

Taba'na Yuan'e Indian ceremony starts at 6 a.m. Friday

On Friday, March 22, 1991 the Post Chamber of Commerce will host the "Sunrise Wind" ceremony, translated from the Comanche Indian "Taba'na Yuan'e." This ancient custom was used by the Comanche Indians to predict the good or bad conditions for the coming year. They later taught the early settlers this custom.

Once again Chief Frank Runkles will be performing the ceremony with the assistance of Ken LeBlanc.

Guest should arrive by 6 a.m. in order to observe the entire performance which ends with sunrise. The unique Indian ceremony will be held at the Post City Park located on the south part of the town lake just off of Highway 84. A full catered breakfast will follow the ceremony.

The Algeria Art Center will host their annual Collector's Show with exhibits from the Lubbock Art Exhibit. The Art Center will be open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on March 22nd and 23rd and from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. on March 24th. Admission to the ceremony and art exhibit is free.

The ceremony, a careful observance of an ancient Plains Indian spring ritual, begins with the lighting of the fire and constructing the circle of council.

The Taba'na Yuan'e tradition, which dates to earliest memories of the Plains Indians, began here in 1906 when early pioneers in Garza County recalled the legend as told by the Indians.

The ceremony is held each year on March 22, as visitors and Garza County residents gather around a circular ceremonial ring to watch a dancer, clad in traditional beaded buckskins and feathered headdress, perform an Indian version of an extended weather forecast.

Taba'na Yuan'e translates to "The Sunrise Wind."

The Plains Indians used the dance to check the wind direction at the exact moment of sunrise, which would determine their success in the coming year.

According to the legend, the wind must be checked at sunrise on the day after the sun reaches the halfway point in its journey from the south to north.

Garza County farmers and ranchers have relied on the Taba'na Yuan'e for more than 80 years to provide a hint as to their success in the coming year.

"Chief" Runkles has been faithfully keeping the ceremony true to its original form since 1973. He is a longtime student of Indian lore.

He starts the Taba'na Yuan'e with the building of a small fire, using only natural materials. The fire is lit by the friction of rubbing two sticks together.

Following the lighting of a tribal prayer of thanks for the fire, the "Chief" performs a Four Winds dance where a pipe of peace is presented to the Four directions then to Mother Earth and to Wakantanka, the Great Spirit above, to seek their blessing.

A wad of grass is placed on the coals and as the smoke indicates the wind direction at the moment of sunrise, the Smoke Dance is ended by kneeling and pointing a feather in the direction from which the wind comes.

Post ISD trustees authorize engineer to proceed on building improvement projects

Installing special equipment at the gymnasiums for the physically handicapped and a new sound system at the auditorium were among the items outlined by Post Independent School District engineering consultant Bill Stracener at the regular Board of Trustees meeting Tuesday, March 12.

The handicapped facilities, approved at a previous meeting, will include a lift at the high school gym and a special ramp at the middle school gym. Stracener informed the trustees that detailed cost estimates of the improvements to the sound system at the auditorium should be completed in time for the April meeting for final approval.

Other building improvements being considered by the trustees includes central air conditioning and heating systems for all campus buildings. Stracener introduced Jimmy D. May of Higgins & May, Inc., consulting engineers, who outlined preliminary estimates for the project.

May cited the recently completed work in Lubbock on 28 campuses, "which gives us a basis in which to make some estimates."

He told trustees that the elementary school here will need 160 tons, the middle school building 101.5 tons and the high school facility 148 tons of air conditioning. The total estimate was approximately \$1 million, based on bids received in 1990 for the Lubbock project.

May recommended the system include programmable energy monitoring and insulation to take advantage of energy savings. Post ISD superintendent Bill Shiver said that the potential savings in energy consumption could be an important factor to consider.

The board authorized May to conduct an energy study, comparing current utility costs to provide more accurate information for the board to consider. The energy analysis is expected to be completed in time for the April meeting.

Other improvements discussed included the possibility of constructing a new high school gymnasium with seating on both sides of the court, and use of the space underneath permanent bleachers. Stracener reported that he is still preparing details for the project.

The addition of six classrooms at the elementary school is also under consideration. Stracener showed the board a drawing, recommending the classrooms be added to the southeast wing, with three on each side. The engineer was authorized to study the need and costs of improving restrooms in the elementary school building as part of the improvements.

No action was taken on the proposed implementation of a baseball program at the high school, following input from citizens at the beginning of the meeting. Board of trustees president Dan Hodges explained the board policy concerning public input. Following comments by the supporters of the baseball program, Hodges allowed for a motion to bring the item up for discussion, but the matter was left "tabled" for lack of a motion.

GMH board members file for May 4 election

Garza Memorial Hospital board of directors incumbents Jack Alexander, Zoe Kirkpatrick and David Nichols have filed for reelection on the May 4 ballot.

There were no additional filings for Post City Council. Candidates currently on the ballot are incumbents Larry Mills and Dan Lamb and challenger Marion Cruse along with Mayor Giles McCrary seeking reelection.

Post ISD board of trustee Place 6 incumbent Barbara Hardin and Mark Kirkpatrick have filed as candidates in the May 4 election.

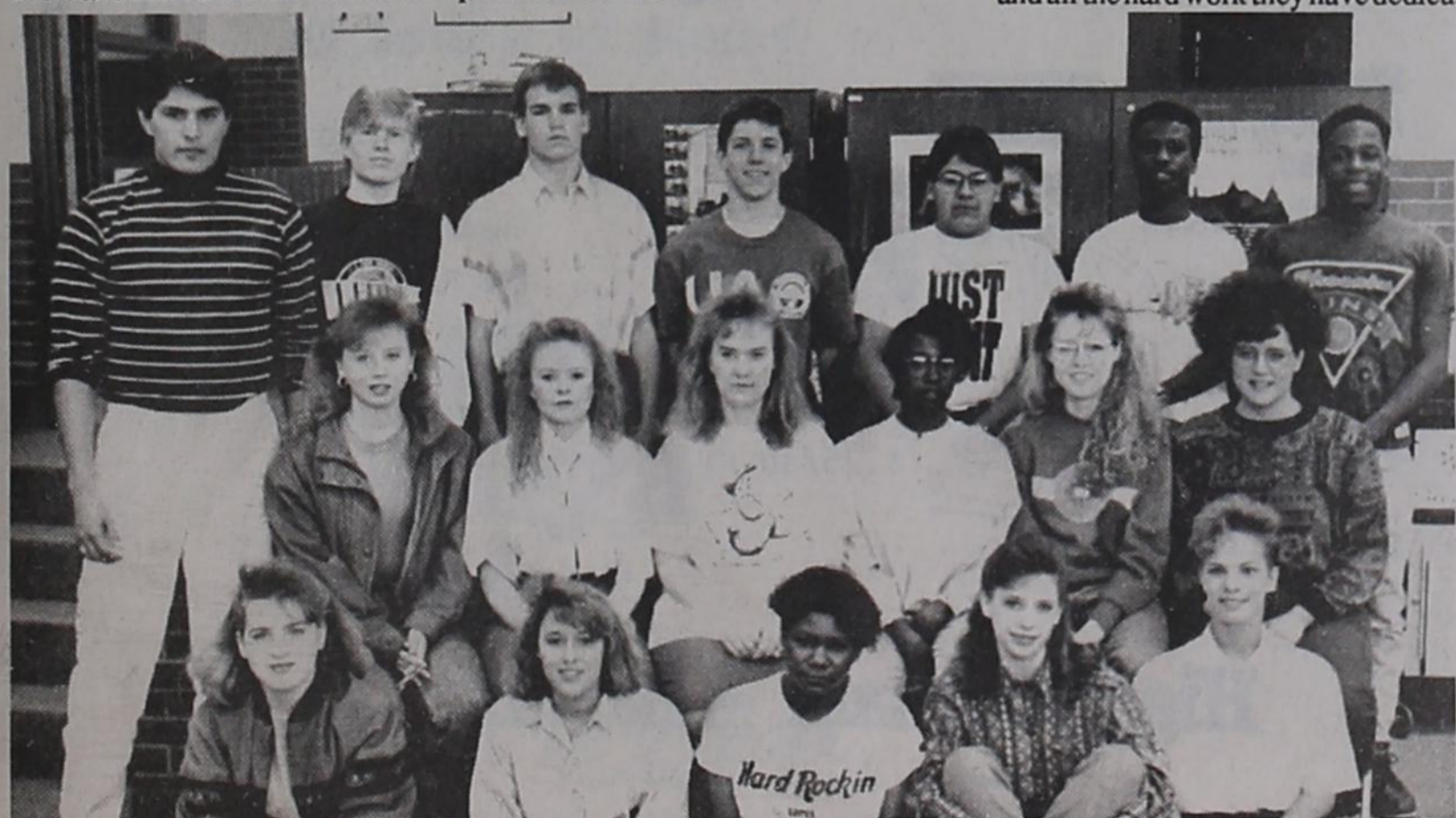
Hardin is filing for the Place 6 unexpired two year term and Kirkpatrick has filed for the two year unexpired term of Place 7 on the Post ISD ballot.

Todd Taylor, Monroe Buxkemper Jr and V.C. Wheeler have filed in the Southland ISD board of trustees election. Taylor is seeking fill a two year unexpired term, Buxkemper, who is serving an unexpired term by appointment seeks to be elected to the same three year position and incumbent Wheeler has filed for a three year term.

Filing deadline for candidates is March 20 in the school and city elections and April 8 for the hospital board of directors.

In other action, Shiver reminded board members that they will face major decisions concerning the tax rate following pending legislative action in Austin. "We may face a major tax increase, or severe cuts, depending on what happens on the school funding issue," Shiver emphasized.

"Be forewarned, the fund balance that looks like we have a lot of money, will be used up in a hurry, and as you know, our auditors have always recommended at least one full year of funding be set aside for just such emergencies."

Trustees approved renewal of five certificates of deposit in the amount of \$4,974,393 at rates from 5.35 percent to 5.41 percent for 30 to 32 days.

Without entering executive session, the board approved the administrative recommendations for personnel.

Attending the meeting were board of trustees members Hodges, Barbara Hardin, Gary Workman, Pru Basquez, Jerry Hays and Ronnie Gradine.

High Blood Pressure: Five Things To Do

High blood pressure cannot be cured. Control of blood pressure takes a commitment to several things that can make living with the condition easier. If you have high blood pressure, here are five things you can do:

1. Keep track of your pressure. Home blood pressure monitoring equipment makes possible the obtaining of frequent measures.
2. Reduce salt intake. Cook with less salt and use less table salt. When shopping, purchase foods with low-sodium content as compared to brands with more sodium. And avoid "salty" foods such as potato chips and pretzels. If you are overweight, reducing calorie consumption will facilitate weight loss and may reduce blood pressure.
3. Stay fit. One of the best exercises for all age groups is walking. Walking 20 to 30 minutes three or four times a week will help burn excess calories and give you a feeling of extra energy.
4. Stop smoking. Cigarette smoke contains substances that tend to increase the blood pressure.
5. Take prescribed blood pressure-lowering medicines. The "best" medicines are those that control pressure with a minimum of side effects.

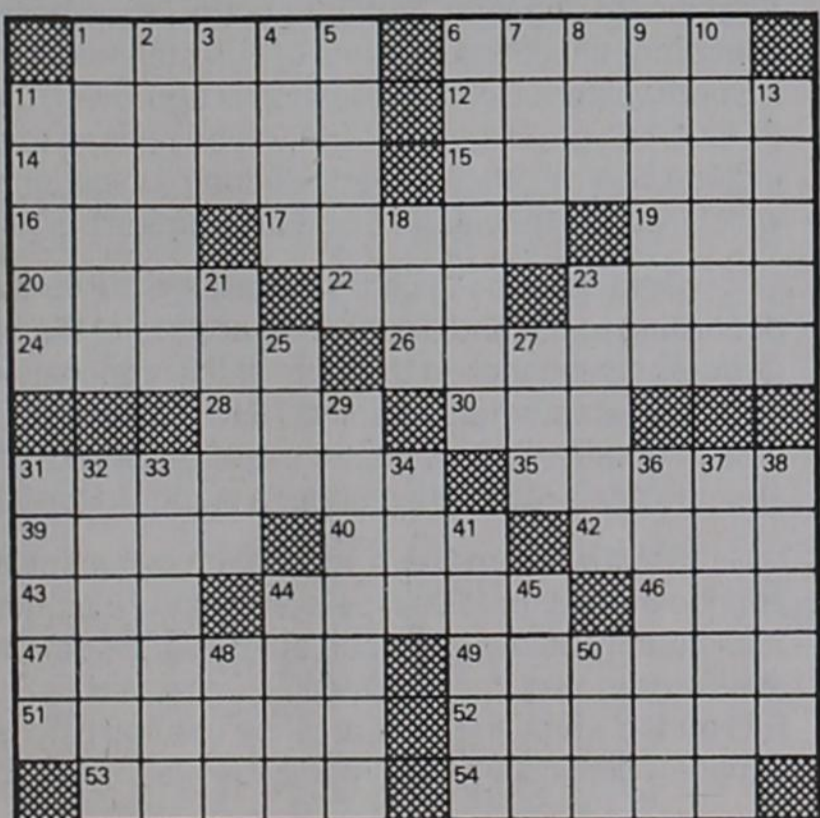

Justiceburg. The 18 wheeler from San Antonio, loaded with horses, overturned, trapping the driver between the seat and the door. The driver was freed from the wreck by people at the scene before the Post Volunteer Fire Department "jaws of life" arrived at the scene. A passenger in the truck also suffered injuries. The two were transported by Garza County EMS to Garza Memorial Hospital. The passenger was later transferred by ambulance to Lubbock's University Medical Center for further treatment.

Following the accident sheriff's deputies, assisted by Riley and Mary Miller, Giles Dalby Jr and Ted Tatum, spent several hours rounding up the horses, which had scattered along the highway. Fourteen of the horses died in the accident, four had to be destroyed at the scene and a few were still in the trailer.

Early Monday morning deputies responded to a one car accident 18 miles east on U.S. Hwy 380. The injured driver was transported by the Garza County EMS crew to Garza Memorial Hospital and then to Lubbock for evaluation.

Also Monday sheriff's deputies arrested a Southland man and charged him with disorderly conduct and reckless conduct following an incident there. The man was later released on bond.

Tuesday morning an 18 wheeler struck and killed a horse near Justiceburg. No one was injured in the accident. Officials speculate that the horse was one of the ones from the Saturday morning accident.

Law enforcement officers were also active during the weekend attempting to control speeding as the annual spring break of schools resulted in heavy traffic on the major highways.

If this proposal is approved, Southwestern Bell intends to provide service to this market segment via its PLEXAR-Custom service, which provides for contractual rates and charges to be based on an individual customer-specific basis.

PLEXAR-Custom is a central office-based service which provides switched voice and/or data communications similar to a customer-premises PBX. PLEXAR-Custom service is currently being provided on an individual customer-specific basis via Southwestern Bell's Customer Specific Pricing Plan Tariff for central office-based telecommunications systems of 200 stations or more. If Southwestern Bell's application is approved, the PLEXAR-Custom service tariff will be revised to also include central office-based telecommunications systems which require between 75 and 200 stations.

Centrex and Plexar-II services are currently priced according to a standard tariff regardless of the customer's geographic location in the state. If this application is approved, customers needing 75 to 200 stations will be able to obtain this service priced on an individual customer-specific basis rather than under a standard tariffed rate.

Southwestern Bell's application proposes that the service market for PBX/type systems of 75 stations up to 200 stations be declared subject to significant competition statewide in all of the exchange areas served by Southwestern Bell and in which the central office capability to provide the service exists and/or can readily be made available.
