

# Democrats choose Ratke, Wyatt, Norman, Valdez and Clinton

Democratic voters in Garza County chose a new sheriff and new county attorney in the primary election Tuesday.

Former deputy sheriff Kenny Ratke received 1,254 votes to Sheriff Freddy Cockrell's 490 and challenger Chris Wyatt picked up 835 votes to unseat County Attorney Preston Poole, who got 793 votes.

Precinct One commissioner Sammy Ellis was unseated by challenger Lee Norman 298-134 and Precinct Three voters re-elected commissioner John Valdez over challenger Kenneth Williams by a 397-144 margin.

Unopposed Tax Assessor-Collector Laura "Chita" Hataway got 1,350 votes. Also unopposed Constables Lonnie Gene Peel got 592 votes and Leroy Demming collected 550 votes.

Democratic voters here overwhelmingly chose Bill Clinton as their favorite presidential candidate with 771 votes. Paul E. Tsongas received 191 votes and Charles Woods got 110 votes.

Republican voters here chose President George Bush by a wide margin,

giving him 23 votes over challenger Pat Buchanan's 12. David Duke got one vote.

All vote tallies are unofficial and must be canvassed before becoming official.

Primary election winners will face voters again in November in the general election.

Democratic voters here also cast ballots in the presidential campaign for other candidates, including 58 for Edmund G. Brown, Jr.; 38 for Bob Kerry, 24 for Tom Harkin, 16 for Lyndon Larouche Jr., 14 for George Bennis, 13 for Rufus Higginbotham, nine for J. Lewis McAlpine and eight for Tod Howard Hawks.

Voting was considered above average for a primary election and county clerk Sonny Gossett reported a record number of early voters.

Complete details of the election by precinct for all candidates on the ballot will be published in next week's edition of The Post Dispatch.

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# Commissioners cancel contract with Dr Erdman

## Court expected to enter agreement with Dr David Hoblit

The Garza County Commissioners' Court voted at its regular meeting Monday morning to notify pathologist Dr Ralph Erdman of Lubbock of the required 60 days notice to cancel the contract for pathological services.

Judge Giles Dalby explained to commissioners that District Attorney Ricky Smith had recommended Dr David Hoblit as a replacement for autopsies.

"It has been the practice that all counties in the 106th Judicial District contract with the same pathologist," Dalby added. Justice of the Peace Dee C. Justice reported that he was waiting for an autopsy that was ordered in January and expressed his concern about the delay.

In other action, commissioners heard a report on a certified letter from the Texas Water Commission concerning an unauthorized landfill site located on the west side of the Justiceburg township. Precinct Four commissioner Herb Walls said the landfill, which residents in the area have been using for years, would require up to 100 truckloads to remove. Walls said he is to meet with TWC inspectors in the near future to work out a plan to cover the landfill.

"We've already put up signs and we're doing our best to keep it from being used," Walls said.

Dalby requested that members of the Ordinance Regulatory Board be contacted as to their willingness to continue serving and to schedule a drawing at the March 30 meeting of the court to determine staggered terms for board members. Dalby's suggestion for appointing city manager Bob Turner to serve as an "ex-officio" member of the board for consultation and advice was approved.

Members of the Ordinance Regulatory Board are John Boren, Clyde Cash, V.O. Rasberry, Ed Neff and Judge Dalby.

Commissioners approved the purchase of new maps designating the redistricting of precinct lines.

A contract renewal with Motorola for leasing of the radio tower was approved.

## Sales tax rebate shows slight increase

The most recent sales tax rebate to the City of Post from the State Comptroller shows a 3.65 percent increase over the same period last year.

The \$11,311.54 check compares to \$10,912.85 for 1991, bringing the total this year to \$42,672.49, an 8.01 percent decrease for the same time last year of \$46,388.48.

The quarterly sales and use tax analysis the Third Quarter of 1991 for Garza County shows a total of 56 reporting outlets, compared to 1991's 66 outlets.

The 1991 Third Quarter gross sales total was \$5,465,710, compared to \$5,453,264 or a net increase of .2 percent.

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### This ANN That

It's Spring sports time again. Lots of adults as well as kids are participating in sports for fitness as well as fun. Whether a person is an adult or kid, professional or once-a-week exerciser, food is a key factor in athletic performance -- but too many advertised products mislead and misinform, according to a registered dietitian. Everyone needs to eat a bal-

anced diet, which provides energy to complete an exercise routine and all the nutrients necessary for tissue growth and replacement after a workout, according to TAEX nutritionist Dr. Mary Kinney Bielamowicz. However, there are too many misleading advertisements and fad diets that can cause consumers to stray from healthful choices.

Many people who put their hopes in health products that claim to build their muscles and give them stamina often end up with a diet that lacks some important nutrients but has an excessive amount of others, she said. Nutritional practices based upon half-truths and misconceptions can even be dangerous if taken to the extreme.

Bielamowicz says some of the most common myths about how to get energy include:

- \* Eating more protein helps build more muscle -- Protein is important in building and protecting muscles, but high-protein diets or supplements have not proved to increase muscle mass. Without

proper exercise, excessive protein is often converted to fat and stored. Excessive protein intake may also strain kidney function.

- \* Eat a lot of carbohydrates before each workout -- A high-carbohydrate diet is not necessary for a regular workout. If you are preparing for a long-distance event (lasting an hour or longer) such as a marathon or bicycle race, a high-carbohydrate diet may be needed - starting several days before the event. For events lasting less than 90 minutes, a high-carbohydrate diet for one day can adequately fuel muscles.

- \* Drinking sports drinks before and after exercise is essential for replacing lost body fluids -- During activity, perspiration causes loss of water and minerals such as sodium and potassium that are important for normal body function. Under usual circumstance, the average American diet contains more than enough sodium to make up for losses. Supplements are not needed unless circumstances are unusual, such as participation in a triathlon in intense heat.

- \* Consuming foods or beverages high in sugar before exercising provides extra energy -- If you eat a food high in sugar 30 to 60 minutes before working out, it may actually have negative effect on your performance. The short-term energy boost could lead temporarily to hypoglycemia, which limits the brain's ability to use its fuel (calories) to boost muscular function and mental drive. Symptoms of hypoglycemia include feeling light-headed, disoriented, shaky, sweaty, and fatigued or having blurred vision and heart palpitation.

- \* Beverages that contain caffeine and alcohol stimulate the nervous system and provide energy -- Drinks that contain caffeine and alcoholic beverages have dehydration effects, which offer no benefits to a person who works out regularly or an athlete in training.

Whether you work out every day or play tennis or jog on the week-ends, pay attention to the food you eat. You'll feel better and perform better if you eat a balanced diet every day. Good luck to all those spring sports participants!

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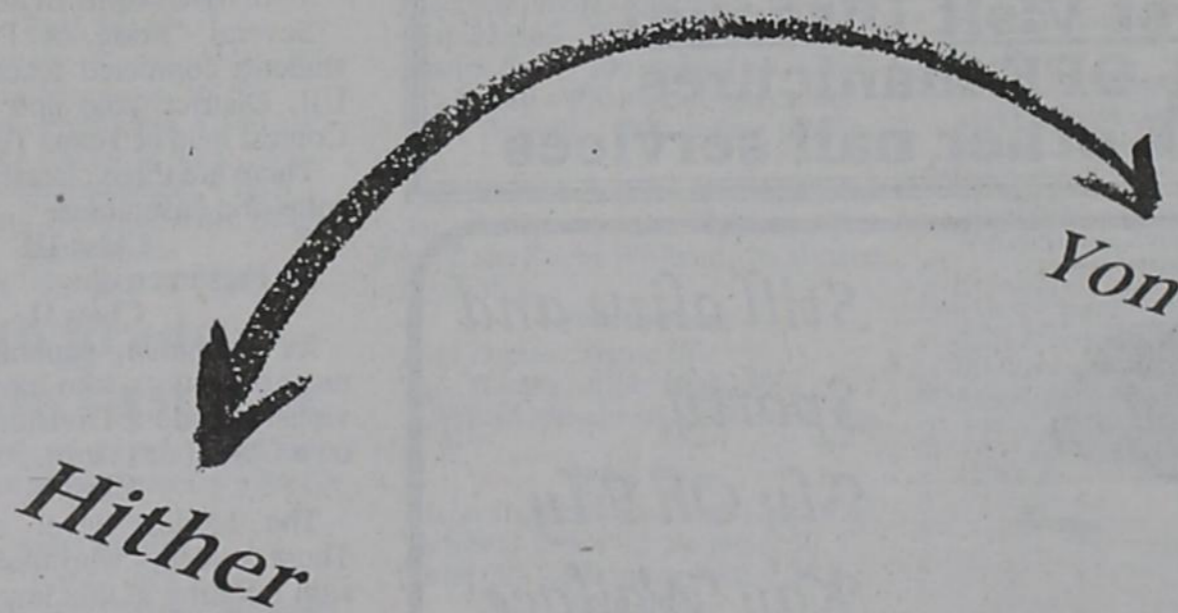
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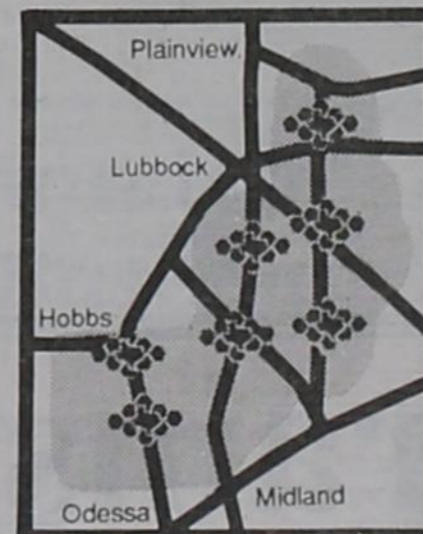
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## Southland inducts 12 to NHS and NJHS

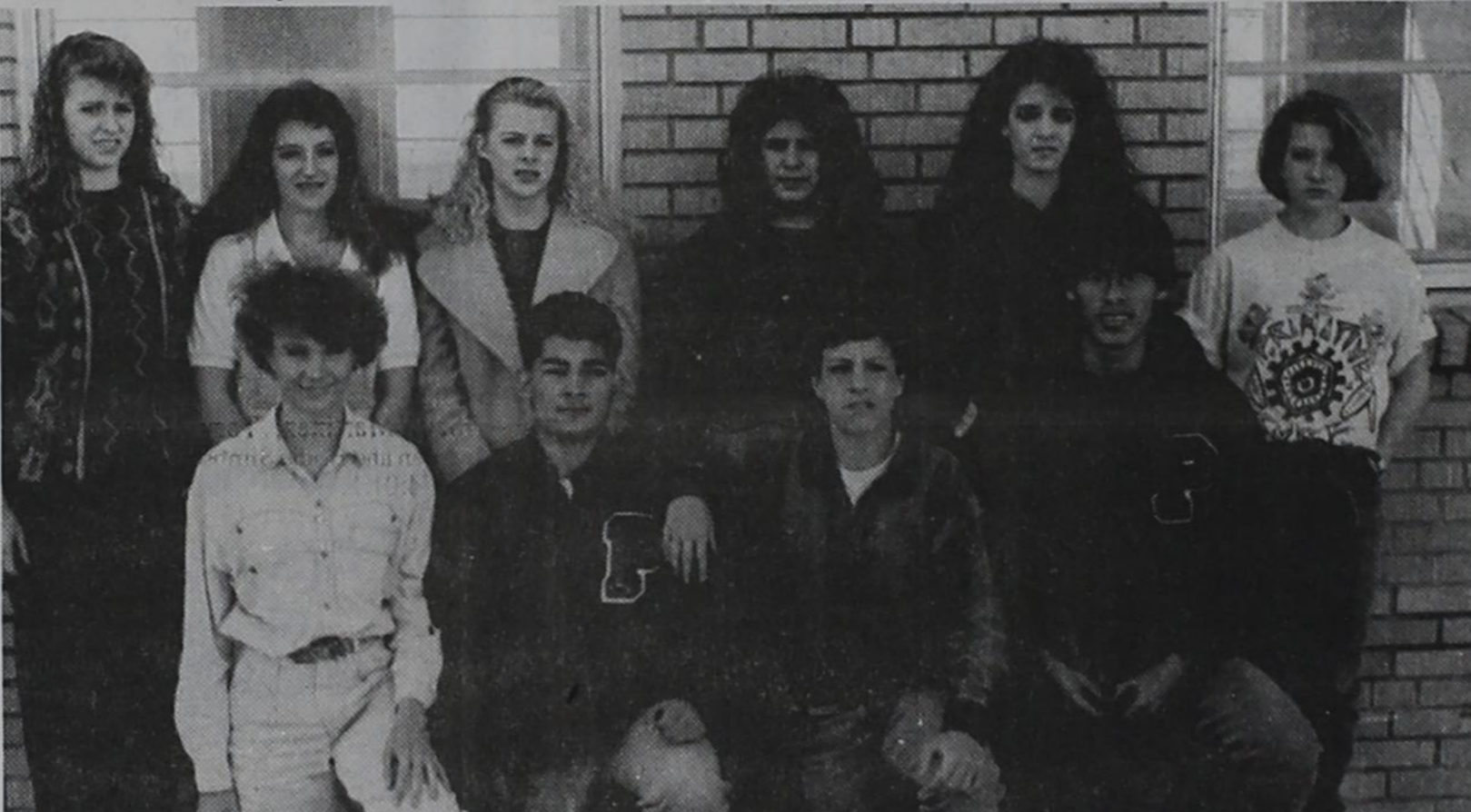

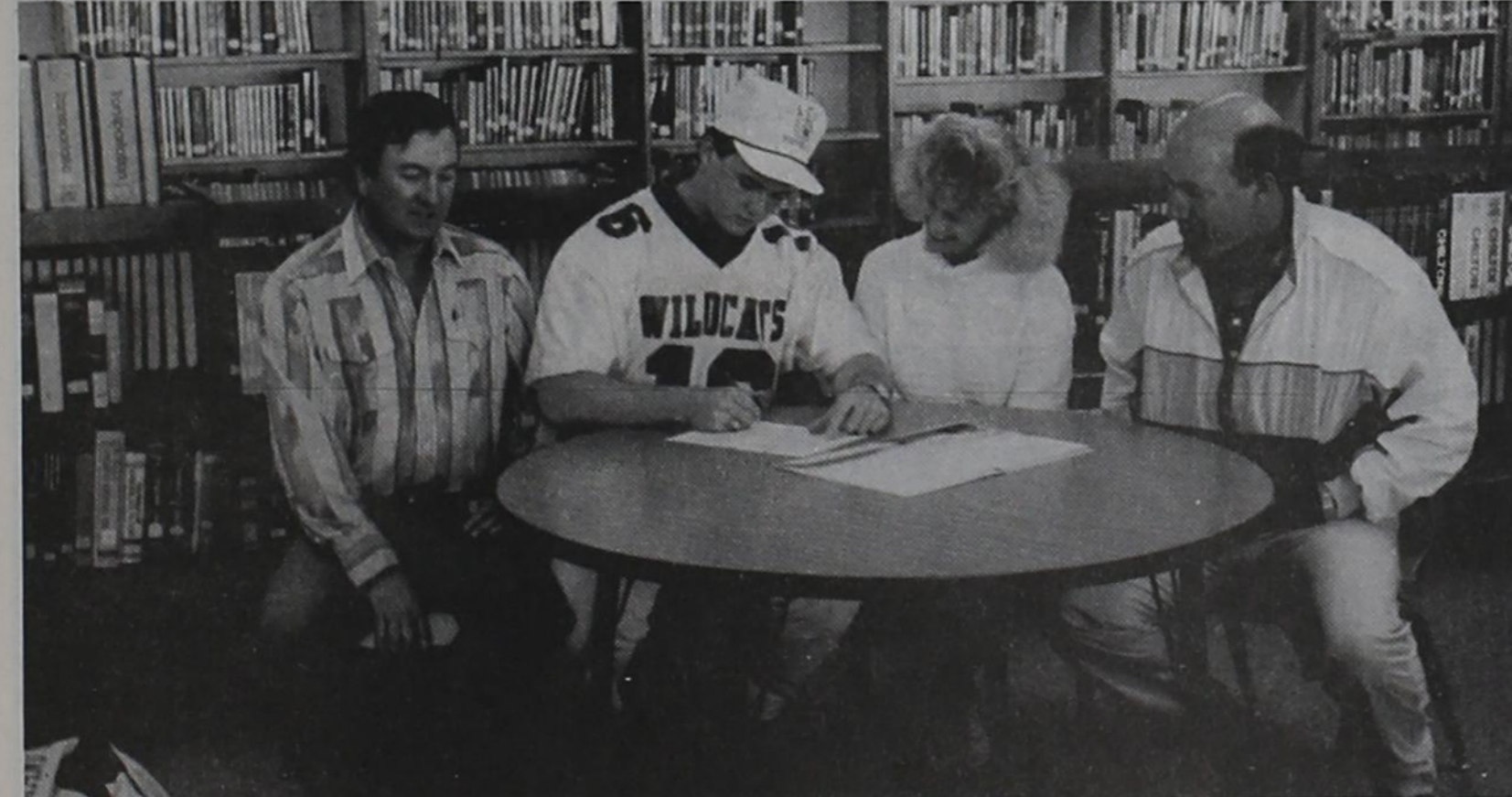

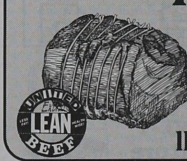

## Living on the Edge of the Caprock

As the weather begins to warm, grass greens and the spring rains come, homeowners start to turn thoughts to home lawn care. Soil conditions may well be just a bit too cool for active lawn growth but there are some things home lawn enthusiasts can do now for early preparation.

Weed control is a major item of concern this time of year because many early season weeds have begun to infest lawns. Preemerge herbicides offer good control of these weeds but, keep in mind that a preemerge herbicide will offer no control after the weeds have germinated and started to grow.

For weeds that have already emerged, a post-emerge chemical must be used. Keep in mind that all types of post-emerge chemicals cannot be used on all lawn grasses. To avoid damage to existing grass, make certain the chemical you are considering is cleared for use on your particular lawn grass.

Perhaps one of the most overlooked and underestimated practices for a quality lawn is regular applications of a balanced fertilizer. A balanced fertilizer is any fertilizer with all three elements represented on the bag. Example, a 10-20-10 fertilizer has all three elements of nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium (potash) present.

On the other hand, a fertilizer represented as 18-46-0 is not considered a complete fertilizer. If you are in doubt as to the type of fertilizer you need to apply, a soil test would certainly be in order to indicate exactly the type, amount and frequency of fertilizer your individual lawn requires. A standard rule of thumb is to apply 1.5 pounds of actual fertilizer per 1,000 square feet of lawn. This would equate to 18 pounds of 8-8-8 fertilizer per 1,000 square feet.

So far this year lack of water has not been a problem. However it is important to remember to always water in any type of granular fertilizer immediately after application.

We have some information for anyone with an interest in this program. The "Don't Bag It" program deals with all aspects of home lawn maintenance, water utilization and conservation. If you have an interest in any of the items discussed in this column or should this material raise questions, feel free to call our office at 495-2050.

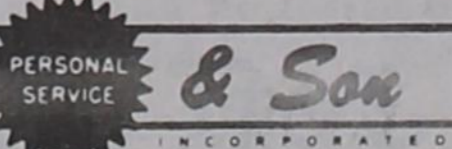
