'Witty World of Will Rogers' and Jim Hamilton exhibit capture attention here Friday and Saturday

Deadline for reservations today at 5 p.m.

"The Witty World of Will Rogers," featuring Gene McFall, will be presented by the Caprock Cultural Association at a February 28 dinner theatre at the Post Community Center, along with a special exhibit by western artist Jim Hamilton at the CCA building, 127 E. Main.

The event will open with a catered meal at 7:30 p.m. followed by the "CCA Good Times Auction" and McFall's special portrayal of America's "cowboy philosopher" Will Rogers.

Tickets for the event are \$10 per person and may be purchased at the First National Bank, CCA office, Garza Theatre and Chaparral Restaurant. Deadline for ticket purchases are at 5 p.m. February 26.

McFall has performed as Will Rogers in 43 states since 1982. He toured with James Whitmore as his understudy in "Will Rogers' U.S.A." and was the first person other than Whitmore to tour that show.

In 1989 McFall spent hundreds of hours in research, drew upon his seven years' experience as Will, and compiled his own show.

McFall is a native Kentuckian and a professional actor since 1966, appearing in motion pictures and on television in "All In The Family," "Benson" and "Archie Bunker's Place."

The public is invited to a special reception honoring Hamilton, which will be held Saturday from 3 to 6 p.m. at the CCA office.

Summer Youth Employment and Training Program seeks non-profit group participation

Planning is underway at JobSource+ for the Summer Youth Employment and Training Program.

The purpose of the program is to give youth ages 14-21 quality job experiences to build a positive work ethic. Youth are placed with public and private non-profit organizations for a maximum of 30 hours a week with JobSource+ paying the wages and providing worker's compensation for the participating youth.

With the \$504,958 allocated from the Texas Department of Commerce for Lubbock and Garza counties, JobSource+ plans to serve approximately 350 eligible youth during the summer of 1992.

Jon Masood, manager of Youth Programs at JobSource+, is currently speaking with organizations that are interested in hiring during the summer. Not only are youth placed in jobs throughout the two-county area, but other opportunities are provided.

Summer school tuition will be paid for those students who have failed courses during the previous school year up to a maximum of two courses. These students may also be placed with employers to work up to 20 hours per week. It is anticipated that 75-80 youth in this program will participate in summer school.

In addition to summer school, several special programs will be operating. JobSource+ is funding a project at Goodwill for handicapped youth to learn a choice of computer skills, outdoor maintenance/landscaping, janitorial/custodial skills, retail sales, child care or food service.

The Texas Tech Songs for Schools project involves creating music for elementary students geared toward the Spanish culture.

Also at Texas Tech is the GTE-PREP program. Students are challenged in the areas of computer science, business, mathematics, science and engineering.

New programs offered this year are Texas Tech Career Exploration and Computer Literacy for Youth.

The Career Exploration program will combine educational and vocational elements into one course that examines dropping out of school versus choices of education and beyond high school.

DOS 5.0, Lotus 1-2-3, WordPerfect and dBaseIII will be instructed in the Computer Literacy for Youth program taught at International Business College.

Enrollment and eligibility of students will be determined through coordination of JobSource+ staff and the school districts in Lubbock and Garza counties and the local children's homes.

Russ is the son of Cindy and Jay Bird and the grandson of Jimmy and Ada Lou Bird.

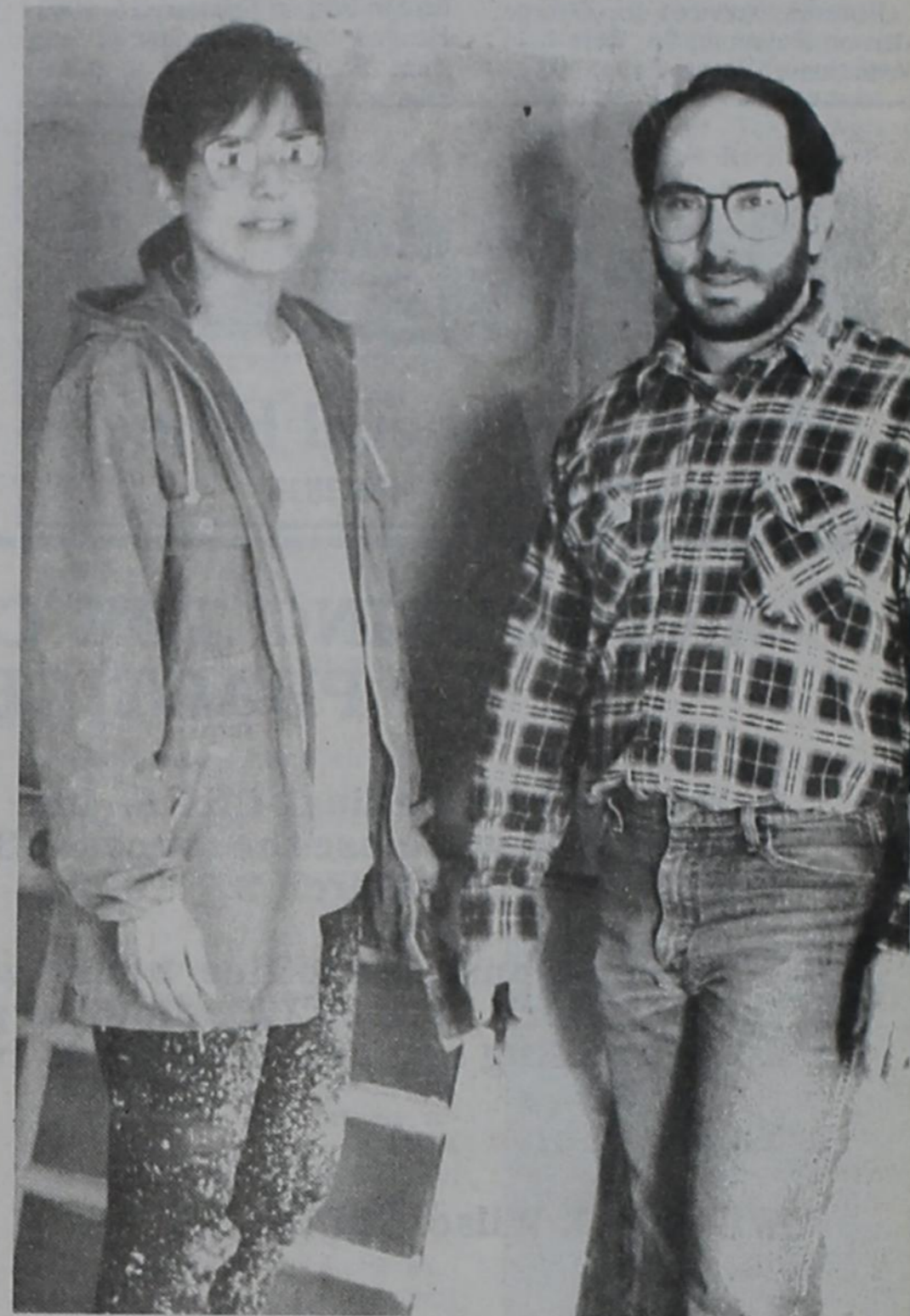


Grand Champion Steer

Garza County to elect businessman director to PCG

Garza County cotton producers and agribusinessmen will elect a Businessman Director to Plains Cotton Growers, Inc at 7:30 p.m., Tuesday, March 3. The meeting will be held at the First National Bank, Post.

Announcement of the election comes from Wayne Carpenter of Post, Garza County Producer Director to the 25-county cotton organization, and Jack Alexander also of Post, current Businessman Director.

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Living on the Edge of the Cap

A great deal of information has been printed and distributed across the South Plains in the past couple of weeks, regarding the Amnesty Day Waste Pesticide Collection Day. The Collection Day will be held on Thursday, March 5 at the O'Donnell Co-op Gin, located off

of Highway 87 on Loop 76 in O'Donnell. The collections will last from 8 a.m. until 3 p.m. and these times will be followed very closely so you must arrive and get in line before 3 p.m.

As you recall, the Amnesty Day will allow private pesticide applicators the opportunity to dispose of all unwanted pesticides with "no questions asked" and no fee needed. All types of herbicides, fungicides, insecticides, rodenti-

cides, etc will be accepted. The exceptions to this are pesticides containing 2,4,5-T and/or Sylvex.

There are some very important things to keep in mind as you travel to and prepare to participate in the Amnesty Day Collection procedure. Remember, only clean, triple rinsed containers that have been rendered unusable by puncturing are eligible to be submitted. It is critical to notice the Triple Rinsed notation. If any containers are found to be improperly rinsed they will not be accepted and then become your responsibility. The lone exception to the clean, triple rinsed rule will be the Bacillus Thuringiensis (BT) products. Due to the heavy, sticky nature of these

products, completely clean containers may be difficult. Also remember, items such as explosives, waste oils, solvents and non-pesticide materials will not be accepted.

Following are some "Rules for the Road" which will help you move through the collection procedure a little more rapidly:

1. Inspect containers. If you feel you have one or more containers that will rupture or tear when moved, do not move it. Notify collection site personnel for assistance.

2. As always, when you handle pesticides, wear protective clothing and equipment (gloves, goggles, respirator etc.)

3. Transport only containers which are securely closed. Pack containers that won't close inside containers that will.

4. Line the storage area of the transport vehicle with plastic sheeting to contain spill or leaks and simplify the clean up process.

5. If possible, arrange the pesticides by hazard class -- flammable, corrosives, oxidizers, etc to prevent mixing of incom-

patible materials if a spill should occur.

6. If any containers do not have the label securely attached, make a notation on the container of the contents and pesticide type. Unlabeled containers must be tested and this can be very expensive!

7. Brace containers in your vehicle to prevent shifting and spills.

8. Keep containers dry during transport. If it rains, make certain you have your pesticides well covered.

9. Be careful to keep fumes from entering your vehicle.

10. Make two copies of the pesticides you are transporting. List the pesticide name, number of containers and hazard class (when known). Include the emergency phone number for fire and police assistance. Should an accident occur, leave one copy on the seat of your vehicle, for emergency personnel, and take the second copy with you for reference.

11. After you have securely loaded your vehicle, drive directly to the gin in O'Donnell.

12. At the collection site, remain in your vehicle, be patient - the

line may be long.

13. Finally, it is very important to note, you are responsible for any damage and or leakage of your products whether the incident is your fault or not. Make certain to take extra precautions to guarantee your safety and the safety of others.

There is a large amount of chemicals which fit very nicely into the scheme of this Amnesty Day. The Texas Department of Agriculture, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Water Commission are all involved in this event. It may be a once in a lifetime opportunity for you to dispose of hazardous chemicals and pesticides at no charge. Plan to take advantage of this event and should you find yourself needing a copy of the above rules and procedures, feel free to drop by Extension Office.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages, regardless of socioeconomic level race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin.

She will be teaching Comprehensive Home Economics, Food Science and Nutrition, Advanced Apparel, Advanced Child Development, Individual and Family Life, Parenting and Child Development, and Consumer and Family Economics courses. Ms Stone, a 1987 graduate of Wall High School, is the daughter of Elmer and Barbara Stone of San Angelo.

Ms Stone is currently president of the Texas Tech University section of the Vocational Home Economics Teacher's Association of Texas and is an active member of the American Home Economics Association and Home Economics Recruiters, as well as the Texas Tech University Home Economics Council. Ms Stone's college honors and achievements include Home Economics Council Student Leader of the Month, Dean's List, Outstanding Senior Nominee, and is a recipient of the Jewell L. Taylor Scholarship. Ms Stone will

graduate from Texas Tech in May 1992 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Home Economics and teacher certification.

Texas Tech has the largest home economics teacher certification program in Texas and is one of the top 10 programs in the nation.

While many majors in the College of Home Economics specialize in one area, Home Economics Education majors are generalists. As generalists, these majors receive instruction in the areas of family studies, child development, clothing and textiles, food and nutrition, consumer economics, as well as family financial planning, housing, interior design, resource management and restaurant, hotel and institutional management. In addition, these students take professional development courses including teaching methodology.

The Home Economics Teacher Certification program prepares graduates for many careers which include positions in classroom teaching, adult and community-based education, Home Economics Extension, personnel, business, government, and educational support services such as media and curriculum development.

There are 25 Texas Tech home economics student teachers this

spring. The teaching sites include Lubbock, and the 30 miles surrounding area in addition to Post, Lamesa, Dimmitt, Plano, Longview, Richardson, San Angelo, Dallas, and Houston.

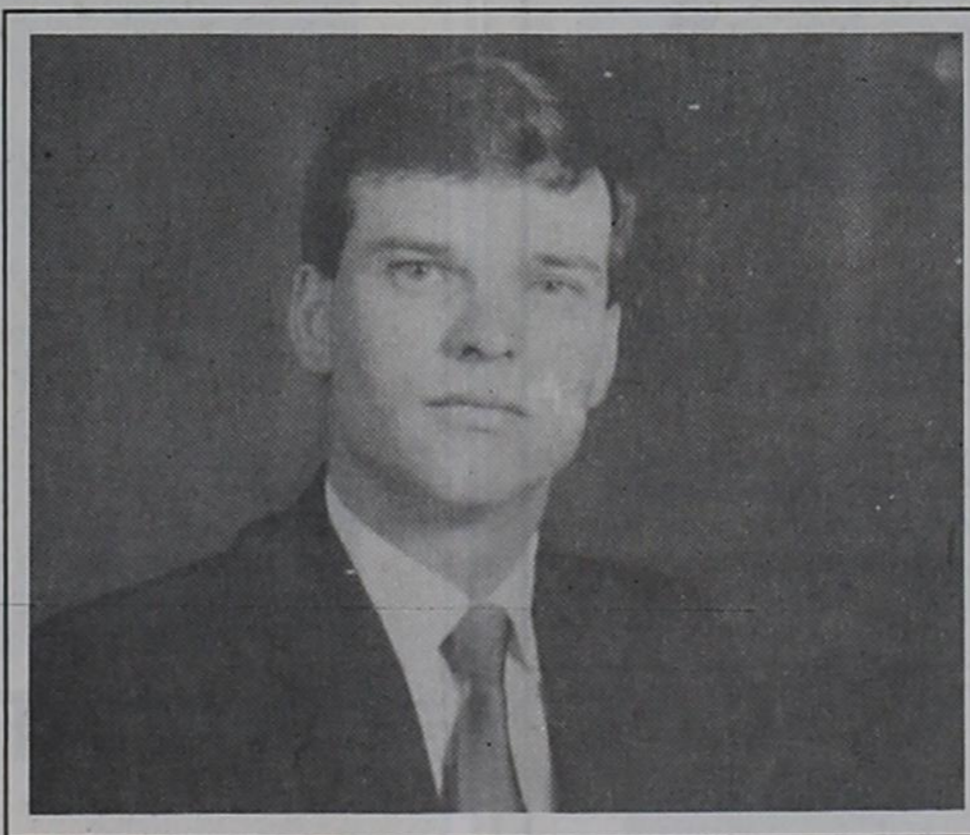

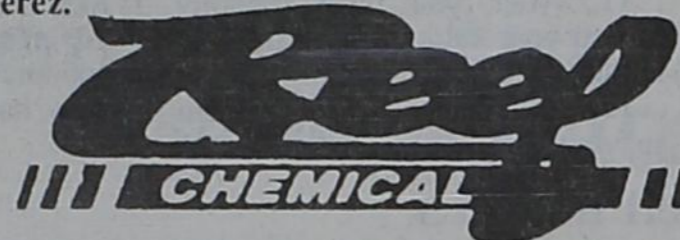

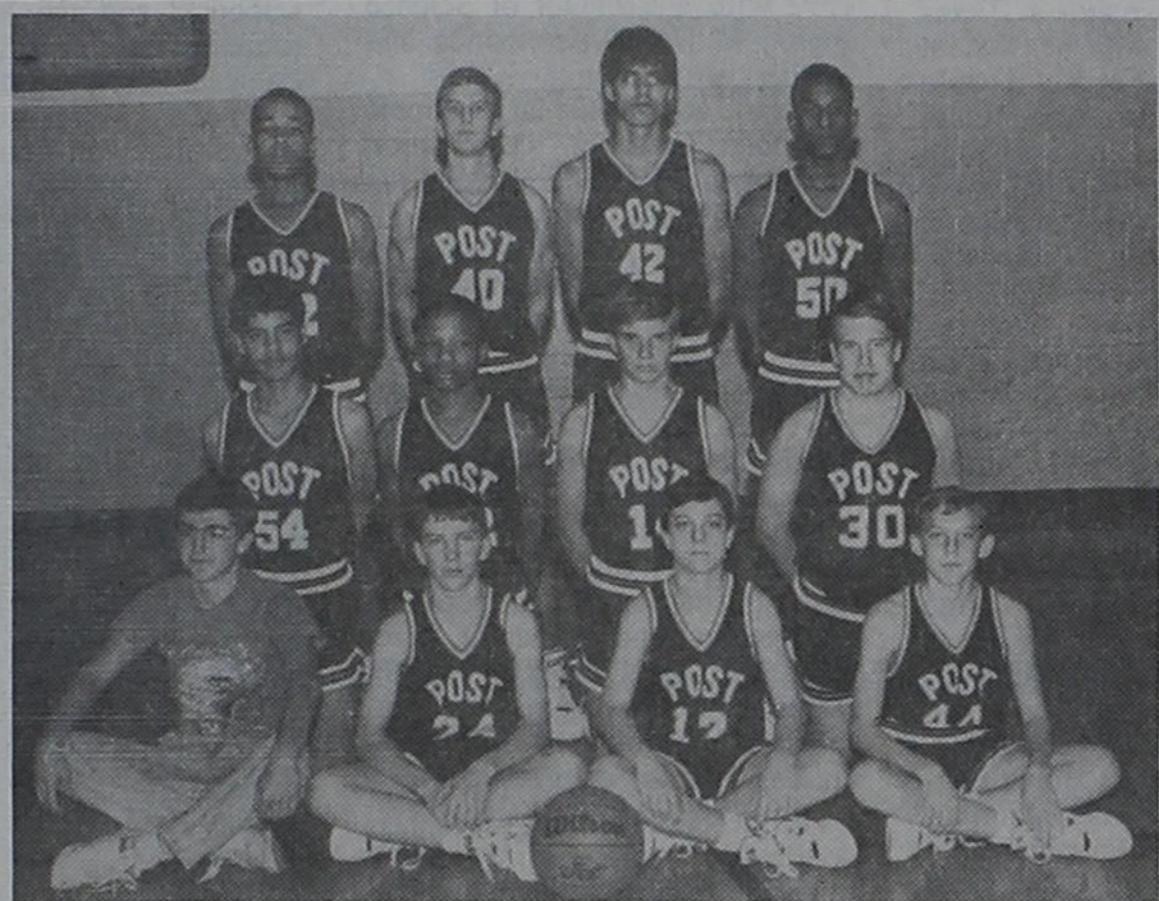

Farmers may apply for emergency loans

Low-interest emergency loans are available to eligible farmers and ranchers in 53 Texas counties declared disaster areas, including Garza County, Texas Agriculture Commissioner Ricky Perry has announced.

U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan issued the disaster declaration for counties that suffered adverse weather conditions in 1991, making affected producers eligible for emergency assistance from the Farmers Home Administration.

These counties were declared disaster areas due to hail, drought, heavy rain, heat and humidity

damage throughout 1991. These designations do not include the recent heavy rains.

Each loan application will be considered on its own merits, taking into account the extent of losses, security available, repayment ability and other requirements.

The following nine counties were designated as primary disaster areas, which means a certain percentage of the county's economic base was lost.

Crosby County suffered from agricultural losses from drought and hail between January 1 to July 19, 1991, and continuing. Drought

during the same time period damaged crops in Andrews, Dawson, Dickens and Duval counties. Heavy rains between January 1 and July 19 damaged crops in Bowie and Liberty counties. Heavy rains, high temperatures and humidity from July 1 to August 23 also resulted in El Paso and Leon counties being designated as primary disaster areas.

All other counties were declared contiguous disaster areas because they are adjacent to the primary disaster areas, but did not have the same extent of losses.

SBA offers emergency loans

Walter Fronstin, district director of the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) in Lubbock announced today that SBA is accepting applications for Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDL) from eligible small business concerns and small agricultural cooperatives located in the following Texas counties: Childress, Cottle, Crosby, Dickens, Fisher, Foard, Garza, Hall, Hardeman, Kent, King, Motley, Scurry and Stonewall.

Applicants must have sustained substantial economic injury because of their dependence upon farmers and ranchers who suffered agriculture damages caused by excessive rainfall which occurred between April 1 and June 30, 1991. To qualify for the EIDL loans, applicants must be unable to secure financing from other sources, and must be considered small by SBA size standards.

This loan program is intended to assist agriculture-dependent businesses and small agriculture cooperatives who sustained a substantial decrease in sales (or other forms of economic injury) directly due to losses incurred by farmers and ranchers to whom the business usually sells.


"Farmers and ranchers are not eligible for these SBA loans," Fronstin said. "Nor are small busi-

nesses claiming to have been physically injured by the excessive rainfall."

The interest rate for loans processed under this designation is four percent. The loans are limited to the financial needs of the applicant based on the actual economic injury and may be made for up to \$500,000. A loan may extend to 30 years, depending on repayment ability.

The deadline for filing applications under this designation is August 10, 1992.

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

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

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This ANN That

I have friends who live (that's not a typo!) to go "antiquing," and sometimes I like to go along and see what people have now decided is an antique. Lots of items I see in those stores are like the things my grandmother had when I was a kid. I wish that we had made a point to keep some of that stuff.

I remember when I was first married my grandmother gave me red and blue glassware to break into small pieces to make a mosaic tabletop. I thought that table would be perfect in my house. And it was! But now those glasses would really be worth something, and I don't even know where that table ended up!

Well, you can see why I'm not really an antique collector. If you are and you really love to bring those items home, but you don't care for the musty smell they sometimes have, the following suggestions may help you keep the antiques but get rid of the smell.

* To remove musty odors in enclosed parts of the furniture -- inside drawers or cabinet doors, for example, first open drawers and doors to air. Next, wash and scrub the insides thoroughly with a mild soap and hot water. Be careful not to soak the wood. Quickly dry damp surface with a towel and leave the doors and drawers open for a day or two. When thoroughly

dried and aired, spray with a cedar deodorizer or place your favorite sachet of potpourri inside to keep it smelling fresh.

* To rid old wicker of mildew, rub the mildewed spots with a cloth dipped in a mixture of ammonia and water. The cleaning cloth should be squeezed well to avoid saturating the wood, which could discolor it. Give cleaned areas a mild salt-water bath and dry in the sun.

* To clean a mildewed rug or piece of tapestry, take it outside and brush away any loose mold. If you do this indoors, you could inadvertently spread mold spores throughout the house. Vacuum away loosened mold and dispose of vacuum bags immediately in an outdoor trash can. Use a fan to dry damp spots. Remove mildew stains with a rug shampoo. If an item is badly stained or too delicate to treat, take it to a professional antique restorer.

* To clean dirty, mildewed leather-bound books, use saddle soap. Work a damp sponge into a lather by rubbing it on the soap then apply the sponge on the leather covers in gentle circular motions. Pass a clean, damp sponge over soaped areas until soap is gone, then dry. Buff with a shoe cream in a matching color to restore the leather's suppleness.

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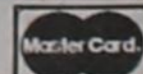
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
