City Council issues support for high school baseball program

Post City Council members, at the regular meeting Monday night, expressed unanimous support for the use of the city baseball field by Post ISD, which is considering the implementation of a baseball program at the high school.

City manager Bob Turner reported to the council that Post ISD athletic director Dewayne Osborne had asked about the city's position on the use of the older youth field on the east side of David Nichols Park.

The council authorized the city manager to work with the ISD, along with a committee of two members of the council, to prepare a written agreement for the use of the field, to include provisions for sharing costs of repair and maintenance. The plan would then be presented to the Park Board for consideration.

Turner also informed the council that a preliminary contract with the City of Slaton has been completed, which will provide Post a temporary solution to the disposal of solid wastes following the expected closing of the Post landfill later this year. Turner reported that The George R. Brown Partnership "was very helpful" by relocating existing pipelines so that another pit could be opened at the landfill, which will provide the city a few more months of operation at the site.

When the landfill is closed, all solid waste disposal will be transported by truck to Slaton's landfill.

"There seems to be no end to the federal and state mandates," Turner added during his administrative report, "we've just been notified that we must secure a storm water permit to operate vehicle maintenance facility, which will initially cost \$500 just for the permit."

The council authorized condemnation proceedings on a structure at 707 W. 11th, which has had no utilities in several years and after a number of inspections has been declared a safety hazard.

The first reading of an amendment to the animal ordinance was approved. The changes include a definition of restraint, including the leashing of animals in the back of pick up trucks.

A resolution was approved which authorizes the city to take advantage of the State Bid Price, which gives the city access to lower prices on equipment purchases.

General Telephone Company's O.D. Hearn reported to the council on the recent accidental cutting of the long distance cable, which left Post with no long distance service for approximately eight hours.

"We take a lot of precautions to make sure this doesn't happen, but one of our construction crews accidentally cut the optical fiber lines," Hearn said.

"The optical fiber is about the thickness of a human hair, and it is really a technically difficult job splicing and making sure it is all correct, that's why it took so long to get the service back on line," he added.

Hearn expressed his and the company's concern over the incident and apologized for the inconvenience to GTE customers. He also told the council that this year GTE will complete the 25 mile stretch from Tahoka to Brownfield.

Candidates begin filing for May 4 elections

Post ISD board of trustee Place 6 incumbent Barbara Hardin has joined Mark Kirkpatrick in filing as candidates in the May 4 election.

Hardin is filing for the Place 6 unexpired two year term and Kirkpatrick has filed for the two year unexpired term of Place 7 on the Post ISD ballot.

Mayor Giles McCrary has filed as a candidate for re-election in the municipal election, along with Marion Cruse for a city council position and incumbent city council member Dan Lamb.

No candidates have filed in the Garza Memorial Hospital Board of Directors nor in the Southland ISD election.

Filing deadline for candidates is March 20 in the school and city elections and April 8 for the hospital board of directors.

Caprock Cultural Association's Iva Hudman and Marie Neff reported to the council on the economic impact of arts in the community. Hudman emphasized that at the end of the fiscal year 1990 (August 31) the total arts income was \$137,610.41, which represents a 50 percent increase over the past five years combined.

She invited council members to attend the "Arts Day Celebration" Banquet April 5 at the Post Community Center, which will feature Tom Bowman as the principal speaker. He is a member of the board of the Texas Arts Council and a strong advocate of the Arts in Education projects.

The council appointed Victor Ashley to serve on the Park Board, replacing Wayne Childers.

Theresa Harp and Donald Windham were appointed to continue serving on the Post Housing Authority board.

Judy Bush was named election judge for the May 4 municipal election with Debbie Mason as alternate.

Mayor Giles McCrary informed the council that repair on the fence at the cemetery would begin soon. Turner explained that the property adjacent the cemetery is now being used for cattle grazing, which requires the repairs to the fence.

After a detailed discussion, the council authorized the law enforcement committee to meet with county commissioners to determine the needs and costs of replacing the radio system at the Sheriff's Department.

City attorney Harvey Morton explained the process for establishing a redevelopment or development zone, with tax abatement for industrial development. McCrary emphasized that the city should begin to make plans for future growth, especially considering the expected economic impact of the Lake Alan Henry project near Justiceburg.

Turner reported to the council that a new federally funded program, coordinated by the Soil Conservation Service, could be an answer to the storm drainage problem and fire protection system. Referring to the "Big Country" program which was announced recently in Snyder by Congressman Charles Stenholm, Turner said that grant applications could be submitted for projects such as flood control and fire protection.

Funding for the programs is through a rebate established by congress on oil companies for "overcharging" of fuel costs.

Attending the meeting were Mayor McCrary, council members Irene Fry, Larry Waldrip, Dan Lamb and Jim Schooler, city manager Turner, city secretary Wanda Wilkerson and city attorney Morton.

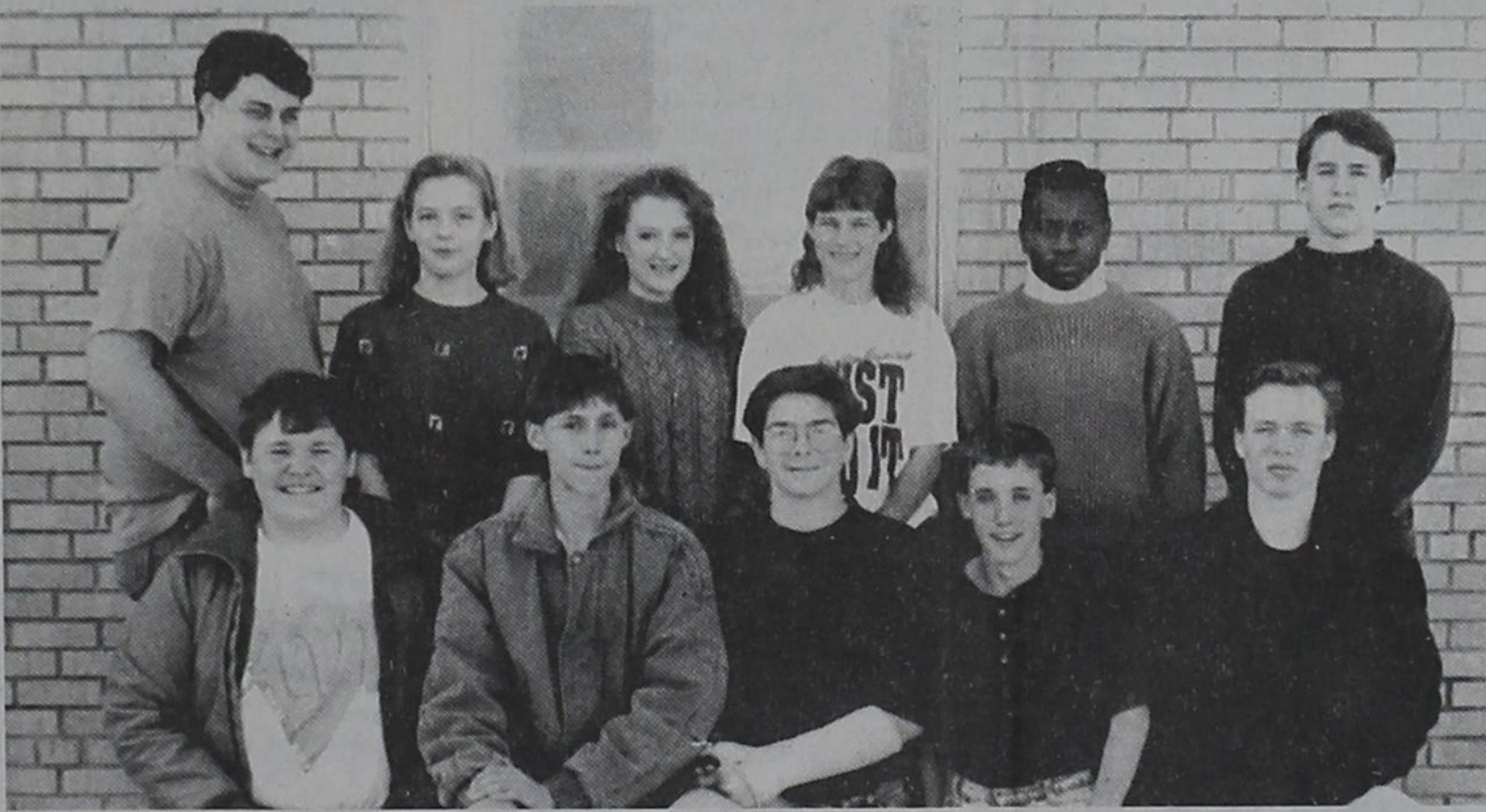
This is Owen's second trip to the state contest.

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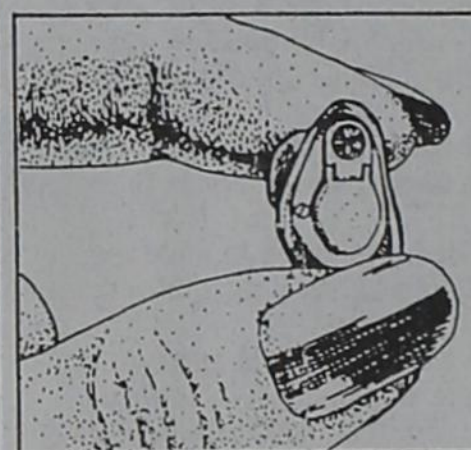
What To Do About Morning Sickness

One of the most common complaints experienced during pregnancy is morning sickness. According to recent statistics, about 60 percent of all pregnant women experience early morning nausea and vomiting, usually during the first three months of pregnancy. However, only a few women experience severe vomiting throughout the day.

Most physicians are cautious in prescribing medicines for pregnancy-related nausea and vomiting. A common recommendation is to avoid large meals. Eating small portions of low-fat foods at frequent intervals has been shown to be beneficial in some cases. Some physicians suggest treating morning sickness with soda crackers and caffeine-free soft drinks. Avoiding spicy foods and the smell of foods may help prevent the nausea and vomiting.

If these measures are not successful, nonprescription medicines that are proven safe to take during pregnancy may be helpful. A phosphorated carbohydrate solution such as *Emetrol* may help reduce nausea. According to a recent article in *Pharmacy Times*, the antihistamine *meclizine hydrochloride* is considered by some to be the drug of choice for the management of morning sickness. However, no medicine should be consumed during pregnancy without the advice of a physician.

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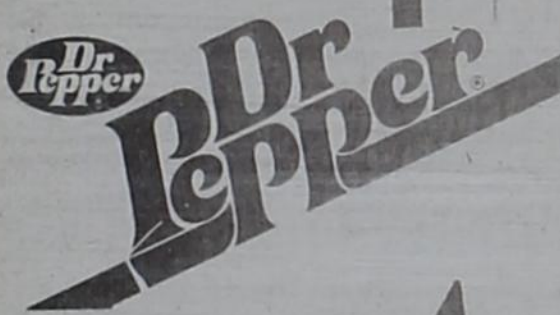

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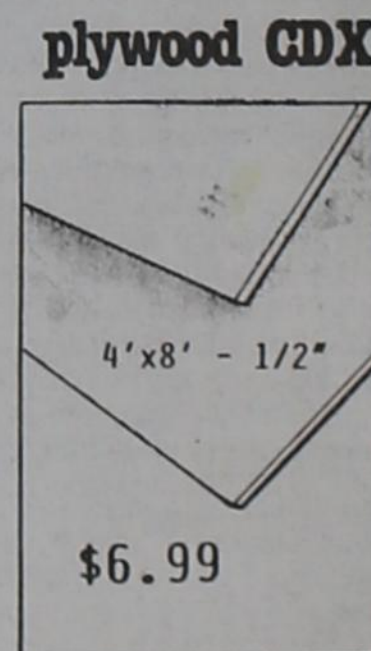
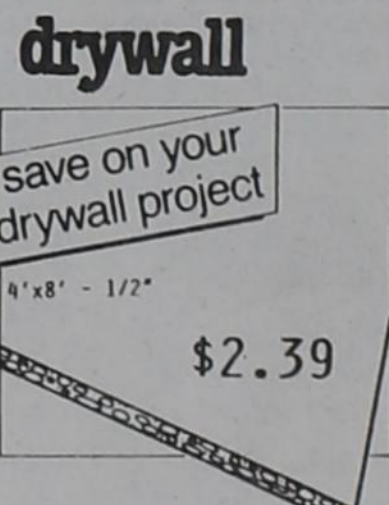
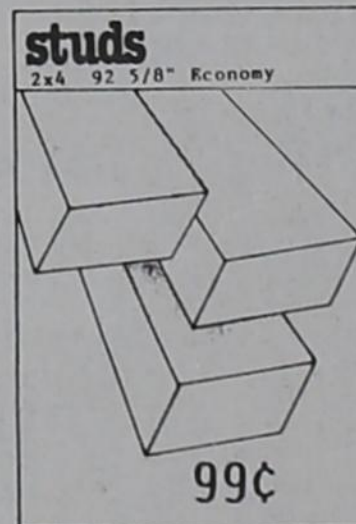
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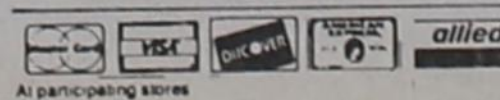
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Traci Tannehill, Kirk Stevens exchange vows February 23
