

Dream comes true for Post and Lubbock with Lake Alan Henry dedication

Approximately 800 people gathered around the rim of the canyon 12.6 miles east of Justiceburg last Friday morning under a cloudy sky to participate in the historic ground breaking ceremony marking the end of more than 20 years of planning and the beginning of one of the most important projects for Lubbock, Post and West Texas.

Lubbock Mayor Peck McMinn said in his remarks that the event ranked in importance along with the procurement of the railroad, the establishment of Texas Tech University and the cross-town expressway.

All the speakers at the podium emphasized the historic measure of the lake and its impact on West Texas.

Among those to comment were Post Mayor Giles McCrary and Garza County Judge Giles Dalby.

"West Texas has always believed in the good neighbor policy," McCrary commented, "and today is the beginning of this tradition with a new emphasis. The future of Post in the next two to five years will be materially affected with the creation of this lake."

"On behalf of Post, with much optimism," McCrary added, "I pledge to Lubbock the cooperation and support of this new project and assure you, Mayor McMinn and city council, Post is here to continue a long lasting good neighbor relationship."

Dalby, taking his turn at the podium, emphasized the economic importance of the project and welcomed the opportunity to cooperate with Lubbock in the lake's development.

Keynote speaker for the event was State Senator John Montford. Bob Nash served as master of ceremonies.

McMinn formally dedicated the lake and recognized former mayor Alan Henry for his efforts in developing the project.

McMinn announced that the dam is officially named the "John T. Montford Dam" and the recreation area was named in honor of Samuel W. Wahl, recently retired Lubbock water department supervisor.

The lake will be constructed and operated by the Brazos River Authority.

When completed the lake will cover 2,880 surface acres and impound approximately 116,000 acre feet of water with a depth of 100 feet at the dam.

The earthen dam will be 3,600 feet long, stretching between two canyon walls, 1,000 feet wide and will have a crest of 138 feet at its highest point. Approximately seven million cubic yards of material will be used to construct the dam. Granite Construction Co. is expected to complete the dam by the summer of 1993.

Water will be piped to Lubbock with pumping stations and a treatment plant in Lubbock.

Public access to the completed lake will be by FM 2458 from U.S. Hwy 84, approximately 15 miles southeast of Post. A 580 acre site on the north side of the lake will be set aside for boat launching, hiking, picnicking and fishing. The lake will be stocked by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Other development along the lake will be controlled by private land owners, in compliance with a Garza County zoning ordinance.

Public hearings set for city council redistricting

Two public hearings have been set concerning plans for establishing individual voting districts for the Post City Council. April 28 the public is invited to attend the first of the hearings at the Pleasant Home Baptist Church beginning at 1 p.m. and May 1 at 7 p.m. another public hearing on the issue will be held in the fellowship hall of the Holy Cross Catholic Church.

"The purpose of these public hearings," Mayor Giles McCrary says, "is to offer the people an opportunity to express themselves about the future plans for setting up city council member districts."

Plans for the redistricting are to be studied, based on the latest information from the U.S. Census Bureau, and public hearings on the issue are required to satisfy requirements by the U.S. Department of Justice.

Currently all city council members are elected in an at-large system.

"We have been studying this change for some time now," McCrary adds, "and now that the census has been completed we believe we are better able to discover proper voting districts to abide by the federal voting rights act."

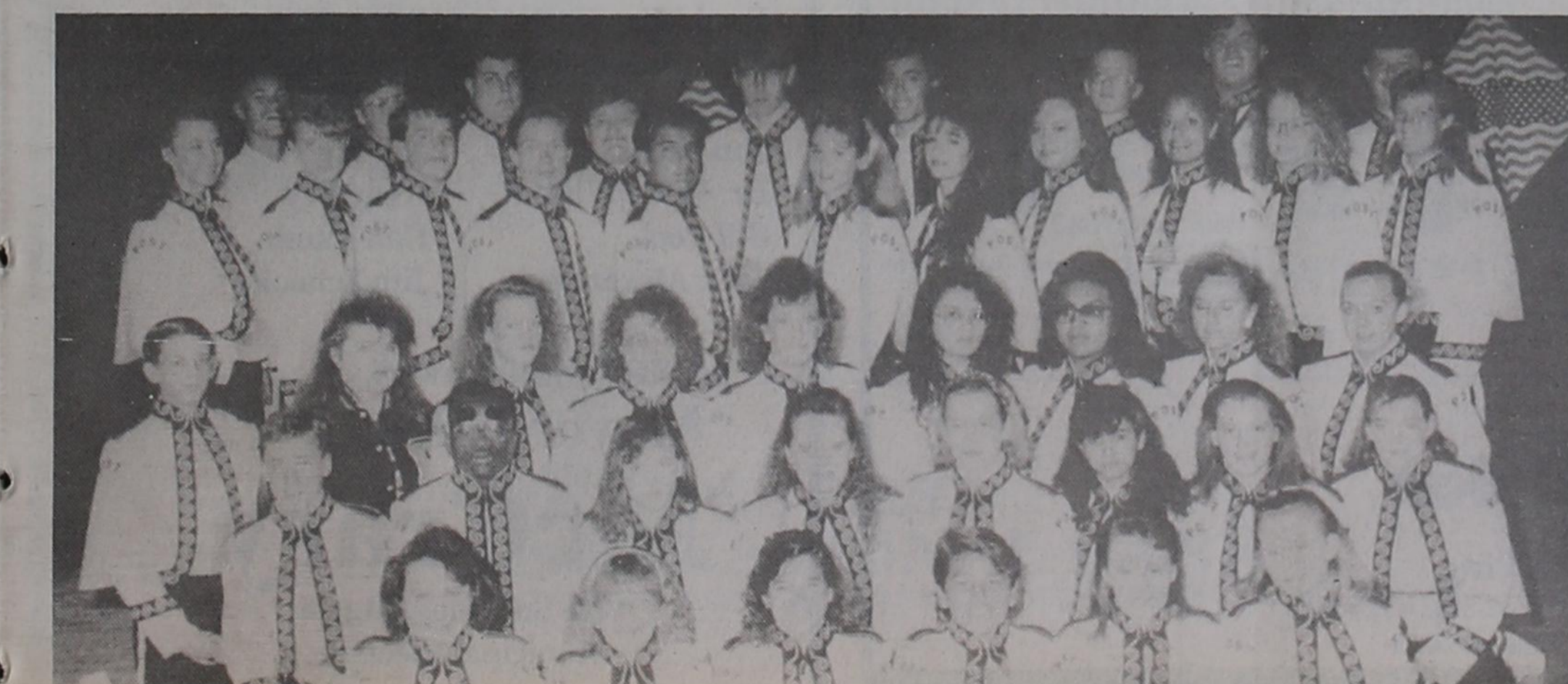

Commissioners approve South Plains Community action remodelling at service center

The Garza County Commissioners' Court, at the regular meeting Monday morning, approved plans for remodelling of the service center on the Snyder Highway, which will include paving of the parking lot.

The building will be improved with a new outside look as well as upgrading inside. Funding for the project is through a rebate to the federal government from "oil company overcharges", administered by South Plains Community Action.

Commissioners agreed to a 10 year leasing arrangement, with the provision that county vehicle parking behind the building would be a priority for that area's use.

Commissioners also accepted the Texas Jail Standards Certification, which found the Garza County facility in full compliance, "we're certainly happy about that," Judge Giles Dalby emphasized.

A \$50 per year membership to the Big Country RC & D was approved, and commissioner Sammy Ellis was named to represent the court on the local committee, which is composed of representatives of member organizations.. Membership in the RC & D will provide Garza County opportunities to get funding for special projects, such as storm drainage improvements.

Garza Soil and Water Conservation District board member Richard Hart and conservationist Obie Kelly presented a request for continued funding for the district, and after reviewing the budget request, approved an \$800 funding for this year.

No action was taken on a proposal by Carrol Stark of Tri-State Communications to provide long distance telephone service at a "savings from 25¢ to 19.95¢ per minute," Stark said. The item will be studied and placed on the agenda for the next meeting.

Judge Dalby suggested that all used and obsolete equipment stored in various buildings and offices be collected at a central point for an auction to be held in the near future. "We have a lot of stuff sitting around taking up space and this is a good way to clean house," he said. Commissioners agreed and Donald Windham was instructed to begin the process of moving the items to the warehouse offered for this purpose by Dalby.

Attending the meeting were commissioners Sammy Ellis, Albert Stone, John Valdez, Herb Walls, Judge Dalby, clerk Sonny Gossett and treasurer Ruth Ann Young.

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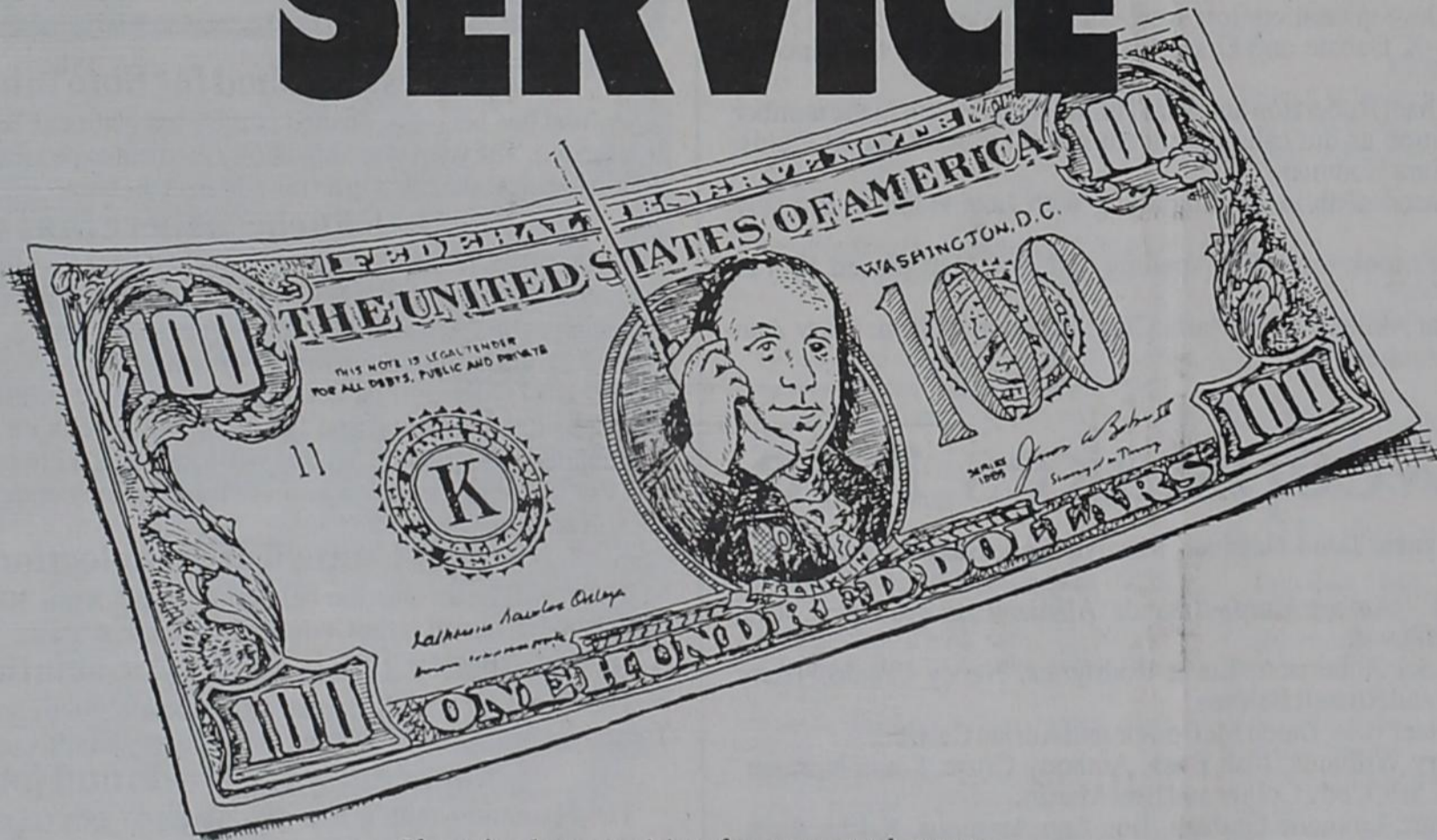

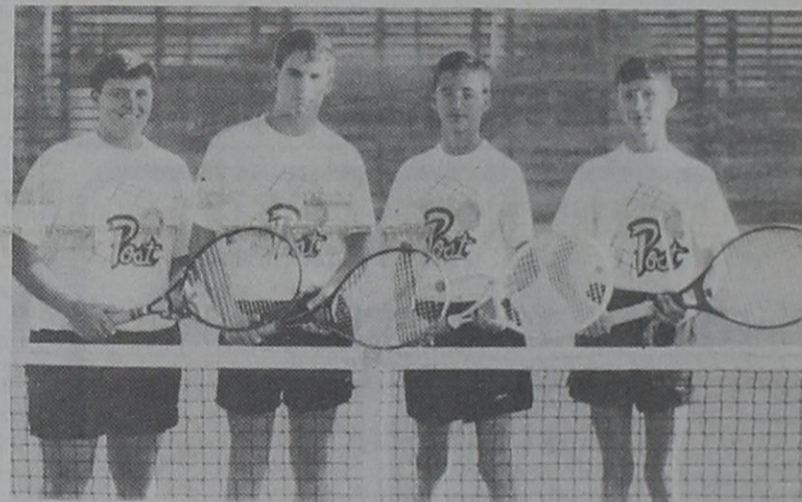

Lubbock officials explain lake project at Rotary Club lunch

Lubbock city manager Larry Cunningham, water superintendent Dan Hawkins and Granite Construction Co. project manager David Smith provided an overview of the Lake Alan Henry dam and lake project to members of the Post Rotary Club at its regular noon meeting April 16.

Smith opened the program with a brief description of Granite Construction Co., which is the fourth largest heavy civil engineering contractor in the United States. He said the company generates approximately \$540 million annually in Texas, California, Arizona, Nevada and Utah.

Smith said there are approximately 50 people now working on the project and the company expects to hire a total of 125. He encouraged local people to apply for jobs at the site.

Smith also said the project should be completed in April or May of 1993. Hawkins outlined plans for the ground breaking ceremonies which were held Friday, April 19. He also explained Lubbock's plans for the public access area.

Soil Conservation announced changes in 1990 Wetland farm bill regulations

The Wetland regulations of the 1990 Farm Bill have changed, stated Obie G. Kelley, Jr District Conservationist of the SCS in Post.

One of the most important changes involves the time frame when a person is in violation of Swampbuster. As of November 28, 1990, when a person converts a wetland for the purpose or to have the effect of making the production of an agricultural commodity possible he or she will be subject to a fine plus loss of eligibility of USDA benefits until the wetland has been restored stated Mr Kelley.

Persons who plan to convert a wetland for other than agricultural production, this includes things such as roads or building construction, may be able to get prior approval so they will be exempt from eligibility and benefit losses. Obie stated that this prior approval involves a person completing a AD-1026 Form at the ASCS Office. He or she will need to state their intentions on the AD-1026. At this time the SCS will approve or disapprove the proposal de-

pending on whether or not the proposal fits into a non-agricultural use and all needed permits have been obtained.

Mr Kelley stated that if a person is planning any new construction in a wetland he or she should contact the local ASCS or SCS Office prior to starting construction. In Post the SCS office is located at 210 W. Main or by phone at 495-2056.

Kim and Allen are planning a May 25 wedding in Post at the First Presbyterian Church.



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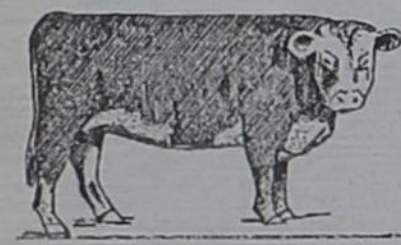

This Ann That

The week of April 21-27 is volunteer week. We at Texas Agricultural Extension Service want to take this opportunity to thank all of the faithful, dedicated volunteers who make our programs work.

You spend untold numbers of hours working with us to provide a high quality program for the development of Garza County youth. When you help the youth of the community, you help the whole community. We thank you very much.

We are all looking forward to summer as a time to slow down a little. We adults often discuss the

stress we are under and out need to do something about the stress in our lives. But, how many of us ever think about stress in the lives of children?

Common stressful events for children include going to day care, preschool, or school for the first time, fights or arguments with friends and family members, difficulties with a teacher or caregiver, a move to a new home or town, parents' divorce or separation, parents' loss of a job.

Adults can best help children to cope with life's stresses by talking with them openly about their feelings and plans. Helping children to understand the particular stress can result in the child's not feeling responsible for the changes that did occur.

Stress responses are unique for

each child. When adults observe the behavior of children closely, they quickly learn to recognize signs of stress. Adults can find out a great deal by listening carefully to a child's conversations, especially with other children at play.

The appearance of unusual behavior, especially if it is short-lived, is probably no cause for great concern. However, do long for long-term patterns of changes in a child's behavior.

For children, an important buffer against stress is a healthy parent/child relationship. Growing up in a caring family provides children with the security, consistency, respect, and honesty they need to become confident and independent people.

There are ways that adults can show children that they care. First, build communication patterns with children. Talk with and listen to your children. Describe and explain what they can expect. Just as important, listen to what your child has to say. Listen for the message in the words and also watch for the feeling and meaning behind them. Adults need to be sure to clarify and correct children's misconceptions about stressful events or situations.

Spending time alone with each child is also important. This encouragement to ask questions. Sometimes just the presence and attention of the adult reassures the child that the parent cares. Another important way to offer reassurance and support for children is through touch. A hug, a kiss, a smile makes every one feel better and more secure.

Don't forget that children have stresses too!

Y.E.S. Project Update

Garza County Y.E.S. (Youth Exchanging with Seniors) Project is off to an exciting start according to the nineteen PHS students and eighteen senior citizens who are participating in the project.

Students are helping seniors in their homes by doing laundry, ironing, washing dishes, cleaning light fixtures and windows, washing curtains, taking out trash, cleaning up yards and garden spots, and other tasks that are difficult for senior citizens to do for

themselves.

The students are volunteers and do not get paid for the services they provide, but they Y.E.S. Project can accept donations.

Airman Bilberry completes training

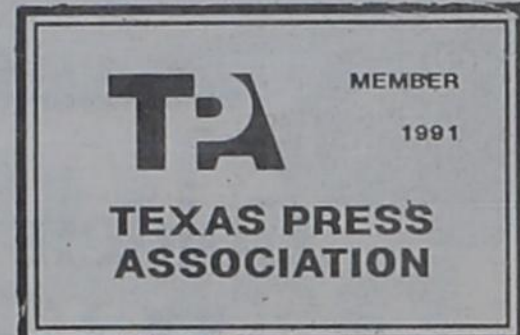
Airman John W. Bilberry has graduated from the aerospace propulsion specialist (turboprop) course at Chanute Air Force Base, Rantoul, Ill.
