Main Street manager Melissa Cunningham, members of the Post Merchants' Association and the Post Chamber of Commerce.

"The reinvestment figures for the building renovations and the landscaping project are just under \$1 million, and I think we can really say we are proud to be from Post!" Mitchell added. Other special recognition went to the Texas Highway Department, Southwestern Public Service, Green Enterprises of Dallas and City of Post employees.

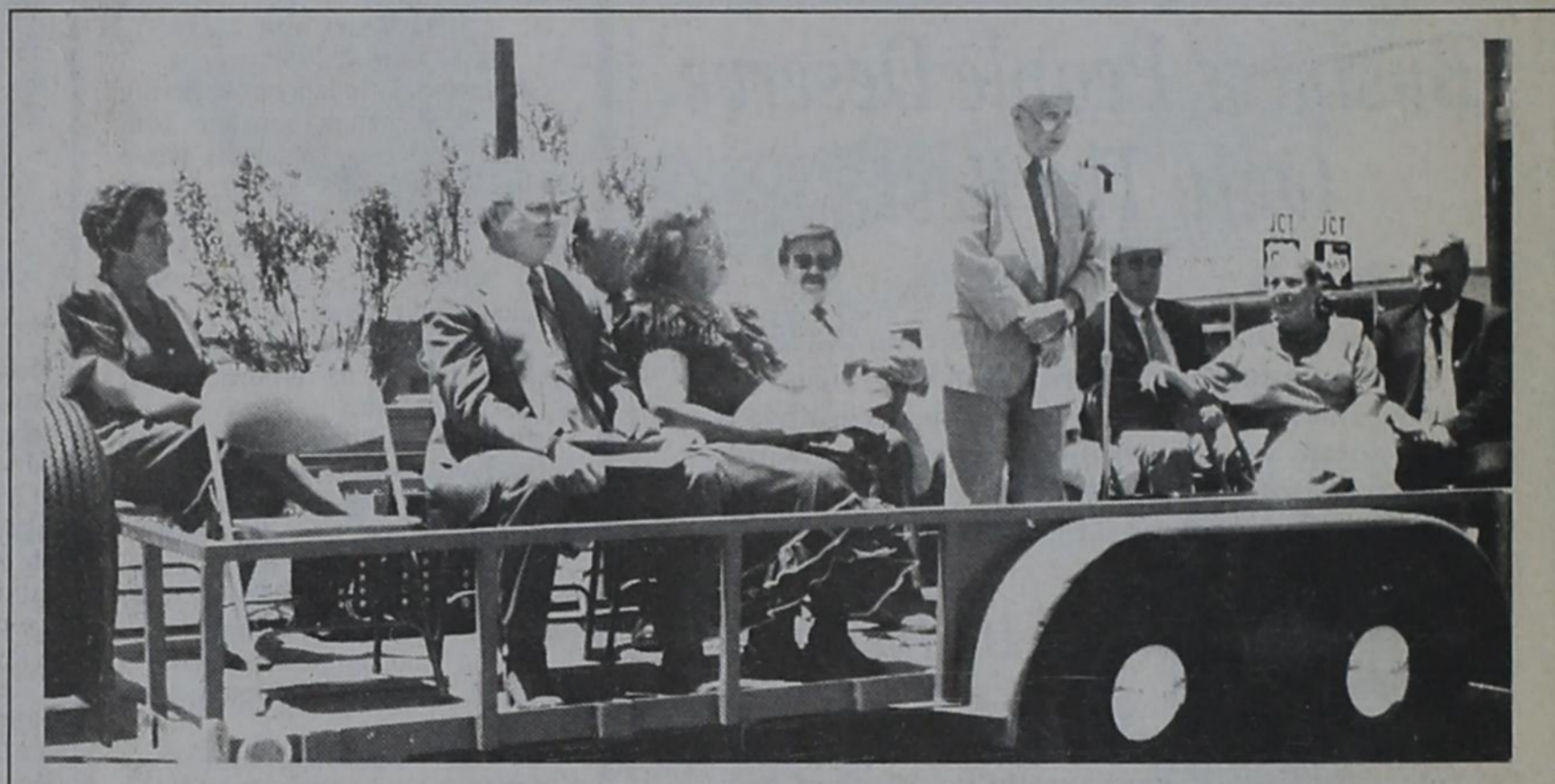

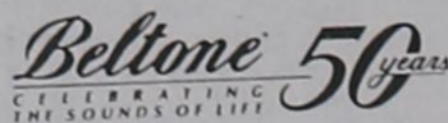

Contact Dermatitis From Outdoor Plants

Summertime outdoor activities can be spoiled by a brush with poison ivy, poison oak, or sumac. June and July are peak months for contact with these plants and the skin inflammation that follows. It has been reported that as many as 8 out of 10 persons are sensitive to poison ivy alone.

Blisters resulting from exposure to these plants are caused by a chemical in the plant sap called *urushiol*. Once this chemical contacts the skin, it begins to penetrate in a matter of minutes. Usually within two days, a rash develops which is followed by blistering, redness, and itching. After a few days the blisters become crusted and begin to scale. If there are no complications, the condition begins to clear in about 10 days.

If exposure to plant sap is suspected, exposed areas of the skin should be washed immediately. A mild rash may require nothing more than soaking in cool water. Home remedies that help dry oozing blisters include wet oatmeal or a solution of baking soda. Calamine, a mixture of zinc oxide and ferric oxide, reduces inflammation, stops oozing, and promotes healing. Topical medicines containing local anesthetics such as benzocaine may help alleviate pain. Hydrocortisone cream or spray usually relieves redness and itching.

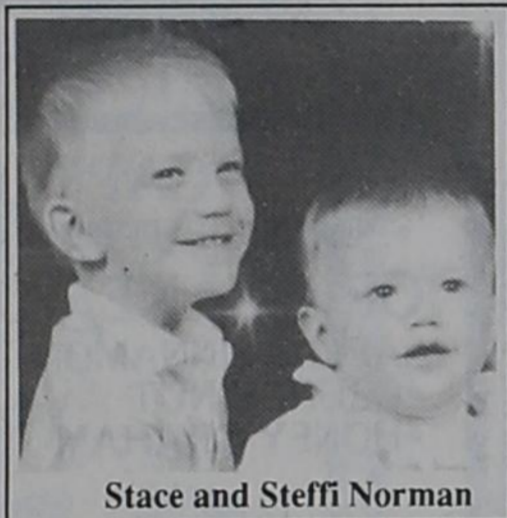

Protests of Appraisals

Property owners in the Garza County Appraisal District will have an opportunity, June 15, 1990 to protest proposed appraisals of their property for local taxes. The district's appraisal review board (ARB) will begin hearing taxpayers protests on June 15, 1990.

After the ARB concludes its hearings and approves final property appraisals, local governments will use these appraisals to assess property taxes for 1990.

The ARB is a group of citizens who live in the appraisal district and who are appointed by the district's directors. Their responsibilities are outlined by the Texas Constitution, which requires that property be appraised equally and uniformly and that exemptions and productivity appraisal be properly granted.

Property owners may appear before the ARB to protest any of these specific actions of the appraisal office:

- *the appraised or agricultural value of the property;
- *unequal appraisal of the taxpayer's property compared to other property in the district;
- *inclusion of the property on the appraisal records;
- *denial of a partial exemption, such as a homestead exemption;
- *denial of agriculture-use, open-space, or timber productivity ap-

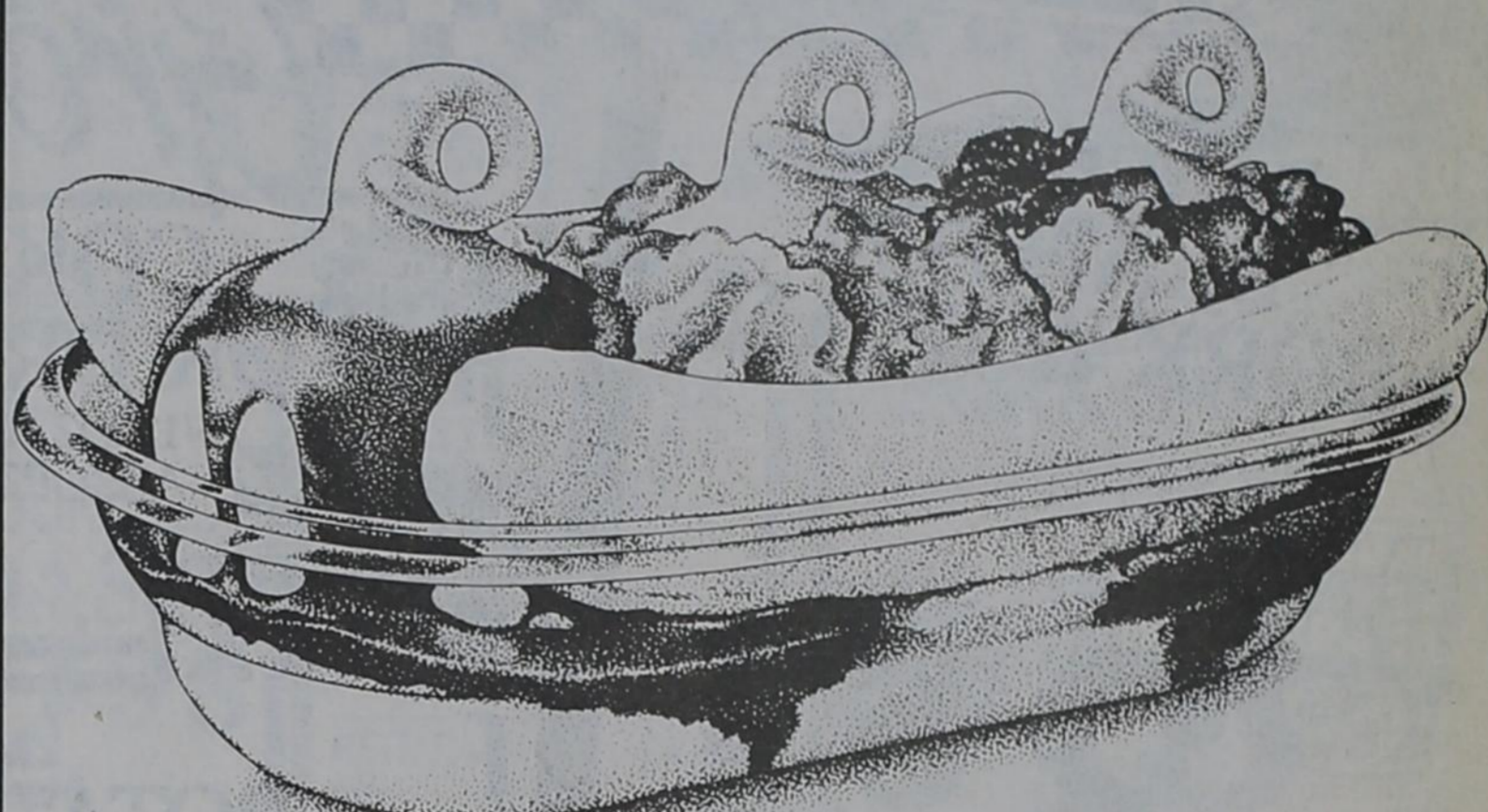

The refunds will be based upon either the actual or estimated amount of overtime charges attributable to such rounding practices. An exact refund will be determined for customers able to produce copies of their WATS/800 service bills. For customers who do not have copies of their WATS/800 service bills to establish actual overtime charges paid, an average refund of \$4.53 to \$5.95 per WATS/800 service line per month will be applied. All claims will be subject to verification. The refunds will also include interest at the rate of 7.80% per annum.

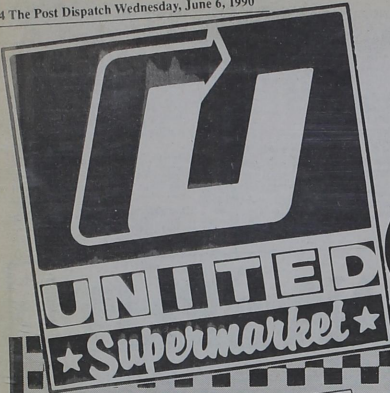



praisal:
*determination that agricultural or timber land has had a change-of-use and is subject to a rollback tax;
*identification of the taxing unit or units in which the property is located;

*determination that the taxpayer is the owner of the property;
*any other action of the appraisal office that adversely affects the property owner.

Jean Westfall, chief appraiser for the district, outlined the steps by which a property owner files a protest. First, the property owner must file a written "notice of protest" with the ARB. This must be filed by May 31 or within 30 days after the taxpayer is mailed a notice of appraised value by the chief appraiser, whichever is later.

However, if the ARB sends a property owner a notice of any other kind of change in the appraisal records, or if the chief appraiser issues a prior-year omitted property notice, the property owner has only 10 days from the mailing date to file a protest.

Each protesting property owner may offer evidence of argument, either in person or by filing an affidavit with the ARB. Property owners should be aware that the ARB has no authority over tax rates or taxing-unit spending and will not hear protests on those matters.

The ARB will schedule hearings as property owners file protests and will inform them of the time, date, and place of their individual hearings at least 15 days before the scheduled hearing date. Westfall said that protest hearings will be held for one day, and that the ARB expects to approve the final appraisal roll on June 15, 1990. State law requires the ARB to review and approve the appraisal records by July 20, or when not more than 5 percent of the total property value in the district remains under protest.

The State Property Tax Board has issued a pamphlet called "Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities," which explains how to prepare and present an appeal to the ARB. The pamphlet is available at the Garza County Appraisal District office. For a copy, contact the appraisal district staff at 124 East Main, P.O. Drawer F, Post, Texas 79356.
