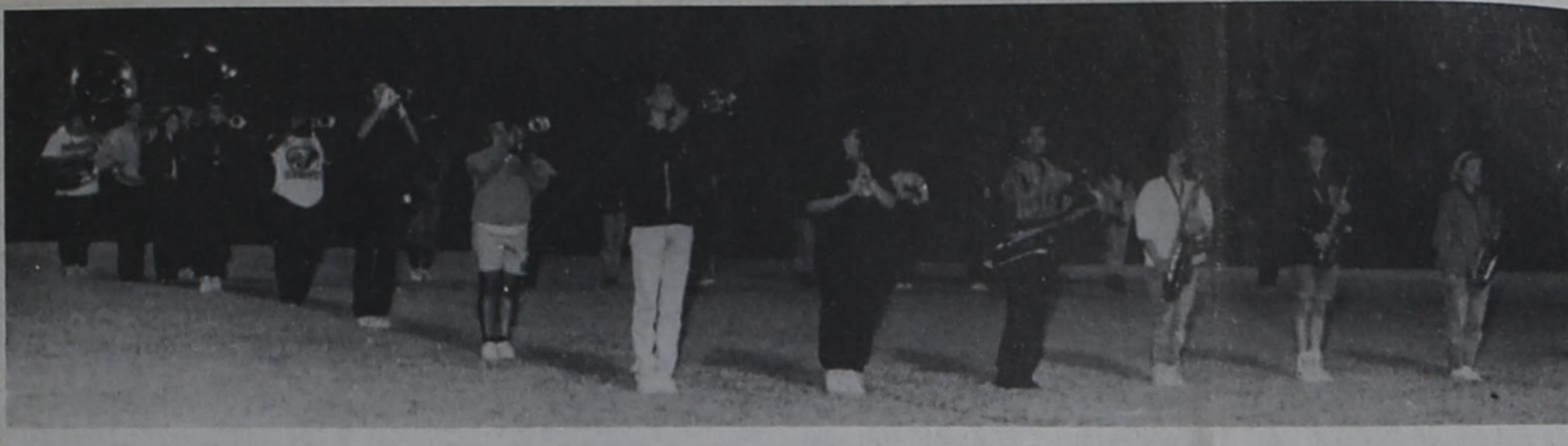


## The Post Earnings Division I Superior Rating at U.I.L. Marching Contest

## Regional 911 system update includes Garza County service in December 1991

Garza County representatives to the South Plains Regional 911 System Planning, Dee C. Justice and Sammy Ellis, were notified recently on the status of the project.

Garza County residents will be joined in the 911 system in December 1991, as was originally planned in the area wide service.

The update reports that under the South Plains Regional 911 Emergency Communications Plan, 12 of the 911 systems will be implemented by the end of 1991. There are two systems currently on line, Hale County was included August 10, 1990 and Terry County went on line October 3, 1990.

The Hale County system has the ability to lock onto calls by automatic number identification (ANI) which displays the number of the phone from which 911 was dialed.

The Terry County system has the ability to lock onto calls by ANI and automatic location identification (ALI) which displays the telephone number and address of the phone from which 911 was dialed.

## City attorney attends census conference to study redistricting

Post city attorney Harvey Morton, on behalf of the City of Post, will attend a special conference on redistricting in Dallas next month.

For the past two years the city has been exploring the possibility of creating single member districts for the city council elections, and this conference will provide information to assist in the planning for the changes.

The conference, "Drawing Districts From New Census Data," will be held November 28 and is presented by the Texas Municipal League.

"Although final census results will not be released until April 1991, you can prepare in advance by learning from a host of city attorneys, legislative experts and political consultants who will share their expertise, experiences and solutions," the TML letter explains.

## DPS troopers will enforce seat belt use in city limits

Texas Department of Public Safety troopers will begin this week issuing citations for violations of the seat belt law, including "aggressive" enforcement in the city limits.

"We sure want people to know that we will issue citations," state trooper Gene Posey emphasized.

Municipal Judge Louise Green reminds citizens that the seat belt law requires the driver to be restrained with a seat belt as well as all passengers in the front seats and minors in the back seats. Citations carry a penalty with court costs of up to \$50 per violation.

Posey also issued a reminder that all vehicles in Texas must have a license plate on the front and back. "Sometimes dealers don't put the plates on the front of new cars," Posey said, "and it's just a matter of the customer demanding that the plates be put on the front." He said citations will also be issued for these violations.

But the seat belt use is the one item which drivers here will feel the most impact. Drivers beware, buckle up or pay up.

The implementation dates for the other 10 systems in the 911 region are Bailey, October 1991; Cochran, December 1991; Crosby, November 1991; Dickens, December 1991; Floyd and Motley, August 1991; Garza, December 1991; Hockley, July 1991; Lamb, August 1991; Lynn, October 1991 and Yoakum, September 1991.

Competition from equipment suppliers has resulted in a cost reduction, which will benefit users of the systems with better and more efficient services.

Citizens are reminded that in order to receive the 911 service, the 911 commission requires the telephone companies to start collecting an equalization fee of 50 cents per month from each telephone customer, 18 to 24 months prior to implementation. Garza County telephone customers have been paying this fee.

The South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG) staff has developed a grid mapping system for addressing and locating residents in rural areas. SPAG also has a software program written for use in the 911 database suitable for rural areas. This software is currently in use with the Hale County system and will be available for the remainder of the region.

The 911 commission is in the process of implementing a rural addressing program. A statewide effort led by the commission will achieve one goal: see addresses assigned in unaddressed areas. The objectives are to identify unaddressed areas and the means to complete the addressing.

Consideration will be given to a single addressing standard, Master Street Address Guides (MSAG) format use, telephone and utility use and local government use.

Over the next year, SPAG will continue revising 911 plans and contracts, seeking the most cost effective systems, and working with city and county governments, along with volunteers of police, fire and medical services, to provide 911 service for everyone throughout the South Plains Region by the end of 1991.

He was born January 22, 1935 in Wilson and was the son of Clay B. Johnston and Cordia M. Weaver. He married Llawan Winterrowd

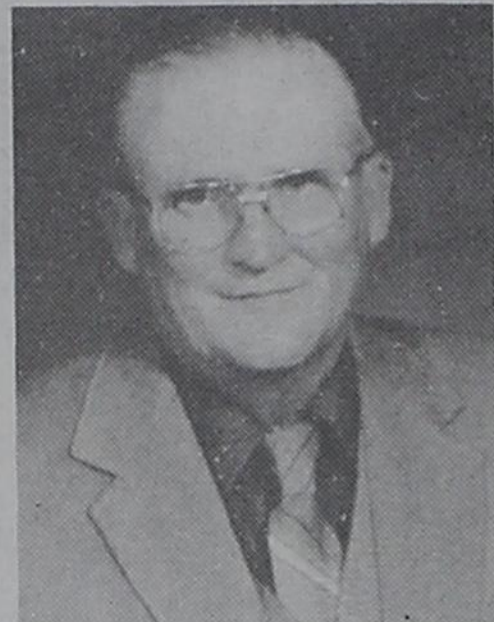
on December 27, 1950 in Plains. He was a farmer.

## Head Lice: Fall is the Peak Season

According to the National Pediculosis Association, the peak season for head lice is the fall. Head lice is a condition in which the parasite *pediculus humanus capitis* lives in and on the hair of the human host. Children are affected more often than adults. Typically, the parasite is picked up at school, brought home, and transmitted to other members of the family.

Parents should consider these preventative measures: Do not let children share beds at night. Each child should have his or her own hair brush, comb, hat, and headphones. Encourage children to not wear other children's clothes at home or at school.

According to a recent article in *American Pharmacy*, parents should check their children at least weekly during the fall months for lice. Look for lice and their small eggs on the child's hair and skin. Examine behind the ears, at the crown of the head, and at the nape of the neck. Check towels after children bathe. Wash bedclothes, blankets, towels, and pillow cases in very hot water and dry these items at the highest dryer temperature setting. Clean combs and brushes in hot water.

Nonprescription shampoos for head lice are available as gels, liquids and foams. Your pharmacist can help you select a good product.

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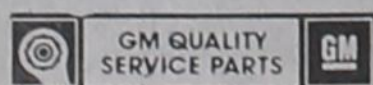
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## J-U-D-G-E-S APPOINTED OR ELECTED?

On November 6, the people of Texas will be electing more statewide judges than ever in history of the courts. For over 150 years, Texas has always elected its judges, yet there is an elite segment of lawyers who consistently want to take away from the people the right to elect their judges.

All of the people aspiring to be elected judges on November 6 are, in my opinion, qualified to serve in the capacity they seek to be elected. The controlling issue I believe that separates one from the other is their ideology concerning appointing judges.

I have studied the position papers of all judges seeking statewide office and the following shows how each of them stands in regard to electing all judges or having the governor appoint all judges. Strangely enough, the great majority of Democrats want to continue electing judges and the Republicans solidly want the governor to appoint not just the statewide judges but all judges.

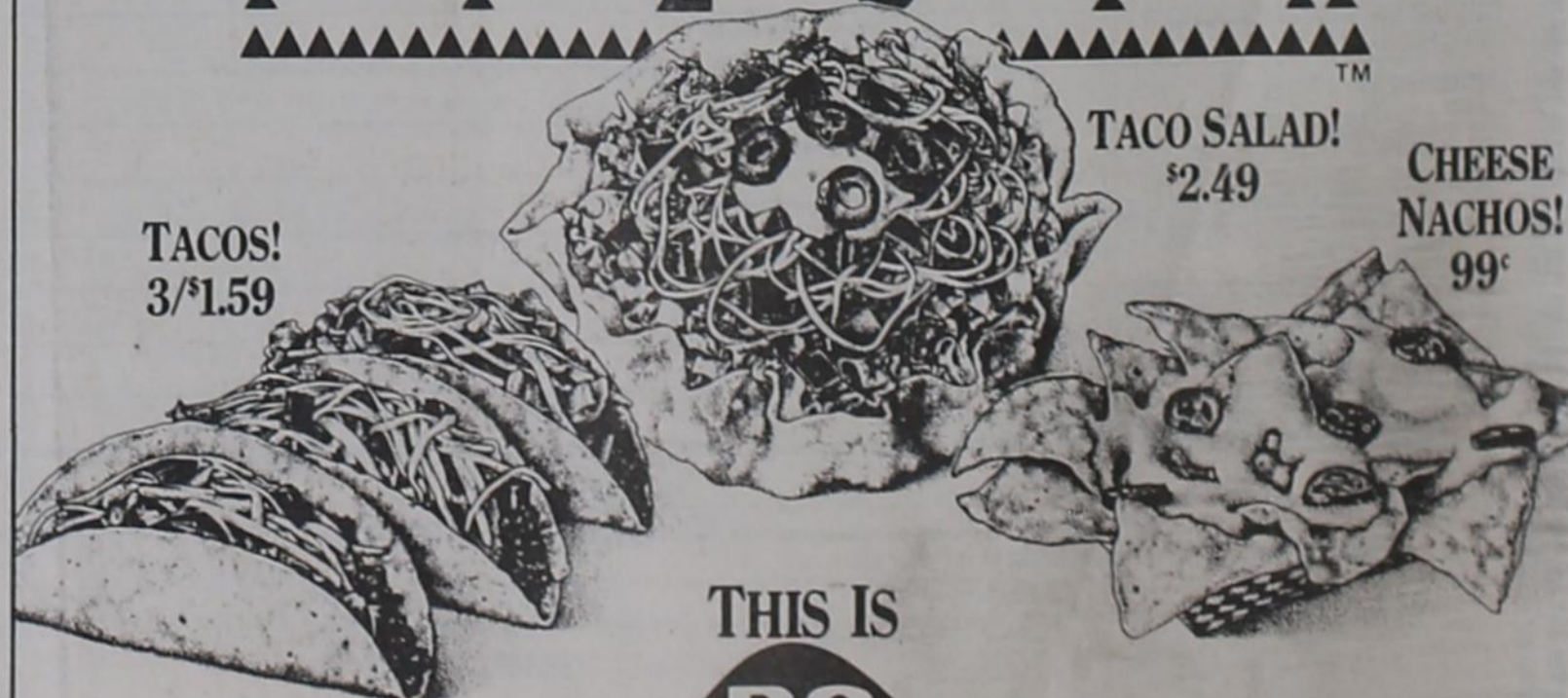

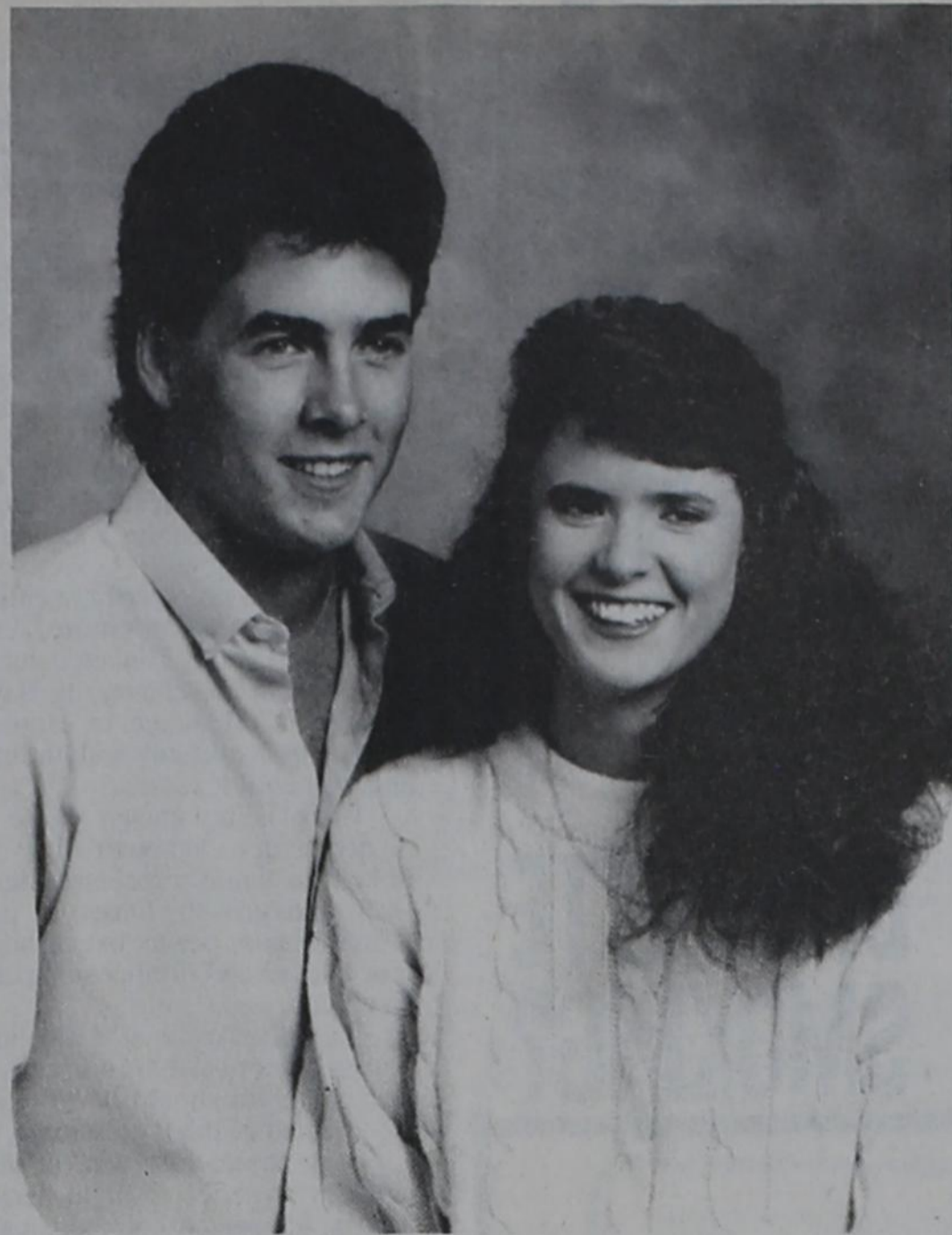



## Scary costumes produce terrors

Scary Halloween costumes may give some children nightmares, but more frightening for parents are a child's night terrors.

Unlike nightmares, which are emotionally caused, night terrors are a physical condition that causes children to abruptly "awaken" in the first half of the night. Although their eyes are open, children with this problem are still asleep. Symptoms include screaming, rapid heart beat and breathing, dilated pupils, goose bumps, confusion, and disorientation.

"During a night terror, a child is not in a state to be comforted," said Dr. Letha B. Cole, clinical associate professor of psychiatry at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "A parent should stay with the child and wait until it passes."

There is no known cause for night terrors, although they are linked to brain processes during sleep and growth. Onset of night terrors usually occurs between ages four and 12 and disappears in early adolescence.

Cole stresses that if the night terrors continue beyond age 12, then the child should be evaluated by a mental health professional.

Only one to four percent of all children experience night terrors, and in 96 percent of these cases, someone in their family has them.

Nightmares, on the other hand, are bad dreams from which the child awakens distressed, but not confused or disoriented.

Overstimulation, such as frightening costumes or horror films often seen at Halloween can cause nightmares.

"Be aware that young children cannot differ between what is real and what is not," Cole said. "Ask the person in costume to remove the mask so that the child can see the difference."

Frequent nightmares are a sign that the child is worried about something. If there are other changes in behavior, then parents should seek professional help for their children.

"Parents need to realize the difference between night terrors and nightmares," Cole added. "They shouldn't worry about an occasional occurrence of either because they are part of a child's natural growing process."

A pilot project to improve loan service to cotton producers, the Regional Cotton Loan Center in Lubbock, is staffed and anxious to "prove its mettle" as the area harvest accelerates, says Center Director Susan Hughes.

The Center is equipped to handle much of the data processing required in recording warehouse receipts and class card information needed for cotton price support loans. It also will provide a centralized data base to make cotton loan collateral information readily accessible to buyers.

The service, instituted for the first time this year by USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), is designed to benefit producers by shortening the time between loan application and receipt of proceeds. In addition, it's intended that a centralized loan collateral data base available to buyers will facilitate producer marketing operations.

The elapsed time from loan application at the county ASCS office to a check in the producer's hand, ASCS officials say, will be cut to 48 hours. And producers who make loan applications at the Lubbock Center can expect a check within 24 hours. Otherwise the wait is a minimum three days.

Testing the new method of handling cotton loans will involve cotton from 42 county ASCS offices in roughly a 100 mile radius of Lubbock. The regional facility will provide a service center for entering and processing loan data electronically, plus physical storage of receipts and class cards. Participating counties will continue to be fully responsible for administering the loan program and county offices will be the only disbursement point for loan payments.

It's emphasized that producers are not required to use the regional center. They still can apply for and redeem loans at their individual county offices, but with the new system producers from all 42 counties will have the additional option of conducting loan transactions at the Lubbock site.

Producers and buyers using the center will find six terminals set up for their use. They'll be able to access the most current collection of information on loan cotton, but will have access to no data other than that which is currently and legally available in county offices. The advantage lies in the speed of the operation and in the availability in a single location of data from all 42 counties.

Some familiarity with the computer system and its reporting methods obviously will help users get the most out of the information collection. And Ms. Hughes and her staff are offering to arrange demonstrations and informal training sessions on request. The center is located at 4601 West Loop 289, Lubbock. To arrange demonstrations or get information on fee schedules users may call Ms. Hughes or Chief Program Assistant Lana Overland at (806) 743-7614.

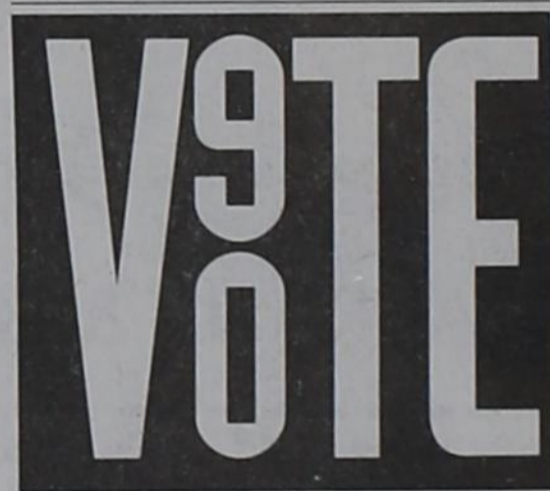

AUSTIN - Items of note that cropped up last week while Congress wrestled with the budget and Texas hurdled toward an election:

■ Congressmen drawing the line on spending have written themselves a \$19,000 pay raise into the budget;

■ Former San Antonio Mayor Henry Cisneros said Democratic nominee Ann Richards did not snort cocaine at a fundraiser for Atty. Gen. Jim Mattox and ripped his sheriff for investigating her.

**Candidate for Mayor**  
White was white-hot at Richards for smearing him in TV ads which accused him of enriching himself financially at taxpayer expense, and vowed publicly he would never support her.

Williams courted White's endorsement over the summer, with unpublished results, and many have been surprised to see White stay out of it.

Now a Houston attorney, his

name is being circulated there as a possible candidate for mayor next year.

White's name will be included in an exploratory poll in January by forces seeking to unseat Kathy Whitmire, according to reports.

**School Finance Case**  
Moving with surprising speed, the state Supreme Court last week agreed to hear oral arguments on whether Texas' new school finance system is unconstitutional and should be thrown out immediately.

"We are pleased by the strong leadership shown by the court in agreeing to hear the Edgewood versus Kirby case at a very early date," said Al Kauffman, lead attorney for the property-poor school districts that launched the legal challenge against the funding system in 1984.

The high court will hear arguments on Nov. 28 - seven weeks after Kauffman's clients filed the appeal.

**L-Word, Good Ol' Boys**  
Some days a good ol' boy just can't do anything right, according to Richards.

She protested because Williams calls her "a liberal" in new TV ads, and her campaign spokesman said she actually is more of a fiscal conservative than he.

That brought quite a few inside laughs in Austin, where nothing is so hilarious as a liberal Democrat "admitting" he or she is actually a fiscal conservative just before Election Day.

**Scott Controversy**  
The governor's chief of staff, Rider Scott, found himself embroiled in controversy when a new prison consulting firm used his name to solicit business.

Instead, he was promoted to chief of staff and timing prevented his name from being pulled from some of the printed solicitations.

**Record Registration**  
Secretary of State George Bayoud said a record 7.7 million Texans have registered to vote in the Nov. 6 gubernatorial election.

According to Bayoud, 7,701,499 - or 62 percent - of Texas' 12.5 million eligible voters have registered. That eclipses a record set in 1986 when 7,287,173 Texans registered to vote in a gubernatorial election.

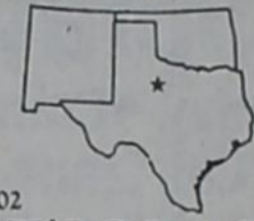

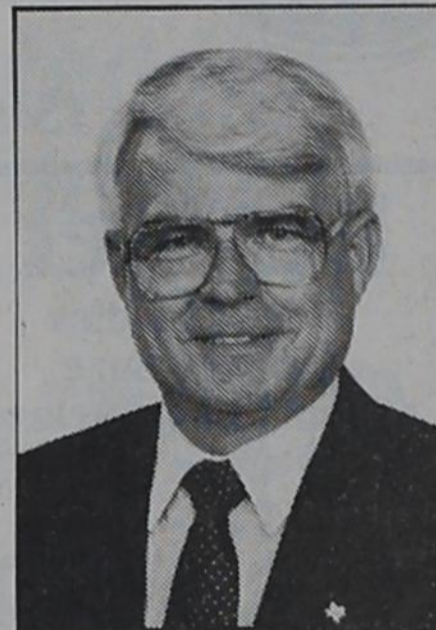

**Texans are cheated by Williams' stand on debate**

Evidently, the final chapter of the expected debate between state Treasurer Ann Richards and Midland oilman Clayton Williams Jr. was written Wednesday (October 10) when Williams failed to accept a League of Women Voters' invitation to a televised gubernatorial debate. Williams should bear the responsibility for cheating Texans out of a long, live look at the candidates.

Richards at least appeared ready when she declared at a news conference Wednesday (October 10) she would debate Williams anywhere, anytime. But Williams remained absent. All he's done so far is to insist on

a pointless precondition - that Richards promise not to engage in negative advertising - and then he'll debate. The bet here is that if Richards said OK, Williams would find another excuse to duck facing Richards and Texans.

Having hired crafty television managers to construct an image of himself as a knowledgeable, crime-fighting, tax-cutting candidate, Williams will now ride out the rest of the campaign hiding behind that image. It is a sorry day for Texas when the leading candidate for governor does not feel secure enough to debate the issues, especially when the state faces yet another

budgetary shortfall and must again go to court to try to figure out the school finance mess.

Having catapulted to front-runner status with a cagey use of television and millions of dollars to bury his opponents, Williams now refuses to go on television live - opting instead to present himself to thousands of Texas households in the safest way possible.

Williams' decision not to debate Richards live on television makes Richards' claim that Williams is scared of her and scared to reveal what - if anything - he knows about state government ring true. Williams' refusal should make voters think twice

about the man who faces down the criminals he features on his catchy new commercials that look like advertisements for this season's latest television cop shows.

The millions of dollars Williams spent on television creating a manly image, an image that was reinforced by macho slips of the tongue. The ads were designed to picture a tough, secure Texan. But the voters need to consider whether they have a claim of false advertising. How tough and secure is someone who refuses to join in a debate?

What a shot in the arm it would have been for the public's ailing faith in government if the two

candidates for governor could have met face to face with only a moderator and engaged in a conversation about their vision of Texas.

But could that be the problem? - that Williams is running for governor with no clue about what state government is or what he could do with it. All he has said so far in neat commercials is: That he is against drugs. Who isn't? He is against taxes. Who isn't? He wants criminals to pay for their crimes. Who doesn't? He wants to cut waste in government. Who doesn't? He wants Texas to be prosperous. Who wouldn't?

The people ought to be given an opportunity to see and hear how the candidates for governor would go about fighting drugs, reducing or raising taxes, making criminals pay for their crimes, cutting waste in government and making Texas prosperous again. What Williams has done is to cheat people out of an opportunity to assess both candidates in a neutral setting and not in the slanted presentation of television commercials.

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# Eagles squash undefeated 'Lope record

## Mistakes, execution key factors in loss

The Post Antelopes scored first, last Friday at Seagraves, but let the game slip away in the third and fourth quarters as the Eagles went ahead 24-7 before the Bold Gold offense scored late in the game to fall short 24-13 for their first loss of the season.

The Eagles proved their defensive reputation was for real as they intercepted four passes, recovered one fumble and trapped sophomore quarterback Damon Curtis in the end zone for a safety, stopping the Antelope offensive punch.

Seagraves offensive line blocking and execution in the second half sent the Antelopes reeling as the Eagles took advantage of the nifty running of sophomore quarterback Timmy Cavazos and running backs Quincy Anderson and Tony Conde.

The Eagles, with the win, take sole possession of first place in District 4AA and force the Antelopes into fighting for second place, needing to win both remaining games to find a spot in the playoffs.

### First Half Action

The Antelope defense looked good on the Eagles' first possession following the opening kickoff. Joe Garcia led the charge, forcing the Eagles to punt on

fourth down and under heavy pressure from Floyd Slay, the punt was short.

Quarterback Michael Radle led the Antelopes, as Darren Brown carried four times, got a first down at the 39, then two plays lost two yards and on third down Radle attempted a pass, which was picked off by Cavazos at the 26 yard line.

The defense came back to action and proved equal to the task, forcing another punt, which was again pressured by Slay, and the Antelopes started at their own 39. Three plays later, after losing two yards, Jr Ray Gonzales punted the ball deep into Eagle territory, with the ball rolling dead at the 13.

Again the Post defense stopped the Eagles cold, with big plays in the middle by Gonzales and Lance Bland. A punt put the ball at the Eagle 33.

With 1:57 remaining in the first quarter, the Antelopes took one play to score, following a five yard penalty for illegal motion, Radle dropped back to pass and lofted the ball over the head of defender to Danny Leach who tucked the ball away and rolled into the end zone. Gonzales' kick put the 'Lopes out front 7-0 and Post fans, who had filled the visitors' side, roared their approval.

Following the kickoff Seagraves got a first down on a pass completion to Kent

Cole at the Eagle 41, then Brown and Gonzales trapped Conde and a second down pass failed and on third down Cavazos' pass was intercepted by Chris Redman at the Post 40 and returned to the 47.

The second quarter opened up with Post on the move, Brown and Jay Whitehead getting the running chores, but after getting a first down at the Eagle 39 on a fourth down situation, the drive stalled and on third down Radle's pass attempt was intercepted by Rudy Garza at the 35.

Seven plays later Cavazos ripped over right guard, broke a tackle at the line of scrimmage and raced into the end zone. The point after was good and at 5:40 left in the first half the score was knotted.

Both defenses took control, although the Antelopes were intercepted one more time with 3:28 left in the half when Radle's pass to Slay was intercepted by Quincy Anderson at the Post 41.

A great defensive stand by the Antelopes, led by Benji Vargas, Bland, Gonzales and Damon Curtis forced a punt, which rolled dead at the one yard line.

Brown picked up a first down at the 12, Curtis, leading the offense at quarterback, got another first down to the 25, then was

sacked at the 23 twice and the half ended.

### Second Half Action

The Antelopes moved the ball in six plays following the second half kickoff, getting to midfield before forced to punt on fourth down. The defense came to the field and did what it had to do, with Bland, Bobby Curtis and Gonzales leading the tacklers, forcing a punt from the Eagle 18 yard line.

Taking over at their own 34, the 'Lopes clicked off two first downs with Brown and Whitehead sharing the running chores, including a critical fourth down conversion at the 45 yard line. Then on first down Curtis rolled to his right and threw a pass which was tipped by a Seagraves defender, then intercepted by Cole, who ran it into the end zone. The touchdown was nullified on a clipping call against Seagraves, but five plays later Cavazos turned a bobbled snap into a score as he fooled the Antelope defense, going to his left, then cutting back to his right and going 16 yards to the end zone. A fake extra point kick, turned into a pass completion to Quincy Anderson for the two point conversion and the Eagles led 15-7. With 2:41 left in the third quarter, the 'Lopes were looking at their undefeated season slowly fading away. A clipping call on the kickoff return set

the ball at the 12 and four plays later the 'Lopes punted as the Seagraves defense took control of the line of scrimmage. The short punt set up the Eagles at the 38, but two plays later Brown stepped in front of Cole at the two yard line to intercept Cavazos' pass, giving the 'Lopes another shot.

The fourth quarter opened up with a third down situation at the five yard line, Curtis rolled to his right, looking for running room to set up for a pass, and was thrown to the ground for a hard charging Seagraves defense, putting another two points on the board for the Eagles as the referee signaled a safety. With 11:51 left in the game the home team led 17-7 and chances of a comeback for the Antelopes were dimming.

The 'Lope defense did its job, led by Whitehead, David Dean, Vargas and Shane Horton and a fourth down try was stopped at the Post 39 yard line.

With 9:30 the 'Lopes opened up four play drive, that was snuffed at the end of a first down run by Brown, who was stripped of the ball as he was going to the ground at Eagle 44 yard line.

Seagraves took advantage of the turnover, ripping off a seven play drive behind outstanding offensive blocking, as Quincy Anderson took the ball the final

seven yards around his left end to the end zone. With 5:22 the Eagles led 24-7.

The 'Lopes came charging back to score on a nine play drive that went from their own 41 yard line, with a clutch pass reception by Dustin Massey for a first down and running by Brown, Slay and Gonzales. Slay got the final eight yards over left tackle. 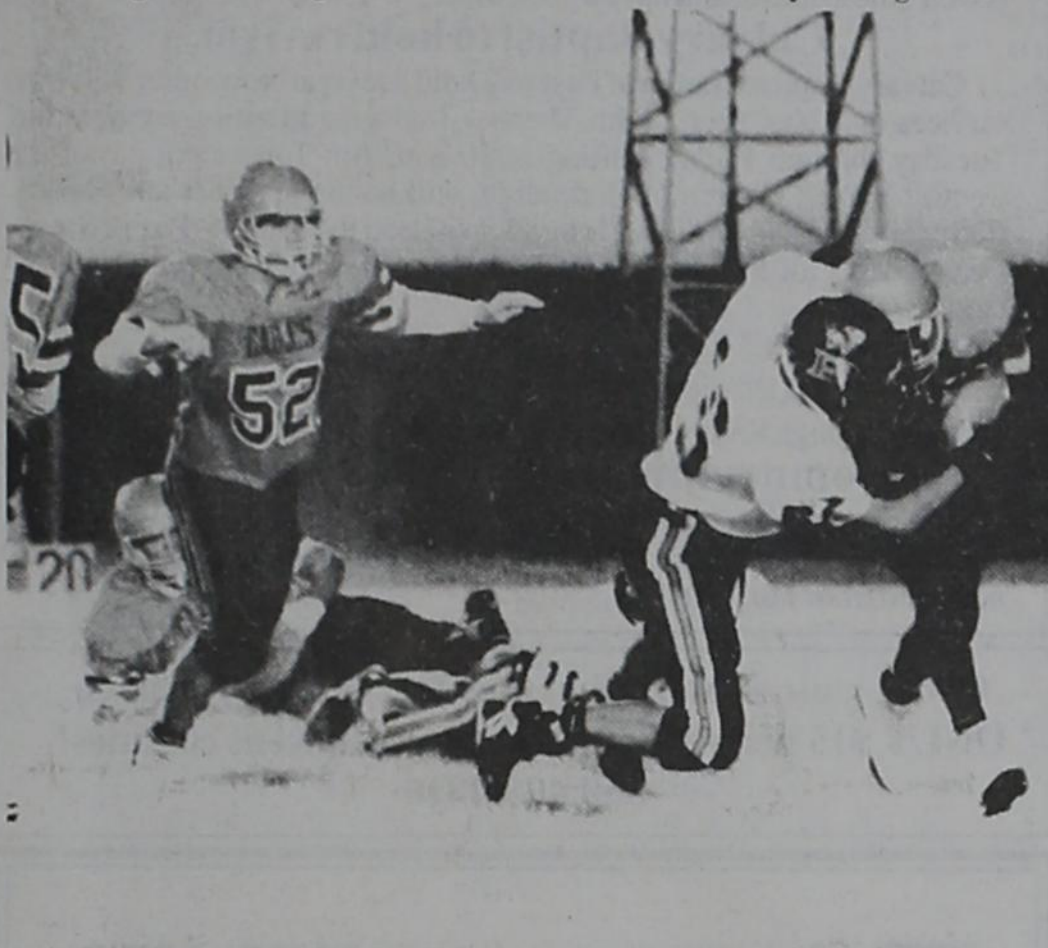

Coming off a 24-13 loss at Seagraves and trailing the Eagles in the District 4AA championship race, the 'Lopes will be tested on their drive for the state championship.

"We wanted to go undefeated, okay, but we still feel good about ourselves with only one loss this season and if we play the way we are capable, we'll be in the playoffs," Osborne adds.

### Amended Notice of Rate Change Request and Statement of Intent

Notice is hereby given that DICKENS ELECTRIC COOPERATIVE INC., (the "Utility") intends to establish a new load retention rate for qualifying large power loads over 2000 KW. The load retention rate includes a separate factor for recovering power costs associated with the customer's load. The Utility intends to change the power cost recovery factor applicable to all other customers to exclude the cost of power and KWh sales to customers utilizing the load retention rate. The changes are proposed to be effective as soon as may be permitted by law. Based upon a test year ended December 31, 1989, the proposed changes result in a decrease less than actual test year revenues of \$224,542 or 1.6%. The changes are applicable to all areas, all customer classes, and all customers served by the Utility.

Implementation of the proposed load retention rate and other changes is subject to approval by the Public Utility Commission of Texas. A statement of intent including the proposed revisions of tariff and schedules and a statement specifying in detail each proposed change is available at the general office of the Utility located at Spur, Texas.

For many years, large high load factor customers have paid a disproportionate share of power costs. The proposed method of power cost recovery more accurately tracks the cost of providing service by placing more of the responsibility for payment of power costs on customers who cause the utility to incur those costs. Based upon a test year ended December 31, 1989, the proposed rates, if approved, will result in an increase in billings to all classes of affected customers. The amount of power cost that will be incurred in the future cannot accurately be predicted.

### Former resident faces judicial problems...

*Publisher's note: The following letter is printed at the request of Mrs Hollis Branson.*

Recently I had an occasion to set through a trial held in the county court house in Sherman, Texas. The defendant in the case was Hollis Branson. Hollis was charged with sexual assault on a child. The child was being kept at the Branson house in a licensed day care type setting. The case was investigated by one of Sherman's finest, officer Sandy Dittfurgh. Officer Dittfurgh called Mr and Mrs Branson into the police station and advised them of their charges against Hollis. Officer Dittfurgh was provided with a list of the parents of the children who stayed at their home. No statements were ever taken by the police department on either Mr or Mrs Branson, further more most of the other parents of children in the Branson's care were never even questioned. The police department never asked Mr or Mrs Branson to submit to any type of testing at all, no polygraph test were offered by the police department. Mr Branson took a polygraph test on his own and passed the test with flying colors, of course this is inadmissible in court. My point is that these are all investigative tools that should have been used by the police department long before the case went to trial.

I was a police officer for eighteen years in Dallas county. I worked criminal investigation for several of those years. All I can say is things must be done different in Sherman. In my opinion this case was never investigated by the Sherman police department with an open mind, set on finding the truth. Officer Dittfurgh seemed to have her mind made up from the beginning in this case.

During the trial Hollis had several friends that he had grown up with from Post, Texas as well as from this area at the trial, these people came to the trial and stood by him every day through this ordeal. These friends came down here at their own expense because they believed in Hollis. The D.A. however tried to make it look like we were there to intimidate the court. How many of us have true friends who would stand by us day in and day out through something like this? Several of these people were parents of the children that stayed in the Branson house, they were there to testify for Hollis if they were allowed to. These parents and friends took off work to sit in a court room or in a hall outside the

court room all day waiting to help Hollis in any way they could.

To our disbelief Hollis Branson was found guilty. During the sentencing on Friday, August 31, once again all of those friends showed up in support of Hollis. All of these parents and friends all returned to court that day to show their support and faith in Hollis. Once again the D.A. made a comment to the court that our purpose was to intimidate the court. In reality the reason that we were there is because we all love Hollis and believe in him, each of us knows beyond a doubt that Hollis is not guilty of the charges.

During the sentencing phase of the case the probation officer and her supervisor both testified that they requested a prison sentence because Hollis had not admitted his guilt. They also testified that Hollis has a spotless record, as a matter of fact they had never had a person with as clean a record in their office, yet they wanted this man to go to prison.

I feel sorry for the people of Sherman who depend on their police department to investigate offences fairly and completely. The probation office also seems to think it's acceptable to put people with past criminal records back on the street on probation, yet they want to look up the ones with spotless records, this concerns me about the type of people they are allowing to walk the streets of Sherman.

The people of Sherman don't have to take these things lying down, the people making these decisions are elected by you, and they will be running for office again. You have the power to correct these problems and make your streets safe.

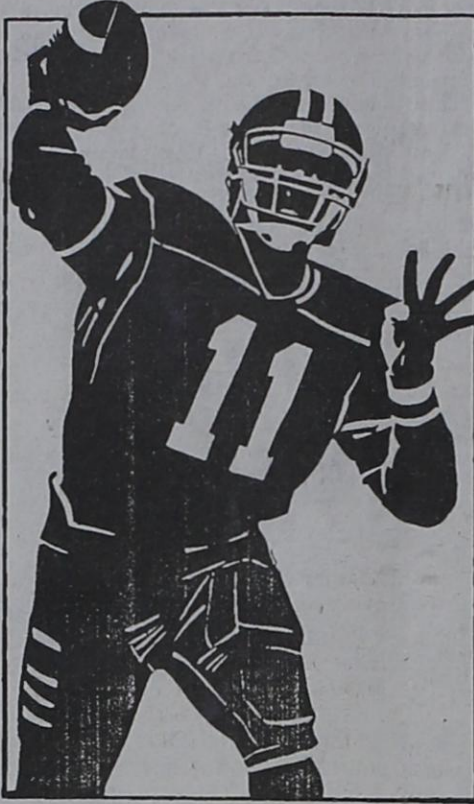
