

Cotton Unlimited solves oil spill problems with Instasorb All Purpose Oil Absorbent

Wednesday morning, May 14, Derrick Walls discovered a major problem on his regular inspection at the Post waste water treatment plant, located just south of the Postex plant building near Avenue F.

"Maybe the big rain Tuesday night had something to do with it," Walls said, "but we had about 75 to 125 gallons of what looked like used motor oil in the tank."

Walls went to Paul Muncrief at Cotton Unlimited and invited Muncrief to test his new oil absorbing material.

Muncrief was delighted to show off his new product and it worked. "It removed 98 percent of the oil," Walls emphasized, "and in just a matter of few minutes."

Had the oil contamination not been removed, the waste water treatment plant would have been in trouble. The system uses bacterial enzymes, which would have been destroyed by the oil and would have put the city out of compliance with state regulations.

The cause of the oil contamination is still not determined, although Walls and Delbert Rudd both suspect the heavy rainfall may have flushed used motor oil from surface areas into unsealed "manholes". There are no storm sewer outlets in Post, so intentional dumping of the contaminated oil is unlikely.

"This is the first time we've ever had this problem," Walls said.

Muncrief began development of the cotton absorbent material more than five years ago, and he attempted to introduce the material at no charge to Alaska officials following the giant Exxon oil spill. "No one would talk to me," he said, "I finally talked to the mayor up there, and he said he'd love for me to come up and try it out, but there was no place for me to stay."

Muncrief said that he was never able to get anyone in Exxon to even talk to him.

Recent attempts to help in the Persian Gulf also met with stoned silence from officials. The oil cleanup in Post was videotaped, and a recent visit by Texas Department of Commerce officials was well received.

Instasorb All Purpose Oil Absorbents, the name of the Cotton Unlimited product, is designed to contain and control petroleum based fluids. The material repels water while absorbing oil and petroleum based liquids. Instasorb also stays afloat for an indefinite period of time.

Among its qualities, Instasorb may be used in place of clay granules for in-plant spills, under leaking equipment and machinery, without the inherent dust maintenance and disposal problems created by the clay products.

The water repellent, oil absorbent properties of Instasorb also makes the material an excellent tool for controlling cleaning up and recovering oil from bodies of water.

Some of the advantages listed by Cotton Unlimited for the product include leaving very little ash when incinerated, can be cut into custom widths and lengths, picks up 20 times its own weight in oil and has high natural cotton fiber content, making the product nature's way to remove oil.

The product is 85 percent cotton, no less than 75 percent with a polyester fiber making up the remainder.

Local man charged with assault on officer

A 37 year old Garza County man is being held in the jail here on two \$75,000 bonds, charged with two counts of aggravated assault on a peace officer, attempting to take a weapon from a peace officer and aggravated sexual assault. The case has been filed in the district court. The man was arrested following a disturbance at a North Avenue M residence May 11.

Also on May 11 a 22 year old man was arrested on warrants from Gonzales, Gillespie and Harris counties for assault to do bodily injury, violation of probation, bad checks and theft by bad check. He was released following the posting of five bail bonds.

On May 7 law enforcement officers arrested a 29 year old man, charged with DWI in the county court. He is in the county jail pending the posting of a \$2,500 bond.

On the same day a 25 year old man was arrested under terms of revoking of his probation. He is being held in the county jail.

City voters may be given chance to assure future economic growth here

For years I have heard citizens here complaining, "They never do anything to get us more jobs and get some industry in here."

Well, if plans outlined at a special called meeting of the Post City Council are approved, voters here will have an opportunity to insure jobs and a strong economic future for Post.

The complaint about "they won't do" will have to be placed squarely on the shoulders of the people. The decision to provide state approved guaranteed financing to help Cotton Unlimited Inc. begin full fledged production and sale of its products will depend entirely on city voters.

City council members were briefed Monday evening by Cotton Unlimited's president Joe Pate, along with financial specialists from Diversified Lenders of Lubbock and Consolidated Financial Resources Inc. of Greenville.

L. Scott Mann of Diversified Lenders explained the funding program, which would require approval of the City of Post for the more than \$1 million loan assistance.

The state legislature in 1989 authorized the loan program for cities interested in helping new industries.

Pate explained the economic advantages, including a briefing of the three patents held by the corporation. Two of the patents are for manufacturing and process of cotton based insulation materials and the third is for the newly developed oil absorbing cotton based material.

The patents have been valued at more than \$2 million and could be used as part of the collateral for the bond issue.

Pate also emphasized that the financing is strictly for the purchase of equipment needed to manufacture the products.

Cotton Unlimited vice president Paul Muncrief, when asked by city council member Larry Mills how soon production could begin, said "we could be in full production within four weeks after the equipment arrives."

In the first year Pate said the plant will employ up to 128 people and double that in the second year. The estimated first year payroll will exceed \$1 million and put an extra \$2 million into the local economy in the second year.

The trucking industry will be one of the main benefactors when production begins, with approximately 60,000 square feet of cotton insulation material loaded per truck. Pate said that the first year would see a need for six trucks and 15 drivers and the second year 12 trucks and 30 drivers.

Cotton producers on the South Plains will also see a big dividend, as the plant will use almost exclusively low grade cotton from this area.

Buyers for the product are waiting for delivery, but financing for purchasing the equipment has been a problem.

"We have exhausted all the conventional avenues for commercial lending," Post Economic Development Corp. board of directors member Patty Kirkpatrick explained. "Banks and lending institutions all think this is great, but with the current government restraints on the banking industry, the money is just not available."

If approved the loan program would use the equipment for collateral during the 12 year payment period.

Thomas Shirey of Consolidated Financial Resources explained that Cotton Unlimited would make the annual payments to the city and the city would then pay the bond holders.

"What we need is to know whether or not the people of Post want to support Cotton Unlimited," Shirey said, "and if so, then we can package the financing to meet the needs."

Pate said additional funding for the corporation is being sought through a \$2 million operating loan from the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Mayor Jim Jackson expressed the appreciation of the council for the information, then said that the issue would be included in the next regular meeting in June.

Attending the meeting were council members Irene Fry, Larry Waldrip, Dan Lamb, Mills, Mayor Jackson, city manager Bob Turner, city secretary Wanda Wilkerson and city attorney Harvey Morton.

Post Economic Development board of directors members also at the meeting to answer questions were Giles Dalby, Patty Kirkpatrick, Wanda Mitchell, A.C. Cash and Charles Adams.

Commissioners cancel radio contract, discuss Post Lake project

At the regular meeting Monday morning, the Garza County Commissioners' Court notified Commercial Radio of the termination of the contract for maintenance in anticipation of the installation of the new radios recently purchased by bid from Parkinson Electronics. The terminated contract was costing the county \$375 per month, and Sheriff Freddy Cockrell explained that it seemed every time repair was made, "the repair wasn't covered in the maintenance agreement, so we got billed for the repair and still paid the monthly fee."

Judge Giles Dalby recapped the meeting held last Thursday at White River with the White River Municipal Water District board of directors. "It was a cordial meeting and I think very positive," he said.

Dalby also informed commissioners that the Austin attorney representing the county on the lake project is preparing a detailed report of the activities through the past 20 years and is expected to present a preliminary report later this week when Dalby will be in Austin. "We should have the latest water quality report also," Dalby added.

His visit to Austin includes a meeting with Senator Lloyd Bentsen to discuss a proposed Job Corps Training Center to be located in Garza County.

A review of the courthouse lawn maintenance and janitorial services was postponed until the June meeting. Yvonne Sapp was at Monday's meeting to discuss the services, and was requested to return to the June session.

A heating and air conditioning proposal for the probation office was tabled with commissioners requesting additional study on the best way to cool the area. A cost of \$4,000 to \$5,000 was estimated for the central and heating project.

Justice of the Peace Dee C. Justice submitted his monthly report, showing a significant increase in his case load, which prompted an extension of the Ambulance Service billing project. Commissioners had earlier authorized Justice to perform the service from his office. A discussion concerning the best way to get the ambulance billing up to date resulted in a 60 day extension of the effort in Justice's office.

Commissioners accepted a statistical report from McCreary, Veselka, Bragg and Allen on the delinquent tax collection program.

The court authorized Dalby to contact Motorola to renew their agreement for renting space on the radio tower. The agreement expired in April 1990.

Attending the meeting were Dalby, commissioners Sammy Ellis, Albert Stone, John Valdez, Herbert Walls, clerk Sonny Gossett and treasurer Ruth Ann Young.

Commissioners, city council meets with White River Municipal Water District to discuss plans for Post Lake Reservoir

Members of the Garza County Commissioners Court and Post City Council met last Thursday evening at White River with Municipal Water District board of directors to discuss plans for developing the Post Lake site, which is proposed on the North Fork Double Mountain Fork of the Brazos River approximately four miles east of Post.

Judge Giles Dalby represented the Post group and presented a suggestion for cooperating with the water district to "get the lake built as soon as possible."

Following his explanation of the Commissioners' Court position on the lake development, Dalby reminded the water district board that the permit to build the lake expires in July 1992, "and we are somewhat concerned that the permit may not be renewed."

"Perhaps White River would want to release the permit to us," Dalby suggested, "and we could establish a water district to build the lake."

WRMWD board member Gene McLaughlin explained that the major problem in developing the lake has been the quality of the water as reported by the Texas Water Quality Control Board.

"The water has gone from good to bad in the past five years," McLaughlin said, "and what's really serious is that it keeps getting worse, and no one seems to be able to identify the source of the problem."

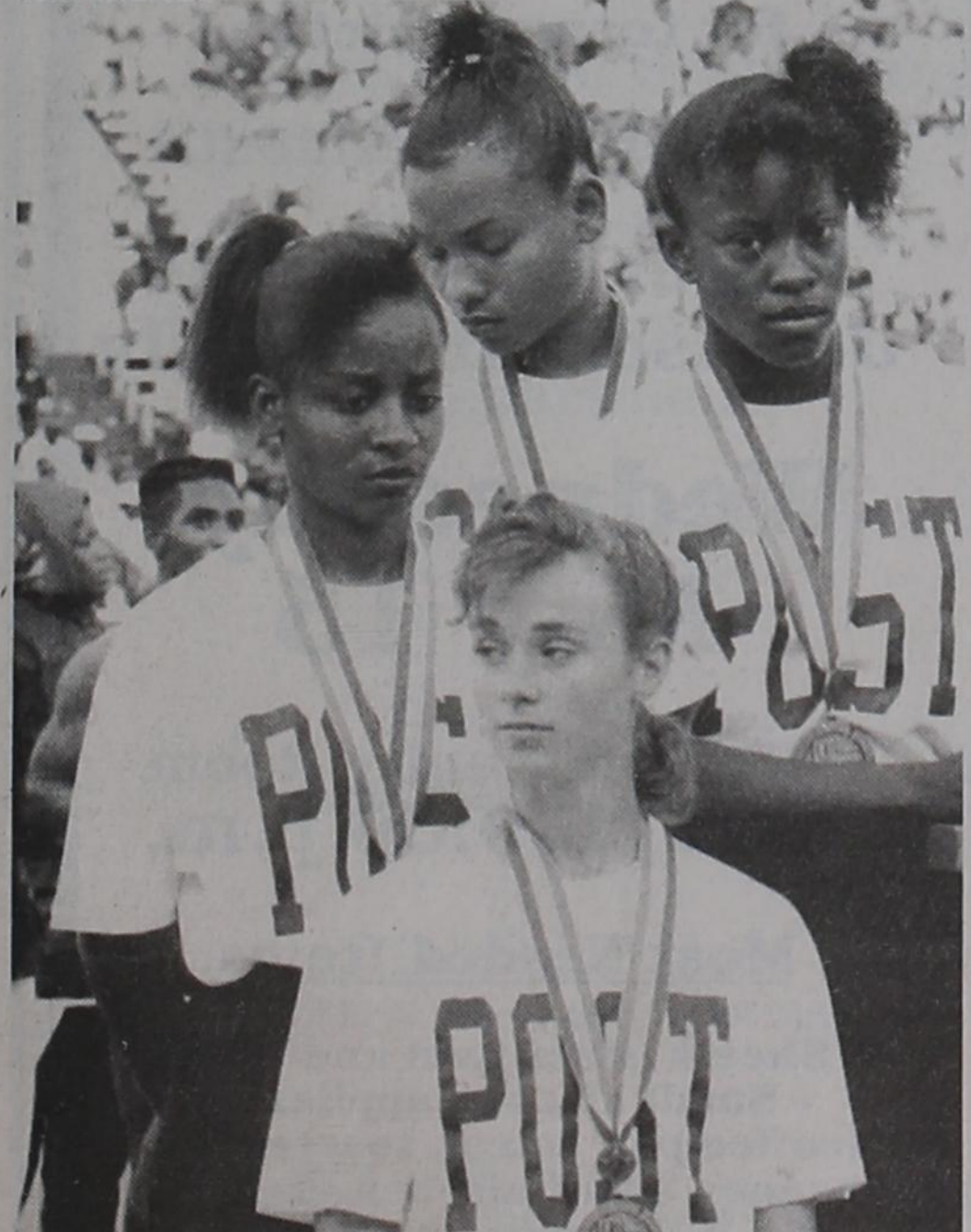
When asked by city council member Larry Mills what the exact contaminants were, WRMWD's AIO'Brien replied, "solid wastes, with some solinium."

McLaughlin suggested to Dalby that perhaps Dalby could use his influence to speed up the current water quality study. The study is into its sixth month.

"I've been drinking untreated water out of that river since 1941," Dalby said, "and as far as we can tell, there's nothing wrong with it."

WRMWD directors expressed appreciation to the Post group for its support in the project and assured Dalby that "we want to develop the lake just as much as you do, but our hands are tied until we can find out what is polluting the river."

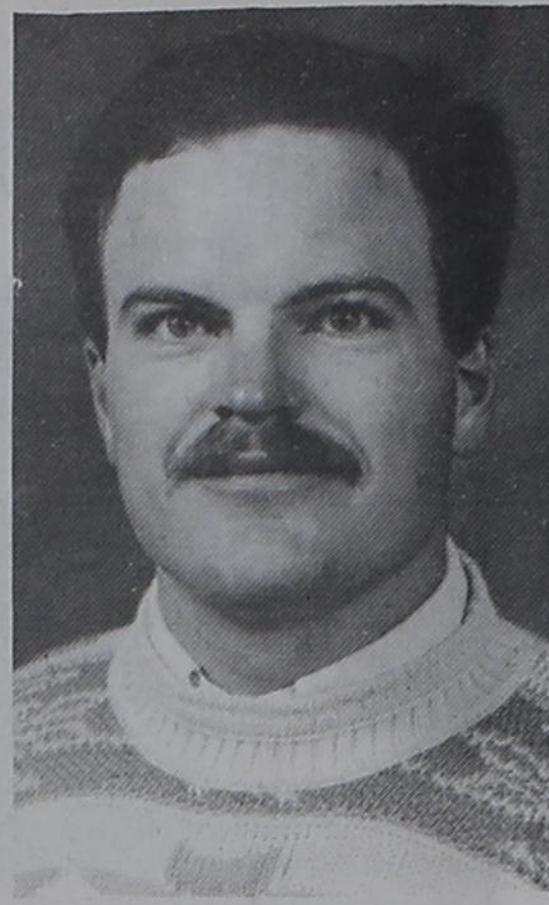
Ron Graves recipient of 1991 John Tarleton Spirit Award

They had only lived there for the past two months when Roger took a job with the Bovina Feeders.

The tornado struck the house at 7:49 p.m., the time being recorded by a neighbor's home video of the twister.

Debbie was in the kitchen preparing supper, while Roger, who had just come in from work, was stripped down to his underwear, resting on the sofa.

Roger had not had time to hook up the antenna wires to the outside television antenna, so they didn't know a tornado was on the ground in their area... but Roger knew something was up with the strong wind, hail and rain.

He looked out the living room window and saw sheets of tin flying in the air... then hollered to Debbie to get the girls and head for the basement.

As the family got into the basement, which was located near the kitchen, Debbie said she wasn't sure if she turned off the gas range.

So Roger went up to check to see if the gas was off, but just about the time he stepped through the door he heard Debbie coming up the stairs. Roger turned to her and told her to get down, at the same time the walls in the house began to collapse and bricks started falling.

Roger pushed Debbie down the stairs, then when he was about halfway down bricks hit him in the back and one cut about an inch gash across the back of his head.

The family was trapped in the basement for approximately 30 to 45 minutes, when Lazbuddie Volunteer Firemen and county crews pulled the debris off. Roger stepped out and said, "well, fellas, I guess you caught me with my pants down."

Ever with a sense of humor, Roger also refused to be carried to the hospital for treatment to his cuts and bruises.

There were no other injuries.

Roger's mom and dad, Johnnie and Sue Johnson, went to help Saturday morning and Johnnie reports that they

were able to salvage the washer, dryer, gas range and microwave. Roger's horse trailer, which ended up approximately one-half mile away, was completely destroyed, but his pickup truck, which was moved only about 30 feet, suffered minor damages.

"The generosity of the people in Lazbuddie and Post have just been tremendous," Johnnie said.

A benefit is being held at the First National Bank community room from 7 to 9 p.m. for the family today. A host of personal and household items are needed, as almost everything they had was destroyed.

Roger was formerly employed by the Cross H Ranch.
