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## Commissioners approve six point plan toward development of Post Reservoir

In a special called meeting Monday morning, the Garza County Commissioners' Court approved a six point plan designed to put development of the Post Reservoir Lake onto a firm schedule.

Commissioners met Monday afternoon with City of Post White River Municipal Water District (WRMWD) directors Charles Hardin and Bo Jackson. WRMWD Post director Everett Windham was out of town and unable to attend the session.

Garza County Judge Giles Dalby outlined the process, which includes a May 9 meeting with the full WRMWD board of directors.

"We want to politely explain our position," Dalby said, "and to request a firm schedule of development dates from the White River board. They have held a permit to build the dam since 1970 and the current permit provides for construction to begin by July 1992 with a completion date of 1995."

"If the White River directors do not provide a satisfactory answer for definitive development plans," Dalby added, "then we must be prepared to proceed with the establishment of a Garza County Water District for the purpose of securing a permit to build the lake."

The proposed Post Reservoir Lake is located approximately four miles east of Post and was surveyed in 1968, showing the dam site to be approximately one-quarter of a mile northwest (up river) from U.S. Hwy 380 on the North Fork Double Mountain Fork of the Brazos River.

"Time was," commissioner Herb Walls commented, "that the Post lake was supposed to be the primary future water for Lubbock, then along came Justiceburg and here we are."

Citing economic benefits for Post and Garza County, Dalby emphasized the recreational importance of the Post Lake for West Texas and specifically the future of this area.

"What we'll be doing will eventually be very important to our grandchildren and great-grandchildren," he said, "but we promised the voters we would get something going on this lake, and this is the only way I see to get some action."

Dalby also explained to commissioners that a petition by 50 people in Garza County would be necessary for the court to establish a water district, with a referendum by the voters to decide the issue.

"This way, the people can decide," Dalby added, "if they want to develop the lake, the referendum will settle the issue."

"Could be that White River might want to just relinquish the permit, or the Texas Water Commission might transfer the permit," Dalby said.

Following the proposed meeting with the White River board of directors, the plan includes consultations with a legal firm specializing in water districts, seeking a petition to establish a water district, set a date for a referendum and appoint members to the newly created water district.

"When this lake is finished," Dalby said, "it will ensure economic growth and vitality for this area for years to come, you know, people just tend to flock toward a body of water."

Attending the meeting were commissioners John Valdez, Albert Stone, Sammy Ellis, Walls, Judge Dalby and clerk Sonny Gossett.

## Council approves election canvas, sets Friday for administering oaths of office

Post City Council members canvassed and approved Saturday's municipal election results, then set Friday noon at City Hall for formal administering of the oaths of office to those elected to serve.

Mayor Giles McCrary, who was edged out in the election by challenger Jim Jackson, asked Jackson if a survey had been done on Jackson's residence, to determine that the property is located in the city limits.

Jackson replied that a survey had been done, "that was before I first ran for city council," he said, "and Pat Walker said it was okay."

McCrary then asked Jackson if a copy of the survey could be delivered to city hall to clear up the issue about the location of Jackson's residence. Jackson agreed to provide a copy of the survey before the Friday oaths of office ceremony.

"Good," McCrary said, "this will put to rest the question, which I'm sure you'd like to get out of the way."

In other action, the council suggested to Gayla Leary to resubmit her request to operate hair styling services from her home to the Planning and Zoning Commission, explaining to the P&Z that no signs would be placed at the residence. Leary said that since Anne Leake's beauty shop had been allowed to be placed in a residential zone, she felt her request should be approved.

Energas Slaton and Post manager Weldon Self requested the city to suspend the proposed rate increase, joining the action of other affected cities, to allow time for negotiations. The proposed increase, the first since 1983, provides for a six percent hike, with an average of \$29 per customer per year. The delay sets an implementation date of August 22, 1991.

McCrary reported on two public hearings concerning redistricting, explaining that although few attended the meetings held at the Pleasant Home Baptist Church and the Holy Cross Catholic Church, "it was a valuable session and helps us toward the goal of single member districts."

Following the mayor's report, city council member Larry Waldrup informed Jackson that "in reference to your advertisement in the newspaper, I want to go on public record to inform you that we have been working on this very carefully for some time, and it is a complicated procedure that has to be done in a specified manner."

Council members were provided a proposed drug and alcohol abuse program for study. The city is required to implement a program, which must be approved by the workmen's compensation board.

City manager Bob Turner reported that the West Main Street project, being conducted by Bo Jackson, is completed and "everything went very smooth." He reminded the council that all money for the project has been donated. The city will install a sprinkler system, with the equipment to be paid for by private donations.

Lights, trees and benches will also be purchased by private contributions. McCrary announced to the council that the Federal Aviation Administration has approved the disbursement of a \$500,000 grant to upgrade the city/county airport. Funding for the project is included in the fiscal year 1993 budget, with

planning to begin this summer. The city and county will be required to fund as much as 10 percent of the project total.

The council authorized Waldrup, in cooperation with the volunteer fire department, to research costs and details for the purchase of new fire truck. The newest fire truck is a 1982 model. "We need to have better equipment to handle potential oil fires and to be able to get out into the county," Waldrup explained.

Turner informed the council that the budget "is in good shape." The city manager also informed the council that repairs to the lights at the baseball field have been completed at a cost substantially lower than expected. The total was approximately \$1250.

McCrary reported that the "village idiot" had shot a hole the size of a volleyball into the side of the concession stand at the park.

He also informed the council that a joint meeting between the Garza County Commissioners' Court and the White River Municipal Water District would be held Thursday evening and council members were invited to attend. The topic for discussion is the long sought Post Reservoir Lake, which White River has had on the drawing board since 1968, with a permit which was first issued by the Texas Water Commission in 1970.

Closing out the meeting, McCrary thanked the council for its cooperation and expressed his appreciation "of being able to serve the people of Post these past 22 years."

"I've put a lot of me into this, and I have enjoyed it," he said. He cautioned the council to go slowly on making changes which might end up hurting the people and the future of the community.

Attending the meeting were council members Irene Fry, Dan Lamb, Jim Schooler, Larry Mills, Waldrup, Mayor McCrary, city manager Turner and city secretary Wanda Wilkerson.

## Jackson wins mayoral contest in low voter turnout Saturday

A dismal turnout of less than 25 percent of registered voters in Post put a new mayor in office as challenger Jim Jackson collected 312 votes to incumbent Giles McCrary's 290.

City council members Larry Mills (366) and Dan Lamb (361) both won reelection over Marion Cruse (222). A total of 532 votes were cast from a registered voter list of approximately 2,400.

Post ISD trustees Dan Hodges, Gary Workman, Barbara Hardin, Mark Kirkpatrick were reelected along with newcomer Rex Cash, Place 6. Southland ISD trustees Todd Taylor, Monroe Buxkemper Jr and V.C. Wheeler also were reelected.

Garza Memorial Hospital board of directors incumbents Jack Alexander, Zoe Kirkpatrick and David Nichols all were reelected. (Continued on Page 12)

### Law officers busy with arrests

The past couple of weeks have been busy for Garza County Sheriff's deputies, involved in a variety of arrests.

### Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these procedures if you have a concern about:

- the value placed on your property;
- exemptions that may apply to you;
- cancellation of agricultural appraisal;
- whether your property is taxable;
- which local governments should be taxing your property; or
- you think the appraisal district has done something else that adversely affected you.

**Informal Review:** Call or come by the Garza County Appraisal District, 124 E. Main, Post, Texas 79356. Tele: (806) 495-3518

**Review by the Appraisal Review Board:** If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board.

The appraisal review board (ARB) is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals and other concerns listed above. They have the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notification of the time, date, and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 124 E. Main, Post, Texas.

**Note:** You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires you to sign an affidavit saying that you haven't done so before the ARB hears your case.

**Review by the District Court:** After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the

ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

**More information:** You can get more information by contacting your appraisal district at Garza County Appraisal District, 124 E. Main, Post, Tx. (806) 495-3518. You can also get a pamphlet describing how to prepare a protest from the appraisal district or from the State Property Tax Board, 4301 Westbank Drive, Building B, Suite 100, Austin, Texas 78746.

### Deadline for filing protests with the ARB

(the deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday)

**Usual deadline:** On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

**Late protests (If you miss the usual deadline for good cause, Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.)** Before the day the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact the appraisal district for more information.

**Special deadlines:** Change of use (if the appraisal district has informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land) Before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

**ARB changes (if the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed)** Before the 10th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

The single-payment National Merit \$2,000 Scholarships are distributed on a representational basis, and the number of winners in each is proportional to the size of the state's graduating high school senior class.

The National Merit Scholars named today were chosen by a committee of college admissions officers and secondary school counselors who evaluated a substantial amount of information collected from all Finalists and their high schools.

Considered in the selection process were each Finalist's academic record (including amount and difficulty level of course work as well as grades earned), scores from two tests, significant contributions to the school and community, and personal interests and goals, as well as the recommendation of an official of the Finalist's high school.

National Merit \$2,000 Scholarship winners in each state are the Finalists judged by the committee to have the strongest contribution of abilities and accomplishments needed for success in rigorous college studies.

## This ANN That

May is National High Blood Pressure Education Month. As a part of this observance, I'd like to remind you of some facts and give

a few practical suggestions for controlling blood pressure.  
High blood pressure has long been established as the key risk factor for stroke, the third leading cause of death in the U.S. Cigarette smoking and overweight are also risk factors for stroke.  
Adults with normal blood pressure should have it checked at least once every two years. Those with high blood pressure and those who are taking medication for high blood pressure need to have it checked more often, according to the doctor's instructions.  
Recommendations for controlling high blood pressure include a low sodium diet, weight control, limited use of alcohol, regular exercise, and proper medication.  
One of the most challenging of

these recommendations to follow is reducing sodium in the diet. Here are some tips to help you:  
\* Replace the salt shaker on your table with one of the commercial salt-free herb blends. These products are available in the spice and herb section at the grocery stores.  
\* Skip the cold cuts and hot dogs at lunch. Try plain sliced turkey, chicken or lean roast beef instead.  
\* Rediscover fresh or unsalted frozen vegetables instead of canned ones. If you have to use canned foods in a pinch, drain the liquid and rinse the vegetables to remove some of the salt.  
\* Watch out for frozen dinners and other prepared foods. They often contain large amounts of salt. Make your own dinners using herbs instead of salt. Package and freeze these dinners individually. They will be ready to pop into the oven or microwave when you need a meal in a hurry.  
\* For snacks with a low-salt crunch, use bread sticks coated with sesame seeds, popcorn lightly sprinkled with parmesan cheese, or unsalted nuts.  
\* Season foods with garlic, curry powder, lemon pepper, dry mustard, basil, thyme, or lemon juice.  
Experiment with some of the salt substitutes and salt replacements. You may not miss salt at all, and by reducing sodium in your diet you will take a giant step toward controlling your blood pressure.

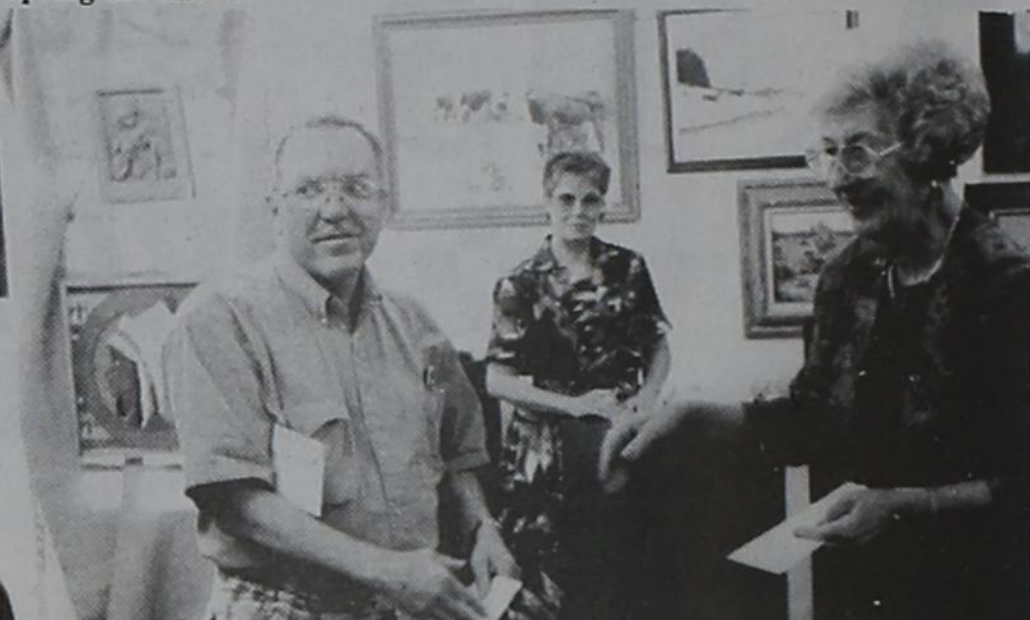

Students who have been working with the project provided

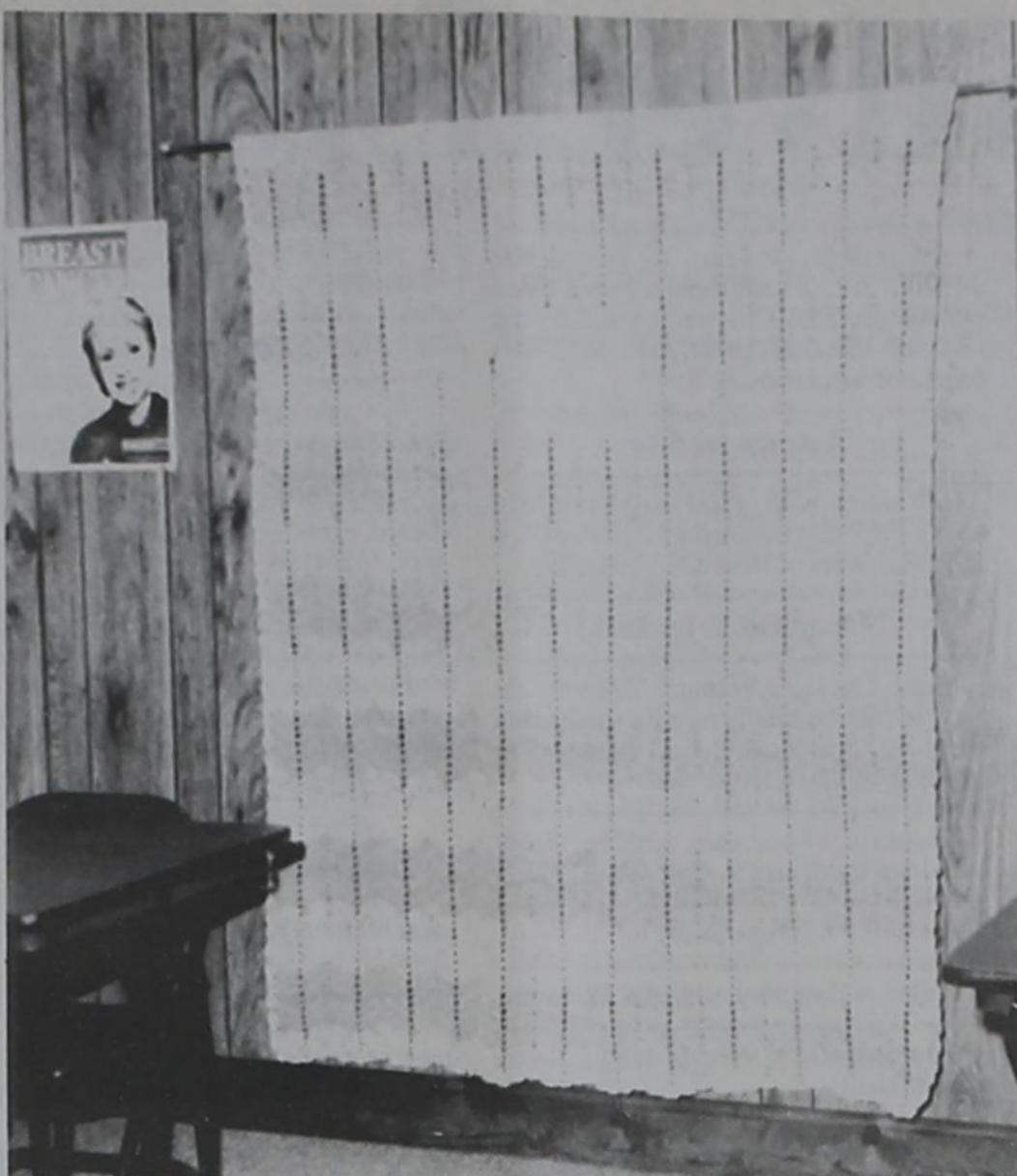

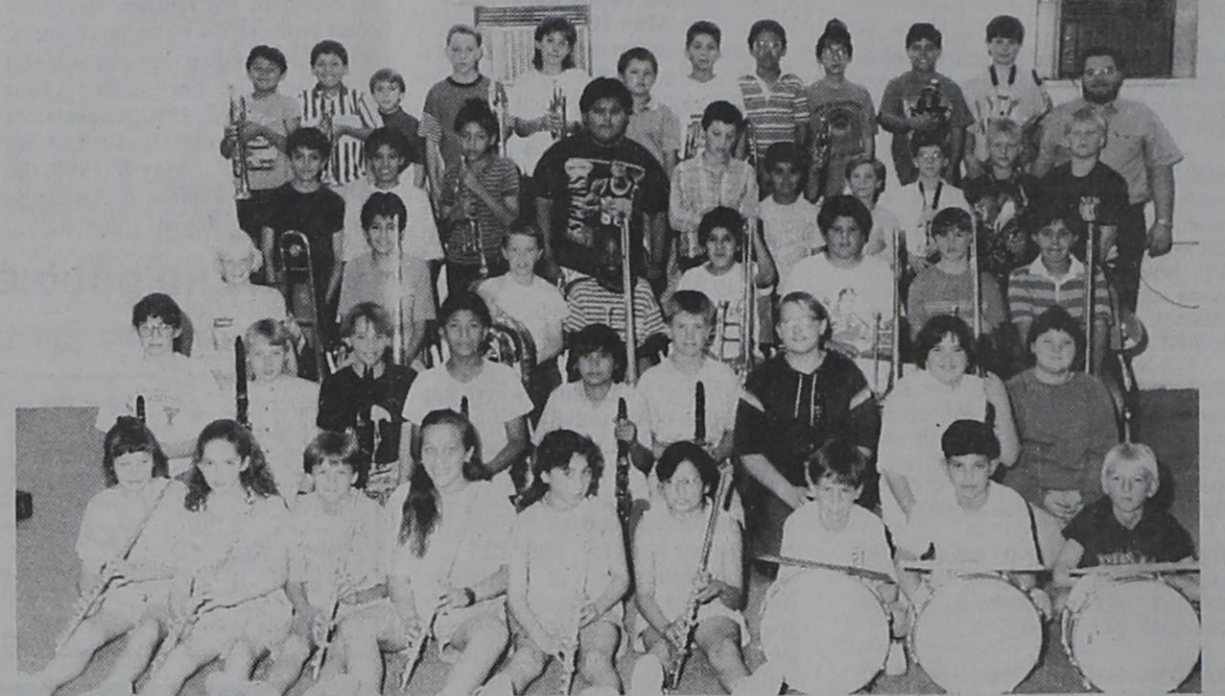
