Post ISD trustees appoint Barbara Hardin to Place 6

The Post Independent School District (ISD) board of trustees at the regular meeting Tuesday, June 12 appointed Barbara Hardin to fill the Place 6 position vacated by Jack Kirkpatrick. The appointment is effective until the next election in May 1991. Royce Hart presented Hardin's name for consideration and after a discussion about holding a special election, a vote to appoint Hardin was approved with Hart, Dan Hodges and Jerry Hays voting yes and Gary Workman and Ronnie Gradine abstaining.

The board also approved major repairs to the heating system at the elementary school, accepting the bid of Scott Boiler Service of Lubbock for replacement and repair to the system at a cost of \$23,572.

ISD engineer Bill Stracener explained a series of summer projects to the board, including roof repairs over the auditorium. "We haven't been able to find the source of the leak, but it is under a 10 year guarantee and the contractor is continuing to work on solving the problem," Stracener explained.

Trustees authorized Stracener to review necessary repairs for the gymnasium dressing rooms and to present a proposal at the next meeting.

Board members approved the hiring of Amy Easterling to teach English. She is replacing Florene King who retired at the end of this school year.

A grading policy to explain clearly to parents that grades will not be used to punish students for unexcused absences was approved by the board.

Sharla Wells presented a detailed description of the parenting and child development course she teaches at the high school.

State funding set aside specifically for career ladder obligations was approved for those teachers qualifying for level II or III. A total of \$89,000 will be distributed according the state formula to the teachers. Superintendent Bill Shiver reminded the board that the career ladder funding is totally from state funds and that the board had earlier voted not to use local funds for the state mandated program.

Shiver also informed the board that Travelers Insurance has notified the district to expect a 20 to 30 percent increase in premiums for health insurance next year. This year the district is spending \$136,000 in health insurance premiums, an average of \$1,740 per employee. The district pays for employee coverage, family members are paid for by employees.


Hart explained that the district should set "a limit to how much we can pay." After discussing the high cost of insurance, the board requested Shiver to invited the Bryan Williams, agent of record, to attend the next meeting to explain what options are available.

A request for transporting 12 students to a special education cooperative project in Lubbock was denied by the board. "It looks like a good arrangement, but the procedures setting this up weren't done correctly," Shiver explained. Board members expressed concern about liabilities for daily transportation of students to Lubbock, citing the school bus accident in Mission, Texas as an example of what can happen.

Shiver also informed the board that if the new education program recently enacted by the Texas legislature is ruled unconstitutional by the courts, "it will end up costing us about \$250,000."

The board approved the renewal of certificates of deposits of \$1,953,915 for 30 days at 6.9 percent interest; \$1,345,295 for 30 days at 6.9 percent interest and \$703,608.94 for 30 days at 7.02 percent interest.

Attending the meeting were board members Hart, Workman, Gradine, Hodges and Hays, superintendent Shiver and engineer Stracener.

may neither vote nor hold office. Because the admission of patients to the hospital is an excercise of a privilege and, therefore, is accompanied by responsbility, admission of more than an occasional patient should require the practitioner to seek membership on the Active Medical Staff.'

The active medical staff, as outlined by the by-laws specifies "...shall deliver the preponderance of medical service within the hospital, and shall perform all significant organizational and administrative duties pertaining to the medical staff. Members of the Active Staff shall be eligible to vote and to hold office. The existence of additional staff categories should in no way modify the privileges, duties and responsibilities of the members of the Active Medical Staff. Members of the Active Medical Staff must be conveniently available to the Hospital."

Cotton Unlimited begins production at Postex in the fall

Signs 15 year lease with PEDC for 40,000 Sq. Ft.

The Post Economic Development Corp. board of directors Tuesday, June 12 entered into a 15 year lease agreement with Cotton Unlimited, Inc., which will manufacture insulation materials and hire initially 20 to 30 employees at the site here.

The non-woven cotton and polyester insulation materials are expected to be marketed to commercial and residential building contractors. The new product, in the planning stages for more than four years, will compete with fiber glass insulation, and according to Cotton Unlimited president Joe Pate, the new insulation will be safer and provide improved insulation factors. The material is completely fire proof.

Paul Muncrief, vice president of Cotton Unlimited, developed the new material after years of working as a contractor and trying to insulating material

to replace fiber glass. Muncrief, a building contractor from Las Cruces, N.M., will be in Post to supervise the start-up production.

"We are excited and pleased to complete this agreement with Cotton Unlimited," PEDC chairman Giles Dalby said, "this new industry for Post will benefit the community in a wide variety of areas, not the least of which is a local buyer of the kind of cotton we produce.

Pate explained that the insulation product is best suited with lower quality and low micronaire cotton, the type of cotton grown in this area. "When Paul came to see us, he came here because we are the cotton capitol of the world," Pate added, "and it is a great match of our resources to a product which will have wide application."

Pate said that other uses for the material could include horse blankets, heating and air conditioning filters, insulation for appliances, especially kitchen ovens and refrigerators, automotive and aircraft.



Allergic Reactions to **Insect Bites & Stings**

Bites and stings from insects such as ants, wasps, yellow jackets, hornets, and bees are more common during summer months. For most individuals, bites and stings are painful but uneventful. However, for many of the more than one million people who are allergic to insect venom, a single bite or sting can be fatal.

Prevention: Tight fitting clothes can prevent insects from getting between the material and the skin. Light-colored clothing (e.g., white or light khaki) has been found to be less attractive to bees. Persons with known allergies should avoid scented soap, perfume, suntan lotion, and bright, shiny jewelry. When outdoors, wear long-sleeved shirts, a hat, and socks and shoes (not sandals). Use an insect repellant before going outdoors. Spray garbage cans with an insecticide. Keep food stored properly to prevent ants from congregating.

Treatment: Pain and itching may be controlled with ice packs or one of several topical products containing a local anesthetic. When individuals with known allergies are stung, they should keep the amount of venom in the blood low by removing the stinger and wrapping a tie around the arm or leg above the sting. Get to a hospital or physician's office as soon as possible.

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

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



Post EMT crew rescues Boy Scout from cliff after fall


Members of the Post EMS were called Sunday night to Camp Post to rescue a 12 year-old scout who had fallen off an 18 foot cliff.

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
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
