Garza County gets \$60,000 funding forcriminal youth rehab program

Garza County Judge Giles Dalby informed the Commissioners' Court at its regular meeting Monday morning that a \$60,000 grant from the Texas Criminal Justice Department would provide funding to offer alternatives to sending youth offenders to prison.

The resolution requesting the funding was approved by the court unanimously. The program will use both local efforts and funding for space in treatment facilities in Lubbock, where Dalby said there has been success with youth getting help at a time when they need it most. He said that sending young people to prison often creates a hardened criminal later.

Commissioners approved an amendment to the budget to pay for 106th Judicial District expenses that had not been included in the budget years of 1989, 1990 and 1991. The total was \$17,721.60, with two of the years being paid this year and the remainder in next year's budget.

There are two budget items for the 106th court, "and for some reason that

expense item was overlooked," Dalby explained.

Dalby told commissioners that the Jail Standards Commission will inspect the jail here on March 5. He also informed the court that an interlocal agreement is being prepared with Dickens County to hold prisoners when the jail here becomes overcrowded. "They have offered to pick up and return our prisoners and house them at a rate of \$25 to \$35 per day," Dalby said, "that's almost less than what we can do it for."

No decision was made on a request by Texas Department of Public Safety officers for procurement of tone only pagers. A representative of Lubbock Radio Paging made a proposal but commissioners put off the decision until the next regular meeting.

The court authorized Donald Windham to visit Bailey County to research the details on Garza County's land there which is scheduled to be sold.

No decision was made on a suggestion to open bidding for the county audit. County attorney Preston Poole, at the request of Dalby, explained to the court

that the county auditor is appointed by the district judge. The regularly scheduled meeting for March 23 was moved to March 30 to accommodate Dalby's requirement to be in Austin to attend the Judicial Reform Committee and Lottery Commission meetings. He was appointed to the Judicial Reform Committee by Gov. Ann Richards and was recently named to the Lottery Commission by State Comptroller John Sharp.

County agent John Senter informed the court that a total of 14 youth from Garza County are participating in the stockshow at San Antonio. Cotton crop called disappointing and disastrous

Rough, disappointing and disastrous are how Garza County farmers are describing the 1991–92 cotton crop.

The combination of poor quality and low grades in cotton returns have caused prices to fall dramatically. This season's prices have ranged from 17 cents to 57 cents per pound, as compared to the '90-91 season average of 58

Garza County is projected to show a 40 percent loss on the 39,000 acres planted in 1991, according to Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office here.

"If farmers were able to harvest before the October 30 freeze, they had a good yield of a half to one bale to the acre, unlike those who are still trying to finish," ASCS executive director Victor Ashley said, "Many farmers who still have cotton in the field may not gather because the quality and price will be too low."

The weather has been the biggest factor in reducing the quality of the cotton in this year's crop. This has been the longest season on record since the '72-73 crop, and, just as it did 20 years ago, the weather has taken the upperhand and forced farmers to play by its rules.

Drought, hailstorms, rain, snow and more continuous rains have all combined in an untimely manner to hamper and destroy the growing and harvesting attempts. A farmer in the Grassland area said he has been trying to harvest since November 15, but has only been in the field three full weeks since then.

Because of the time the cotton has remained on the stalk or in the modules and had to withstand the harsh weather and continuous rain, the quality of the fiber has decreased. Cotton in the modules that have remained wet during the rains have produced a lower quality than that left on the stalk, resulting in Below

Because of low prices and low quality, many of the farmers will not be able to break even. To assist the farmers, the United States Department of Agriculture,

through the ASCS, has established a Disaster Program. According to Ashley, signups have begun for the program and will continue until March 13. After that time, the total benefits of all crops nationwide will be

determined, and farmers will receive payments according to the national factor. Crops from the 1990 and 1991 seasons are eligible for assistance through this program, but they must meet requirements established by the USDA. Crops must suffer at least a 40 percent loss without crop insurance or a 35

percent loss on crops with insurance.

Participating program crops will be paid at 65 percent of the target price, and non-participating program crops will be paid at 65 percent of the load rate. More information about this program may be obtained through the Garza







In recent weeks the news media has reported that fish markets in Chicago and New York had severe food handling and sanitation problems. Because the seafood industry in Texas is relatively small and new, it has not become as complacent as the markets men-

To ensure safety and quality, many Texas distributor participate in the voluntary seafood inspection program provided by the U.S. Department of Commerce, contract with independent labs for product analysis and conduct their own quality control and sanitation program. The industry also supports the call for an improved inspection system for seafood prod-

Seafood is highly perishable and it is true that by the time most seafood reaches retail, its, near the end of its brief shelf life. The following guideline are suggested for seafood shoppers: * Know your seafood retailer.

Buy all seafood from licensed stores and markets.

* Observe the retail area for cleanliness and sanitary food handling practices of the employees.

* Look for well-iced products. * Avoid products piled high in the display case and place under bright lights, situations that increase chances of spoilage.

* Select cut fish that has a sheen

or bloom to the flesh a translucent look and a mild fresh clean odor. ' Make sure that raw products

are not touching cooked ones. Choose fresh shrimp that's firm, unbroken and free of discoloration on the flesh. The odor should be clean and mild or non-

* Make sure oysters are in marked containers nestled down in ice. The container should have a certification number. Look for plump oysters in clean, thin liquid. An ammonia-like odor indicates spoilage.

* Select fresh-picked crab meat that has a sweet odor and is in a container displayed in ice. Purchase within five days of the date marked on the container's bottom.

If you're not going to freeze your seafood once you get home, use it within two days of purchase. Keep it in the coldest part of the refrigerator -- the meat drawer or on the bottom shelf in the back -and never thaw it at room temperature, but rather in the refrigerator, a sink in cold water or in the microwave oven.

Spoiled seafood usually smells and tastes bad, so consumers should use good judgement to help determine quality. In addition, all seafood should be cooked thoroughly before it is eaten to help destroy bacteria and parasites. It is best to never eat raw or undercooked seafood. The bottom line is to buy a good quality product, handle it with care and enjoy it cooked.





Senator Gramm announces loans to aid farmers

U.S. Senator Phil Gramm has announced that farmers in seven Texas counties are eligible to apply for low-interest emergency loans to help recover from damages and losses to crops due to drought, hail and excessive rainfall which plaqued much of Texas during 1991.

Due to drought and hailstorms between January 1 and July 19 of last year, farmers in Crosby County are eligible for the loan as-

In addition to the above counties, 43 other Texas counties have been named as contiguous counties and therefore eligible for assistance. The counties affected by the drought are Borden, Brooks, Cottle, Crosby, Ector, Floyd, Gains, Garza, Howard, Jim Hogg, Jim Wells, Kent, King, La Salle, Live Oak, Lynn, Martin, McMullen, Midland, Motley, Stonewall, Terry, Webb, Wheeler and Winkler. The counties affected by excessive rainfall are Cass, Chambers, Hardin, Harris, Montgomery, Morris, Polk, Red River and San

AUSTIN - "Our ox is in the ditch," Gov. Ann Richards is fond of saying, as she did last week while blasting President George Bush's proposals to improve the national economy.

In Texas, public education's ox is in the ditch:

■ Texas property taxpayers are paying millions in new reform taxes which the Texas Supreme Court ruled is illegal, but must be paid anyway.

■ More than half of Texas high school seniors have failed the basic skills performance exam.

■ Japanese leaders accuse us of having a 30 percent illiteracy rate. Undeniably, Texas education is

in a ditch, despite billions in tax dollars jacked up by the Legislature since former Gov. Mark White began the reforms in 1984.

Last week, state leaders signaled they are well aware that voters have taxes and education on their minds.


Retreats from Threat

Richards, Senate education chairman Carl Parker and others tried to pressure the High Court into accepting their latest try at straightening out the mess.



Gov. Bob Bullock echoed the need for Texans to stamp their approval on any legislative plan. It's the only way to get the controversy out of the courts, their aides say.

Richards said it is very likely she will call the Legislature into special session instead of waiting until the next regular session in January 1993.

Another Committee?

"We're going to take our time, so that when we do it, we try to get it right," Richards said, explaining why no date has been set.

"I'm saying you've got to come up with a proposal that not only passes the Legislature but will pass the voters of Texas," she said. "And that's not easy."

Richards said she will probably appoint another blue-ribbon task force, such as one recommended by the NAACP and LULAC.

Governor Boosts Pact

National and state issues are harder to separate these days: The governor was in Washington, D.C. last week boosting her pet issue, the free trade pact with Mexico.

Richards said she was looking for a Congressman with enough bravery to author a "social pact with Mexico" as well, which was badly needed, in her opinion.

She cited job training as one

social issue for the pact. The President proposed to spend \$210 million to address environmental problems, with Mexico committed to spending \$500 million.

Later, following a meeting between governors and Bush, she criticized the Bush administration for not laying "down any plan whatsoever" for an economy that

"was in terrible straits." The governor admitted, however, that his proposed national
