# 911 service approaches for Garza County

As 911 implementation dates approach, citizens of the South Plains region will hear and learn more about the emergency service. The emergency communication service is due to start in Garza County by the end of December 1991.

The 911 service will provide faster access to public safety agencies in an emergency situation. The 911 lines will be dedicated and 911 call takers will be trained to recognize, answer and handle the call as an emergency.

"Emergency response personnel from public safety agencies are aware of the service, how the 911 system operates, and are humble enough to work with other agencies to provide the necessary assistance needed in an emergency," regional services specialist Ella O'Neal says.

"Overall, 911 will bring the communities closer together," she adds. "This will result in a better working relationship and better communication among public safety agencies and the community, but most of all, 911 will help save lives and property."

"No one knows when emergency assistance may be needed," O'Neal continues. "It is important that citizens, especially children, know what 911 is and when to use it." She cited a recent event in the Dallas area where a child's call saved the girls' mother from bleeding to death.

The intent of the 911 service is for use in an emergency situation to save lives and property, not for hang-ups and pranks.

O'Neal issued the following implementation dates:

August 1991 - Hockley, Lamb, Floyd and Motley counties. September 1991 - Yoakum County.

October 1991 - Bailey and Lynn counties.

November 1991 - Crosby County.

December 1991 - Cochran, Dickens and Garza counties.

# Commissioners approve appointment of new home economics agent

# Anna Nobles begins duties March 11

Anna Nobles, a native of Colorado City and recent graduate of Texas Tech University, was appointed to fill the county agent for home economics position, following a meeting with the Garza County Commissioners' court Monday morning.

Nobles will assume her duties March 11, moving here from Plainview where she has been training with former Garza County agent Colleen Chadwick.

Dr Kathy Volanty, district extension service director, introduced Nobles and emphasized to commissioners that she was confident in Nobles' abilities, enthusiasm and interest in a long term commitment here.

Nobles is a 1962 graduate of Colorado City High School and earned her Bachelor of Science in Home Economics at Texas Tech in 1990.

In other action, commissioners voted to continue workmen's compensation

coverage for elected officials. Sheriff Freddy Cockrell explained to the court that overtime in the Sheriff's Department was largely due to the inability to recruit a part-time dispatcher. "We just haven't found anyone who can be available when we need them," he added. The sheriff also pointed out that extra help has to be called in when an out-of-town trip to pick up or deliver prisoners is required. "We have six deputies and myself," he added, "and there are times when someone has to come in on overtime, especially during illness.

"I assure you, we are not looking for ways to create overtime," Cockrell

emphasized.

City water superintendent Mike Sanchez requested help from commissioners with work on West Main Street, which is expected to begin within the next two weeks. Commissioners agreed to assist with road crews and equipment on the landscaping project.

Justice of the Peace Dee Justice suggested an additional 60 days of work in his office on updating the ambulance records would give a better idea of the financial condition of the organization. Commissioners agreed to the extension and Justice's recommendation for a meeting with the ambulance committee later to review the situation.

Auditor Steve Sawyers presented a good report to the court concerning the financial condition of the county. "Overall," he said, "the county is in real good

shape." Sawyers pointed out that the ending balance for the fiscal year was approximately \$50,000 less than last year, but also pointed out that taxable

## Middle Ear Infections In Children

Infections of the middle ear (called otitis media) affect approximately seven out of ten children at least once before their third birthday. By age eight, almost all children have had at least one infection in the middle ear. Children often become irritable and may complain of fullness and pain in the ear. There may be some hearing loss. Some children experience fever as high as 104 degrees with earache. Many of these symptoms result from the presence of bacteria that build up within fluids in the ear. Infection causes tissue swelling which prevents fluid drainage from the ear into the throat by way of the eustachian tube.

The primary treatment of middle ear infections in children involves the use of antibotics to kill bacteria. Antibiotics commonly prescribed for ear infection include penicillin derivatives and the cephalosporins, a category of powerful and often well-tolerated antibotics. Steroids (prescription only) may be needed on a short term basis when there is fluid discharge from the ears.

Nonprescription medicines often are useful in dealing with the symptoms of the infection. Fever and pain reducers such as acetaminophen help reduce general discomfort associated with the infection. Decongestants and antihistamines help relieve associated congestion.
