Living on the edge of the caprock

Govenor Clements Proclaims Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Week
Governor Willime Governor William P. Clements has
proclaimed the week of September proclaimed the week of September
$16-22,1990$, as Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Week. The State of Texas joins the entire nation in recognition of the 47th annual
observance of National Farm Safety observance of National Farm Safety
Week in order to help make Texas Week ind ranches safer places to live and work.
"Preventable accidents, fires and
work-related illnesses cost farm and ranch families dearly in both human suffering and dollar loss," said Thomas D. Valco, Extension
Agricultural Engineer. According to Agricultural Engineer. According to
Texas Agricultural Extension Service preliminary estimates,
agriculutral work accidents resulted in 1,300 deaths and 12,000 disabling
injuries in 1989. The agricultural injuries in 1989. The agricultural 100,000 workers, among the highs compared with the composite rate for all industries of nine per 100,000 .
Thousands of farm and Thousands of farm and ranch
suffered severe or fatal home, highway and recreation accidents last year, most of which were preventable. The leading cause, of
work-relating illnesses suffered by farmers, is excessive exposure to toxic gases, chemicals, dust, sun noise and other farming hazards.
"Farming also has the addition "Farming also has the additional
hazard of the combination of workplace and home. In most work situations, people leave their homes and families to go to work ... families
are not exposed to workplace are not exposed to workplace
hazards," says Valco. "Farm families are exposed to workplace hazards around the clock and safety should be a part of every day life."
Another factor contributing to high risk in production agriculture is that a minimum or mandatory retirement working on farms and ranches range from eight to 80 , instead of the usual 16 to 65 age range in most
occupations. Children often being helping with farmwork at an early
age, even operating machinery and vehicles, such as tractors, which are meant for adults. Likewise, many
people continue to farm well past the people continue to farm well past the
standard retirement age of 65, which increases their chances of illness and injury. As a result, farm accidential death and injury rates rise at the upper and lower edges of the age spectrum.
On order to combat this problem. Valco recommends that children be assigned jobs suited to their age and capability with proper supervision.
Older farmers need to draw their experience and recognize their physical limitations. Farmers need to
realize that as people age, they are realize that as people age, they are
less likely to recover quickly or less likely to recover quick and longer recovery period will result in longer recovery pery.

"Some simple steps for reducing "Some simple steps for reducing
risk on a farm are for a farmer to take good care of his health, maintain his manuals and product labels in orderto use them safely and effectively,"
Valco says. Another overlooked, yet important aspect of farm safety is that each
individual on a farm or ranch should be trained in basic first-aid and CPR.
Farms are ususally a long distance Farms are ususally a long distance
from a doctor or hospital, especially if the accident happents in a remote field. Many lives could be saved if farm personnel were trained
